This past October an astonishing two-thirds of California voters headed out to local polling stations. Voters expressed their opinions about whether or not to end the 30-year political career of Governor Gray Davis. Talk about recalling Davis began soon after he was re-elected for his second term in November. Reasons to recall Davis were centered on the billion-dollar deficit California is currently suffering. Californians are baffled as to how the flourishing California budget could go from a surplus to such a large deficit so quickly. Others in California saw the recall as the Republicans' attempt to take power from within Sacramento. Those against the recall were clearly outnumbered, as Davis

became the second Governor in American history to be recalled, the first being North Dakota's Lynn T. Frazier

Ted Costa, a conservative anti-tax gadfly, was the first to make an attempt to file documents that would force a recall election. However, without millions of dollars to back his efforts, he was unable to gather the required 897,158 signatures. Later, Darrell Issa, a San Diego-area Republican, took action. Issa spent \$1.7 million of his own money to hire hundreds of professional signature gatherers. By mid-July, Issa had collected 1.6 million signatures. Soon after the collection of signatures, Oct. 7, 2003, was the date set for the










recall. The election was almost called off due to lack of resources. After the 2000 Presidential election, California removed all punch card machines, due to the confusion in Florida during the 2000 election. The state intended to replace old machines with cutting-edge touch screen machines. However, the machines were not ready for the unanticipated election. In last-minute efforts to prepare for the election, California decided to use old fashion bubble-in ballots.

Within a few months many Californians were adding their names to the ballot. Some of the more infamous candidates included Larry Flynt, former child star Gary Coleman, and porn-star Mary Cary. More serious contenders included Independent Ariana Huffington, Republican Tom McClintock, Democrat Cruz Bustamante, Republican Arnold Schwarzenegger and Green Party member Peter Camejo. Near the end, those leading the race were Schwarzenegger, Bustamante and McClintock. Around 11 p.m. news reports marked the end of Gary Davis' long-standing political career and the beginning of another chapter to Arnold Schwarzenegger's amazing life story. With Schwarzenegger in power, some view this election as a radical change within the California political status quo.



# Fall From Grace

Los Angeles Lakers' All-star Kobe Bryant faces charges of sexual assault in this paparazzi-centered trial-of-the-century.

Los Angeles Lakers' star player Kobe Bryant was staying at the Lodge and Spa at Cordillera in Edwards, Colo., when the alleged victim, an employee at the resort hotel, voluntarily chose to visit Bryant in his room after her shift. Bryant, in Colorado to see a physician specialist for knee surgery, allegedly encountered the 19-year old woman in the hotel lobby, where the two began to flirt. On July 4, 2003, Bryant returned to Colorado where he was arrested and released on \$25,000 bail.

Bryant may be in jeopardy of facing four years to life in prison if convicted of rape. Eagle County District Attorney Mark Hurlbert officially filed sexual assault charges against Bryant on July 18, 2003, claiming his decision came about after "reviewing all the evidence — testimonial evidence, and physical evidence — and after conferring with prosecutors from around the state." Immediately after Hurlbert's decision, Bryant came out publicly, accompanied by his wife, and tearfully admitted to adultery, pleading his innocence to the allegations. "I'm innocent. You know, I didn't force her to do anything against her will. I'm innocent. You know, I sit here in front of you guys, furious at myself, disgusted at myself for making the mistake of adultery."

After attending two preliminary hearings, Judge Frederick Gannett ruled on Oct. 21, 2003, that Bryant must stand trial for felony sexual assault, claiming the prosecution has presented enough evidence to suggest probable cause; creating possibly the largest and most talked about celebrity trial since the O.J. Simpson case.

Bryant's attorneys, Pamela Mackey and Hal Haddon, have had illustrious careers as defense attorneys. Bryant's presumed defense is to attack the 19-year old woman's credibility, claiming she is promiscuous, a liar and only out for Bryant's pocketbook. Factors which have favored the defense's case thus far are that the underwear the woman wore to the hospital examination the day after the encounter with Bryant had blood and a semen stain that was not Bryant's.

The Kobe Bryant Case is set to commence towards the end of the National Basketball Association regular season, creating uncertainty regarding Bryant's availability during the playoffs. The outcome of this trial inscribes the future of Kobe Bryant, however, one thing is for sure — the image and reputation Bryant once had are forever tarnished. Many celebrated athletes are haunted by dark clouds over their careers. As far as Bryant's career is concerned, the night of June 30, 2003 will always haunt him, marking him for the remainder of what should be and already is an illustrious career.

# RING OF FIRE





UCI IS CAUGHT IN THE CENTER OF THE CALIFORNIA FIRES, WITH DEVASTATING EFFECTS ON STUDENTS AND ALL CALIFORNIANS.

The wildfires of California struck unexpectedly in late October and a devastating impact on many residents. Thousands were evacuated from their homes and 20 people were killed. More than 3,600 homes were destroyed, as well as more than 550,000 acres of brush, forest and homes were burned. In addition, more than 11,000 firefighters from all over the state worked overtime throughout Southern California. There were 14 fires, nine of which were major, that spread rapidly and uncontrollably due to the Santa Ana winds, turning the entire Southern California skyline a sickly shade of orange. One of these fires was said to be

started by a lost hunter's signal fire and another was allegedly started by arsonists.

Some other factors that contributed to the spread of these fires were years of drought and the infestation of bark beetles, which killed millions of trees and made them highly flammable. President George W. Bush declared a state of emergency and outgoing Governor Gray Davis, who had been recalled on Oct. 7, 2003, stated that these fires could be the costliest disaster ever to hit California: Costs have averaged around \$9 million per day and the fires have already cost the United States \$2 billion in damages.

Not only did these fires affect residents of the scorched areas, they have also immensely affected many students at UCI. Most students have family and/or friends who live in either the Los Angeles or San Diego Counties. Consequently, many students went home or were extremely occupied with their escalating situations at home. Students were so worried about their circumstances at home that they found it extremely difficult to concentrate on their studies. Some could not even study because of the windy and dry weather conditions and ash in the air. Throughout the time the fires burned the air quality of Southern

California ranged from bad to unhealthful, leaving many residents short of breath.

It is often assumed that only people directly involved with the fires have been set back by this tragedy. In actuality, both directly affected residents as well as much of California will have to deal with the aftermath environmentally, economically and emotionally. In the coming months Southern California will be forced to cope with these misfortunes and attempt to rebuild and replace what the fires destroyed.

# Bumper to **Bumper**


THE ROAD TOWARDS HASSLE-FREE PARKING.

As the population of UCI continues to grow each and every year, so does the parking predicament. UCI's parking situation will only worsen in the upcoming years, especially with construction continuing to take place all around campus. According to UCI's Parking Director Mike Delo, about 11,200 parking permits were sold to commuter students and 2,400 parking permits were sold to resident students this year. With only an estimated 13,000 commuter and resident parking spaces available around campus, roughly 600 students have no place to park.

To alleviate the parking problem UCI administrators initiated a new stack parking program. Stack parking is provided in specific parking structures around campus where students park their vehicles in the drive aisles, creating room for 40 to 50 more cars. Although the administration took every measure to make stack parking as safe as possible for students and drivers, there are still certain risks drivers have to be willing to take to participate. Students are required to leave their car keys with the stack parking attendants, so their cars may be moved if they happen to block exiting vehicles. Students participating in the program are advised to store any valuable belongings in the trunks of their cars since UCI Parking and Transportation is not responsible for any damage or theft. Besides launching the stack parking program, UCI Parking and Transportation highly encourages students to carpool or use the shuttle service provided by ASUCI to further decrease the parking complications. Future plans to relieve parking dilemmas during the construction period include a Upass, a pass in which students can use ASUCI public transportation for free. This pass will be encoded into each student's I.D. so all students can simply slide the card before boarding any ASUCI public transportation vehicles. With the many programs UCI offers and organizes for its students there is no doubt that parking will at least become more tolerable.


This year's event was different from others held before.





Keeping a secret can easily eat up a person inside, DAY PROMOTES HONESTY especially when the secret involves hiding a sexual orientation that one feels others may not accept. UCI recognizes this difficulty in "coming out" through National Coming Out Week, celebrating the openness of being lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender. The week extends National Coming Out Day held every Oct. 11, after half a million people marched in front of the Capital in Washington, D.C. for lesbian and gay equality in 1987. The day also acts as a means to promote the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender community, since there are no boundaries set

on the characteristics of persons who identify themselves with the LGBT community.

