ROUSING RALLY FOR DEBATERS.

ENTHUSIASM AT HEARST HALL.

Alumni and Students Join in Honoring the Team.

Hearst Hall was crowded last night with enthusiastic students eager to do honor to the men who will uphold the University name in debating next Friday night. President Dorety of the A. S. U. C. presided.

After "Palms of Victory" had been sung and several yells given Professor Bacon was requested to give a few remarks. He stated the object of the meeting to be to give encouragement to the debating team in its prospective attack on "the Philistines." He pointed to the success of California hitherto and said it was only required of the team to do what had already been done. "In fact," said he, "we have had so much success that it might even do us good to be defeated once—but some other year, not this." He pointed out the benefits in debating, not only to men who intend to enter public life but to every man. A new style of oratory is now coming into vogue and California is one of its principal exponents.

Arthur Elston, who next spoke, referred to the growth of the spirit which produces rallies, and said the rally at the gymnasium last term was the beginning of a new spirit. He showed how it was as important that the men should be supported in debating as in football or baseball.

D. A. Gordenker advocated the entrance of "Co-eds" into the debating field as is the case at Stanford. He also dwelt on our peculiar debating policy.

Will Gorrill, an old graduate, spoke of the improvement in the quality of our politics brought about by the young men of all parties and pointed out the opportunity thus offered to the University men.

After a selection by the University band, Frank Powers gave a rousing speech. He said the true rallying spirit must be spontaneous. Enthusiasm cannot be worked up by formulae nor by having labored efforts in the way of speeches.

When the Glee Club had rendered two selections, Seth Mann told of the necessity for developing the social side of college life.

Martin and Greeley of the team, and O. E. Hottle the substitute, then expressed their determination to do all in their power to win the day for California. Greeley said it did not matter which individual should win as long as California comes out ahead.

After the speeches the band furnished music for dancing.

ATHLETIC COMMITTEE MEETS.

Proposed Athletic Agreements Discussed.

At the meeting of the Athletic Committee at one o'clock yesterday, the proposed athletic agreements with Stanford were discussed at some length, and it was finally decided to strike out the article relating to graduate coaches. The Committee give as their reason for this step the attitude of Stanford in demanding that the coach must have actually graduated from the University for which he acts as coach. Our men wished to have the article so construed that men who had played on the Varsity for one year whether they had graduated or not should be eligible for the position.

The action taken on this point disposes of the subject of Eastern or Graduate coaches. Hereafter, Eastern men may be hired if the committee so desires. It was thought that future committees of the two Universities might be able to come to some agreement on this point, but the time is not yet ripe for the innovation.

The matter of holding a field day at Stanford was also discussed. Stanford assured the committee that, if the field day were held there, there would be gate receipts amounting to \$1200, but refused to make any guarantee. The California committee, on the other hand, was willing to guarantee \$500 as an inducement for holding the contest on the Berkeley campus. After discussion the committee decided to propose the following order for track events:

1. 100-yard dash—heats.
2. 120-yard hurdles—heats.
3. 100-yard dash—finals.
4. Mile run.
5. 120-yard hurdles—finals.
6. 440-yard dash.
7. Mile walk.
8. 220-yard hurdles—heats.
9. 220-yard dash—heats.
10. Half mile run.
11. 220-yard hurdles—finals.
12. 220-yard dash—finals.

H. A. U. C. Election.

The election of permanent officers of the Handball Association has been called for Friday. All who wish to become charter members must sign before that date.

A meeting of the Freshman Class has been called for tomorrow at 11:15, in Room 16 for the purpose of installing officers.

SENIOR CLASS HOLDS ELECTION.

MARTIN CHOSEN PRESIDENT.

Oliver Defeated in a Closely Contested Election.

The Senior Class held its election yesterday from 10 to 3 at North Hall. The greatest interest centered around the election of President, for which office there were two candidates, Willis M. Martin and Roland Oliver. Both men had many active supporters and a spirited contest was the result. Mr. Martin was elected by 13 majority, receiving 102 votes to Mr. Oliver's 89.

The only other office for which there was a contest was for Sergeant-at-Arms. For this office there were four candidates, J. R. Moulthrop, Baird, Nicols and Morison. Mr. Moulthrop, although he had withdrawn and his name did not appear on the ballot, was elected, receiving nineteen more votes than his nearest competitor.

As there was but one candidate for each of the remaining offices the Secretary cast the ballot for the following: Miss Lena Macaulay, Vice-President; R. S. Hazeltine, Secretary; and J. V. DeLaveaga, Treasurer.

Not as heavy a vote was cast as is usual in an election for Senior President, about fifty of the class failing to vote.

Boating Association.

