VARSDITY NINE DEFEATED. FIRST GAME OF THE SEASON.

Fireman's Fund Team Wins by Score of 7 to 4.

The first Varsity game of the season was played with the Fireman's Fund team of San Francisco last Saturday on the campus. The insurance men won by a small score in an exciting game, playing the same team which defeated Stanford a week earlier by a score of 8 to 2. By these figures it seems as though both California and Stanford are commencing the season with equal chances.

The Varsity held their own until the fifth inning during which the visitors were allowed, by two costly errors on the part of the Varsity men, to pile up four runs in addition to the two already made. After this both teams made a single run making the score of 7 to 4 with the Fireman's Fund in the lead.

In the seventh inning Kaarsberg retired to give Nourse a trial in the box, and by the way the latter handled the ball California may count on having in him a strong Varsity pitcher. Kaarsberg played his usual brilliant game covering the distance between the box and first in old time style. The work of Hunter and Fuller is worthy of especial mention both in the field and at the bat. For the visitors, King, Bankhead and Schmeer played their positions in first-class form.

About seventy persons interested in track athletics met in Room 15 at the Students' Hour on Friday last, and were called to order by Track Manager Decoto. Colonel Edwards was present and addressed the meeting on the history and development of track athletics in the University of California. He spoke of the successes of the various teams which have represented the University in the past, urged fall training but cautioned against training all the time, and pointed out the University's special advantage in having one of the best tracks in the United States.

Everett Brown was the next speaker. He advocated the personal responsibility of the track captain, as well as careful systematic and obedient work on the part of the men in training.

Mr. Hufferdine, the trainer, promised his hearty co-operation with Captain Drum in the work about to be begun.

SIBLEY CHOSEN PRESIDENT. Defeats Bailey in a Closely Contested Election.

The election of officers for the Freshman Class was held Friday from 9 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. There was considerable electioneering done on both sides and a large vote was polled. The total number of votes was 414.

The contest for President was won by Robert Sibley by a majority of 50 votes over Chas. G. Bailey. For first vice-president, Miss French won by a majority of 19 votes. For the offices of second vice-president, secretary and treasurer only one candidate was named for each, so the following were unanimously elected: second vice-president, Miss Elizabeth Adams; secretary, Miss Edna Wilde; treasurer, George Sessions. For sergeant-at-arms, it was a tie vote between C. C. Finn and Fred Hyde. The following persons were elected to serve on the executive committee: Geo. Shuey, Miss McCleave, Carl Jones and C. L. Cook.

The committee in charge of the election was composed of Hartman, chairman; Van Ornum, Berry, Hanson and Hanna.

Philomathean Council.

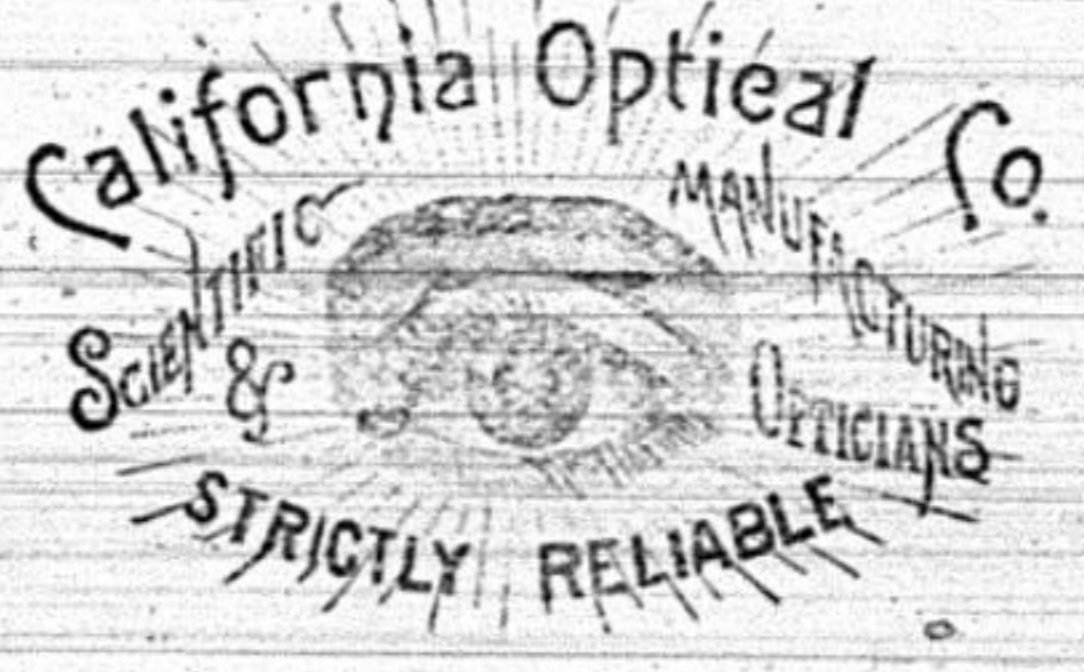
