However, if a whole family should go, at least fifty percent of the members must be able to work. Pay is the prevailing wages in the location. Transportation; housing, and utilities should all be made available by the employer. Workers who leave for this work will remain there for the duration.

Those who are 16 years or over have (continued on page 7) Taking about a month and a half, the vocational survey, conducted by the Personnel and Records Department, has been finally completed, according to Robert E. Caviness, head of the division. The survey, which included about 3,500 individuals, intends to determine the capabilities of the people. It also finds a wide range of occupations in which they were engaged before coming here.

Duplicate cards have been made out designating the primary and secondary occupations of each individual. Two files are kept, one containing the names of those who are working, and the other the complete list of all available workers according to occupations. Therefore, even though a person is working, if a job comes up in which he is better fitted, he will be transferred.

These records will follow the evacuees to the relocation centers, and will aid him in obtaining proper employment there.

Some of the classifications include: accountant, architect, bookkeeper, barber, landscaper, clerks, cooks, drivers, etc.

OVIE RULES OUTLINED


