CONFERENCE

HELD SATURDAY.

BASEBALL SCHEDULE ARRANGED.

Question of Graduate Coaches Cause for Disagreement.

The Intercollegiate Agreement Committee met last Saturday afternoon in the Palace Hotel in San Francisco for the purpose of coming to a more definite decision upon some of the articles submitted to the universities at the last meeting of the committee. Cantwell, Brown and Leiter represented Stanford at the conference, and E. J. Brown, Law College, Clinton Miller '00 and Irwin Muma '00 represented California.

After transacting preliminary business the matter of the place where the intercollegiate field day is to be held was taken up. The committee was unable to agree upon this question and decided to leave it to a joint committee of arbitration. This committee is to be composed of members from the Faculties of the two universities.

In the matter of a graduate coach no agreement could be reached by the members of the conference. The California representatives contended that any person who had played upon the Varsity eleven should be eligible to act as a coach, whether or not he was a graduate of the University. Stanford maintained that the person employed as a coach should have a degree from the University whose team he was to coach. The question was left undecided as Stanford refused to enter into any agreement by which the rules in regard to coaching would be altered, unless their view was adopted.

The schedule of intercollegiate baseball games was arranged as follows: On April 17th the first game will be played upon California's campus; on April 14th the second game of the series will be played upon Stanford's campus. If a third game is necessary it will be played at the Eighth and Harrison street grounds in San Francisco on April 28th.

Baseball on Saturday.

The next Varsity baseball game will be played with the U. C. Alumni on Saturday afternoon. The game between the Sophomores and the winners of the affiliated colleges series will take place in the morning of the day. The line-ups of the games will be announced later.

THE PRESIDENT'S TRIP.

Started for the East Day Before Yesterday.

President Wheeler left for the East Sunday. He will lecture at Colorado College, at Richmond College, Richmond, Virginia, at the Washington's birthday celebration of Johns Hopkins University, before the Civic League of Chicago, and at the National Convention of Superintendents of Education.

While in the East he will also visit Washington on university business, and consult with members of the Government in regard to forestry, the Commercial Museum and the College of Commerce in the University of California.

President Wheeler and Professor Leuschner of the Astronomy Department, will represent the University of California at the conference to be held in Chicago by representatives of the leading universities in regard to uniformity in the standard for the higher degrees.

CHESS TOURNAMENT.

Games Have Been Scheduled and Will Soon Begin.

The Chess tournament will begin on February 8th, and the schedule of games has been posted on North Hall bulletin board. The rules that will govern the tournament are as follows:

I. Any player not keeping his appointment, forfeits his game.

II. Players may play one or three games, as they choose.

III. The schedule is for the purpose of bringing the players together; they must, themselves, decide on the time for adjournment or unplayed games.

IV. Tie games count one-half for each player.

V. All games must be completed and reported to the Secretary before March 1st.

VI. Disputed points may be referred to S. Epstein for adjustment.

The following men have entered: Schaller, Perkins, Elmore, Lamson, Harlex, Schotchler, Crawford and Gordenker.

"Through the High Sierra."

At the end of the first session of the University of California a party of students invited Professor Le Conte to go upon a trip through the Yosemite with them. The trip was undertaken in a pioneer style, the party cooking their own food and camping in the open air. The book is profusely illustrated with photographs taken by Professor Le Conte's son.

Farmers' Institutes.

Professors Wickson, Loughridge, Hayne and Fowler have returned from holding a very successful Farmer's Institute at San Jose. The Institute lasted for two days and was largely attended by the farmers of Santa Clara county. The program included addresses by several of the University professors as well as by representative farmers of the county. The address of Professor Hilgard on "Soils and Subsoils" was read by Professor Loughridge, as Professor Hilgard was unable to be present. At the close of the Institute resolutions were adopted thanking the Board of Regents and the Agricultural Department for their efforts to give the farmers of the State desirable information.

The professors of the Agricultural Department held Institutes in nineteen counties throughout the State during the Christmas vacation.

Professors Loughridge, Wickson, Woodworth, Fowler and Hayne conducted the Institutes, assisted in Southern California by Professor Cook of Pomona College.

Mr. Fowler and Mr. Hayne go to Placer county this week. They will hold an Institute at Placerville on Wednesday, and one at Roseville on Friday.

