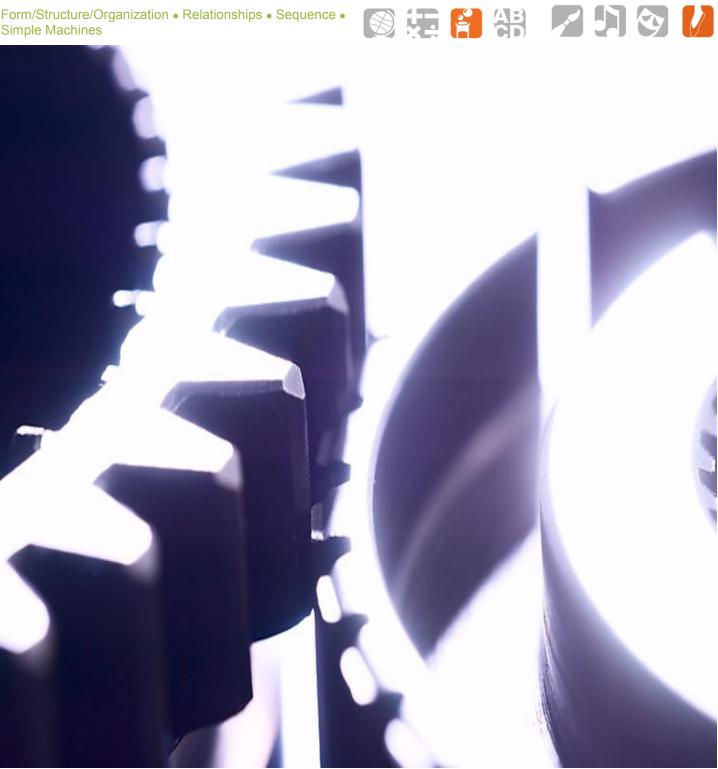

## **Dancing Machines**

Explore a variety of basic techniques in dance/choreography and identify how these strategies can be integrated into the science curriculum. This activity allows students to explore simple machines through movement and create imaginative new machines through choreographic sequences and collaboration.

### **Essential Question:**

How can students use movement to better understand simple machines?

#### **Process**

Warm-up: Name Game

- Have the group form a circle. Pick a person to go first and have him/her say his/her name while making a movement or gesture (related to a part of a machine) to accompany his/her name. The circle then collectively repeats the person's name and gesture.
- Continue with the next person stating his/her name and making a gesture. The circle repeats the new person's name and gesture. Then, starting with the person of origin, repeat all the names and gestures shared to that point.
- Continue until everyone in the circle is included.
- Using the name movements, the class will create a "class machine" where each part is dependent on another for its movement.
- With teacher guidance, students will create simple movements/shapes to represent each of the six simple machines (screw, wheel and axel, pulley, incline plane, wedge).
- Next, divide students into groups. Each group must create a new machine combining at least 2 of the aforementioned simple machines. Students will generate a name and job for their machine.
- Students will create a short movement phrase—"The Dance Machine"—to represent how their machine works.
- Audience members will identify which simple machines were used to create the new machine during the groups' dance performances.

#### **Assessment**

- Did students create dances according to the stated criteria?
- Were students able to identify the simple machines in the dance sequences?
- Did students' newly invented machines work to complete the tasks they were intended to fulfill?

Movement that travels through space

### Spiral

A plane curve generated by a point rotating around a fixed point; a helix

### Counter balance

To act against with an equal weight or force

The exertion of power

#### **Kinetic Energy**

The energy of a body or a system with respect to the motion of the body or particles in the system

## **Potential Energy**

The energy of a body or a system with respect to the position of the body or the arrangement of the particles of the system
