


THE HASH BALL!

PART TWO

How to Ride Safely on the Road and on the Trail

SAFETY ON THE HIGHWAY

- 1. Always wear a helmet! Make sure the helmet you wear has a label inside that says "This helmet meets ANSI Z90.4-1984 requirements."
- 2. Ride defensively. Always assume that the driver of a car does not see you, even after you have made eye contact. Give the right-of-way to any vehicle or pedestrian, even if the right of way belongs to you.
- 3. Most state statutes require that bicyclists follow the same traffic rules cars do. It's a safe idea to do so. Never run red stoplights, always stop at stop signs, always go only when all traffic is clear for you to do so.
- 4. Always ride with the traffic, never into it.
- 5. Most bike accidents occur at intersections. Be especially careful when crossing street intersections. Watch for cars leaving driveways, particularly at shopping malls, and for children chasing a ball into the street.




Fig. 9: Extra wide sewer gratings can trap even fat tires. Solution, ride around these gratings, not over

- 6. Even fat tires can get stuck in extra wide storm sewer gratings (Fig. 9). Avoid these gratings by going around them.
- 7. Always cross street car and trail tracks at a right angle to keep your wheel from being caught, (Fig. 10). Watch out for potholes.
- 8. The knobby fat tires of Fisher MountainBikes give you better traction than skinny street bike tires. Still, it's a good idea to go slower when ricing in the snow. In wet weather, slow down, especially around curves, because rain or wet leaves can make the road slippery.
- 9. When it's raining, be aware that your brakes, good as they are, don't stop as well as when it's dry outside. In wet weather, brake sooner than you would ordinarily; give yourself more distance and time to come to a safe stop. Cut down your speed to suit the wet situation.
- 13. If you have never ridden a derailleur multi-speed bike before, practice shifting until the controls are second nature to you. Practice on a trafficfree street or in an empty parking lot.
- 14. Avoid city streets where parked cars are not allowed. There's no room for you between moving cars and the curb. Plan a route over streets where there is little traffic. At all times watch out for people opening doors of parked cars in front of you.
- 15. At night, always use a working headlight and tailight, preferably one using a halogen bulb in both front and rear light. Best are lights with a rechargeable battery pack, so you have lights when the bike isn't moving, as at a stoplight. Always wear reflective clothing, and a reflective stripe on your helmet. Use reflectors on front and rear of your bike and on pecals
- 16. Register your bike's serial number with local police. If you park your bike in a public place, use a good lock to hold the bike to a parking meter or small tree or fence post.
- 17. In city traffic, it's a good idea to use a rear view mirror so you can see what's behind you. But be aware that a rear view mirror gives poor ceoth perception, so don't depend on it to tell you how far away a car is from you, or how fast it's coming up behind you.

- Keep straps loose in city traffic so you can get your foot out quickly if you have to make a sudden stop. Be aware, if pedal toe clips and straps (Fig. 11) are new to you, that to get your foot out of the pedal you have to pull your foot back and up, as opposed to just up from pedals without toe clips and straps.
- 11. Always use hand signals before stopping or making a turn. Left arm straight up for a right turn, Fig. 12. Left hand out, parallel to the ground, for a left turn, Fig. 13. A sweeping downward motion with the left arm if you are going to stop, Fig. 14.
- 12. Shift to a lower gear before you hit the steepest part of the hill, even though Fisher MountainBikes are designed to make shifting on hills easier. Anytime you shift, ease up pedalling pressure slightly (but keep pedalling) as you shift up or down. Keep speed under control going down steep hills, especially when going around curves when you can't see what's coming up.

NORBA OFF-ROAD CYCLIST'S CODE



Off-pavement bicycling can open exciting new horizons for you. In order to maximize the benefit of your adventure and maintain the quality of the experience for those who will follow you, we urge you to adopt this code

- 1. I will yield the right of way to other non-motorized recreationists. I realize that people judge all cyclists by my actions.
- 2. I will slow down and use caution when approaching or overtaking another and will make my presence known well in advance.
- 3. I will maintain control of my speed at all times and will approach turns in anticipation of someone around the bend.
- 4. I will stay on designated trails to avoid trampling native vegetation and minimize potential erosion to trails by not using muddy trails or shortcutting switchbacks.
 - 5. I will not disturb wildlife or livestock.
- 6. I will not litter. I will pack out what I pack in, and pack out more than my share whenever possible.
- 7. I will respect public and private property, including trail use signs, no trespassing signs, and I will leave gates as I have found them.

 8. I will always be self-sufficient and my destination objective and travel
- speed will be determined by my ability, my equipment, the terrain, the present and potential weather conditions.
- 9. I will not travel solo when bikepacking in remote areas. I will leave word of my destination and when I plan to return.
- 10. I will observe the practice of minimum impact bikepacking by, "tak-

We also recommend:

- 1. If you plan to ride in the wilderness, either take someone with you who knows how to make emergency bike
 repairs or be sure you know how to make them yourself. You'll be far from a bike shop, so you should be self
 sufficient. Bring extra tubes, a tire pump, tire patches,
 a tire lever and know how to fix a flat (see page 25 in
 this manual). Bring basic tools that fit your bike, such
 as a screwdriver and wrenches and above all a chain
 pin remover. (See maintenance instructions later on in
 this manual.)
- Before you bike really far into the wilderness, learn the basics of wilderness survival, such as first aid and ground-to-air signals. Learn how to use a compass and topo maps and, in really wild, hilly country, even an altimeter. Any good camping goods store has good books on these subjects.
- Learn how to take jumps safely (Fig. 15). Sometimes you can't help hitting a small drop-off on a downhill trail, and you may find yourself briefly airborne. Keep your weight evenly balanced, front wheel straight, and when you land, keep going straight.
- 4. On downhill runs, keep weight back as far as possible, (Fig. 16) seat as low as possible. Use the quick release seat binder bolt (Figs. 5-7) to get the seat down before starting a steep downhill run. Keep pedals parallel to the ground on sharp turns. Keep feet on pedals at all times for better balance.
- When going uphill, keep seat up to normal height and on sandy, slippery trails, move your weight forward for steering traction.