"The LGBT community isn't visible like an ethnic group," explains Michael Houston, representative from the LGBT Resource Center. "You have to come out to be identified, and it is important to the LGBT community because there are more people who come out than people realize."

National Coming Out Day allows students the opportunity to freely express themselves as part of the LGBT community when it may be difficult to do so otherwise. Events scheduled throughout the week, including



As Maya Cardenas explains, "Put simply, it helps. Without National Coming Out Day, there would be a definite void in the community." The day not only promotes openness of being lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender, but also lets students know that they are not alone.

# Home Sweet Home

COMMUTERS ARE CHALLENGED WITH THE STRAINS OF ROAD RULES WHILE NON-COMMUTERS RELISH IN THE FLEXIBILITY OF TRANSPORTATION METHODS TO GET TO SCHOOL.

The luxury of having a car is not always advantageous. For most students and faculty, driving to UCI is a daily test of tolerance. En route to school, students and faculty often face heavy traffic congestion, sometimes resulting in tardiness to class.

Sisters Kathy Nguyen, a third-year Computer Engineer major and Diana Nguyen, a second-year Social Science major, carpool 40 miles roundtrip everyday, sometimes at daybreak to avoid traffic, and more importantly, to snatch a parking space.

Many students take pleasure in driving from afar everyday, can tolerate the rules of the road, and do not mind catching a quick cat nap in their cars at 7:30 a.m.

Likewise, on-campus living has its ups and downs, whether it is having no parental supervision, resident concerns or even homesickness. Regardless of the situation, college life has come down to getting to class on time and simultaneously finding ways to adapt to living conditions.

activities throughout the week to help inform and educate the public.


Unbeknownst to many, there is indeed a Disability













for this keynote event. To motivate listeners to use the legacy of King's struggles as an example for future civil rights battles, Belafonte stated, "If you cut yourself off from history, you cut yourself off from the future." In light of this year's theme, "Crossing the Lines," which commemorates a half century of desegregation, students were encouraged to "cross the lines" of racism and fight against oppression and injustice.

The 20th annual MLK Symposium ended on a moving note, with a symbolic march by enthusiastic students along Ring Road and an inspiring rally led by Reverend Timothy Malone. During this time, students, staff and faculty alike

gathered together to celebrate and honor King's legacy, while urging one another to carry on the struggle for peace and equality.

"Now is the time to make real the promises of democracy. Now is the time to rise from the dark and desolate valley of segregation to the sunlit path of racial justice. Now is the time to lift our nation from the quicksands of racial injustice to the solid rock of brotherhood. Now is the time to make justice a reality for all of God's children." — Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.









Affiliated. Philanthropy. Alumni. Active. Pledge. Rush. Rushee. Sisterhood. Brotherhood. The lexicon of the Greek System often prompts the cliché, "Sounds Greek to me!"

These terms are bandied about in conversation up and down Ring Road at the beginning of each quarter—the Greeks actively seek new members in the college ritual known as "rush." To "rush," by the way, means to show an interest in a specific Greek organization; that organization may or may not return such interest.

Students new to the college experience, and even many veteran Anteaters, don't really understand what the various Greek terms mean. Imagine hearing for the first time, "Is your philanthropy today or tomorrow? I'm sure my affiliates would absolutely love to come."

How does one respond to such a question? "Philanthropy, I thought, meant being nice," states sophomore Kimberly Pham. It is actually an organization that benefits from time and money contributions from members of a Greek organization. Often, members are assigned specific tasks on specific days, which answers the question above.

The terminology is key. A pledge is a person who pledges loyalty and support to a particular Greek organization. In doing so, the student ends the rush period and begins the trial pledge period; in some organizations this time is referred to as the new member period.

After a designated number of days or weeks the pledge goes through initiation. The initiation ceremony officially welcomes the new member. Further, the ceremony is often one that mimics decades-old traditions within the specific sorority or fraternity, and the pledge must agree not to divulge any of the ceremony particulars to any persons outside the organization.

Only after becoming an active member and then graduating from UCI does one become an alumni of said organization. Affiliates are other Greek organizations that work towards a common cause with a particular sorority or fraternity. Sisterhood and brotherhood, suggest that all members of the organization are kindred spirits.

Thus ends this lesson of Greeks 101. Now students are ready to march out onto Ring Road and try to figure out what all those tall wooden letters mean. Or, they can just sit back and read Anthology 2004 and continue to expand their Greek organization education! @





GREEK BUILDING BLOCKS

With close to 50 Greek organizations on campus, why is it that UCI lacks a Greek row? A Greek row is a single street that contains all, or most, of the fraternity and sorority houses, which in turn provides a central area where the Greeks can come together and collaborate with peers. It is important to have this Greek row since it will help the Greek organizations work like a network from one location, working, helping and participating with one another. Greek communities thrive off each other and support one another. With a Greek row, living together and around one another would enforce and promote the positive atmosphere, academically and socially. Arroyo Vista was an attempt to be a Greek row which has failed since other school-related organizations live there too, much like a regulated community. The school regulates Arroyo Vista like they regulate the dormitories on campus, whereas a Greek row lives independently. Obtaining a Greek row in the future will be a long process, probably taking up to ten years to complete. Greeks are already conducting research of their own on the matter, discussing it within each chapter and within each national chapter. Unfortunately, property outside of UCI is owned by the Irvine Company, making land difficult to purchase. Despite the City of Irvine's long and detailed Municipal Code, which includes building, zoning, sign, grading, noise and encroachment regulations, it does not restrict the building of a Greek row. As a primary goal, getting a Greek row would definitely be a step in the right direction, not only for the Greek organizations themselves, but also for the school in general. Besides providing a positive atmosphere and independence for Greek members, a Greek row would also provide housing for an abundance of students and at the same time lessen parking problems throughout campus. Greeks can easily use shuttles and other means of public transportation to get to school. (9)





Four. The number of undergraduate housing complexes on campus. Nearly everyone on campus can name Mesa Court and Middle Earth, and most know Campus Village as those buildings behind the Science Library. Not so many can name the last complex, and even fewer know exactly what is there. But Arroyo Vista is not insignificant in the least, with 35 houses of 16-32 residents each. Among the houses are 12 Greek houses, four fraternity houses and eight sorority houses. The remaining 23 houses are classified into 17 different themes. The majority of houses are for continuing students only, with the exception of the three transfer houses which house first-year transfers as well as continuing transfer students.

Arroyo Vista, despite being farther from campus than the other undergraduate housing complexes, is nonetheless a unique community with unique features. So what makes Arroyo Vista residents so unique? While a mere 6 percent of the total student body consists of transfer students, an overwhelming 62.9 percent of non-Greek Arroyo Vista residents surveyed identified themselves as being transfer students. Of those, 85 percent transferred from a California community college. Also, the complex is comprised entirely of non-first-year students and requires an application process to be accepted into

From surveys taken of non-Greek residents. approximately 60 percent of residents are female, 70 percent consider California their home state and 50 percent were born in California. Despite the finding (cont on 134)





that 34.3 percent of students were born abroad, only 25.7 percent are international students. The majority of students are in the 21- to 22-year-old category, which makes up 48.6 percent of the students, with 30 percent of students between the ages of 18 and 20, and 20 percent being 23 or older. The most popular academic school among Arroyo Vista residents seems to be the School of Social Science, with Humanities and Social Ecology being a close second and third.

A look at the survey also gives us an idea of the lifestyle of Arroyo Vista residents. On average, residents see three or fewer movies a month, talk to their parents once or twice a week and work out three to four times a week. A majority of residents watch between one and five hours of television a week and play at least one hour of video games per week. About 20 percent of residents own between zero and 15 compact discs, and another 20 percent own between 31 and 50 CDs.

Other interesting statistics that can be gathered include: 40 percent of Arroyo Vista residents have only one sibling, while only 12.9 percent have no siblings at all. Further, 31.4 percent of residents claim to be the oldest child in the family, but occurring more commonly are youngest children, which make up approximately 40 percent of residents.

