PROJECT SUMMARY: The proposed authorization would provide a grant to Environment Now to develop and manage a wetlands restoration local assistance program as a component of the Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project (WRP). Environment Now will undertake this project as part of its coastal restoration program. Through the proposed program, Environment Now will provide technical assistance to local government agencies and community based organizations (CBOs) to facilitate implementation of projects to acquire, restore, and enhance coastal wetlands and coastal watersheds. The proposed project will help the WRP to increase the pace, effectiveness, and cost-efficiency of project implementation.

> Environment Now will assist the WRP's local partners to set local and regional priorities; increase technical expertise on staff; secure funding; and develop and implement wetland preservation and restoration projects. In addition, Environment

Now will assist the Coastal Conservancy in managing the overall WRP effort.

Environment Now is a private nonprofit environmental organization whose mission is to protect, preserve, and restore the environment. One of its five core programs is to protect and restore coastal habitats. Facilitating the work of the WRP has become an integral part of Environment Now's coastal restoration program, and the proposed local assistance program will further these efforts.

STAFF

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the State Coastal Conservancy adopt the following Resolution pursuant to Sections 31251-31270 of the Public Resources Code:

"The State Coastal Conservancy hereby authorizes the disbursement of up to four hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000) to Environment Now to develop and manage a wetlands restoration local assistance program as a component of the Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project, subject to the condition that prior to the disbursement of any Conservancy funds, Environment Now shall submit for the review and approval of the Executive Officer of the Conservancy a work program and budget, and the names and qualifications of any subcontractors that it intends to employ."

Staff further recommends that the Conservancy adopt the following findings:

"Based on the accompanying staff report and attached exhibits, the State Coastal Conservancy hereby finds that:

- 1. The proposed project is consistent with the purposes and criteria set forth in Chapter 6 of the Public Resources Code (31251-31270) regarding enhancement of coastal resources.
- 2. The proposed project is consistent with the guidelines and criteria set forth in the Conservancy's Project Selection Criteria and Guidelines adopted on January 24, 2001.
- 3. Environment Now is a nonprofit organization existing under Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code, and whose purposes are consistent with Division 21 of the Public Resources Code."

STAFF DISCUSSION:

Project Description:

The proposed authorization would provide a grant to Environment Now to assist the Conservancy in developing and managing a wetlands restoration local assistance program as a component of the Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project (WRP). Environment Now will undertake this project as part of its coastal restoration program. Through the proposed program, Environment Now will provide technical assistance to local government agencies and community based organizations (CBOs) to facilitate implementation of projects to acquire, restore, and enhance coastal wetlands and coastal watersheds. The proposed project will help the WRP to increase the pace, effectiveness, and cost-efficiency of project implementation.

Environment Now will assist the WRP's local partners to do the following:

- Set local and regional priorities. Environment Now will
 provide staff assistance to the five county task forces in
 their efforts to assess wetland conditions and needs, and set
 priorities.
- Increase technical expertise on staff. Environment Now will organize training sessions for local partners on technical issues such as permitting, environmental review, invasive species, restoration design, monitoring, etc.
- Secure funding. Environment Now will assist local partners in identifying appropriate sources of federal, state, and private funding for wetland and watershed projects.
- Develop and implement wetland preservation and restoration projects. Environment Now will provide technical assistance to local partners on all aspects of project development and implementation.

In addition, Environment Now will assist the Coastal Conservancy in managing the overall WRP effort, including tasks such as preparing program reports, organizing meetings, and assisting in the review and evaluation of project proposals.

The WRP began five years ago as an initiative of state and federal agencies to better coordinate their efforts on wetlands issues in southern California. Since then, participation in the WRP by local agencies and community based organizations has grown steadily, and become one of the greatest strengths of the WRP. The WRP has initiated several programs in response to the high level of local interest, including: creating wetlands task forces in each of the five coastal counties to increase coordination among local agencies and between state and local

partners; adding task force representatives to the WRP Managers Group to provide local participants with a greater voice in WRP policy-making; and initiating the small grants program to build local capacity and community involvement. The proposed local assistance program is an expansion of these efforts to empower local partners in their efforts to preserve and restore coastal wetlands and watersheds in southern California.

Environment Now is a private nonprofit environmental organization whose mission is to protect, preserve, and restore the environment. One of its five core goals is to protect and restore coastal habitats. Environment Now currently manages the WRP's public outreach program and small grants program; in addition, Environment Now has a grant from the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to prepare a regional wetlands and watershed management plan for the WRP. Facilitating the work of the WRP has become an integral part of Environment Now's coastal restoration program, and the proposed local assistance program will further these efforts.

Project Financing:

The Conservancy's contribution to the proposed project would be funded by appropriation to the Conservancy from the California Clean Water, Clean Air, Safe Neighborhood Parks and Coastal Protection Act of 2002 (Proposition 40), allocated internally for the Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project.

Site Description:

The project area for the Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project is the coastal wetlands and watersheds from Point Conception in Santa Barbara County to the International Border with Mexico.

Project History:

The Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project is a partnership of federal, state, and local agencies, business leaders, and environmental organizations working together to implement a regional strategy for wetlands recovery in southern California. The Coastal Conservancy serves as staff to the program. The WRP has grown considerably over the past five years, primarily from the increased involvement of local agencies and CBOs. In addition to funding specific wetland and watershed acquisition and restoration projects, the Coastal Conservancy has also provided funding for the WRP's public participation program, Science Advisory Panel, and Small Grants Program.

