Second Game With Fireman's Fund Team Saturday.

A game of baseball will be played on the campus today between a team from St. Mary's College in Oakland and a team made up of aspirants for positions on the Varsity. This will be the second regular game of the baseball season. The men from St. Mary's are good players and, although it is probable that they will meet defeat at the hands of the California men, an interesting contest is expected.

The Executive Committee meeting which was to be held yesterday morning has been postponed until to-morrow at 10:20 in the Occident office.

STUDENTS CONGRESS.

A Ministerial System of Procedure Definitely Adopted.

The Students Congress held its regular semi-monthly session last evening in Stiles Hall. The meeting was well attended and the proceedings were very exciting, which augurs well for the new ministerial organization of debate.

A. C. Skaife, as chairman of the banquet committee, made an itemized report showing that the affair was a financial success. The following were elected to membership: Brand '01, Adler '02, Allen '02, Arnstein '01, Hyde '03, Agar '02. Professor Gayley and Mr. Flaherty were elected honorary members.

The Committee on Permanent Organization submitted some recommendations through its chairman, Mr. Kidd. These recommendations were adopted by the Congress and were as follows:

1. We advocate the adoption of a ministerial procedure. For this purpose two parties are necessary. The members will divide themselves into three groups, one supporting the ministry, another forming the opposition and the third composing the neutral body. The third group shall vote according to the merits of the debate and will practically constitute the judges.

2. After the debate this evening the ministry and opposition will caucus separately and name their party leaders.

3. When a ministry is overthrown it will elect some one as its leader and will constitute the opposition.

4. All committees shall be appointed by the speaker from persons recommended by the government. The government shall also fill vacancies but shall not remove any one from a committee.

5. No changes in the constitution will be necessary. The constitutional forms can still be employed. The change will merely involve a different use of these forms.

The debate on the bill before the house was next taken up. The bill was: "Resolved, That the proposed intercollegiate agreement should be ratified." Kennedy '00; Peterson '03 and Hunt '02 supported the ministry. Hunter '02, Newmark '03 and Mansfield '02 supported the opposition. When the discussion was thrown open to the house many of the members took advantage of the privilege to speak.

The bill was then submitted to the house who supported the ministry by a vote of 13 to 10. The opposition caucused and elected Ralph Pearce '01 as its leader. The leaders and speakers of the ministry and the question for next time will probably be posted in North Hall today.

TRACK MANAGERS MEET.

Place of Holding Next Field-day to Be Arbitrated.

Last Saturday afternoon, E. W. Decoto, Track Manager of California and C. A. Cantwell, Stanford's Track Manager, met in San Francisco and held a conference over the question of the intercollegiate field-day.

Mr. Cantwell argued that the field-day should be held on the Stanford campus this year, since it was held on the Berkeley campus last year. He would not offer a guaranty against loss, but expressed the belief that no loss would be incurred.

On behalf of the University of California, Mr. Decoto refused to agree to hold this year's field-day on Stanford's campus for several reasons. Stanford is not easy of access, and the railroad company would have difficulty in handling the crowds. Besides, the track is a mile from the railroad station and can be reached only by busses.

It was finally decided to submit the question to an arbitration committee. Those selected for this committee were: Professor Bacon, University of California, Professor Richardson, Stanford, and John Elliot of the Olympic Club.

OFFICERS NOMINATED.

Y. M. C. A. Committee Recommends Names for Election.

The Nominating Committee of the college Young Men's Christian Association in its report recommends the election of the following men to serve as officers during the term commencing with March 1st, and continuing through one year. The nominees are: For President, Fred Cuttle '02; for Vice-President, C. M. Colton '01; for Recording Secretary, Loring Barker '03; for Corresponding Secretary, Fred Goodsell '02; for Treasurer, J. E. Gustafson '01. Cuttle '02 and Colton '01 were nominated as members of the Advisory Committee. The election will be held next Saturday evening at Stiles Hall.

The various Farmers Clubs of the State which have been organized through the agency of the Agricultural Department, are preparing for a convention to be held in Riverside in 1901. Each club will report on a subject assigned upon the topic of horticultural and agricultural industries.

COLLEGE OF FORESTRY.

Large Area of Wooded Land to Be Secured at Lake Tahoe.

