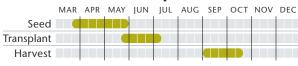
All About Cabbage

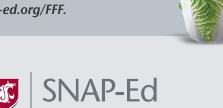

Did You Know?

- * Vegetables in the cabbage family are excellent sources of vitamin C, vitamin K and good sources of fiber. They can reduce the risk of cancer.
- * Vitamin C helps to maintain healthy gums, skin and **blood**. Vitamin K contributes to **bone** and blood health.
- * When not heat-treated, fermented cabbage foods like sauerkraut and kimchi contain microbiotics that promote health.

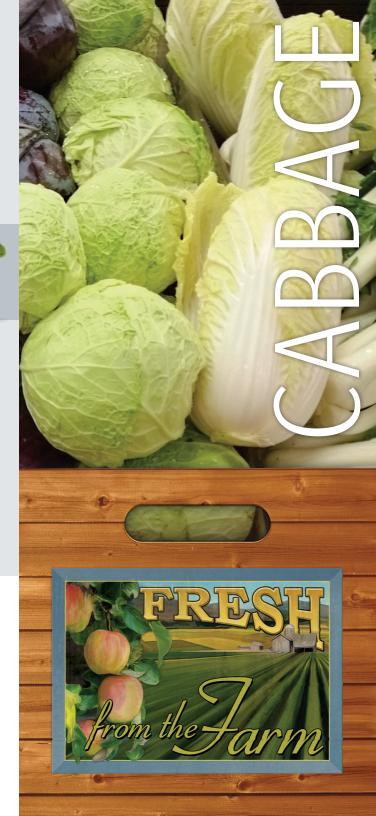

Selecting and Preparing Cabbage

- ⁶⁸ Choose firm, heavy cabbages that are free of yellowing leaves, splits or soft spots.
- ⁰³ The leaves should be compact and smooth for green or red cabbages. For Savoy cabbage, look for crinkly leaves that are packed more loosely.
- Store cabbage in the refrigerator and use within 2 weeks.
- Wash well and remove any leaves that appear wilted or mildewed before using.
- Green, red, Chinese and Savoy cabbage add great flavor and crunch to salads or slaws.
- All cabbages are easily steamed, stirfried or boiled. Slices or wedges cook in about 6 to 12 minutes.
- Chopped or sliced cabbage can add flavor and texture to soups and stews.

Simple Vegetable Soup

3 cubes low-sodium bouillon 1 cup chopped tomatoes 1 cup chopped cabbage 1 cup canned* white beans, drained 1 small turnip or potato, diced ½ cup diced carrot ½ cup diced onion 1 tablespoon flour ½ cup low-fat milk

Makes 4 servings

- 1 In a soup pot, dissolve bouillon in 4 cups of water and bring to a boil.
- 2 Add vegetables. Cook on medium-low heat until vegetables are tender, about 30 to 40 minutes.
- 3 Stir flour into the milk, and pour into soup. Stir to combine. Cook 2 to 3 minutes, until soup thickens.
- 4 Season with salt and pepper to taste. Serve hot.

*Note: Use fresh cooked, dried beans to lower sodium and save money.

Chicken & Cabbage Stir-Fry

Makes 2-3 servings

1 chicken breast, skinned and boned 1 teaspoon oil 1½ cups sliced cabbage 1 to 2 teaspoons cornstarch

¼ teaspoon ground ginger 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder ¼ cup water

1 to 2 teaspoons soy sauce

- 1 Cut chicken breast into strips.
- 2 Add oil to pan and sauté chicken over medium heat, turning constantly until lightly browned.
- 3 Add cabbage. Cook 2 minutes until cabbage is tender crisp.
- 4 In a bowl, mix cornstarch and seasonings. Add water and soy sauce, and mix until smooth.
- 5 Pour seasoning mixture over chicken. Stir gently to coat all pieces. Remove from heat once sauce has thickened, and serve hot.

Cabbage Apple Slaw

Makes 4 servings

- 2 cups shredded cabbage 1 medium carrot, peeled and grated ½ green bell pepper, diced 1 apple, diced 5 tablespoons plain, low-fat yogurt
- 1 tablespoon low- or non-fat mayonnaise
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon celery seed
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper

- 1 Put cabbage, carrot, bell pepper and apple in a large mixing bowl. Stir together.
- 2 Combine yogurt, mayonnaise, lemon juice and celery seed in a small bowl. Stir together to make a dressing.
- 3 Pour the dressing over the salad. Toss to mix. Season with pepper to taste.