Other information gathered from this survey shows that the residents of Arroyo Vista are relatively well-travelled; more than 70 percent of residents have been out of the country at least once, not including those who consider another country home. An overwhelming 92.9 percent of residents have travelled out of their home state at least once.

What can be concluded from these numbers? These statistics, along with the individual uniqueness of each resident, make Arroyo Vista not only a convenient place to live, but also a diverse community of which to be a member.

# Going Down In History

Babe Ruth, Larry Bird and Joe Namath. All names that would usually be associated with their professional sports' respective halls of fame. But Major League Baseball, the National Basketball Association and the National Football League are not the only organizations that honor outstanding athletic achievements. UCIs own Athletic Hall of Fame has been going strong for over a decade, with its most recent induction on Feb. 7, 2004. Greg Jablonski, a record-setter in men's tennis, George Newland, former U.S. National Water Polo Team member, and Tim Tift, former men's basketball coach and associate athletic director are this year's inductees, adding to the list of 53 members.

Jablonski played on UCI's men's tennis team during its four consecutive NCAA Division II championships between 1970 and 1973, setting a College Division Record. He earned All-American honors four years in a row, once for doubles with partner Chuck Nachand, and three times in singles. George Newland, son of UCI men's water polo coach Ted Newland, played on the water polo team

from 1976-80. The Anteaters finished in the top three in the nation for three of Newland's four years. He was awarded UCI's Student Athlete of the Year in 1980-81, and was given All-American and first team All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association honors in 1980. Newland then went on to compete as part of the U.S. National Team from 1982-85.

Tim Tift served as UCI's head men's basketball coach from 1969-80, leading the Anteaters to the NCAA Division II playoffs in 1972 and 1975. He was also named District Coach of the Year in the 1971-72 season. Tift's involvement at UCI has also included time as an associate athletic director, chairman of UCI's Department of Physical Education, men's golf coach and extends to his current position as a senior lecturer in the Department of Education.

The UCI Hall of Fame was started in 1983 with the induction of five honorees. It has since honored 53 past members of UCI's athletic community: three administrators, including founding chancellor Daniel Aldrich, seven coaches and 46 intercollegiate athletes.

This year also introduces the annual Varsity Club Alumnus Award of Merit, which recognizes a former UCI student athlete for exemplary post-collegiate, professional, athletic or civic acheivements. This year's awardee is former UCI golfer Gary Singer, who is currently a managing partner in the law firm O'Melveny and Myers LLP and a member of the UCI Foundation.

# Swinging Their Way to the Top

If one were to look at UCI's baseball program five years ago, one would have found merely a history of what it once was. If one were to look at UCI's baseball program three years ago, a fledging program with a new coaching staff, new team and new facilities would have been found. If one looks at UCI's baseball program today, one will find a team that has been picked to finish fourth in the Big West preseason coaches poll.

The team roster boasts three returning All-Big West second team members Brett Smith, Mark Wagner and Steve Schroer, along with 11 new freshmen. Among the 11 newcomers are 2003 All-State selection David Huff, All-American first-team selection Justin Cassel and Nevada All-State first-team selection Brady Dolan.

The team has come a long way since its reinstatement into Anteater athletics in the 2001-2002 season. Before its ten-year sabbatical, UCI claimed two Division II titles. The program was cut in 1992 due to

budgetary constraints at the university. Now in its third consecutive season as a Division-IA team, the Anteaters face one of the toughest non-conference schedules in the nation, with 20 match-ups against teams that have previously gone to the NCAA Tournament in the 2002-2003 season.

Head Coach John Savage leads the talented coaching staff, which includes himself, Assistant Coaches Jason Gill and Pat Shine and volunteer Assistant Coach Matt Jones. Savage, a former USC pitching coach, secured his reputation while with the Trojans by producing several successful athletes, including current Chicago Cubs pitcher Mark Prior.

In addition to the new staff and new team, UCI's baseball program also received a major-league quality playing field, the Anteater Ballpark. The ballpark opened with the first UCI baseball game in a decade on Jan. 25, 2002. The crowd that day reached the stadium's capacity of 3,083 spectators.

The 2004 season opened on Feb. 10, 2004, with a close loss to Pepperdine University (7-8). They quickly recovered, winning the next two games against UC Berkeley. They went on to win 11 of the next 16 games, including two shutouts, and tied one for a midseason record of 13-3-1. The team was also ranked 18th in the Collegiate Baseball poll and 23rd in the Sports Weekly/ESPN Coaches Poll midseason.

After a shaky season opener against Pepperdine, the Anteaters have regained their balance to continue their rise up the polls. The Anteaters are well on their way to another winning season.

# Avoiding the Red Card

UCI's finest women have been kicking balls out on the field for over eighteen years now. Beginning in 1984, UCI's women's soccer was first coached by Matt Etchison. In 1994 the torch was passed down to Marine Cano, who has led the girls to many victories. Cano, along with assistant coach Jamie Surprenant, assistant coach Allison Merrick and volunteer assistant coach Mike Lane have been molding the Anteaters into a formidable team.

During the 1997 and 1998 seasons, Cano led the team to victory in the Big West Conference. In 2000, they came in 2nd place. In the last six seasons, the team has a 69-39-13 record. They have been on the Top 10 in the West Coast and are nationally ranked as 21st in the nation in team goals on averages based on the NCAA weekly statistics. UCI is also ranked 34th in the nation with a shutout in 47 percent of their games. The Anteaters played in nine overtime games this season, a new record.

This year, three players were named to the All-Big West first team. Senior Caroline Kabe earned the

first team honor after two years of being named All-Big West second team. Junior Alyson Spencer won the first team honor and senior Hayley McNallan won the first team honor for the second time in her career. Junior Tara Weldon and senior Leah Dawson were awarded honorable mentions by the Big West conference this year.

Every year, members of UCI's women's soccer also participate in community outreach programs. Coaches, athletes and staff members reach out to local schools and instructional clinics to talk to the students and provide motivational talks. To this day members reach out to the local youth and have even won the National Conrotium for Academics and Sports for outstanding contributions in outreach.

This year's season began on Aug. 29, 2003, against Pepperdine University and ended on Nov. 7, 2003, against California Polytechnic Pomona. The season brought UCI in at fourth place in the Big West Conference, facing schools such as USC, UC Santa Barbara and UC Riverside.

The 2004 season begins on Aug. 27, 2004, against San Jose State, and ends on Nov. 7, 2004. This next season the UCI Anteaters will face such schools as San Jose, UC Davis, San Francisco and San Diego. The Lady Anteaters are sure to continue their rise up the Big West ladder with their solid coaching staff and promising returners.





Attention UCI Students! The UCI Crew team is looking for 6'2" athletic men and 5'8" athletic women to row, compete and beat their number one rival, Orange Coast College as they begin the crew season on Feb. 28, 2004, with their first match against the University of California, San Diego. Are voices of disgruntlement heard concerning the description of ideal UCI students the crew team is looking for? Never fear, for the crew team is open to accepting any willing and hardworking men and women. The first step is to "walk on" the team, rowing for novice under the coaching of Scott Charette. The second step is to work up to rowing on the men or women's varsity team with the coaching styles of Carrie Chamberlain-Parsons for the women and Don Emrich for the men.

One team position available on the crew team is the coxswain. A coxswain is the person in the front of the boat who steers and motivates the team. Basically the brains of the team, the coxswain motivates

the oarsmen to continue rowing even when every muscle in the oarsmen is aching. A major requirement for becoming a coxswain is to weigh less than 110 pounds for the girls and less than 130 pounds for the men's teams, as the coxswain sits in a tiny area for the duration of practice and competitions. A popular misconception concerning coxswains is that they yell "Row, row row." Instead the coxswain will yell "Jump! Relax! Jump! Relax!" or "Let's take a ten to move through Sac State. Make every stroke of yours equal two of theirs."

