Much of the imagery of *Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty!* comes from Revelation 4:2-11, which its author, an Anglican bishop, knew as a reading appointed for Trinity Sunday. The tune, written specifically for this text, reinforces the Trinitarian theme by strong dependence on the D-major triad.

Today's anthem was commissioned in honor of Dr. Glenn Doak's twenty years of service as our Senior Pastor. The composer writes, "Alleluia" is a song of praise and, more importantly, of celebration. This setting seeks to tap into the souls of both humility and exaltation as it paints words across a full spectrum of emotion. In this way, 'Alleluia' may be seen as a more comprehensive word for all people and all occasions; the euphoric utterance that joy and love thrive unconditionally." Daniel Elder (b. 1986) is a prolific composer of vocal and instrumental music. He began attending First Presbyterian Church in 1997 and sang in both our youth and Chancel Choirs.
