UCI's Research Propels Shared Use Car Project

transportation network enables commuters to drive battery-powered vehicles to work.

The electric car research project that utilizes both Toyota's E.com model and two of UCI's departments, the National Fuel Cell Research Center and the Institute of Transportation Studies, continues to forge the path for smog-free commutes to work and better air quality in Orange County.

Launch of the Zero Emission Vehicle-Network Enabled Transport (ZEV-NET) program commenced on April 18.

The program uses special battery-powered vehicles to transport people to the Irvine Transportation Center located at the Irvine Spectrum, where the vehicle is then parked in a special reserved parking spot with built-in chargers to prepare the vehicle for the next scheduled use, according to Michael McNally, associate professor at UCI's Institute of Transportation Studies.

While parked and stationed at their workplace, different people can utilize the vehicle at different

times during the day to run errands, and after returning the car to the Irvine Transportation Center, another commuter on his or her way back from work can use it again to get home, according to McNally.

Also known as the Shared Use Station Car Program, the project is scheduled to enter its third phase, according to McNally.

The first two phases consisted of the E.com car being tested by workers of various companies and corporations, mainly for business-related excursions during the day.

The research end of the project is headed by UCI's National Fuel Cell Research Center and the Institute of Transportation Studies at UCI, in collaboration with researchers from UC Riverside, UCI's Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Toyota

Also involved with the project are the City of Irvine, The Irvine Company and corporations, such as Orthodyne Electronics, Quantum ATL, located at University Research Park near the UCI campus, and CTG Energetics.

McNally said that the fuel cells that generate zero-emission electricity in the car decrease environmental problems caused by normal

Elderly Man Commits Suicide

TRAGEDY: Police suspect 81-year-old man jumped from sixth floor of Social Science parking structure.

The lifeless body of an 81-yearold man was found face-up on the ground beside the Social Science parking structure on May 9 by UCI police.

According to Captain Al Brown of the UCI Police, the department received a call at 7:58 p.m. notifying them that a man, later identified as Thomas Taylor, had jumped off the sixth floor of the west end of the Social Science parking structure.

Brown believes that the probable cause of death was suicide. Taylor was suffering from cancer and emphysema, explains Brown, and was clearly "ailing and in a lot

Taylor's son, who arrived at the scene after being contacted by UCI police, had explained to authorities about his father's condition, Brown and


ed the award on her behalf.

Whoever said laughter is the best medicine certainly speaks an element of truth, according to Dr. David Felten, UCI professor in the Department of Anatomy and

College of Medicine Hosts "Camp Med"

UCI's College of Medicine hosted a "Camp Med" educational enrichment program for students of Estancia, Anaheim, Westminister and Long Beach Polytechnic high schools May 10 in San Juan Capistrano.

Discovery may Help Fight Alzheimer's

The first animal model that exhibits behavioral symptoms of body myositis, a common degenerative muscle disease among the elderly, was discovered by UCI researchers, April 22.

They found that abnormally high levels of a certain beta-amyloid precursor protein cause muscle tissue degeneration, creating motor-behavioral difficulties associated with body myositis.

The discovery could lead to breakthrough research in advancing understanding of Alzheimer's disease, which shares similar molecular processes with inclusion body myositis.

Whether the defendants' cases are successful or not, it has become increasingly clear that reforming the three-strikes law will be one of the most pressing issues facing our criminal justice

As stated in the statute itself, the motive of the law is to ensure longer prison sentences and greater punishment for felony offenders who have been previously convicted of serious or violent felony offenses.

Although the law aims to achieve great things, it falls short. Even before the law's enactment in 1994, crime had been declining for several years, according to a study done by the Sentencing Project—a nonprofit group that supports prisoners'

The law also fails to address the fact that depending on which county the crime takes place, sentences may vary due to the enormous amount of discretion allotted to the prosecutors of the case. So, by living in liberal San Francisco as opposed to a more conservative

have enacted similar legislation, but only California allows the third-strike to be a nonviolent offense. By creating a category listing all violent offenses - such as murder, rape, kidnapping, armed robbery, etc. - and limiting the application of the three-strikes to those, we would prove to target only the select few serious habitual offenders society wants behind

Most importantly, the discretion given to prosecutors under the three-strikes law must be returned to the courts. Laws in Arkansas, Connecticut, Kansas and Nevada enhance the possible penalties for multiple convictions for serious felonies, but leave the actual sen-

tence discretion to the judges. California should do the same and reform the overly severe three-


