Irvine residents rally for justice

PROTEST: Community members who live in the Woodbridge housing complex in Irvine fear for their safety after the attacker of an Irvine Valley College student was released without bail.

Concerned citizens from Southern California held a rally for the second week in a row on Monday, Feb. 8, in protest of what they are calling injustice. The protest was an attempt to push the Orange County District Attorney's office to pursue further investigations into the death of Irvine resident and Irvine Valley College student Amir Zekria.

More than 25 people attended the rally on Monday, which was held at the Orange County Superior Courthouse in Santa

"We are here to get justice for the [death] of my brother," said Ozra Zekria, Amir's sister. "We have a lot of witnesses who saw the [incident]. My brother was unarmed and we want the [killer] to be imprisoned."

According to the Irvine Police Department, Amir Zekria, 23, and Chrysanthus Thomas, 25, both residents of the Woodbridge Villa Apartments in Irvine, got into a quarrel in the parking lot outside of Zekria's apartment on Dec. 16. According to Witnesses, the argument escalated into violence and Zekria was fatally shot. He later died from the single gunshot wound to his chest.

Thomas was arrested on Dec. 18 under suspicion of murder, but was released the following week because the DA's office felt there was insufficient evidence that it was anything other than an act of selfdefense, as Thomas had claimed.

The District Attorney's Office could not be reached for comment.

"The entire incident is scary," said Juli Abajian, a second-year psychology major and Woodbridge resident. "I mean, I am

now scared to even leave my house."

According to Khalid Siddiqi, Zekria's brother in law, Thomas' attack was both unnecessary and unfair.

Although he was not present during the time of the incident, Siddiqi said he heard how the confrontation heightened from eye witnesses. Siddigi heard that Thomas' threats and harassing to Zekria's younger

Minority students sue UC Berkeley

LAWSUIT: After being denied admission to Berkeley, several students, along with civil rights groups, are contending university admission policies.

Eight university students, of African, Latino and Filipino descent, sued the University of California last Tuesday Feb. 9, claiming the university had discriminated against them in the admissions process and consequently denied them admission at UC Berkeley. The students accuse the university admissions officers of using "unjustified reliance upon standardized test scores" and grading policies that favored the predominantly white and wealthy students which went against civil rights laws.

"The plaintiffs claim that Berkeley does not want African-American, Latino and Filipino-American studenst," said UC Berkeley Chancellor Robert M. Berdahl said. "That is not true-we do."

"We seek minority students vigorously and welcome them eagerly," Berdahl said.

According to civil rights attorneys, Berkeley was singled out for this lawsuit because it is the most competitive UC campus and because the ban on affirmative action turned away the most number of qualified minority students.

Lawyers are also disturbed by the fact the

UCIMC returns improper donations

M SCANDAL: After being offered the choice to be reimbursed, only five families have responded so far.

Following an internal investigation headed by Chancellor Ralph J. Cicerone, Medical Center Director Mark Laret and College of Medicine Dean Thomas Cesario, the UCIMC will reimburse the families of five patients a total of \$11,950 for improper donations solicited from the individual families. The donations were requested in exchange for preferential treatment in reserving a spot for family members to take part in clinical trial services performed by the medical center.

The outcome stemmed from the close inspection of Dr. John C. Hiserodt, who is alleged to have illegally participated in federally funded research in 1996, from which he was barred. As a result of this allegation and several others that followed, the research facility was shut down in Dec. 1996.

"The university took rather aggressive action in addressing problems that had arisen in the laboratory, ultimately including shutting it down," said UCIMC Chief Executive Mark Laret. "It was a rather bold move."

"We had several investigations and we were quite thorough in our review."

In 1995, a report was made that said patients and their families were asked to make donations in order to reserve places in the clinical trial. According to Laret, the

Power outage forces evacuation of library

ECAMPUS: The short circuit caused students to be stuck in elevators and kicked out of study halls.

An electrical short circuit occurred late Monday afternoon, Feb. 8, knocking out power for a few hours in several buildings on campus and forcing the evacuation of the Main Library.

"There was a fault - a short from either the phase-to-phase or phase-toground elements on an electrical circuit," said Greg Pierce, electrical supervisor for UCI's Facilities Management team. "What we actually had was a fault that went from a cable to a ground [wire]."

The cabling used to supply the school with its energy runs through a system of tunnels that lies beneath the campus and consists of over 12,000 interwoven strands of wire. The pressure of the voltage passing through is so great that a flaw the size of a pinhole can cause an entire system to fail. "Basically that's what happened. We had a fault, the cable blew out and took out all the buildings," Pierce said.

The area affected by the blackout included the Main Library, the Administration Building, Student Services 1 and 2, Gateway Commons and the humanities and fine arts trail-

Although no serious damage was inflicted on any of the buildings involved, the lack of power caused considerable inconvenience for the staff and students who had to be evacuated from the Main Library.