It is to be sincerely hoped that the present deadlock in the conference with Stanford will not develop into any serious proportions. The cause of this as of most disagreements is the fact that managers do not, and under the present system cannot be expected to hold to the arrangements of their predecessors. Agreements are customarily made for but a single season but it is sometimes claimed that they carry with them implications as to the future. In the present instance Stanford avers that the holding of the Field Day on our track last year carried with it an understanding that this season's meet should take place at Palo Alto. The real cause for the change a year ago was the impossibility of securing neutral grounds and the certainty of securing a large crowd here with no expenses for the accommodations. The objection to holding the Field Day on either of the home tracks is that

the visiting team can bring with it but a small percentage of its supporters. The proposal that our team go to Palo Alto, however, presents the insurmountable objection, that a loss of several hundred dollars at least for the season will be incurred, and thus our finances cannot afford.

The necessity of considering the business side of the proposition does not imply that we wish our athletic representatives to proceed with but a single season in view. We would have them stand out only on points of permanent policy, and neither side should lay up disagreements for the future by juggling for a temporary advantage.

Students' Congress.

The next meeting of the Students' Congress will be held in Stiles Hall Tuesday, February 13th. The question for debate is: "Resolved, That the suggested Intercollegiate agreement should be ratified." Kennedy '00, Hunt '02 and Peterson '03 will argue for the Ministry, affirmative, and Hunter '02, Mansfield '02 and Newmark '03 will speak in opposition.

Students Construct a Model.

Two students in Dr. W. P. Boynton's course in Thermodynamics, Messrs. Keyes '02 and Smallwood '02, have constructed a "Gibbs' Thermodynamical Model," a piece of physical apparatus possessed by few universities.

Dr. Boynton has sent to a prominent eastern scientific periodical, a paper on this model, embodying some important results obtained therefrom. Professor J. Willard Gibbs of Yale University has suggested the representation of certain very important Thermodynamical relations by the properties of a surface. Professor J. Clark Maxwell, the famous physicist, gave in his text book, "The Theory of Heat," a description of the surface, which, though not entirely clear, is the only authoritative one accessible. Professor Maxwell had two models of the surface constructed, one of which is now at Cambridge, England, and the other at Yale University. There are very few other models of this surface in existence.

In preparing the model for the University of California, much difficulty was found in reconciling the description given by Professor Maxwell with the known properties of substances which the model is intended to represent. A description of these difficulties, and of some apparent inadequacies in the form of the model, form the substance of Dr. Boynton's paper. He has prepared some photographs of the model which show interesting results.

J. H. Stutt, B. S., graduate of the College of Civil Engineering, has been appointed graduate assistant in civil engineering, vice Chandler, promoted.

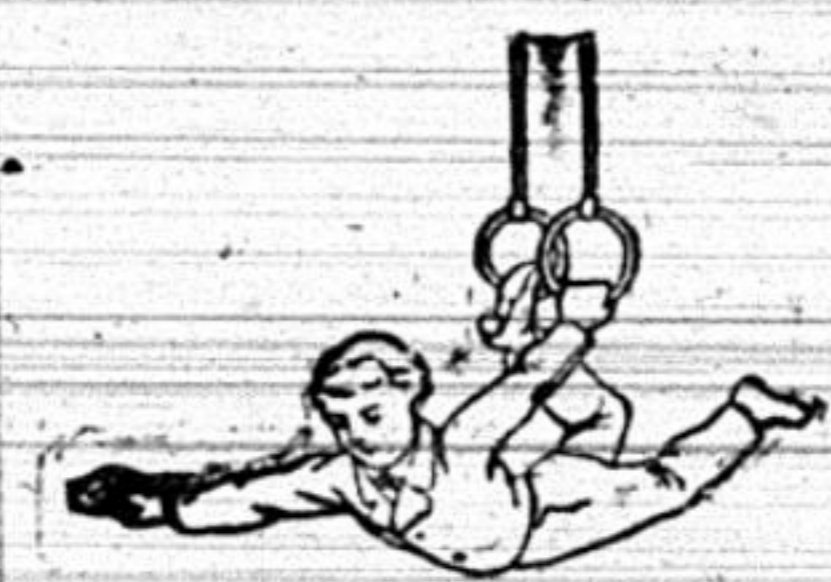
