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Students will demonstrate their competency in the writing process by integrating theater arts and writing. The integration will help the writer to effectively communicate his character's true self to the audience.

**Essential Questions:**

**How can I use drama to create a writing piece that appeals to my reading audience? What strategies can I use to help me formulate ideas to develop a writing piece?**

**Process**

Day 1

- To introduce the lesson, the teacher should create and show a model alien.
- Students will be given a sheet of paper and some crayons or markers. The students will use their imagination to think about what they might look like if they were an alien. Students will take time to imagine their alien, draw it, and give it a name.
- Students will then be asked to come up with a name for the planet on which they live as the alien and one problem that their planet is having. This information will be used later on in the lesson.
- The students will now use theater to show how their alien would walk and talk. The teacher should demonstrate an example, and then give each student an opportunity to walk and talk like their alien, being sure to tell the class their name, planet, and the problem occurring on their planet. One example of how to share is by having the teacher use a talk show setting and interviewing each student.

Day 2

- Using the details and picture from the previous day, students will now begin the process of writing out their creative story.
- Each story needs to include all of the details that have been covered so far: name of alien, planet name and the problem they are having on their planet. Each student also needs to describe a solution to their planet's problem.

**Assessment**

- Students will demonstrate command of the conventions of standard English capitalization, punctuation, and spelling in writing.
- Students must utilize voice modulations/modifications during improvisations.

**Materials**

- paper

**Classroom Tips**

This activity works best in an open space with chairs around the perimeter of the room.

**ESOL Modifications and Adaptations**

ESOL teachers will need to provide students with a graphic organizer that will allow students to write the name of the alien and planet, the problem occurring or happening on their planet, and a solution to the problem. The graphic organizer should allow students to write a sentence that they will be able to transfer for their writing.

**ESOL Assessments**

Depending on students' language level, students will demonstrate (in various degrees): command of the conventions of standard English capitalization, punctuation, and spelling in writing.

**Gifted Modifications and Extensions**

Students will draw an alien, create a name, and a planet. Then, instead of creating their own problem, they will do research to find a current event or world problem to use in their creative story. They will then write a creative writing piece to highlight the problem on the alien's planet and one way the alien will solve the problem and defend their solution.

**Gifted Assessments**

Students use research to identify a problem. Students use appropriate mechanics to write a story including a problem, solution and defense.

**Special Education Modifications and Adaptations**

Students will complete step 1 of Day 1 as written. Teacher will provide scenarios of common daily problems (ex: My shoe is untied. My hands are dirty). Students will work together to create solutions to each problem. Students will choose one problem and illustrate how their alien solves it. Students will write or dictate 1 – 2 sentences for each picture.

**Special Education Assessments**

Students will accompany their alien problem and solution drawing with 1 to 2 sentences.