"[In situations like this] we have to clear everybody out of the building because we no longer have ventilation," said library night manager Bruce Brodnax. "There's a large number of people using up the air, if a fire breaks out everybody's dead; it's a cataclysmic scenario, but that's why we had to shut the library down."

Security from Special Events was called in to help clear people from the building and the evacuation was executed with only minor problems.

"We did have a couple of people stuck in the elevator for a while," Brodnax said. "We contacted campus police on how we should get them out."

The two students were instructed to use an emergency lever located between the doors and after about 45 minutes, were finally able to free themselves.

"The guy [stuck in the elevator] was pretty non-chalant about it," said Vanessa Tanedo, a second-year student, who works at the Loan Desk. "He was eating an apple and acting like nothing happened."

With the safety of the couple secured, concern shifted to the number of students who had been using the facilities to study for upcoming midterms.

Artin Massihi, a fourth-year biology major was preparing for an exam at the library.

"The lights went out and they told us to leave, so I went over to the Science Library to study," Massihi said. "Then the fire alarm went off

and everybody was evacuated again. I think it was some sort of conspiracy.'

The likelihood of another power outage is compounded by the age of the cabling currently being used. According to Pierce, the same electrical network has been in place since UCI's initial construction.

"It is very possible," Pierce said. "You just can't predict whether you're going to have a cable fault.'

Due to the considerable cost of high voltage cable, it is being replaced through an incremental-type system of deferred maintenance.

The section that was the cause of Monday's blackout is going to be replaced by a company specializing in high voltage repairs.

According to Pierce, an outage like the one that occurred could have lasted for days if it was not for the dual feeding system employed by the electrical depart-

UCI receives its energy from two off-campus substations directly linked to Southern California Edison. If a circuit is lost, workers are able to isolate it to a certain area and back feed power from another circuit located somewhere else on campus.

This system has only become available in the last 8 to 10 years and has been a huge help to the efforts of people

"The university has gone to a big measure to make sure that we're able to keep supplying power to the buildings here on campus," Pierce said.

campus selected over 50 percent of last year's freshman class from only five percent of high schools in the state.

Of the eight students involved in the case, six of them are currently attending a UC, including UC Irvine, and another student is in the process of starting UCLA in the spring quarter.

The lawsuit focuses on three main points that are implemented by all eight undergraduate campuses. The suit alleges there is unwarranted emphasis on standardized tests such as the SAT and SAT II achievement tests.

Another section of the suit questions the use of the extra grade point for honors classes and Advanced Placement courses that are exclusive to upper class white areas and scarce in others. A grade point average that exceeds that of a 4.0, results in an unjustifiable weight that not all high school students have access

Last month, a faculty committee proposed lowering the extra whole grade point to half a point for those AP and honors courses.

The case has been filed in the U.S. District Court in San Francisco.



Dr. Michael Behe

Lehigh University, Professor of Biochemistry

Michael J. Behe graduated from Drexel University (B.S. Chemistry, '74). In 1978 the University of Pennsylvania awarded him the Ph.D. in biochemistry for his research on sickle-cell disease. In 1985 he accepted a post at Lehigh University where he is currently Professor of Biochemistry. Dr. Behe is not a "creationist" but a strong believer in the scientific method That method, however, has led him to conclude as a biochemist that the complexity of living systems at the molecular level is best explained as the result of deliberate, intelligent design. This is the argument of his 1996 book, Darwin's Black Box: The Biochemical Challenge to Evolution. recently translated into Dutch, Portugese and Japanese.

donations were not intentionally solicited in a way to be unethical. Rather, he says, doctors had asked for donations out of not knowing the proper policies of the cen-

According to the medical center's policy, patients or their respective insurance companies are often charged for routine medical costs, associated with experimental treatments. Laret said, though, that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration guidelines prohibit patients from being charged for the experimental drug or device itself.

"I think people either didn't know the policy or did not choose to find out what the policy is," Laret said. "I think that is what disturbs me. It's one thing to ask payment for services, but to ask for donations in exchange for services is a real problem."


The medical center has refunded \$2,955 to each of the three families, \$4,729 to one family and \$576 to another.
According to Laret, there have been several attempts to contact other families, but a few families have still not responded as to whether or not they want their money

University officials also said that 27 other cancer patients enrolled in the clinical trials might have also been improperly charged for their experimental treat-

Laret hopes that the thorough investigations and aggressive steps taken in order to address such improper activity will help prevent similar situations from occurring in the future of the medical center.

"It's very unfortunate that this happened. It's the kind of thing that we take very seriously," Laret said. "We

It can be said without reservation that Algeria is the most hazardous country in 1992, according to Amnesty International, and the killing continues to this day.

The most gruesome aspect of the violence in Algeria is the secretive and consistent nature of this blood bath now starting its seventh year. According to Amnesty groups of unknown individuals armed with of the massacres firearms, knives, axes and other weapons.