The necessity for a College of Forestry at this University has been felt for some years. It has been generally recognized that the first step necessary would be to place at the disposal of the Regents a large and well situated forest area.

In a communication addressed to the University by Marsden Manson, he sets forth a plan which is on foot to secure such a forest area. Representative Kahn has introduced a bill in Congress entitled "A Bill Granting the Use of Lake Tahoe Reserve to the University of California," which has been referred to the Committee on Public Lands and ordered printed.

The bill provides, "That the Lake Tahoe Forest Reservation be granted in trust to the Regents for the following purposes: to protect, improve and extend the forest covered lands within said forest reserve forever, to maintain a College of Forestry, wherein young men may be trained in the science of forestry and to do all such things as may maintain wise systems of forest and water conservation and use."

A Distinguished Visitor.

It is announced that the University is soon to receive a visit from a well-known student of American college life, Mr. C. C. Michener of New York City. For a number of years Mr. Michener has been intimately connected with the colleges of the country, and has made a close study of American student life and conditions. A graduate, himself, of an Eastern college, he has visited all the large Universities and colleges in the United States, including both the University of California and Stanford. During his visit here he will give an address before the student body.

Military Examination.

In the 2nd Battalion all Sophomore privates who wish to become Sergeants will be given a special examination. All inefficient sergeants and corporals will be reduced to the ranks.

The present drills in extended order will probably be discontinued today, and next Monday platoon movements in battalion formation will probably be taken up. An examination is being held of the corporals in each company on which their ranking will be based.

The information is welcome that the vexed questions concerning the Intercollegiate Field Day are to be left to an arbitration committee. Judging from the erstwhile attitude of student representatives even this is something of a mutual concession and if athletic committees could not settle the matter amicably between themselves they have shown the proper conciliatory spirit in resigning it to fair minded arbitrators. In the committee designated the e is no danger either that both sides will not receive the proper consideration or that the decision will not be an equitable one. In intercollegiate as in international diplomacy a resort to arbitration usually bespeaks seriously strained relations. We can ill afford to repeat the experience of

a few years ago of two prominent Eastern universities, when even faculty arbitration was unavailing and intercollegiate relations were entirely suspended. Having submitted the questions of difference to arbitration, let both sides abide unquestioningly by the decision.

Teachers in Japan.

Galen M. Fisher '96, Secretary of the Students' Young Men's Christian Association of Japan, has written to Mrs May L. Cheney, from Tokio, that there are many openings in Japan for teachers. He sends word of two immediate opportunities. The University of California has recently received numerous inquiries from China and Japan concerning people desirable as teachers.

