## MUSICAL CLUBS' FIRST CONCERT

### YESTERDAY AT HEARST HALL.

#### Entertainment a Musical and Financial Success.

The first of the series of afternoon concerts to be given by the Musical Association was held yesterday afternoon at Hearst Hall. The concert was attended by an enthusiastic audience which filled the entire hall.

The Glee Club rendered three numbers and was each time loudly encored, as were also the other features of the program. The Musical Clubs were assisted by Otto T. Wedemeyer '98, Baritone soloist, Hugo G. Poheim '00, Violinist, Edward G. Kuster '00, Cellist, Milton H. Schwartz '01, Monologist, and Rea Hanna '01, Accompanist.

Mr. Wedemeyer rendered "Alta Stella Confidante" in a superior manner, and responded to an encore with "Matrenata" by Tosti. The violin and cello solos were well received, as was also the monologue, "An Afternoon Tea," by Mr. Schwartz.

The entertainment was a financial as well as a musical success, and Manager Tully estimates the receipts at over \$150.

The next concert of the Musical Clubs will be given in Haywards next Friday night. The next afternoon entertainment in Berkeley will be given on March 12th.

#### Graduate Club Reunion.

On last Friday the graduate students of Stanford were the guests of the Graduate Club of the University of California and the California Union. In the afternoon a meeting was held at Stiles Hall presided over by Mr. F. G. Cottrell, which was addressed by Professor Leuschner on "The Uniform Requirements for Higher Degrees," a subject which is at present much discussed.

In the evening a banquet was held in the U. C. dining hall at which Mr. R. C. Root, president of the Graduate Club, presided, and prominent members responded to toasts.

This meeting is intended to form a nucleus for the union of all graduates on the Coast and was well attended.

## HANDBALL MEN MEET.

### Officers Elected and Court Rules Adopted.

The U. C. Handball Association met last Friday for the purpose of effecting a permanent organization. The following officers were elected: President, Kuster '00; Vice-President, Waring '01; Secretary and Treasurer, Bailey '03; Manager, Arnold '02.

The following rules relating to the use of the courts were adopted:

- I. None but members of the Association will be allowed to play.
- II. Tennis shoes must be worn by all players.
- III. When any set is waiting for an opportunity to play, the number of games is limited to one for singles and two for doubles.

## WOMEN'S FIELD CLUB FORMED.

### First Excursion Taken Last Saturday Afternoon.

The organization of a Women's Field Club was completed last Saturday. The following officers were elected: President, Miss Miliken; Secretary, Miss Reed; Member of the Executive Committee, Miss Jones. The membership of the Club was limited to twenty-five, and the full number have already signed.

The object of the Club is to study various phases of nature in a broad, systematic way. It is the intention of the members to study trees, plants, birds and other animal life. The geologic formations of the immediate vicinity will also share in the attention of the students.

The first trip of the Club was made last Saturday to Wildcat Canyon. The trip was made under the leadership of Mrs. Furlong, a student in the Geology Department. The next trip will be to West Berkeley marsh, and will be made for the purpose of studying marsh plants and algae.

The following persons have been invited to lead parties with the view of studying certain definite phases of nature: Mr. Davy, for the purpose of studying trees and flowering plants; Dr. Merriam, for the purpose of studying fossils; and Mr. Steubenrauch, Professor O'Neil and Mr. Keeler will lead excursions for the purpose of studying Berkeley birds. No definite dates for these excursions have as yet been set.

Twenty volumes of standard works, mostly historical, have just been purchased for the Library.

## STUDENTS' CONGRESS BANQUET.

### Annual Reunion of the Debating Organization.

Last Saturday evening the members of the Students' Congress gave their annual banquet at the California Hotel, San Francisco. Professor Gayley, Mr. Flaherty and the members of the Carnot team were the guests of the evening. Mr. A. J. Cloud '00, the Speaker of the Congress, acted as toastmaster, and during the evening responses were made to the following toasts:

"The Government," A. M. Kidd '00; "The Opposition," R. S. Pierce '01; "The Bust Committee," A. C. Skaife '00; "College Debating," Mr. Flaherty; "How the Medal was Won," Willsie Martin '00; "Czariam, or the Congress as it was," C. E. Thomas '99; "Our Alma Mater," O. E. Hotle '00; "Extemporaneous Spelling, or Clapp's address to the Ephesians," R. W. Tully '01; "The California Union," Professor Gayley; "The Philomathean Council," Quayle '99; Bufford '98, Dunlap '99, Abraham '99 and Mannon '99 spoke extemporaneously in response to the toast, "In My Time." The final toast, "The Ladies and Good Night," was responded to by F. W. Aitkin '00.