Men, women and children are often slaughtered, decapitated, mutilated, shot and burned as their homes are set on fire. The few survivors who escape this nightmarish ordeal recount that the massacres often last until

More financial support must be given to student-run publications. If ASUCI cannot support student media, then another alternative must be pursued. Perhaps, Student Services could fund student media because these publications provide an outlet for student viewpoints and help foster a more diverse, more interesting cam-

pus environment. A more centralized location should be found for all student media. If the offices of student media are in one place on campus, students could instantly access the media and communicate with the campus communi-

Administration, faculty, staff and students need to rally behind student media by at least reading and listening to the various forms of media that dot this campus. Beyond mere support though, administration could perhaps look into starting a journalism program. The School of the Humanities has offered a journalism class, which was a good starting point. More, however, must be done so that students can be better prepared for the field of

communications. Students, themselves, need to become more active in student media. If you have an idea about a paper or if you feel something is lacking in student media make your concerns known and take action.

Student media is perhaps not the most obvious sign of student life. It is, however, something that affects the character and atmosphere of a campus. Without it, students cannot be heard, nor can we learn from each other outside of a classroom setting.

So, do your part for student media Whether it be picking up an alternative paper, or starting your own Chimp-like paper, participate in the campus media.







Only 15 minutes from UCI in Costa Mesa, one can find the Pacific Symphony Orchestra, the third largest in California. Led by Music Director Carl St. Clair, the orchestra allows Orange County's music patrons to enjoy a professional concert at a reasonable price and without having to travel all the way to Los







Well known throughout the industry as the queen of "Indie"

music, DiFranco has secured her reign for yet another year or two with Up Up Up Up Up Up.

"'Tis of Thee" is a brilliantly written anthem of today's disease-ridden society. It addresses such issues as racial bigotry, TV sensationalism and failed social activism. It is a lyrically superior song to many of today's female artists and sets up the bottled-up anger within the remainder of the CD.

Ironically, she attempts to denounce that same emotion through her song "Angry Anymore." Instead of a denial of her feelings, what comes forth is a cathartic remembrance of a time when naïveté wouldn't permit understanding of life's complicated "Trickle Down" is a brilliant



reasons). Their presence is a constant reminder of the performances that this year's squad could produce. In light of the high turnover rate of assistant coaches that the program has seen in the last several years (Cesar is the fourth sprint coach in as many years), the arrival of a pair of alumni has also helped to lift the morale of the

"Having that [coaching] stability is really important," said Christy Villa, a distance runner who was this fall's Big West cross country champion, earning All-America honors. "We've been more focused and motivated to race. It's really

This is not to say that the coaching staff overall wasn't dedicated in the past. Head Coach Vince O'Boyle has been with the team for 17 years and is almost a track and field institution in himself. He also attributes much of this year's unusually high level of optimism to the two new coaches.

"The continuity of having good assistant coaches who have been athletes here, know the program and are going to be here for a while is very important," O'Boyle said. "It helps in the recruiting; it

helps in the coaching."

Among them, many of the veteran athletes are coming off of extremely successful seasons. On the women's side, junior Christy Villa was ranked fourth in the 3,000 meters, senior Kay Nekota was fifth in the 10,000-meter event, and senior Kristine Bostick finished third in the 400meter hurdles at the Big West Conference Championships. On the men's side, junior Robert Frichtel finished second in the 800 and senior Pete Kovacs placed sixth in the pole vault at the 1998 conference meet.

"I'm in the best shape of my life," Frichtel said. "I had sort of a mental block when it came to the 1,500 last year, but I've had a breakthrough during cross country. I hope to do a lot of things this season."

This new year also represents big changes for some. Third year long jumper Anita Sampson is already jumping past 17 feet despite having not competed since high school and senior Dedra "Dee" Butler, who discovered her affinity for the high jump well into her third year of competition, is hoping that a full season of honing her mechanics will pay dividends.

"This is the first year I've really, really dedicated myself to the high jump," Butler said. "I look forward to running my fastest and jumping my best during conference."

Butler and Sampson are key cogs in a

With talented athletes in all phases of the sport this season, it looks like UCI track and field might be on its way to reclaiming the glory of previous eras.




With the Aztecs serving for game point, the Anteaters called a valuable timeout to rally the team. UCI won the sideout on a Rafter kill.

Volunteers Wanted For PET Scan Study of Normal Brain Function:

University of California, Irvine College of Medicine, Department of Psychiatry and Human Behavior is interested in obtaining normal controls (age 30 to 60) for PET scans. A PET scan is a color picture of brain function. The benefits would come from receiving a color brain PET scan picture of one's own brain. Subjects will be paid \$50 for the PET scan. The PET scan will be performed at the UCI Brain Imaging Center and will require approximately five hours. Subjects must have no history of drug abuse or psychiatric or neurological problems. Female subjects must not be pregnant and will receive a serum pregnancy test on the day of the scan. A blood draw to study heritable biological factors is an additional option if subjects are agreeable.