The other team position available, Oarsman (a.k.a. rower), is classified by the side of the boat, "ports" and "starboards" and by their seat in the boat. With the port rowers rowing on the left side of the boat and the starboards rowing on the right side of the boat, it is crucial for the ports and starboards to be syncronized in their movements in order to keep the boat balanced and moving effectively. In an eight (a boat with eight rowers and one coxswain), the boat is divided into stern pair, middle four (midshift), and bow pair. The stern pair consists of two rowers at the backmost section of the boat facing the coxswain. The middle four consists of six seat, five seat, four seat and three seat as these four rowers are essential for boat power and speed. The bow pair consists of two seat and bowman who sit in the front of the boat, pointing the boat in the right direction.

a sprint race, the novice UCI Crew Team depends upon the coxswain to be as straight as possible when steering as they row in a straight line, competing for the fastest time. In contrast, in other races called head races, the rowing course is full



# An Apple A Day...

The sports medicine department at UCI strives to keep student athletes healthy. The sports medicine department has many things to offer to injured athletes. Therapy, soft tissue massages, whirlpools, ultrasounds and electrical stimulation are just some of many services available to these students. Students also have the opportunity to visit the doctors, whose offices are conveniently located within the facility.

In addition, the sports medicine department supports students who are interested in becoming certified athletic trainers. It has a training program for students who wish to pursue sports medicine. Students go through three phases, starting as observers, progressing to student athletic trainers and finally advancing to certified athletic trainer status. The observers intern in the facility about 60 hours per quarter. By the fourth quarter, and after passing certain tests, they are assigned a team to work with consistently. Student interns are instrumental in achieving the goals of the sports medicine department.

Students are also required to take a class at Irvine Valley College during their first year of internship.

### UCI's sports medicine program benefits both athletes and student trainers.

This gives them a better idea of what is expected when they become athletic trainers. There is also an introduction class on Wednesday nights for observers to attend, as well as a sports medicine club that invites guest speakers to come and lecture.

The second step of the training program is to become a student athletic trainer, where one assists in treating injured athletes, whether they are in the training room, on the playing field or on the court. They work with physicians and other health professionals daily. Finally, after being a student athletic trainer, they can become certified athletic trainers. A student achieves this status through a curriculum program or by participating in an internship program, which involves completing 1,500 hours of work under a certified athletic trainer.

The department has grown extensively over the past few years, having doubled their staff in the past four years. The quality of care is very high and there is usually one-on-one interaction with the athletes. Just this past August the facility moved upstairs in Crawford Hall. Now there is increased accessibility to athletes and a larger space to accommodate more injured athletes.

The sports medicine department at UCI has come a long way over the years. It continues to expand and fulfill its goal: to provide excellent services to athletes and to keep them healthy.

Sciences to increase the number of underrepresented groups in biomedical research careers.



The School of Biological Sciences not only offers high quality education to UCI students, but is also home to several outreach programs. Programs such as the Biology Outreach for Science Scholars (BOSS), the Science Fair, COSMOS and the Orange County Bridges to Baccalaureate (OC Bridges) are just some of the ways that the School of Biological Sciences strives to integrate students into the community.

acquisition and utilization, scientific methodology, critical thinking and analytical reasoning. The Science Fair initiative also allows high school students to participate in new programs that bring students to UCI laboratory facilities. Additionally, the Science Fair requires students to complete an independent research project that may be chosen to participate in county and state science fairs.

COSMOS is a program in which academically talented high school students are encouraged to take an active role in the fields of science, mathematics, engineering, business and higher educational sectors of the state of California. During the summer months, high school students move into UCI dorms and take part in math and science courses, as well as take advantage of some of the surrounding resources such as the Palomar Observatory and the UCI Brain Imaging Center.

The Orange County Bridges to Baccalaureate (OC Bridges) helps to advance the careers of minority community college students by providing research training. Through workshops and seminars, conducted under UCI faculty, students are able to further pursue their careers in biomedical fields.

First, let me congratulate you on being part of a school that is vital and growing — with 90 faculty members in five departments:
Biomedical Engineering, Chemical Engineering and Materials Science, Civil and Environmental Engineering, Electrical Engineering and Computer Science and Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering.

The school is also home to three interdisciplinary academic programs and numerous research facilities. Although the potential avenues of study available here stretch the

imagination, our focus is on four of the most exciting, emerging areas: biomedical engineering, energy/ transportation, information technology and nanoscale/ microscale engineering.

Engineers affiliated with the Center for Biomedical Engineering are building the roadmap for the future of medicine and healthcare. Using bio-opto-electronics, photonics and advanced microscopy, they are developing new ways of seeing life from the inside of single, living cells. Engineers affiliated with the California Institute for Telecommunications and Information Technology, a joint initiative with University of California, San Diego, are working to advance the reach and capacity of the Internet, which will be global, wireless and operating on an all-optical core. Inside the Integrated Nanosystems Research Facility, engineers, physicists and scientists are working on the design and fabrication of microscale and even smaller systems.

We encourage our students to conduct research in areas they are most interested in, from aerodynamics to micro-machining
techniques. Students may also
choose to explore areas that are
destined to revolutionize the world:
pervasive computing and communications, micro-electro-mechanical
systems or biomedical engineering.

to helping our students reach their
career goals, by providing opportunities to interact with industry and
work in labs to solve real world

problems.
The educational environment here at the Henry Samueli School of Engineering is designed to equip students with a fundamental understanding and knowledge of mathematics, physics, chemistry, biology and humanities. An interdisciplinary background in the sciences and humanities enables our students to pursue whichever specialty is of interest to them.

The most successful engineers have the knowledge to work in multiple disciplines. A leading engineering mind integrates all the knowledge necessary to create highly

complex systems, such as spacecraft, jetliners, the most sophisticated computers and software, medical devices and many other products and systems beneficial to our society and economy.

During a lifetime career, engineers will experience numerous ends and beginnings. This profession, perhaps more than any other, requires a constant commitment to being a leader in the development of new technologies, or at least to maintaining a knowledge base through continuing education. Founded in 1965, the Henry Samueli School of Engineering is one of the nation's fastest growing Engineering schools. Enrollment numbers reached a new high this year with nearly 3,000 undergraduates and more than 600 graduate students within the school. This year's freshman class was the largest incoming class to date, with 692 students. The Henry Samueli School of Engineering is comprised of five different departments to allow students an opportunity to explore whatever area of engineering most appeals to them: Biomedical Engineering, Chemical Engineering and Materials Science, Civil and Environmental Engineering, Electrical Engineering and Computer Science, and Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering. To stimulate students' thinking, the school actively engages in various projects that allow students to design new creations

The School recently opened an anechoic chamber designed to test the performance of antennas, such as those used for cell phones and laptop computers. The chamber offers a controlled test environment because it absorbs nearly all the reflections of electromagnetic waves emitted by an

antenna. The 26 by 12 by 12 feet chamber is enclosed in a sealed metal cage, which acts as a shield to external signals. The chamber is 99 percent effective at absorbing waves. Faculty and staff believe the facility will provide valuable services to local companies and create collaborations between the school's future engineers and industry professionals. Also, by allowing students to engage in the school's projects, it gives them an opportunity to have hands-on experience for their future careers.


You have learned how to ask the right questions, and you know where to go looking for answers. You have come a long way from that senior year in high school, but you still do not need to know what you are going to be when you grow up. You have not even come close to reaching the beginning of the end. If you leave UCI with a B.A. and the feeling that the best years of your life are now behind you, your professors have done you a profound disservice. A college education is not as good it gets. A college education prepares you for what is yet to come, not just one more new beginning, but many.





Students gain insight when new faculty are welcomed into the School of Humanities and new majors are created to expand their intellectual horizons. Barry Siegel, who won the 2002 Pulitzer Prize for feature writing, joined the UCI faculty in Fall 2003 as a professor of English. Siegel has been a Los Angeles Times reporter since 1976. He won the Pulitzer Prize for A Father's Pain, a Judge's Duty, and a Justice Beyond Their Reach, a portrait of a man who was tried for negligence in the death of his son. In addition to winning the Pulitzer Prize, Siegel has earned many other awards, such as the PEN Center USA West Literary Award in Journalism, the Best Writing Award from the California Newspaper Publishers Association and the Livingston Award for Young Journalists. Also, Siegel's past works include two nonfiction volumes of literary journalism and three legal suspense novels.

Siegel is the director of the undergraduate major in Literary Journalism, the first of its kind in the University of California system. The program builds on the University's existing strengths in literature,

creative writing and literary theory. The new major is directed primarily at students who are interested in reading, studying, and writing nonfiction in the journalism field.

