**1. Organization and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies**

**Nature of Organization**

The Diocesan Investment Trust of the Diocese of New Jersey, (the "Trust"), is invested in fixed income and equity securities for the benefit of Parishes and Institutional accounts of the Diocese of New Jersey who hold shares in the Trust. The objectives of the Trustees of the Trust are to maintain or increase the real value of the Fund in perpetuity.

**Basis of Accounting**

The financial statements of the Trust have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with United States generally accepted accounting principles.

**Basis of Presentation**

The Trust has adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards covering "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations". The statement established standards for external financial reporting by not-for-profit organizations. The Trust has also adopted guidance from "Audit and Accounting Guide: Investment Companies."

**Investments**

Security transactions are recorded on the trade date. Investments are stated at market value, which is the closing sales price on the last day of trading during the year. The difference between cost and market value is reflected as unrealized appreciation (depreciation) of investments. Realized gains (losses) from securities transactions are determined for financial reporting purposes on the identified cost basis. Dividends are recorded on the ex-dividend date. Interest income is accrued as earned. Debt securities are recorded at amortized cost.

**Capital Transactions**

Subscriptions and redemptions from the Trust are based upon the number of shares subscribed or redeemed multiplied by the previous month's end Net Asset Value ("NAV") per share.

**Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with United States generally accepted accounting principles may require management to make assumptions and estimates that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

**Income Taxes**

The Internal Revenue Service has classified the Trust as a tax-exempt corporation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from certain activities that are not directly related to the Trust's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. The Trust has no unrelated business income for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009.

The Trust adopted the accounting pronouncement dealing with uncertain tax positions, as of January 1, 2009. Upon adoption of this accounting pronouncement, the Trust had no unrecognized tax benefits. The Trust's policy is to evaluate uncertain tax positions in accordance with Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) Topic 740, "Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes". Pursuant to the ASC, management has determined that as of December 31, 2010 and 2009, it does not have any uncertain tax positions required to be reported. The Trust is not required to file Form 990 or 990-T with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), and accordingly these returns have not been filed with the IRS. In addition there have been no tax related interest or penalties for periods presented in the financial statements. Should any such penalties and interest be incurred, the Trust's policy would be to recognize them as operating expenses.

**2. Fair Value of Investments**

The Trust has adopted Accounting Standards Codification 820, *Fair Value Measurements* ("ASC 820"). The Trust has adopted ASC 820 with respect to its financial assets and liabilities only. ASC 820 defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value under generally accepted accounting principles and enhances disclosure about fair value measurements. Fair value is defined under ASC 820 as the exchange price that would be received for an asset or paid to transfer a liability (an exit price) in the principal or most advantageous market for the asset or liability in an orderly transaction between market participants on the measurement date. Valuation techniques used to measure fair value under ASC 820 must maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. The standard describes a fair value hierarchy based on three levels of inputs, of which the first two are considered observable and the last unobservable.

These levels are:

- Level 1 – Valuation is based upon quoted prices for identical instruments traded in active markets.
- Level 2 – Valuation is based upon quoted prices for similar instruments in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar instruments in markets that are not active, and model-based valuation techniques for which all significant assumptions are observable in the market.
- Level 3 – Valuation is generated from model-based techniques that use significant assumptions not observable in the market. These unobservable assumptions reflect one's estimates of assumptions that a market participant would use in pricing the asset or liability. Valuation techniques include use of option pricing models, discounted cash flow models and similar techniques.

**Investments in Securities**

Investments in securities that are exchange traded on major securities exchanges are valued at their last reported sales price as of the valuation date.

**Investments in Private Investments**

Investments in Private Investment companies are valued, as a practical expedient, utilizing the net asset valuations provided by the underlying private investment companies, without adjustment, when the net asset valuations of the investments are calculated in a manner consistent with GAAP for investment companies. Investments in private investments companies are categorized in Level 3 of the fair value hierarchy.