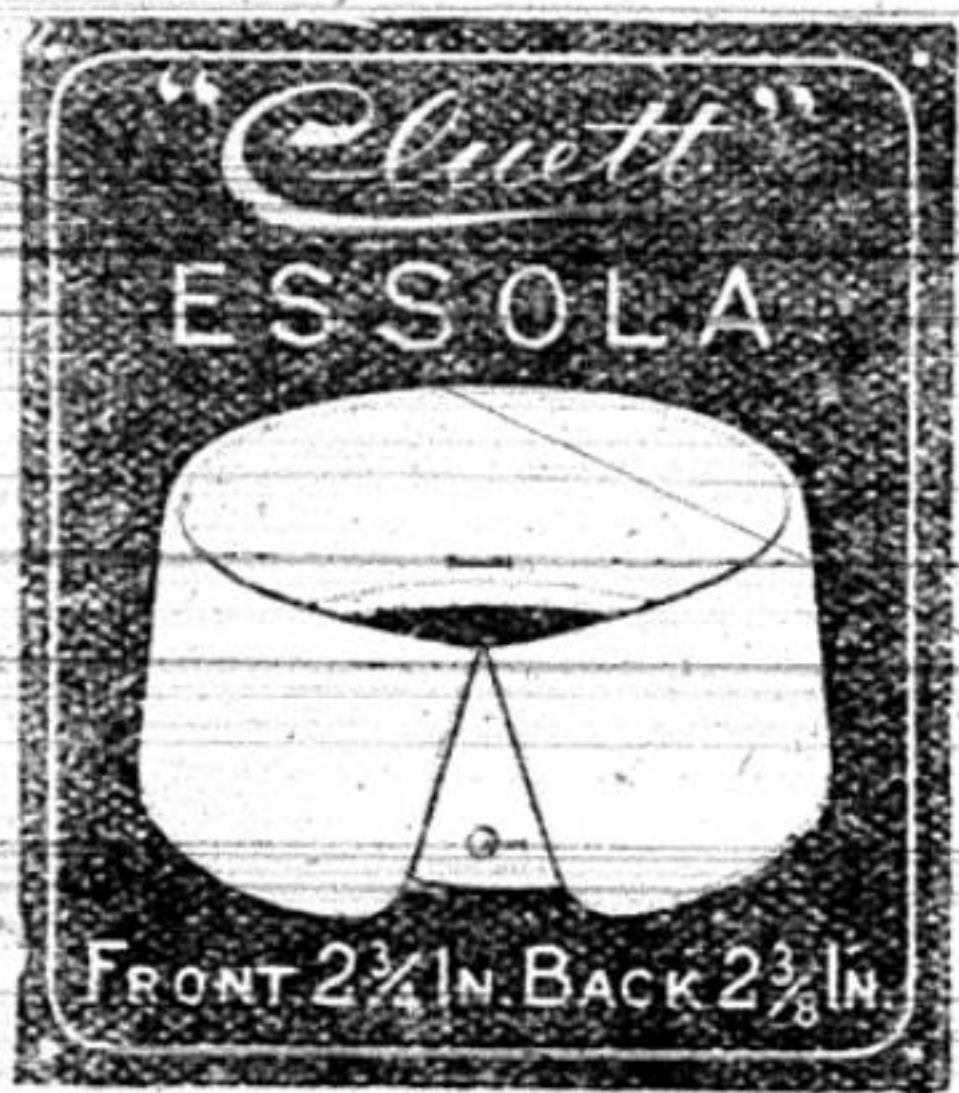

Wrestling as Football Training.

College men are just now watching with more than ordinary interest a plan which A. A. Stagg, the physical director of Chicago, has for the preliminary training of the football season of 1900. Stagg believes that wrestling is the best form of exercise that a football player can indulge in as preparatory work for the struggles on the gridiron. Ability developed in this branch of athletics, he believes, will make the men supple and better able to take care of themselves when it comes to the scrummages of the game. Although this is somewhat at variance with all other methods of training, it is being endorsed by many of the most experienced trainers. Wrestling will bring the men up to the summer months in fine physical condition, and also teach them tricks which may be of use in a game.

General Graham, who was formerly Brigadier-General of the Regular army and late Major-General U. S. V., will be in San Francisco within a few days. During his stay there Professor Soule intends to invite him to review the corps of University Cadets. General Graham is the father of Lieutenant Graham, who was formerly a student in the University of California but who is now stationed at Manila. 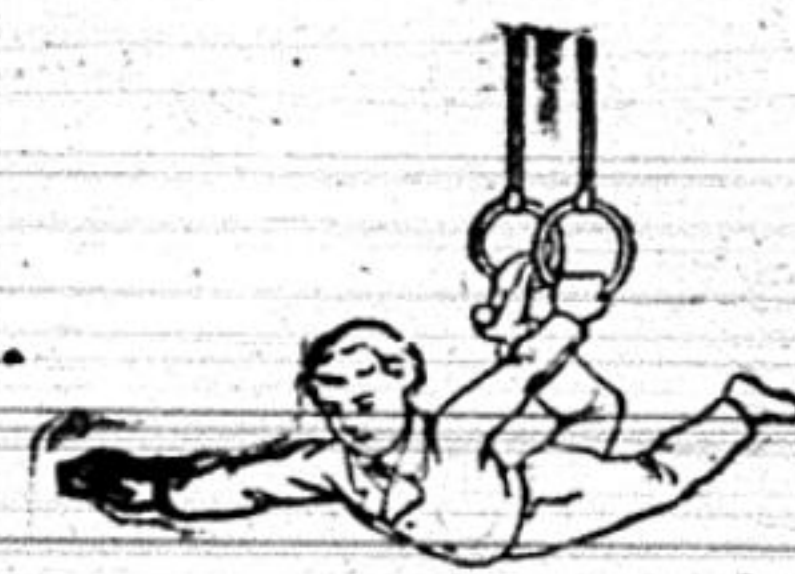