In addition to Literary Journalism, the School of Humanities recently added two other new majors, Global Cultures and Humanities and Arts. Global Cultures is a new undergraduate major and minor that explores the problems and processes of globalization from a humanistic perspective. The Humanities faculty has created a new and powerful way of thinking about globalization through three different humanistic perspectives: in terms of change across time and history, the formation of identity and theoretical practices that shape philosophical speculation and beliefs. They believe that by majoring/minoring in global cultures, students will have a greater appreciation of the world and its histories and today's society's interaction with it. Humanities and Arts provides students with a broad exposure to a range of disciplinary and methodological opportunities in both the Humanities and Arts.

The scholarly work of the faculty in Humanities and Arts lies at an intersection between the two subjects. This major helps students improve their critical sophistication while learning about the process of performance and creative work. It also investigates the symbolic dimension of human behavior and identity. All majors in the School of Humanities give students the ability to express themselves clearly and accurately, the skill of critical evaluation, the courage to make choices based on shared values and, most importantly, the ability to understand and make sense of other people and their cultures.




Spread over four buildings and two temporary facilities, UCI's School of Information and Computer Science is home to nearly 2,500 students, more than 120 faculty, researchers and staff as well as numerous research and computing labs. Those who have ventured to ICS recently see that it is spread a little thin. However, a new complex that includes a six-story academic building and a two-story classroom building will give ICS some breathing room. Set to break ground in May 2004, the ICS 3 complex will more than double the school's current space. The buildings, supported by a November 2002 bond measure of nearly \$34 million, are estimated to cost \$50 million, with the remaining \$16 million coming from private and university support. Occupancy is expected in the summer of 2006.


"As you can imagine, we are very anxious for construction on these buildings to begin," said Debra J. Richardson, ICS Interim Dean, "and even more anxious to be able to move into them. Since 1998, the ICS student population has grown more than 125 percent. During the same




You end your UCI years and begin your next grand challenge, keep your eyes and minds open and continue to learn about and deepen your appreciation for the universe around you.

### School of Social Ecology

The School of Social Ecology is an interdisciplinary academic unit whose scholarly research and instruction is informed by and contributes to knowledge in the social, behavioral, legal, environmental and health sciences. The School is comprised of four departments: Criminology, Law and Society; Environmental Health, Science and Policy; Psychology and Social Behavior; and Planning Policy and

Design. Social Ecology faculty apply scientific methods to the study of a wide array of recurring social, behavioral and environmental problems. Among issues of longstanding interest in the School are crime and justice in society, social influences on human development over the life cycle and the effects of the physical environment on health and human behavior. While the field of ecology focuses on the relationships between organisms and their environments, social ecology is concerned with the relationships between human populations and their environments. Social Ecology's faculty is multidisciplinary, including psychologists with a variety of specialties (e.g. developmental, social, environmental and health psychology); criminologists; sociologists; political scientists; lawyers; urban and regional planners and economists; environ-

mental health scientists; and program evaluation experts. The School's research and teaching is distinguished by an emphasis on the integration of the concepts and perspectives of these multiple disciplines. This focus is based on the School's core belief that the analysis and amelioration of complex societal problems requires interdisciplinary efforts. Many Social Ecology faculty are involved in developing policies and interventions directed toward improving the functioning of individuals, families and other groups, organizations, institutions and communities, while other faculty in the School focus their efforts on the complex environmental issues confronting our society. Social Ecology undergraduate students benefit from the multidisciplinary instructional expertise of the School's faculty in the classroom and are afforded opportunities to

engage in field-based learning, as well, through the School's well-established and highly regarded field studies program. Graduate students work closely with the faculty in the classroom and on important research projects that enhance their research skills.


The School of Social Ecology offers students a wide variety of opportunities to get involved and expand their learning experience. Students majoring in this field can host student interns, become a mentor, utilize faculty research and join the Dean's Leadership Council. Engaging in field study allows students to examine social problems, to evaluate the merit of ideas presented in the classroom and to educate students in conducting naturalistic observations and investigations. Each student is required to spend ten hours a week in an agency to receive four units of academic credit. Similarly, graduate students can apply to become a mentor for younger, undergraduate Social Ecology majors. Students in the field can take advantage of faculty research for private or public sector projects such as the Gang Incident Tracking System (GITS) or the Community Health Research Initiative.

There is also support for fellow student and faculty research projects through scholarships and fellowships. Other ways of supporting the School of Social Ecology include partaking in the UCIthink.community Open Forums, in which students strive to build a partnership between the UCI community and School of Social Ecology, Furthermore, students on the





### School of Social Sciences

The academic focus and commitments of UCI's School of Social Sciences for 2003-2004 mirrors the challenges and issues of our local–global–society. The School's unique charge is to address through research and scholarly dialogue such issues as the state's economy, the changing face of

American politics and culture, the evolution of the nation's immigrant populations, conflict resolution in the post 9-11 world to the cognitive understanding of individual behavior. To seek in-depth knowledge and to propose problem solving strategies for 21st century challenges, the School relies on the high academic quality of the departments of the School-Anthropology, Cognitive Sciences, Economics, Linguistics, Logic and Philosophy of Science, Political Science and Sociology and programs in International Studies, Chicano/Latino Studies, and Social Sciences.

In addition to departmental foundations, the School has a commitment to understand human behavior through two multi-disciplinary programmatic areas of new research: Globalization & Society and Complex Systems. The

interdisciplinary vision of Globalization and Society draws upon the International Studies program, immigration, demography and social movement studies in Sociology; global economics; socio-cultural anthropology and world cultures; and the areas of international relations, policy and democratization in Political Science.

Building on the School of Social Sciences' traditional strengths in quantitative and mathematical methods in the behavioral sciences, the interdisciplinary vision of Complex Systems draws on the study of econometrics, mathematical economics, evolutionary game theory, philosophy of mathematics and physics, cognitive neurosciences, perception and action systems, decision and knowledge representation investigations.


The School's substantial role as

the largest academic School on the Irvine campus brings with it the responsibility of educating nearly 25 percent of the campus' undergraduate population. Approximately 36 percent of undergraduates receiving a B.A. degree in 2002-2003 were Social Science majors. Six of the 12 largest majors—Economics, Psychology, Sociology, International Studies, Political Science and Social Sciences are in the School.

A school's growth and reputation are largely built upon the quality and commitment of its faculty. In 1964, a young political scientist, Jack W. Peltason joined a small cohort of academics to establish the priorities for a new university and for a visionary and progressive school of social sciences—UCI's School of Social Sciences. UC President Emeritus Peltason's first University of California position was as an Irvine Professor of Political Science.

Recognized internationally as a top scholar on the American Constitution, Peltason was one of the visionaries in the 1960s who called for a new emphasis on empirical-quantitative based research and analysis in the social sciences. Over the last four decades Jack Peltason has served as the Chancellor of the University of Illinois, Urbana (1967-1984), the Chancellor of the University of California, Irvine, (1984-1992), and as







# Division of Undergraduate Education

Even as undergraduates begin their adult lives they also see the end, or perhaps the completion, of their first stages of learning and experiencing the world. The Division of Undergraduate Education sponsors many programs that help students manage this transition successfully.

For new students, the Division provides Undecided/Undeclared Academic Advising, Peer Academic Advising in all the academic units, Student Academic Advancement Services, Transfer Services Counseling and the Testing Office. These programs assist new students in beginning well at the university and seeing what new patterns they may follow. The Campuswide Honors Program, Scholarship Opportunities, the Center for International Education, the Washington Center Academic Program, the UC Center in Sacramento and the Undergraduate Research Opportunities Program encourage undergraduates to explore new intellectual and cultural dimensions while building on their past interests. The Learning and Academic Resource Center helps students develop their learning

skills, while the Academic Honesty Policy network promotes intellectual integrity. The Student Recommended Faculty Program, the Instructional Resources Center and the Instructional Technology Center help introduce new faculty and new teaching methods to campus in order to benefit undergraduate learning. The Office of Research, Evaluation and Grants provides analysis to inform curricular decisions and grant writing assistance to promote innovations in teaching and learning. Information Systems supports the Division's growing data and computing needs.

