VALUABLE AID TO UNIVERSITY.

COMMERCIAL MUSEUM FORMED.

The College of Commerce Will Be Much Benefited.

On January 23rd, a number of the different organizations of San Francisco sent representatives to Mark Hopkins Institute to establish a commercial museum similar to the one in Philadelphia. These organizations were: The Chamber of Commerce, The Merchants' Association, The California Board of Trade, The Manufacturers' and Producers' Association, The Board of Trade of San Francisco and the Mechanics' Institute. The representatives formed themselves into a "Promotion Committee" and elected President Wheeler chairman and Professor Plehn, secretary. A week later, acting under instructions, President Wheeler appointed the following sub-committee on plan of organization and maintenance: Gen. N. C. Chipman, M. H. De Young, James D. Phelan, Arthur Rodgers, Lipman Sachs, Claus Spreckles, Andrea Sharboros, Ebenezer Scott, F. J. Symmes, Isaac Upham, A. A. Watkins and William R. Wheeler.

The sub-committee has met three times: February 1st, in the Chamber of Commerce; February 2nd, Board of Trade Rooms; February 6th, Board of Trade Rooms. They have completed a provisional plan of organization of which the chief points shall be:

A. To gather and give to all its members information that will assist in developing commerce with foreign countries in and around the Pacific and Indian Oceans; also to establish a connection with the Philadelphia Commercial Museum, and other like institutions by which information may be obtained from the rest of the world which would be of advantage to the producers, manufacturers and merchants who may be members of this institution.

B. To collect the various raw and manufactured products imported into the various countries with which we desire to extend and develop our trade.

C. To collect and exhibit all these raw products—or partly manufactured products of foreign countries which might be useful to American manufacturers and mer-

CARNOT DEBATE.

Order of Debaters to be Announced
Tomorrow.

The order in which and the sides upon which the contestants for the Carnot medal will speak next Friday night at Hearst Hall will be announced tomorrow afternoon at 4 p. m. Admission to the debate will be by card, and tickets will be distributed to all active members of the A. S. U. C. The doors will be opened at 7:30 p. m. to the general public. The debate will commence at 8 p. m. sharp, and the endeavor will be made to have it concluded in time for any who desire to do so of those who attend to catch the 10:10 p. m. train for San Francisco.

Professor Edward B. Clapp will preside at the debate. The names of the judges have not yet been announced. The exact wording of the question is: "Resolved, That in France the Ministers should be responsible to the President."

Over one hundred visitors from Stanford are expected to be present at the debate, and about one-fourth of these will probably remain in Berkeley over night. As many students as are able to provide accommodations for the visitors Friday night are requested to inform Fred Dorety or Frank Aitken.

Death of Leon Solomons.

News has been received of the death of Leon Solomons, a graduate of the University. Dr. Solomons graduated in 1893, taking the B. S. degree, and took the M. A. degree one year later. At Harvard in 1898 he received the P. L. D. degree. After leaving Harvard, Dr. Solomons was Acting Professor of Philosophy in the University of Wisconsin, and then accepted a position as Professor of Philosophy in the University of Nebraska, at which university he was employed at the time of his death.

First Track Practice.

The track squad began regular practice on Monday afternoon. About forty men appeared at the Gymnasium and went through light dumb bell work under the direction of Track Captain Drum. After the Gymnasium work the men took a short cross country run.

The squad will practice regularly four nights a week. The track at present is in a very soft condition and unfit for fast running. The squad will thus be laboring under considerable disadvantage until the track is put into first class shape.

The Treasurer's report for the past half year is presented in another column. The majority of the items, as might have been anticipated, relate to football. As a football report it is the most complete we have ever had, showing both the immediate expenses and receipts of all games. The abstraction of football items shows for that department of athletics a handsome balance, of which part has been applied on old obligations and part on other activities. The season's receipts are much greater than those of a year ago, but expenses taken collectively have also grown apace. The large expenditures for equipment especially bring back the annually recurring question, "What became of last

year's equipment?" The total reached by the training expenses also certainly suggests a large field upon which economy might be tried. As is the case with most financial reports, many annotations would be required to convey an exact idea of the season's receipts and expenditures. Many undertakings of which the returns are given still have bills outstanding against them. It was hoped under the present system that the treasurer's report would furnish at any time a balance sheet of our assets and liabilities. The present one shows the past half year's business not yet completed, and the total of indebtedness somewhat uncertain. As nearly as can be judged the balance of receipts to date will liquidate about half and not all (as had been hoped) of the debts which were outstanding at the beginning of the year.

D. To make complete examination, analysis and tests of these products, and to publish such information concerning them as may lead to a general understanding of their usefulness.

The plan of organization also provides that the President of the University of California and the Dean of the College of Commerce in the University of California shall be members of the Board of Governors. The Museum will undoubtedly prove a valuable auxiliary to the University and especially of great benefit to students in the College of Commerce.
