From Death to Life

It may be that someday you will be sitting by the bedside of a loved one whose time in this life is coming to an end. At some point along this journey, you come to realize that it is time to call for a priest to provide Last Rites. For many people in this position, this is a difficult call because it is an admission to the reality that the loved one is going to die. It can seem like giving up hope. Nonetheless, Last Rites are an embracing of the hope that the individual is on a journey into eternal life. The Last Rites are a source of spiritual food and strength for this journey, an embracing of hope in the promises of Jesus Christ.

Last Rites are composed of three of the seven Sacraments: Confession, Anointing of the Sick, and the Eucharist (when near death the Eucharist is called Viaticum, which is Latin for "food for the journey").

When these Sacraments are conferred on a person at other times in their life, these are known as the Sacraments of Healing.

How often can someone receive the Sacrament of Anointing?

As often as needed or desired. If you grow weaker, if your suffering increases, if your illness becomes worse, you can be anointed again.

The official documents say, "this Sacred Anointing is to be conferred on the faithful who because of sickness, mental illness, or age are seriously ill." Also, "the Sacred Anointing may be conferred on people of advanced age whose strength has been much weakened, even if a serious illness is not apparent."

The Sacraments of Confession and the Eucharist are important for people at all stages and events of their lives. All Catholics have a right to these Sacraments, though it can be difficult to keep in touch with everyone whose health or living situations have changed. Perhaps they have become homebound, are in hospital, in hospice, or in nursing care facilities. Please help individuals keep in touch with us by encouraging them to call or, with their permission, make the call yourselves.

Anyone facing illness, life challenges, and those seeking spiritual or emotional healing can be anointed.

To receive the Sacrament, remain in church for a brief prayer service following all Masses on March 21 & 22.

When can I be Anointed?

A priest can come to your home, hospital, hospice, or anoint you after a Mass. In addition, trained parishioners can come and visit and bring Holy Communion.

Let's joyfully embrace the Sacraments in the light of hope and joy, in a spirit of love and salvation, with an eye on relationship with Jesus and the God who loves us.

These Sacraments connect with Lent as a journey through the spiritual death of our old selves and into the bright life of our resurrection with Christ.

These Sacraments are a part of the rich Tradition of Lent and because of this, Lent can be a kind of rehearsal for our participating in these Sacraments during our ongoing journey from death and into eternal life.

Wishing you a deeply wonderful Lent and Easter!

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal.

Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.

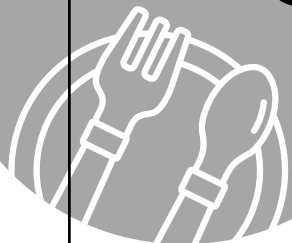

PALM SUNDAY - MARCH 28 & 29

We celebrate Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem with an opening procession, blessing of palms, and the Passion reading.

HOLY THURSDAY - APRIL 2

Mass of the Lord's Supper at 7:00pm

followed by Eucharistic Adoration until 10:00pm

We recreate the Last Supper of the Apostles, complete with washing of feet, sharing the Eucharist, and praying with Jesus late into the night. Traditionally, people visit several churches this evening for a few minutes of Adoration.

Liturgy of the Lord's Passion at 3:00pm

This continuation of the Holy Thursday celebration includes extended Solemn Intercessions, veneration of the Holy Cross, and another reading of the Passion of Jesus.