All of these programs, conscious of undergraduates' constant endings and beginnings, work together to help undergraduates meet the everchanging academic and personal challenges.



The Undecided/Undeclared program also includes a series of Faculty Forums, designed to enhance interaction between faculty and students. The faculty come from a broad range of disciplines and careers, and interested students are invited to spend time talking to and getting information from the faculty member in a comfortable environment.

Freshmen are also given the opportunity to be involved in the First-Year Excellence Program, a comprehensive living and learning environment designed exclusively for Undecided/Undeclared students. This programs consists of submitting an application to live in the FYEP residence hall in Mesa Court, as well as the required completion of the Passport for 21st Century Leadership program, culminating in the awarding of the UCI Leadership Certificate.

While many students feel the pressure to declare a major all around them even before they enter college, it is clear that undeclared students at UCI are not given that pressure in their first year. They are instead given many opportunities to explore all that UCI has to offer before declaring a major, which relieves at least one source of pressure in the pressure-driven world of today.



The UCI Libraries provide the services, collections and facilities that assist students' growth in their

course of study. The Libraries support students' formal class work, but equally important, provide space to think, dream and offer opportunities for individual exploration and personal growth. Students face many difficult challenges throughout their college careers and the Libraries provide an immense array of services and resources to support intellectual pursuits and the development of lifelong independent learning and research skills. Librarians at UCI offer students expert individualized research assistance and instructional classes.

The Libraries contain more than 2.2 million print volumes and subscriptions to 28,500 journals in electronic and print formats at the four library facilities: the Langson Library, Science Library and Library

Gateway Study Center on the Irvine campus and the Grunigen Medical Library in Orange. Wireless network access is available throughout the Libraries as well as more than 450 desktop computers for general and scheduled use. Also available are specialized facilities for multimedia, advanced computing, instruction and e-mail. The Library Gateway Study Center, adjacent to the Langson Library and the Science Library Study Center provide comfortable late-night study space until 3:00 a.m. most evenings and 24 hours a day during midterms, prefinals and finals weeks. Individual and group study rooms are available in the Science Library. Innovative services such as Electronic Reserves, and on-line requests for interlibrary loan materials were developed to

assist students in their studies and research.



Returning students to the 2003-2004 UCI academic year probably noticed a definite change. On Oct. 16, UCI's Main Library was renamed in honor of a Newport Beach entrepreneur named Jack Langson. Mr. Langson's generous donations to the library have made him an esteemed UCI benefactor and as a lifetime member of the Chancellor's Club, Langson passionately supports libraries, believing they are "vital components of strong universities and communities."

Having graduated from the University of Southern California in 1970 with a Bachelor's Degree in business administration and his M.B.A. from Harvard University in 1972, the Newport Beach resident grew up in Anaheim, currently lives in Orange County and feels UCI plays a significant role in the community. Commenting on the contributions, University Librarian Gerald J. Munoff says "[Langson's] gift creating the Langson Library Fund and the Langson Library Endowed Fund will greatly enhance the library for students, faculty and the community. We will be able to make substantial building improvements to provide better services and accommodate new technologies to meet increased library use from the campus and community." The Langson Library offers research services and collections that support the arts, humanities, social sciences, social ecology, business

and management. Among the library's prominent collections are the Critical Theory Archives, Special Collections, the East Asian Collection and the Southeast Asian Archives. The Main Library, the Science Library, the Grunigen Medical Library and the Gateway Study Center, which together comprise UCI Libraries, holds more than 2.2 million volumes and maintain subscriptions to 35,000 journals in electronic and print formats.

Demonstrating the libraries' importance to the community and the world, two million people visit the libraries each year and more than eight million use its resources on-line. "It seems to me that improving the library is strengthening the intellectual heart of the university," Langson said. "A great university library provides the lifeblood to nourish the capabilities of its students and to support the advancement of knowledge by its researchers."

1. How have your experiences here at UCI lived up to your expectations of college?

"About how important math skills and logical thinking are and how far it [can] get you. Also, with the excessive amount of studying and research, it would probably make me a better student."












# Office of the Chancellor

averaged over 1,000 students per year. During this same time, the graduate student population has grown from 2,540 to 3,609. Additionally, this year we have had the largest number ever of transfer students entering as undergrads. For the 2003-04 academic year, we received 34,398 new freshman applications, the highest number ever received at UCI. UCI has added 75 new faculty members since October 2002, including recognized scholars in the fields of cognitive neuroscience, British romanticism, mathematics, organizational theory, economics and educational administration and leadership. Perhaps the most dramatic event during this academic year was the anonymous \$20 million dollar gift to the School of Information and Computer Science. This comes one year after the department





## Student Center


The UCI Student Center is entering an exciting and much anticipated expansion period. The Student Center, as we know it, will be expanded to provide additional services to UCI's growing student body. Construction will begin during summer 2004, with an anticipated completion of fall 2006. During this time, it will be business as usual with the Center meeting the needs of students as much as possible.

The Student Government/Dean of Students wing will be demolished to make way for an entirely new 4-story building housing a 1,000-seat Ballroom on the first floor. On the second floor/terrace level will be Student Government Offices, new food outlet, retail shops and a new Zot Zone. On the third floor will be offices for the Dean of Students, Health Education, Scheduling and Conference Services, UCI Volunteer Center, Student Organizations, Center for Women and Men and the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender Resource Center. And on the fourth floor will be offices for the Housing Administrative Services as well as a complex of meeting rooms.

The Zot Zone wing will be demolished to add a new Food Court, enhance the Terrace area and add more conference rooms. In addition, a new pub will be on the terrace level. Outdoor space will include a performance stage on the Terrace and a garden courtyard.

An additional building (west expansion) will be connected to the Emerald Bay Rooms to include a 450-seat multipurpose performance space with a stage and a large Food Court.







As in most communities, our UCI members may experience problems and conflict in school or at work. UCI recognizes this reality and established the "The Office of the Ombudsman." Ombudsman offers UCI students, faculty, staff and the UCI Medical Center an informal process to discuss and resolve academic, professional and interpersonal problems in an informal, objective and confidential atmosphere. These services are offered at no charge. As advocates for equity and justice, the

Ombudsman staff will listen to the issue, provide immediate assistance if possible, or suggest resources that may enable the individual to resolve the matter. As designated neutrals, the Ombudsman staff do not take sides, nor have the authority to render decisions or authorize outcomes.

Also, providing confidential information to an Ombudsman does not constitute a formal notice to the University. If you experience a problem and don't know where to turn, we may be able to help. Additionally, the Office of the Ombudsman also developed, implemented and manages the Campus Mediation Program which has trained more then 65 students, faculty and staff volunteer mediators who are available to assist in informal conflict negotiation or dispute resolution. 

The Center for Women and Men (CWM) opened in 1973 and was staffed by five volunteers. The activities and services at that time included a library, a calendar of events and several committees. The center also offered a reading group, self-defense classes, consciousness-raising groups, day care for children and information on health services. The CWM has been and continues to be invested in ongoing and emerging issues related to gender equity, support and advancement. Our current mission statement reads: "Through education, advocacy

and individual support, the Center for Women and Men (CWM) promotes gender equity, personal empowerment and mutually respectful relationships. The CWM works to eliminate violence, including sexual assault."

The center assists in helping to educate the campus community on issues related to empowerment and advocacy, celebrates the achievements and strengths of women and men, works for enhanced understanding and communication between women and men and contributes to UCI programs and policies related to women and gender. Services include a video and book library, the Campus Assault Resource Program (CARP), the Right to Know Peer Educator Program, several workshops (e.g., "Sex in the City" on relationships) in addition to sponsored faculty seminars offered through the center to the campus community.

Many campus-wide programs are offered annually. A sampling of programs includes: "Unspeakable Acts (a dramatization of acquaintance rape)," The Clothesline Project, Take Back the Night, SEX RULES!, as well as a range of gender-based educational programs such as, "Crimes Against Nature (issues of masculinity), the Guerilla Girls (women in the arts) and "A Room With a View: A Life of Activism." The CWM Director also teaches a course once a year through the department of Psychology and Social Behavior entitled, "Sexuality and Intimate Relationships."

