## PARTICULARS OF THE DEBATE.

### ORDER OF THE CONTESTANTS.

#### Committee of Judges Named—A Notable Visitor.

The order in which the contestants will appear on the Carnot debate at Hearst Hall this evening is as follows:

**Affirmative.** 1st. Martin, U. C., 2nd. English, S.  
**Negative.** 3rd. Marrack, S., 4th. Springer, S.  
5th. Greeley, U. C. 6th. Borton, U. C.

This is the order in which they were drawn by lot by President Jordan of Stanford. Chance therefore determines that we have two speakers on the side of the question which is considered the weaker, and one on the side which is considered the stronger.

The board of judges for the debate will consist of Justice Harrison of the Supreme Court, Judge Hunt of the Superior Court and Donald Y. Campbell, Esq., a prominent attorney of San Francisco. As before stated, Professor Edward Bull Clapp will preside. The wording of the question is: "Resolved, That in France the Ministers should be responsible to the President."

Monsieur A. de Trobriand, Consul-General for France, has accepted the invitation to be present at the debate.

Active members of the A. S. U. C. may obtain tickets to the debate at the Co-op during the Student Hour today. The doors of Hearst Hall will be opened to those not having tickets at 7:30. The number of tickets is limited and the management earnestly requests that none will apply for tickets who are at all in doubt as to whether they will go or not.

#### Changes in Treasurer's Report.

The following amendments to the published report of Treasurer Kaarsberg are to be noted:

The receipts from the intercollegiate Freshman game should have been printed as \$746.60 instead of only \$20.00.

The salaries of Kaarsberg, Tully and Morse should have been charged to A. S. U. C., not football expenses.

Salaries for "officials of intercollegiate game" should have been made to read "officials of games."

Expenditures mentioned for a reception to the Oregon and Nevada teams are erroneous, having been incurred for the reception to President Wheeler, not to the visiting teams.

The item in regard to a note of the Commercial Bank refers to the payment of interest and principal of a former debt.

### Brightest of Prospects for the Rifle Team.

Fifty candidates have entered for the team, including ten former contestants. This is a greater number than ever before, and all prospects for this year are the best possible. In the target-shooting, cartridges will be furnished free to all those who have been practicing aiming and snapping, also to all old members, and to a few new men who fulfil special conditions. The full list of names will be posted to-day. Shooting will be continued at Shell Mound on next Tuesday, at 1 p. m., and thereafter on Saturdays and Tuesdays.

The first match shoot of the rifle team will be held at San Quentin on February 22nd.

**Lecture in Astronomy.**

Yesterday at 11:15 Prof. Keeler delivered his second lecture before the class in Modern Astronomy. He spoke upon the Crossly Reflector and its work and produced a number of fine stereoptical views from photographs taken with the instrument. The Crossly Reflector is a 36 inch reflecting telescope made in England by Dr. Common. Mr. Crossly M. P. bought it but owing to the unsuitable climate of England could not use it to the best advantage. Ex-Director Holden persuaded Mr. Crossly to present it to Lick Observatory, citizens of the State subscribing the cost of transportation. The new discoveries made by Professor Keeler with its aid have many times repaid the cost. Professor Keeler especially emphasized the new discoveries in spiral nebulae. The view of the great nebula in Andromeda was the finest example of the spiral kind presented by Professor Keeler.

Professor Frank Soule has been appointed by the Bureau of Irrigation in Washington a special commissioner to investigate and report upon the Santa Ana river in Southern California, and to make a study of the canals and irrigation systems dependent upon it. 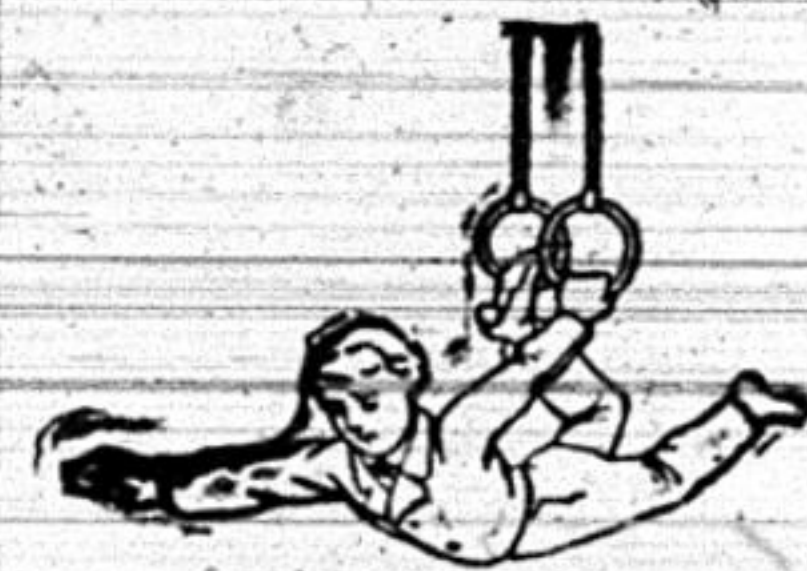

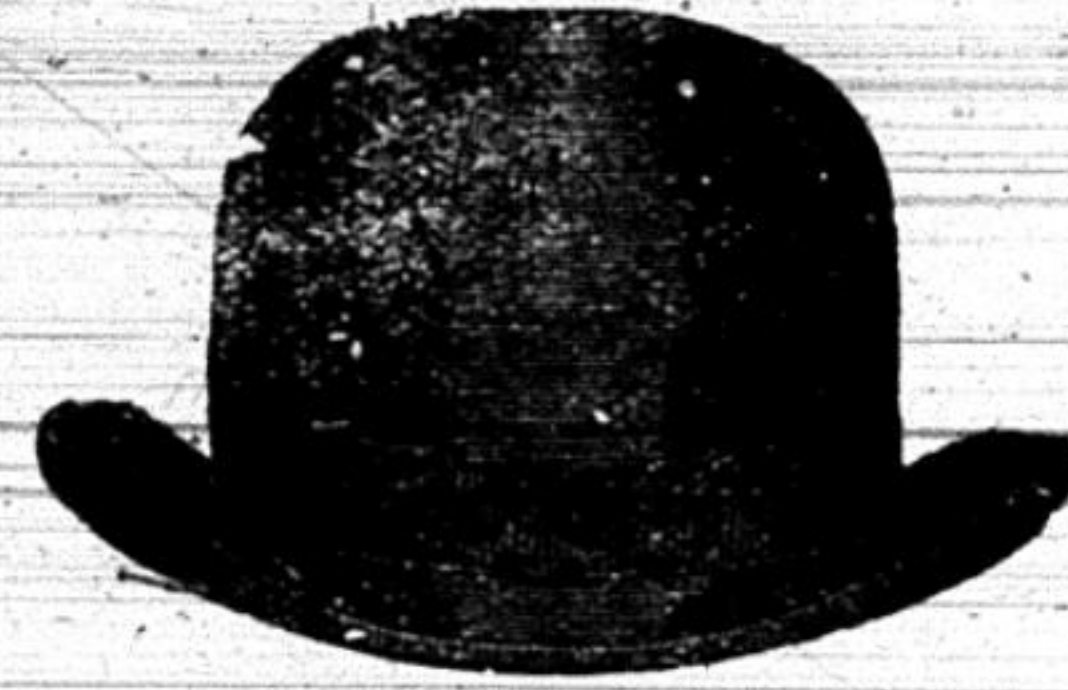
