HOW TO JOIN A CHILD WITH AUTISM IN PLAY

Times like these can be frustrating! You want to connect and play with the child, but your perception is they don't want you to connect with them. The truth is, however, the child may simply not trust that your additions will make sense, be manageable, or meaningful.

The good news is...it is possible to engage a child with autism in such a way as to not only build necessary trust, but also guide the child to improve social and cognitive engagement. Steps for joining the play of a child with autism

(At any step, if the child escalates, stop and take a breath. Stay at this step and practice before moving to the next)

- 1. Sit near the child
- 2. Bid for back and forth co-regulation
- 3. Allow the child to SEEK your contributions
- 4. Add new challenges/elaborations
- 5. Return to easy co-regulation
- 6. End interaction leaving child wanting more