## Cross-Cultural Center

The Disability Services Center (DSC) provides reasonable accommodations to students with permanent and temporary disabilities in compliance with federal and state laws. In support of the university's commitment to providing equal opportunities for students with disabilities, the center offers support services and programs that enable students to maximize their educational potential. Such services include testing accommodations, note takers, readers, scribes, tutor referral, priority registration for classes, liaisons to faculty, sign

language interpreters, real-time captioning, assistive aids and technology, text conversion and disability management counseling. The Center also serves as a resource for the entire University community regarding disability awareness, compliance, rights and responsibilities.

Programs coordinated by the Disability Services Center include Disability Awareness Week, DSC Peer Educators, DSC Peer Mentor Program and disability awareness seminars and workshops. In October, disability education was the focus of Disability Awareness Week. This was accomplished through disability simulation and Q&A on Ring Road, the annual FaculTEA, a variety of workshops offered across campus and distribution of "Attitudes are the Real Disability" buttons. In the winter, UCI was host site for a teleconference on hearing disabilities, and, in the spring, the DSC sponsored a regional seminar on Universal Instruction Design and Web Access.

DSC Peer educators (six UCI students with disabilities) presented disability awareness sessions on- and off-campus, developed projects to improve access on-campus and participated in the UCI All University Leadership Conference. The Peer Educators served as Peer Mentors to new incoming students with disabilities, helping them make a smooth transition to college life.

The DSC initiated fundraising efforts this year through the donation of celebrity items, and Center fundraising continued throughout the year. Disability outreach initiatives were explored.



curriculum reform, professional development and student academic services include the Ford and Kellogg Foundations, the U.S. Department of Education (GEAR UP) and the National Science Foundation Mathematics and Science Partnership.

The Center leads the National Science Foundation/University of CAMP, a program offering faculty-directed research, mentoring opportunities for undergraduates, and a pathway to graduate and professional schools. The Center employs UCI students who serve as residential assistants for their summer programs, higher education coordinators in high schools who provide college prep advising, tutors assisting K-12 teachers in math and reading instruction and staff assistants for data entry and data base design. Through SAGE Scholars, created in 1999 by the UC Office of the President, the Center works with local businesses to offer paid multi-year internships to talented and highly motivated UCI students related to their field of study.

## COSMOS

COSMOS was established by the California State Legislature to motivate the most creative minds of the new generation of prospective scientists, engineers and mathematicians. Each summer, COSMOS serves 160 California high school students in grades 9-12 who are talented in mathematics and science. The four-week residential program, which offers a curriculum not traditionally offered in high school, exposes students to an intensive learning experience that will enhance their academic development and shape their educational and career goals. The curricu-



lum was designed in collaboration with UCI faculty in the Schools of Physical Sciences, Biological Sciences, Engineering, Social Sciences and Information and Computer Science.

An academic enrichment program that serves educationally disadvantaged students, MESA emphasizes participation by student groups with low rates of eligibility for four-year institutions. MESA offers a pipeline of curricular and extracurricular services from elementary school through university levels to increase the numbers of students who graduate with degrees in math, science and engineering. MESA serves 800 students annually, grades seven through 11, in Compton and Anaheim schools.



## **FOCUS**

FOCUS unites mathematics, science and education faculty, researchers and staff from the university, community colleges (CC) and preK-12 district/schools in a close collaborative working relationship to improve mathematics and science achievement in three school districts, including Santa Ana USD, Compton USD and Westside Costa Mesa. One of the aims of FOCUS is the construction of a Future Teacher Highway to increase the number, quality and diversity of teachers of mathematics and science in pre-Kindergarten through 12th grade. The number of pre-college students benefiting annually is 101,000. Some CFEP programs operating under the FOCUS umbrella

are GEAR UP, Summer Academy in Mathematics and Science and the Saturday Academy in Mathematics.



# California Alliance for Minority Participation



The University of California Early Academic Outreach Program was created in 1976 as an aid to prepare young Californians from educationally disadvantaged backgrounds for college. EAOP serves as a cornerstone for achievement to meet the University of California outreach goals: to contribute to the academic enrichment of UC campuses through a diverse student body and to improve opportunities for California students in disadvantaged circumstances to achieve eligibility for admission and to enroll at UC campuses. EAOP works with 70 middle and high

schools throughout Los Angeles and Orange County school districts, serving some 14,000 students annually.



## **CTFMS**


CTFMS was created in 1999 to fill a growing need for qualified math and science teachers by preparing UCI undergraduate math and science majors for teaching careers. CTFMS participants serve as role models and provide instructional assistance in classrooms in partner school districts. CTFMS participants develop their teaching skills through enrollment in education and physical science courses and working a minimum of five hours per week at a school site. Fifty students participate each year.

The SAGE Scholars Program was created in 1999 by the UC Office of the President to complement the UC Outreach Program. Through this innovative partnership between UCI and Orange County businesses, 40 undergraduate students annually have an unparalleled opportunity to gain the business and leadership skills they will need to thrive in the 21st century. SAGE's goal is to facilitate a seamless transition as students move from their undergraduate studies to their professional careers.

## A Different Kind of Graduation

For the last 33 years Dennis Hampton has been the Executive Director of ASUCI. Students and co-workers often refer to him as a honest and fair man, who is always there to listen and provide guidance. During his time at UCI he has served as a guiding light for the student body government.

Hampton's journey to UCI began as more of an accident. As a child growing up he dreamt of following in the footsteps of his father and becoming a forest ranger. As a young adult he obtained a biology degree and completed studies in animal science at California Polytechnic, Pomona. To support his family and pay for his schooling, Dennis went to work. In 1971, at the recommendation of a past co-worker of North American Rockwell, NASA's Apollo Project, Dennis came to UCI. Dennis took the position of the ASUCI Associate Business Manager as a temporary job to help fund his undergraduate studies. When offered the job permanently in 1973, Hampton felt he could help the shortcomings of ASUCI within a mere five years. Before realizing it, five years became 33 years.

Looking back on his time at UCI, Dennis found the accomplishments of Student Government he is most proud of include: the Women's Center (1976); Recycling Center (1974); Clone Copy (1981); Student Media Board (1985); and Outroads Travel (1976).







Trevor was known as the queen of film noir, often playing the hardboiled blond and every conceivable type of "bad girl" role.

Inspired by the diverse career of Claire Trevor, the Claire Trevor School of the Arts strives to deliver an educational experience that develops superlative artistic abilities while providing an excellent liberal arts education with six on-campus theaters, the Cyber A Cafe, The Beall Center for Art and Technology, a costume design and construction studio, a stage production shop, digital arts labs and a motion capture studio.

The School's undergraduate program offers classes in digital imaging, theater design, interactive digital media, sound and video, dance and music technology and computer music composition, as student work is digitally exhibited in the Cyber A Cafe and in the Beall Center for Art and Technology.

Find time for balance in your life. Love your work, use your talents to help others, but allow time for family and friends and for yourself. I've been extremely fortunate in having the opportunity to do research and teach at UCI. I feel very honored to be recognized by the UCI students for teaching. I've thoroughly enjoyed teaching and interacting with students in the Biological Sciences. It's been very rewarding to work with such talented, highly motivated students and watch their progress and achievements.

I think one of my proudest moments was my Ph.D. graduation from UCI in 1982. After finishing my Ph.D. thesis in the spring of 1982, I was able to present my grandmother with a copy of my thesis manuscript. She was an immense support in my early years, and it meant so much for her to see the achievement of my goal.

My research work has focused on the protozoan parasite, Trypanosoma cruzi. T. cruzi is the causative agent of Chagas' disease, a major cause of heart disease in endemic areas of Central and South America. There are currently limited treatment options for Chagas' disease and there are no vaccines to prevent infection. For the past 25 years, I have been a part of Dr. Jerry Manning's research group in the Department of Molecular Biology and Biochemistry. Most of our research efforts have been aimed at developing a vaccine to prevent Chagas' disease. Through the use

ι Wrightsman, Professor of Molecular Biology and Biochemistry of recombinant DNA technology and a mouse model for infection, we were able to isolate and test molecules that successfully protected mice against T. cruzi infection. Currently, we are collaborating with a research group in Brazil to determine the feasibility of using this vaccine preparation to prevent infection in humans.

