Your Spare Parts

We recommend that you carry a spare set of seals for your dry suit and a tube of Aquaseal.

Additionally, like all dive trips, you should carry a selection of o-rings designed to work with your equipment. It is especially important that you carry some spare DIN o-rings since they have a tendency to fall out.

It never seems you can have too many cable ties so bring more than you think you will need.

Also, don't forget talc and zipper wax.

Check Your Equipment

Please make sure all of your diving equipment is in current service. Eric and Faith will not be doing annual equipment maintenance on this trip.

Antarctica

Going on an Expedition may be is unlike any other activity you have done before. One of the sponsors, Diving Unlimited International will be bringing some state of the art dive clothing for you to try but it will not be available for you on every dive because others will want to try it as well. As such, you need to plan on bringing what you need for both the diving and the excursions.

Expect 30°, but the temperatures can be 20°-50° with windy and wet conditions possible.

According to Oceanwide Expeditions, “*the secret to keeping warm is the layering principle. It is better to have several light layers of clothing than one heavy layer...The most important layer is the outer waterproof and windproof shell.*” You should pack clothing accordingly.

Buenos Aires

Expect 80°-90° with high humidity during the day. It cools off some in the evening.

Ushuaia

Expect 40°-50°. Wind and rain are possible.

Mark Your Equipment

Much of the equipment, drysuit undergarments, luggage, etc. look similar. To help assure you keep up with yours, please put your name on **everything**. Remember, there was a reason your mother put your name in all of your underwear and clothes when you went to camp!

You can use paint pens (available at Oceanic Ventures) and sharpies.