In speaking of the California Union, Professor Gayley said that the idea was not dead, but that it would be inexpedient to establish such a union now while so many other interests are claiming our attention. He emphasized the fact that California's success in debating consists in getting down to the bottom of the question, and maintaining her ground by hard, consistent argument.

#### Baseball Trophy.

The intercollegiate baseball trophy offered to the college winning two out of three intercollegiate series and earned by California last year is now on exhibition in the library.

In 1897 California won the first series after defeating Stanford on April 15th, score, 11-15, and May 1st, score, 10-20. Stanford won the first game of this series on April 10th, score, 14-13. In 1898 Stanford won the series, defeating California on May 23, score, 5-6, and on April 16th, score, 12-2. California won the game on April 9th, score, 7-3. Last year California won the first two games and thus completed the three year's series. The scores were: on April 8th, 4-7; on April 15th, 9-7.

## COMMUNICATION.

### Mr. Miller Advises the Track Team to Go East.

Editor Daily Californian: I have been asked to write to your paper and express my views as to the advisability of sending the team East, and in response to the request have the following to say.

Above all things the proposition should be settled one way or the other immediately. Ever since the victorious team of '95 went east it has been the ambition of subsequent managers to have the honor of again taking our track athletes east. With and without authorization of the athletic committee numerous letters have been sent to all of the larger Eastern universities securing dates for dual track meets. Dates have been secured and as often have been broken. Such kind of conduct brings discredit upon us, and after the repeated breaches of faith made on our part, I wonder that any dates with the larger universities can now be secured at all. So, I say the question should be fully discussed at the present time and totally abandoned and all dates cancelled (for I believe, as usual, steps in that direction have been taken), or the trip should be definitely decided upon and active preparations made for its accomplishment.

From what I know of the available material in college, including Ben Bakewell of the Medical Department, who would be eligible in the East although barred from a Stanford field-day, it is my advice that the trip should be made, and this for several reasons.

If for no other reason, simply to materialize in the East after five years of promises, and keep the remnant of our credit there good.

For another reason, to let the Eastern colleges know that our '95 team was not a chance one. Again, this is an opportune time to send a team east. The result of the Indian game was such as to cause much favorable comment in the East as to the standing of athletics in the far West, and if we can follow that up with our track team doing good work, it will be a blow struck while the iron is hot. It is also opportune in as much as the English athletes are coming over this year and it will give us an opportunity of being gauged by something more than a national standard.

Another feature that should not be overlooked is the fact that such

EXPRESSIONS of opinion from alumni are always most welcome, as indeed are all evidences of interest on their part in undergraduate affairs. We wish their interest and advice on all activities and we should do all in our power to bring about a closer union with them and a more cordial attitude on both sides. College activities are at any time in the immediate charge of those who happen then to be serving their undergraduate term. There is the responsibility for maintaining the standards of the past and for making innovations which mean progress. But it should be remembered that these activities, unlike the undergraduate status, go on forever and so have an inalienable claim upon all who have ever served under the name of California.

We are glad to publish the expression from an alumnus which appears in another column. Most of us will agree most heartily with the gentleman upon the desirability of making an Eastern trip and of making it this year. The question of finances, however, most undergraduates will not dismiss so lightly. That is the great obstacle in the way of the trip and experience should teach us not to enter upon so serious an undertaking without carefully counting the cost. A tendency to consider our undertakings more in the light of their desirability than of their expense has been

the chief cause of the troubled course of our finances. The obvious course for us in the present instance is to begin immediately financial preparations. Let the matter of funds be taken up at once with the proper energy. As soon as it can be determined what is needed we can look into the treasury (which unfortunately will probably not yield more than certain special amounts set apart for this purpose,) estimate our individual abilities to contribute, and canvass alumni. This can be done promptly and must be done before the trip can be talked of as assured.

**Lectures on Entomology.**
