

All persons above 16 are considered individuals (\$2.50) and are not included in the maximum family allowance of \$7.50. If either father or mother is deceased or not living with the family group, the family shall be considered to consist of the remaining parent and children under

Coupons will be issued upon application only to persons considered as heads of families and to those considered as individuals.

"Cash" books may still be purchased in any amount, in addition to the books issued.

MESS COMMITTEE SUBMITS REPORT

Following the meeting of chefs and the compilation of Center opinion, the Mess Committee composed of Block Representatives and the Advisory Board members submitted the following report to Mr. L. C. Shaffer, who requested suggestions pertaining to feeding and housing.

Parts of the report have been deleted; however, the more important recommendations have been retained.

QUALITY: The quality of the food served in the Center always has been good, except for one or two items which will be listed under recommendations.

QUANTITY: The amount of food served should be increased.
On several occasions, sufficient food was lacking for
the third shift, particularly in the quantity of meat
served.

VARIETY: The variety of food served is satisfactory under the present circumstances. Since, the committee feels that with the present kitchen space and facilities, it would only make work more difficult for the mess erew to add more variety.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

 Rice: There has been a dofinite improvement in the quality of rice, but since rice is an important item in the Japanese diet, we recommend the use of the better or best quality.

In order to cook rice properly, we strongly urge the authorities to provide proper and necessary facilities and kitchen equipment at relocation areas and centers as well as at assembly centers.

2. Eggs: The present weekly supply of eggs should be increased so that a certain amount can be available for use in preparing other foods.

3. Miso: More requested because it is a necessary Japanese food item.

4. Canned Fruits: Requested in order to add variety to desserts. It would be an ideal substitute for jello because the latter cannot be prepared and served during the extremely hot summer weather.

5. Curry Powder: Requested by chefs but at present there is no supply in the local Center's warehouse.

6. Fish: The concensus opinion of Conter residents favor the serving of mackerel and sea bass rather than salmon and sole.

7. <u>Ice Distribution</u>: With the coming of hot weather, we request that an increased supply of ice be made available for use in the Center mess halls.




