Type of Good	Description of Types of Goods in Society		
private	goods provided by private businesses & groups used only by those who pay for them		
	(cars, flat screen televisions, personal computers, etc.)		
public	goods provided by taxpayers to government that anyone can use/no fees charged		
	(education, water, most roads and bridges, etc.)		
common	goods that all people may use but that are of limited supply		
	(ocean fish, fresh water, etc.)		
toll	goods that are available to many people but used only by those who can pay the fee		
	(toll roads, private schools, toll bridges, etc.)

Bureaucracy & The People's \$\$\$...

- debt—total liabilities
- deficit—spending beyond limits of income/ revenue
- wealth—total assets
- income—revenue source
 - progressive tax—income style tax; heavier burden on the wealthy; loopholes
 - regressive tax—sales style tax; heavier burden on those with lower incomes
 - excise tax—tax on specific goods or services as a source of revenue
 - proportional/flat/fair tax—based upon a set rate for all citizens; usually including a poverty limit

Publications linked to bureaucracy...

- Plum Book—published by Congress listing civil service & support positions usually gained by noncompetitive appointment
- Federal Register—published new rules/regulations after OMB (Office of Management & Budget) approval

policy advocates—persons working actively to propose or maintain public policy

policy analysts—let decision makers know the implications/possible outcomes of decisions; CBO is one example
