Imagine participating in something every single day that makes you hate yourself.

Imagine losing a match and repeatedly saying the words "you are worthless" over and over again. Imagine being 13 years old, crying in the backseat while your mother sits in the front saying "I can't believe you'd behave like that. You're so embarrassing." Instead of asking "are you ok?"

So when I think of tennis I don't think of a fairy sport where you hit a fuzzy yellow ball over a net.

I think of the broken rackets. The silent car rides home. The shame of being a loser. The thoughts that I don't deserve to breathe.

Just thinking about it can cause self-doubt to creep under my skin and give me the chills.

Which is exactly why I need to play again.

Cuz I gotta be honest with you...

Life has gotten pretty easy...

For society as a whole...but especially in my specific circumstances.

Someone delivers food to my house or I go to restaurant where someone makes it for me. (No hunting necessary.) I have clean drinking water at the press of a button (once I filter it with my FIXT water pitcher of course). I have AC and heating to keep me at the right temperature no matter what the weather is like outside.

On top of all that...I don't have a boss who tells me what to do. I make enough money that I don't have to worry about money. I work a few hours a day and only do work that I deeply enjoy.

It means I don't have to do stuff I don't want to do. It means I don't have to push myself through hard times.

And I believe that you discover the Self in times of trial.

So it's important to do things you don't want to do.