A meeting of the Boating Association was held Tuesday afternoon at 4:40 in Stiles Hall. A committee was appointed to investigate the matter of purchasing another barge from the Columbia Boat Club. Resolutions of condolence were presented, signed and ordered sent to the parents of the late Fred Waggerhauser '99, who was a member of the Club. Harold Bradley was elected to serve as first vice-president for the rest of the year in the place of Mr. Allen, who became president at the death of Mr. Waggerhauser. Frank Kington was elected to serve as a director of the Association in the place of C. Tracy, who has resigned.

Will Lecture at Toland.

Dr. E. C. Merriam, Assistant Professor of Palaeontology is to begin a course of lectures next Monday at the Toland College of Medicine on "Comparative Osteopathy." There will be five lectures and the course will last a month and a half.

MRS. HEARST VISITS EAST HALL.

Takes Lunch With Officers of A. S. U. C.

East Hall had a distinguished visitor in the person of Mrs. Hearst yesterday noon. She came to lunch in the room which she furnished for the women of the College and took great interest to see the working of of the plans which she has inaugurated. The Hall was decorated with potted palms and the table with California violets and jonquils with a dash of green here and there. Those who sat down with Mrs. Hearst were the officers of the Associated Women Students and the chairmen of the various committees connected with the organization—Miss G. Jewett, President; Misses R. Wilder and C. A. Henley, Vice-Presidents; Miss R. Morse, Secretary; Miss E. Wenzelburger, Treasurer; Miss Lena Macaulay, Chairman of Ladies' Room Committee; and Miss L. Nathan, Chairman of Social Committee. While the luncheon was in progress the University Band rendered an impromptu program under the windows of East Hall. They played the 6th Infantry March, composed by E. M. Wescott '00, and the State University March.

1902 DEBATING SOCIETY.

Meeting Held Tuesday Night in Stiles Hall.

The regular meeting of the 1902 Debating Society was held Tuesday night at Stiles Hall. The debate of the evening was upon the question: "Resolved, That the Boer policy of extending the period of naturalization from two to fourteen years was unjustifiable." The speakers upon the affirmative were Sawyer and Martin; upon the negative Kelley and Hollzer. The debate was decided in favor of the affirmative.

After the debate President Goodsell appointed upon the Program Committee Messrs. Martin, Hollzer and Weed, and upon the Membership Committee Messrs. Coghlan, Kelley and Sawyer. Mr. Jones' resignation of the office of secretary and treasurer was accepted. Mr. Hollzer was elected to fill the place left vacant.

COLLEGE CALENDAR.

A MORE detailed examination of yesterday's financial report and a careful comparison of it with the one of a year ago suggest certain further comments. These as made by the average member of the Associated Students are not in the nature of censure but are merely inquiries into matters whose whys and wherefores are not at all understood.

In the first place the amounts received from candidates at the training table are almost identical for the two seasons. Computing from the number of men trained, the length of the season and the rate fixed by the Executive Committee, the amount this year should have been much larger. The price fixed was not designed to pay nearly for the quality of fare provided, but on the contrary to be below the lowest rate at which board is obtainable elsewhere. If the amounts due have not been collected, there has been a decadence of our amateur spirit and a moral injury to those concerned. On the other hand the amount spent for team dinners is three and a half times that of the previous season, and this if conscientiously expended will certainly meet with no disapproval. The furnishing to the team of enjoyments, jollifications, luxuries—call them what you will—is another matter and no one would desire to see it done grudgingly.

Information that expenses for equipment this year amount to only a little over a third of those of the year before, with something of a reduction in incidental expenditures for tailoring, shoemaking and the like, furnishes an answer to yesterday's query. Perhaps we have reached the best attainable position in this regard—at least it is an en-

couraging move in the right direction.

Printing is two and a half times what it cost a year ago, but this appears to be more than justified in the large increase of receipts from minor games. There is on the surface no such good reason apparent why the drug bill should be this year twice what it was last.

Other points upon which information would be interesting are, as to whether greater economy might not be practiced in the case of many expenditures; as to whether the additional amount paid to Cochran is in the nature of a *pro rata* salary from Thanksgiving to Christmas or of a donation; as to the divergence between the net amount paid out to the Glee Club and the losses incurred on the northern trip; and lastly as to why we cannot see blushes of petty shame upon the cheeks of more than half the members of the student body as they read the number of dues paid in to the Association.

If blame is to be laid at anybody's door, part of it will probably be assigned to executive authority and to committees whose province is that of supervision. At least they might have seen to it that information is kept in a form which will not require a second asking. There is no room for secrets in Associated Student affairs, and so far there has been shown no disposition to have or to keep any. Information upon the above and similar points may prove valuable from the standpoint of business knowledge and will certainly contribute to the peace of mind of the average member of the Associated Students.
