Location change for spring forest stewardship class

There has been a change of venue for the spring Forest Stewardship Coached Planning shortcourse. The class will not be held at the WSU facility in Burlington as originally

planned, but rather will be held at the DNR facility in Sedro Woolley. Space is still available in this class. This will be the last Coached Planning class in the north sound area until 2009 and we don't expect the class to return to the Skagit County area until at least 2010 (the 2009 classes will most likely be in Snohomish County).

This shortcourse continues to be the flagship forest stewardship program offered by Washington State University (WSU) Extension and the Washington Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The class is designed to help forest landowners "help themselves" by equipping them with tools and resources to manage for a broad variety of objectives, from timber production to wildlife habitat, to aesthetics and conservation.. Each class includes nine evening presentations, a Saturday field day, a comprehensive Forest Stewardship Notebook and other educational reference materials, maps and aerial photos of your property, and an individual on-site consultation from a professional forester or wildlife biologist.

The class is called "Coached Planning" because a major part of this training involves "coaching" participants as they develop personalized stewardship plans for their forests. Many participants use their plans for consideration for significantly reduced "current use" property taxes. With an approved stewardship plan also comes recognition as a Stewardship Forest, eligibility for state cost-share assistance, and qualification to become a Certified Forest under the American Tree Farm System.

Storm Damage and EQIP Funding

For those impacted by the December windstorm in southwest Washington, there is some very good news from NRCS (USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service). Site preparation, reforestation, and related expenses following a salvage harvest necessitated by a catastrophic event (e.g. windstorm) are potentially eligible for cost-share approval under the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP). Applicants must be approved and have a signed written contract with NRCS BEFORE any work begins. Note: EQIP applications are only ranked and approved for funding once a year. Landowners who anticipate planting in Spring 2009 should contact NRCS NOW).

Some broader reminders about the EQIP program:

1. All EQIP funds for federal FY 2008 (October 1, 2007 thru September 30, 2008) have already been allocated (to applicants who applied in 2007 or before).
2. Applications are now being accepted for funds to be allocated for federal FY 2009 (beginning October 1, 2008).
3. Deadline for FY 2009 apps is JULY 15, 2008.
4. NRCS has clarified their policy re: eligibility of reforestation following salvage logging: Site preparation and reforestation are eligible for potential EQIP funding following salvage harvesting when the salvage is

necessitated by a catastrophic event (e.g. windstorm, forest fire).

5. Applicants must have a signed written contract with NRCS before any work begins.

- **Upcoming Beach Watcher Training in Snohomish County:** Do you love beaches and Want to learn a ton? Join the WSU Snohomish County Beach Watchers! Beach Watchers are university caliber-trained volunteers dedicated to protecting Puget Sound's fragile environment through education, research and personal example. The annual 100-hour WSU Beach Watcher Training is being offered in Snohomish County March 17 – May 8, Mondays and Thursdays, 9AM – 3:30 PM in Marysville. The whole course includes expert presentations, field trips and hands-on practice on many topics including:

- coastal processes;
- marine organism identification,
- marine birds,
- public education,
- scientific monitoring,
- salmon and forage fish,
- local natural resource condition.

In return, Beach Watchers continue learning while volunteering at least 100 hours over two years as citizen scientists, educators, restorationists and project planners. A few examples of WSU Beach Watchers projects are designing and launching a crab harvester education program, doing interpretation at public parks and monitoring beaches for rouge creosote logs, establishing baseline beach surveys and educating shoreline landowners. Class size is limited so there is an application process. You don't need to be an expert to participate – just be interested in Puget Sound issues and be willing and able to participate in projects after the training is over.