PROJECT SUPPORT: The Wetlands Recovery Project is a partnership of 17 state and federal agencies working in concert with local governments. business leaders, and environmental organizations. Its efforts to develop and implement a regional strategy for wetlands recovery in southern California enjoy broad support from both the public and private sector.

CONSISTENCY WITH CONSERVANCY'S **ENABLING LEGISLATION:**

The proposed authorization will assist the Conservancy in meeting its purposes and objectives under Section 31251-31270 of the Public Resources Code by facilitating the identification, prioritization, planning and implementation of wetland restoration and enhancement opportunities in southern California's coastal zone.

Consistent with Section 31254, the proposed authorization will request assistance from local agencies, nonprofit organizations, and other members of the public on the development of priorities for coastal resource enhancement projects in southern California. Consistent with Section 31255, the proposed authorization will assist the WRP in soliciting proposals for resource enhancement projects from local agencies, nonprofit organizations, and other members of the public.

CONSISTENCY WITH **CONSERVANCY'S** PROJECT SELECTION CRITERIA & GUIDELINES:

The proposed project is consistent with the Conservancy's Project Selection Criteria and Guidelines adopted January 24, 2001, in the following respects:

Required Criteria

Promotion of the Conservancy's statutory programs and purposes: See the "Consistency with Conservancy's enabling legislation" section above.

Consistency with purposes of the funding source: The intended source of Conservancy funds will be monies appropriated to the Conservancy from Proposition 40, the "California Clean Water, Clean Air, Safe Neighborhood Parks and Coastal Protection Act of 2002." Allowable uses under this legislation include acquisition, restoration, and protection of land and water resources. The proposed project will further efforts of the Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project to acquire, restore, and enhance coastal wetland and coastal watersheds in southern California. Therefore, the project is consistent with the purposes of the funding source.

Support of the Public: See the "Project Support" section above.

Location: The project area for the Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project is the coastal wetlands and watersheds from Point Conception in Santa Barbara County to the International Border with Mexico.

Need: Over the past five years, the WRP has transformed from a state and federal effort into a cooperative partnership of federal, state, and local agencies and CBOs. The greatest potential for increasing the pace of wetlands recovery in southern California is through increasing the commitment and capacity of local organizations to lead recovery efforts. Although many local agencies are willing to take on greater responsibility, most require substantial technical assistance in identifying, developing, and implementing projects. The proposed program will help to meet this need.

Greater-Than-Local Interest: One of the primary goals of the Wetlands Recovery Project is to coordinate wetland acquisition and restoration projects on a regional basis in order to avoid fragmented and piecemeal efforts. The proposed authorization will further the WRP's efforts to develop and implement a regional wetland strategy.

Additional Criteria

Leverage: It is expected that by increasing the participation of local partners in wetlands recovery projects in southern California, Conservancy funding of WRP projects will be leveraged by an increased contribution of local funding and in-kind assistance. In addition, the proposed program will help local partners to identify other likely sources of federal, state, local, and private funds for these projects.

Realization of prior Conservancy goals: The Coastal Conservancy has invested a large amount of funding and staff resources into developing the WRP and implementing projects through it. The proposed local assistance program will facilitate these efforts and will further the Conservancy's goals for coastal wetlands and watersheds in the region.

Cooperation: The Wetlands Recovery Project is a model of cooperation between public and private partners, as well as between federal, state, and local interests. The program has integrated disparate planning and restoration efforts throughout the southern California into a coordinated, regional effort. It is a model for cooperative regional partnerships throughout the state.

CONSISTENCY WITH THE COASTAL ACT:

The proposed WRP local assistance program will further the efforts of the WRP to implement a regional strategy for wetlands recovery in southern California. Thus, the project will further the planning and management policies contained in Section 30231 of the Public Resources Code, which states: "the biological productivity and the quality of coastal waters, streams, wetlands, estuaries, and lakes appropriate to maintain optimum populations of marine organisms and for the protection of human health shall be maintained and, where feasible, restored. . . ."

COMPLIANCE

WITH CEOA:

The proposed authorization does not have the potential to result in any physical changes to the environment and therefore is not a "project" subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), as provided in 14 Cal. Code of Regulations Section 15378.



Dear Mr. Morabito:

On behalf of the Santa Barbara County Task Force of the Southern California Wetlands Recovery Project, I am writing to urge the board of the Coastal Conservancy to approve the proposed \$450,000 grant to Environment Now to fund a Wetlands Recovery Project local assistance program.

As outlined in the staff report (to be heard at your February 27th board meeting in Oakland), the grant would allow Environment Now to provide technical assistance to local government and community-based organizations to facilitate implementation of projects to acquire, restore, and enhance coastal wetlands and watersheds.

One of the most significant components of the WRP's regional efforts has been its locally-oriented public outreach and capacity-building programs. Those programs have had a huge impact in developing and promoting the restoration projects that are the fundamental mission of the Recovery Project. Unfortunately, however, the budgetary crisis now faced by state and local governments creates a serious risk that those critical programs will be eliminated unless creative ways can be found to continue funding them.

Local communities must increasingly assume responsibility and leadership for wetlands restoration and protection. The staff proposal for a SCC grant to Environment Now offers an excellent framework for leveraging state bond monies with strong local initiatives. And Environment Now is well suited to coordinate this locally-based and

locally-led effort---one that will capitalize on community-based capacities and resources to promote this important regional recovery effort.

Thank you for your consideration and approval of the proposed grant, as well as for all the work that the Coastal Conservancy does for wetlands restoration and protection in Southern California.