For applicable assets and liabilities subject to this pronouncement, the Trust will value such assets and liabilities using quoted market prices in active market for identical assets and liabilities to the extent possible. To the extent that such market prices are not available, the Trust will next attempt to value such assets and liabilities using observable measurement criteria, including quoted market prices of similar assets and liabilities in active and inactive markets and other corroborated factors. In the event that quoted market prices in active markets and other observable measurement criteria are not available, the Trust will develop measurement criteria based on the best information available.

In December 2008, the Trust received notification from the Trustee of the Topiary Trust (the "Fund") in which the Trust had a \$4,517,080 investment as of December 31, 2008 that the Fund had suspended redemptions and would effect an orderly liquidation of the Fund's assets. On January 31, 2010, April 30, 2010 and August 31, 2010, the Fund distributed \$373,561, \$242,800, and \$90,576 to the Trust, respectively. On March 31, 2009, July 31, 2009 and September 30, 2009, the Fund distributed \$511,259, \$373,647, and \$220,437 to the Trust, respectively. From January 1, 2011 to October 2013, the Trust has received total distributions of \$485,670, including investment income, from the Fund.

**3. Accrued Expenses**

Accrued expenses represent amounts due for investment advisory, custodial, service and audit fees directly associated with investments in securities.

**4. Dividends**

The aggregate dividends for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009 of \$1,666,422 and \$1,685,342 were declared and payable monthly to participants of record as of the end of each month under a standing resolution of the Board of Trustees. Dividends are first charged to increase in net assets resulting from operations, then to accumulated undistributed dividends and interest net of expenses, and the balance to trust principal.

**5. Monthly Unit Valuation**

Monthly unit valuations are calculated based upon the Trust Net Asset Value as of month end divided by the number of shares outstanding. These values are the basis for contribution or withdrawal of units during the succeeding month.

Monthly unit valuations are calculated without consideration of timing differences for items such as dividends reinvested at month end. The impact of these timing differences on the value per share is insignificant.

**6. Concentration of Credit Risk**

The Trust maintains cash balances in several financial institutions. The balances are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. At times, the deposits may exceed the amounts of the insurance provided on such deposits. Historically, the Trust has not experienced any credit related losses.

The Trust holds significant investments in debt and equity securities of various publicly traded companies and other investments. Investments in these types of securities have an inherent risk of loss due to market value fluctuations, including the risk that should these companies fail, the securities would be rendered worthless.

**7. Effects of New Accounting Pronouncements**

In January 2010, the FASB issued ASU 2010-06, *Improving Disclosures about Fair Value Measurements*. ASU 2010-06 requires additional disclosures about fair value measurements including transfers in and out of Levels 1 and 2 and a higher level of disaggregation for the different types of financial instruments. For the reconciliation of Level 3 fair value measurements, information about purchases, sales, issuances and settlements should be presented separately. This ASU is effective for annual and interim reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2009 for most of the new disclosures and for periods beginning after December 15, 2010 for the new Level 3 disclosures. Comparative disclosures are not required in the first year the disclosures are required.

In May 2011, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update (ASU) 2011-04, *Fair Value Measurement and Disclosure requirements in U.S. GAAP and IFRS*. This standard does not affect previous guidance on fair value measurement. Its provisions are limited to clarifying language on several fair value issues and additional disclosures, especially for level 3 fair values. It is effective for nonpublic entities for annual periods beginning after December 15, 2011. In the period of adoption, a reporting entity will be required to disclose a change, if any, in valuation technique and related inputs resulting from the application of the amendments and quantify the total effect, if practicable.

The Trust is not aware of other new accounting standards that were required to be adopted in 2010, or yet to be adopted, that would materially affect the Trust's 2010 or prospective financial statements.

**8. Subsequent events**

The Trust has evaluated subsequent events occurring after the balance sheet through October 11, 2013, which is the date of the financial statements were available to be issued. Based on this evaluation, the Trust has determined that no subsequent event requires disclosure in the financial statements.