As a microbiologist, I am fascinated by the estimate that 99% of the world's microbes have not been cultured. This means that there are hundreds of unanswered questions about the interactions of microbes in the soil, water and other environments. Some of these microbes may be harmful to humans, but there are many more that provide beneficial interactions. The possibilities for future research projects are endless.

There are seven specialized research units associated with the School of Biological Sciences including: Cancer Research Institute, Center for Immunology, Center for the Neurobiology of Learning and Memory, Center for Virus Research, Developmental Biology Center, Institute for Brain Aging and Dementia and IRU in Biomolecular Structure and Function.

The 11th annual Southern California Conference on Undergraduate Research was hosted for the first time by UCI's Undergraduate Research Opportunities Program in November 2003. More than 550 students representing 90 institutions presented their faculty-mentored undergraduate research, scholarly projects and creative activities.

UCI researchers discovered an important similarity in the causes of cell degeneration and death in diseases such as Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, Huntington's, type II diabetes and CJD, suggesting that a single therapy could combat these different ailments.







I remain struck by the fact that I was precisely the sort of kid that would now drive me crazy. I never attended class; I always created my own topics, regardless of the course's stated concerns; I never completed work in a timely fashion because I was writing endless screeds. And then there was my existential/phenomenological/ psychoanalytical phase, when it seemed good to bring Husserl and Heidegger to Shakespeare on a midterm exam. I didn't finish that either. I say nothing of the quarter when I received four incompletes, some of which lapsed into F's as my ambition exceeded my grasp. Towards the end of my undergraduate career, the director of the Honors Program at UCLA informed me that I was simply not graduate school material, which to all appearances I was not (when I perversely insisted on applying to graduate schools anyway, the University of Wisconsin sent back my transcripts with the F's circled in red pencil). It remains an unfathomable mystery why UCLA admitted me to its graduate program after I ditched the war of all against all that constituted the Master's year at the University of Chicago. But the department did, permitting me to do the kind of work in which I daily find

inexpressible pleasure. So you see, the most unlikely people—at least in the eyes of the world—can find a way to do what they want if they have some passion for it. No judgment, no situation need be final.

Your education need never end because reading makes us our own best teachers, gives us a sense of the irreducible complexity of the human and natural worlds and that sense keeps us from complacent judgments of people and their predicaments. The Humanities offers us the means to self-understanding and selfcriticism, without which any talent or skill, method or technology will inevitably be misused.

#### Interesting...

Chemistry is often called the central science, yet opportunities to learn chemistry have declined. The UCI Chemistry Outreach Program was developed to engage students in high school chemistry classes, rendering the subject more interesting and more relevant to the students' daily lives.

Earth System Science has research that can be grouped into three broad categories: Atmospheric Chemistry which focuses on the transformation and transport of chemicals throughout the troposphere and stratosphere, Biogeochemical Cycles which involves the study of ecosystem interactions with both the atmosphere and water cycle and Physical Climate which involves the study of energy transport across the Earth's oceans, atmosphere and cryosphere.

Mathematics opens the door to a variety of different careers, putting to use the problem-solving and analytical-thinking skills developed in a bachelors degree.

The Physics and Astronomy faculty are outstanding scholars, as 19 are Fellows of the American Physical Society with the National Research Council, which ranks the department in the top thirty in the country.

#### Interesting...

Integrating the studies of environmental, legal, behavioral and health sciences to address recurring social and environmental problems comprises the interdisciplinary program, Social Ecology. Thus, the Social Ecology faculty is a melting pot of attorneys, criminologists, psychologists, sociologists, urban planners and environmental health specialists.

An integral part of Social Ecology is research. Research gives students the opportunity to get hands-on experience working with Social Ecology professors who are experts in their fields of study. In the past, students have used their research experience to develop their own research projects.

Students under the School of Social Ecology are required to log 100 hours of field study to graduate. This gives students much needed work experience that will translate to many of their future careers.

Psychology and Social Behavior is one of two UCI majors that focus on Psychology. The other is the Psychology major in the Department of Cognitive Sciences under the School of Social Sciences. Is concerned with human behavior in social context. Core classes for Psychology and Social Behavior include developmental, health, pre-clinical and social psychology classes. In specialty classes students study courses in infant, child and adult development, gerontology, mental heath and illness, child therapies, social relationships, psychology and the law, personality, social inequality and violence in society. Graduates generally go into counseling or clinical psychology and social work. The approach is more interdisciplinary, drawing from many fields.

The Social Ecology house in Arroyo Vista is unique to schools at UCI. Functions at the house are focused on meeting and interacting with faculty and research.

How do you feel about the statement. "There

are too many liberal professors at UCI"? The comment needs clarification because the adjective 'liberal.' like other adjectives such as 'conservative' and 'radical,' has various meanings. For example, if "liberal" is taken to mean the achievements of the liberal labor movement (eight hour workday, minimum wage, extra pay for overtime, paid sick leave, paid vacation, health benefits, retirement pension), then my response would be that probably all professors (and most students for that matter) are liberal-even the Republicans (can you find a Republican who refuses to accept paid sick days, health benefits and retirement pensions?). On the other hand, if by 'liberal' you mean acceptance of the policies of the Democratic Party leadership such as FDR who put 110,000 Japanese-Americans in concentration camps, or Harry Truman who used atomic bombs on the Japanese and then aided the French in their attempt to recolonize Viet Nam, or Lyndon Johnson who lied about the Gulf of Tonkin incident in order to get war powers from Congress or Bill Clinton who maintained sanctions against Iraq resulting in the deaths of hundreds of thousands of Iragis - in short, if you mean by 'liberal' support for deception, racism and neocolonialism, then I would hope that there are no liberals on campus.

# Adviser's Note

Volume 28 of Anthology, University of California, Irvine, was printed by Herff Jones Yearbooks in Shawnee Mission, KS. Our Local and Customer Service Representatives were Alison Jones and Julie Bogart, respectively.

1300 books were printed on 80 lb Bordeaux paper. The book was sold throughout the year for 55 dollars. Of the 368 pages, 32 pages were printed in four-color and UV laminated. The cover was Vista Lithographed and the spot colors PMS 548 and PMS 7499 were printed on Kivar and UV Lamination. The cover was rounded, backed and turned on 160 point board. The entire cover is Gloss UV laminated. The cover also has over graining with a French Straight grain. The book was Smyth sewn round and back. Both endsheets have spot color PMS 548 and PMS 7499.

Throughout the book Brioso Pro Regular was used for all copy and captions. The headline fonts for People and Division pages were in Brioso Pro; Events, Greeks, Athletics, Academics and Index were in Bernhard Modern Standard Roman; Portfolio, Clubs and Residential Life were in Shannon Book; Administration was in Bernhard Modern Standard Roman and Diskus; and Graduates was in Brioso Pro and Diskus. Throughout the book ten to 100 percent screens were used.

The title and theme "To the End of the Beginning" was created by the entire Senior Staff: Angelo Jefferson, Annie Jiu, Patrick Kellenberger, Adrian Salamanca, Carol Tang and Cari Tom. The cover and endsheet design and layout were created by Adrian Salamanca. The photos on the front and back cover were taken by Angelo Jefferson and Diana Jou.

Pages were designed using Adobe PageMaker 6.5 and 7.0 on three Dell P3 PCs and two Dell Celeron PC computers. All photos for pages were placed on yearbook pages using the Herff Jones Plug-in ImagINe. Yearbook photos in all sections, except those in Organizations and Graduates, and those on the CD supplement, were taken on a Canon PowerShot G2, three Canon PowerShot S30s, one Canon PowerShot S40, two Canon PowerShot S45s, one Canon PowerShot A70 and one Sony DSC F707. Video for the CD supplement was taken on a Canon ZR50MC Digital Video Camcorder. Pictures submitted in hardcopy format were scanned using a Visioneer 5300 One Touch flat bed scanner. Most group photos in the Clubs, Greeks and Residential Life sections along with photos in the graduates section were taken by Kyle Robinson and his staff at Classic Photography.

The Anthology is a student-run publication. Although countless hours are spent to make this book a success, inaccuracies may occur when one considers the thousands of students included in this publication. The *Anthology* Staff regrets any errors. However, no refunds, full or partial, can be issued due to any inaccuracies or omissions.






