BASEBALL

COACH SECURED.

VAN HALTREN TO COME.

First Game of the Season to Be Played Saturday.

After a careful search the baseball management has decided upon, and secured, the services of Van Haltren as coach for the Varsity baseball team this season. Mr. Van Haltren, who is a resident of Oakland, pitched for one of the local teams while in the High School of that city. He afterwards played center field on the New York team where he gained renown by his remarkable batting record and base-running. As a left handed pitcher he has also earned for himself a name.

The new coach will take charge of the squad next Monday. He will be present to size up the team in its initial game with the Fireman's Fund team on next Saturday.

The game on Saturday will be watched with great interest as it will form a means of comparison between the two universities, Stanford having been defeated by the Fireman's Fund last Saturday.

The line-up for the game will be as follows, except for some changes which will be made during the game to try out the new men: Smith, catcher; Kaarsberg, pitcher; Hamlin, 1st base; Fuller, 2nd base; Hunter, short stop; Braley, 3rd base; Wolf, left field; McKeown, center field; Mein, right field.

Journalistic Baseball.

The annual baseball game between the Californian and Occident staffs will take place on the campus one week from next Monday on Feb. 12th, at 2:30 p. m. The line-up of the Californian team is provisionally announced as follows: Catcher, Sinsheimer; pitcher, Greene; 1st base, Eshleman; 2nd base, Powell; 3rd base, Graydon; short stop, Symmes. Dickson, Butler and Mansfield will play in the field.

W. A. Powell is captain of the Californian and A. J. Cloud of the Occident team. The Occident line-up has not yet been announced. Last year the Californian team was victorious.

SENIORS WILL MEET FRIDAY.

In accordance with the resolution adopted last Friday empowering the President of the A. S. U. C. to appoint a committee of five to revise the Constitution with special reference to the insertion of provisions for a graduate manager, President Dorety has appointed the following committee: Alfred C. Skaife '00, chairman; E. J. Brown '98, now of the class of '01 in Hastings, Reno Hutchinson '00, Ezra W. Decoto '00 and John M. Eshleman '02.

It is expected that the committee will spend some time in gathering material, in corresponding with Eastern colleges, and in examining the constitutions of those colleges where the system of graduate managers is now in vogue.

It is very likely that the committee will want to know the trend of student opinion on this subject and hence the columns of the Californian will be open to suggestions from alumni, faculty and students.

Richardson Monument.

Photographic views of the monument erected to the memory of the late Professor Richardson in Athens Cemetary have been received from Professor Putzker, who is in Athens. Professor Richardson died at Athens in 1897 and left his library to the University of California, and the proceeds of certain real estate to be awarded as prizes for the translation of passages of English into Ciceronian Latin. TRACK TEAM MEETS TOMORROW.

Princeton Has Set Date to Meet California.

The first meeting of the track athletes will be held tomorrow morning at 11:15 in Room 17, North Hall, for the purpose of organizing for this term's work. Track Captain Drum desires as large a number as possible to attend.

Eastern colleges have taken it as an assured fact that the University of California will send its Track Athletic team east this year. A number of universities have already gone so far as to set dates upon which to compete with the California athletes.

Princeton has set May 12th as the date of the dual meet between the track teams of that University and the University of California. As during the Intercollegiate meet of 1895, the courtesy of field and track have been extended to California, and in all probability our team will do part of its training there.

Discussing the proposed meet editorially, the Princetonian expresses satisfaction and extends greeting in the following:

"We shall certainly welcome the California team as a rival in athletics, and trust that the bond of union and fellowship thus established will be materially strengthened in the future."

A New Seed List.

A new Exchange Seed List has been completed by Professor Setchell and Mr Davy of the Botany Department, which is now in the hands of the binders. It is published by the University press and will soon be ready for distribution.

The assistance of the University of California has been asked in the strenuous effort which is being made to obtain a permanent endowment for the American School of Classical Studies in Rome. Professor Clapp is in charge of the matter at this University.

Dr. E. C. Moore, of the Department of Philosophy, has recently published in "The Ethical World" of London an account of the study of philosophy in California.

The members of the committee which undertakes the revision of the constitution have an important work on their hands. If they carry out carefully and conscientiously the program they have outlined for themselves there is good promise for the result of their labors. They are charged with the work of making an addition to the present constitutional structure rather than of remedying defects. Their work is constructive rather than revisionary, the crowning of an excellent foundation with a fitting superstructure. The necessity for their action has grown from the year's added realization of the trend of our affairs and not from imperfections which could have been well remedied sooner. They ask general student discussion and advice, for though our organization is centralized it abounds in no Star Chambers. Their appeal also to the experience of other Universities should prove of great value.

It is reasonable to suppose *a priori* that a graduate is to be installed in some important capacity, and from the outstart it might as well be borne in mind that the success of the move depends very greatly on the selection of the right man to be the first incumbent. We should begin to cast our eyes about for him at once. He must first of all be a man of unblemished integrity. After that the highest obtainable degree of business ability is to be sought. He will probably have to be a man not of so many years alumnus standing that we shall be unable to judge of the former qualification, not so recent a graduate that we cannot be assured of his possession of the latter. With the wrong man the best revision may be marred, with the right one the poorest may be made to succeed.

Astronomical Lectures.

Dr. James E. Keeler of the Lick Observatory, the Astronomical Department of the University of California, will visit Berkeley next week for a series of lectures on the work which is being done at Mount Hamilton. At 11:15 o'clock next Tuesday morning he will discuss "The Theory and Construction of Reflecting Telescopes." On Thursday, February 8th, at the same hour, he will discuss "The Crossley Reflector and Its Work." This great telescope was recently presented to the University of California by Crossley, the English astronomer. Dr. Keeler's work with this instrument has revolutionized astronomical photography. These lectures will be delivered in the new lecture room of the Students' Observatory.

During February and March lectures will also be delivered in Berkeley by Astronomer W. W. Campbell, Astronomer R. H. Tucker and Astronomer W. J. Hussey, all of the Lick staff, and by Alexander McAdie of San Francisco, Honorary Lecturer in Meteorology.

Botanical Specimens.

The Botany Department has just received by exchange a collection of boreal plants collected within the Arctic circle in Norway by the Norwegian botanist, Landmark. The collection consists of two hundred and ten specimens and are of great value to the department, being of the same form as were collected by the members of the botanical expedition in Alaska last summer.

The exchange was effected by H. P. Chandler and will make a valuable addition to the collection of like plants now being formed.

Twenty-Rayed Star Fish.

Professor William E. Ritter of the Department of Zoology of the University of California, and Miss G Crocker, one of his advanced students, have completed an important investigation of the multiplication of the rays in the twenty-rayed star fish. The paper which they prepared in collaboration announcing the results of their investigation was read at the recent meeting of the Morphological Society of America, in New Haven, by H. B. Torrey, Traveling Fellow in Zoology of the University of California.
