GLEE CLUB ENTERTAINMENTS.

FINAL ARRANGEMENTS MADE.

Proposition From Stanford for Exchange of Concerts.

Final arrangements for the first of the three afternoon concerts to be given by the Glee, Banjo and Mandolin Clubs in Hearst Hall were completed last night when Mr. Otto T. Wedemeyer was secured as baritone soloist for those occasions. The Clubs have been practicing diligently during the past week and are rapidly getting into shape. The first concert will take place at Hearst Hall on the afternoon of Monday, Feb. 12th. The program on that occasion will consist of three numbers by the Glee Club, one by the Banjo Club and one by the Mandolin Club. Besides these will be a monologue by Milton H. Schwartz '01, a baritone solo by Otto T. Wedemeyer and instrumental solos by Edward G. Kuster '00, cellist, and Hugo G. Poheim '00, violinist. Season tickets will be placed on sale this morning at 9:25 at the Co op. Admission to the series has been placed at fifty cents. The second and third concerts will take place on March 12th and April 9th.

Preparations have also been completed for the four days trip in Sonoma county. The Clubs will leave Berkeley on the afternoon of February 21st at 3:30 and go direct to Petaluma where they will play in the evening. In the morning they will go to Cloverdale where they will be the chief attraction at the Citrus Fair there. On the 23rd and 24th they play Healdsburg, Sebastopol and Santa Rosa whence they will return to Berkeley on Sunday.

The Haywards concert will probably take place on Friday, Feb. 16th. Final arrangements will be made today.

A proposition has been received from the Stanford Glee Club for an exchange of concerts. Our Club will give an entertainment at Palo Alto and the Stanford men appear here, the net proceeds to be divided between the two colleges.

SPECIAL MEETING OF REGENTS.

Stone Residence to Be Erected for the President.

A special meeting of the Board of Regents was held yesterday afternoon in San Francisco. The meeting was called for the especial purpose of considering the matter of the construction of a home for the President of the University. It was decided that the President's residence should be the first structure erected in accordance with the Phoebe Hearst Architectural Plans. It will therefore be built of stone and will cost \$25,000. The house will be situated on the north side of the grounds on the top of the mound where the university barn now stands.

Other business of minor importance was transacted by the Regents but nothing in connection with the colleges at Berkeley.

The truly royal scale upon which Mrs. Hearst has been entertaining the student body seems to have led some individuals to assume a wrong attitude towards them. In consequence there have been some actions which would be censurable even at a public assemblage (such as they appear to regard these) and which from students under a private roof call for an admonition to exercise more reflection. The invitations which are so carefully addressed to each and every one of us according to the natural divisions of the student body, are certainly to be regarded as something sacredly personal, as privileges which we are not empowered to transfer if we cannot ourselves enjoy the privilege of accepting them. A little reflection, too, upon his position will certainly lead every one to deport himself under Mrs. Hearst's roof and to-

wards her other guests according to the best instincts that he possesses.

Realizing that it is neither in our power nor desired of us to make return for favors received, we may find the greatest pleasure in reciprocating the spirit which prompts the first advances. From Mrs. Hearst's cordial expressions we may safely infer that we shall afford her most pleasure in showing the highest appreciation which is in our power. Almost our only means of doing this is by our conduct in receiving her hospitality. Her beneficences to California and her favors to each one of us are alike inestimable and we may assure her that our appreciation of these and our affectionate regard for herself are our utmost.

At the Students' Hour today all who are interested in the track are called upon to meet. To respond is a duty which every man of any ability in this line owes. For others who have never as yet discovered in themselves any such abilities, it is an opportunity to secure a personal benefit from a season's healthful training in the open air. There is also the possibility that any one may develop latent powers which will contribute to California's long standing prestige on track and field. These considerations alone with the newly renovated track ought to bring out the largest squad in our history.

More than that, there are glittering possibilities before this year's track team. Princeton and Pennsylvania are already setting dates to meet us, and there is certainly no harm in making provisional arrangements. The great obstacle to an Eastern trip is of course the enormous expense it involves. The track men are perhaps not to be blamed in thinking that if they do their part the means should be provided. The whole matter will be better understood if both track men and student body remember that they are of us and we are with them. The trip, if made, must be the result of co-operation. Only it falls to the track team to take the lead. Let them inspire us with enthusiasm and faith in their ability and above all in their earnest determination to do great things for California, and all that is needful will be forthcoming.
