### Everyone should have the mindset of making, delivering, storing and serving Quality draught beer. Communicating this through each tier is our presentation goal of today.

The three tier system plays an integral role in making, delivering, preserving and pouring the great draught beer our brewers are making today. The consumer receives those pints in excellent condition, not by accident, but through the hard work of every tier to make sure the pint they get is the pint we want them drink!







- 1. Communicate how your brewery prioritizes kegging finishing practices before focusing on distribution & retail.
- 2. Use your tasting room's draught quality practices to set an example for your expectations in the field.
- 3. Connect with tasting room customers to provide immediate Quality feedback.



















Customer feedback is paramount to quality improvements – especially draught quality: filtration/sediment, filtration/dissolved oxygen, kegging/oxidation, warehouse/aging, etc.





- Use your tasting room's draught quality practices to set an example for your expectations in the field.
- Once beer leaves your brewery, are you tracking warehouse quality practices? Storage care, rotation, temperature in transit?

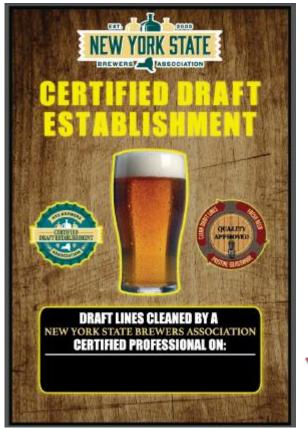

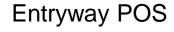

### **What Makes a Certified Draft Establishment?**

- Always stored cold— between 34 to 38 degrees on location
- Proper beer gas and correct pressures used to dispense beer
- No "out-of-code" beer served past expiration date

### **Draft System Quality**

- Cleaned every 2 weeks in accordance with the National **Brewer's Association Standard**
- Cleaned by a Certified New York State Brewers Association line cleaner
- Proper Equipment and Chemicals used to dean lines Technicians use re-circulating pump with turbulent flow
- Beer lines deaned with a high pH solution for removing organic
- Draft lines acid deaned every 3 months to remove all "beer stone"

### **Pouring Quality**

- Only properly washed "beer-clean" glasses
- Poured to perfection, never allowing the "beer head" to touch a faucet

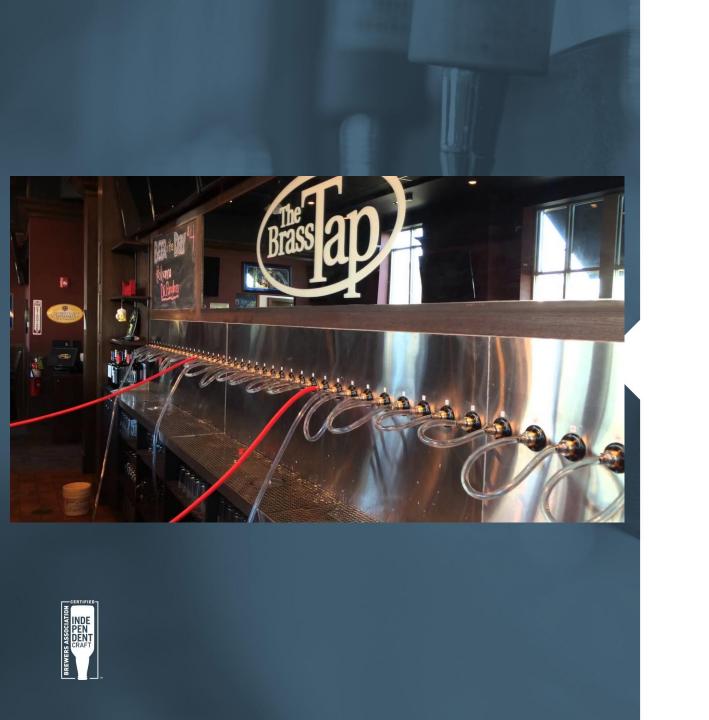

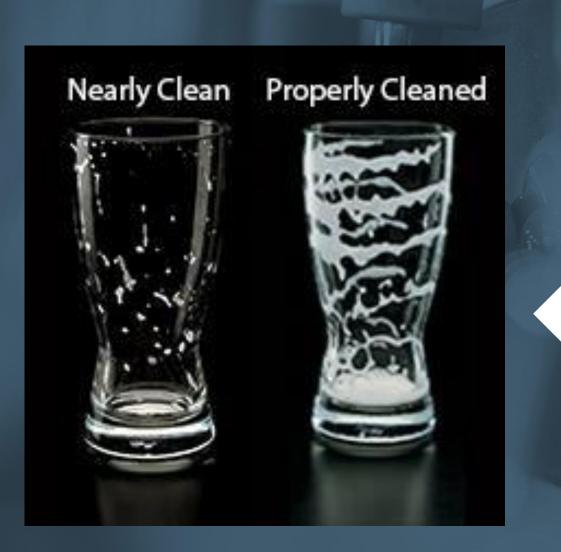
