## ATHLETIC

### COMMITTEE MEETS

#### AGREEMENT DISCUSSED.

#### Minnesota Desires a Coach From California.

The Athletic Committee of the Associated Students met last night to discuss the matter of the intercollegiate agreement.

The Treasurer's report was read and adopted. It was voted to allow Mr. Belcher, the baseball manager, to draw on the treasurer for \$40 for expenses for this week.

The Finance Committee was instructed to make out a list of all outstanding bills and draw up an account of the exact indebtedness of the Association and report at the next meeting.

The action of the Intercollegiate Athletic Committee next came up for discussion. The committee was unable to come to any conclusion about where this year's games should be held. It was decided to leave the matter to a committee of arbitration composed of Professor Bacon of the University of California, Professor Richardson of Stanford and Mr. John Elliott of the Olympic Club. The Athletic Committee voted to be bound by the action of the Arbitration Committee.

It was voted that the clause in the "articles of agreement" drawn up by the Intercollegiate Committee which reads: "after the season of 1900 the coach must be a graduate of, or have attended the university four full years, leaves of absence to be considered attendance provided they do not aggregate more than one semester," be amended to read: "a student who has attended at least two full years." It was also voted to insert a clause reading: "The head coach shall receive no salary but all his expenses shall be paid, and he shall receive remuneration for whatever salary he may have lost while so employed;" also, "the sub-coaches must have played at least one year on the Varsity team."

After a lengthy discussion concerning a coach for the season it was voted to leave the matter to a committee composed of the President of the A. S. U. C., the Football Manager and the Football Captain, to look into the matter more thoroughly and report at the next meeting.

The Football Manager reported that the University of Minnesota has written to him to recommend a coach from among the Varsity players for their coming season.

It was voted to pay the bill of Hufferdine for \$100, and of Miss Keenan for \$12.

Professors Merrill and Plehn have gone to visit schools. Professor Plehn will be back next week but Professor Merrill will be gone until the 10th of next month.

The Civil Engineering Department will make some tests and break some specimens of construction materials in the laboratory today at 4 p. m.

## PRESIDENT WHEELER'S ADDRESS

### Talks on Liberal Education at Colorado College.

The twenty-fifth annual celebration of Colorado College, located at Colorado Springs, took place February 8th. The principal address on that occasion was delivered by President Wheeler.

The Colorado Springs Gazette, of February 9th, gives an extended report of President Wheeler's address on Liberal Education. In tracing the ancient Grecian origin of liberal education, and showing how it spread from Attica westward, the lecturer contracted the political and social state of the "Asiatic East" and the "European West." The man of the East felt himself bound in a system of fate while the man from the West looked out into a world in which he had the right of initiative and referendum. In the East, education was never free from the taint of slavery and it entered the modern world possessing this same taint. In England, the liberal education has been the "gentleman's" education. Although slaves were not there, yet there were others occupying the same relative position. In Germany, this atmosphere of "class distinction" still hangs about it, although nothing in its requirements openly suggests such a distinction.

In America, institutions can not foster class distinction, and "it may be doubted whether we are willing to tolerate any system which adapts itself even to the supposed needs of such distinction of station or class as may for any reason exist."

Dr. Wheeler then deals with the so-called practical tendency in American education. Americans are practical and their method is to go "straight to the goal," and hence they are loath to go by the devious road of liberal culture to obtain something which may be obtained by going straight ahead. There does not exist in America a class of dominating freeman to rule a class of slaves, and hence a "gentleman's" education is not what we need. American society respects only that kind of culture that gives its possessor the ability to shape and create; hence, the system of liberal education in vogue in Europe can hardly prevail here. The American youth must acquire through education the power to more successfully grapple with the problem of living. The course of study must have a "vertebral column."

Yet President Wheeler is not a believer in utilitarianism pure and simple. He looks forward to the time when there will be a genuine American type of education. The specialist, "sharp as a needle and equally broad," should no more be our type than the man educated with the "gentleman's" education. What we do want is a training that trains "men to be, not to know."

## THE VARSITY

### PLAY ST. MARY'S.

#### SCORE, 7 TO 2 THE RESULT.

#### Our Men Win in a Game Marked by Many Errors.

The game yesterday was one in which the Varsity team made a poor showing. None of the California men played in their usual form except Nourse. It was not so much the poor playing that was to be regretted as the spirit of listlessness and carelessness that seemed to have possession of the Berkeley men. The fact that a preparatory school team was allowed to score against them is sufficient to show what kind of a game was played. It is singular that nearly as many bases were made on strikes as on hits. In many cases Smith did not catch the third strike, and sometimes did not even stop it. Nourse's pitching was exceptional. Once with three men on bases and only one out he struck out two men in succession.

The visitors played a very good game on the whole, though the batting on both sides was poor. Jones made three hits, and Nourse, Wolf and Hunter each one. The following are the details of the game:

The present baseball season has begun with a promising lot of Freshman material. Some of the intrants will probably be needed to go right on to the Varsity nine and such men have a reasonably good prospect of developing abilities which will keep them on the diamond for the remainder of their college life. In regard to candidates who do not make the Varsity nine it is to be hoped that a better policy will be pursued than has been followed in the past. Whether Freshmen or upper classmen they should not allow a small prospect of playing in the intercollegiate games to prevent their playing the practice season out. Some such "sacrifice plays" are necessary to a successful season both this year and in the future. The management, it is to be hoped, will also use every encouragement to keep all candidates in the field, and have regard to coming seasons as well as to the present one.

**Professor Soule on the Review.**

Professor Soule offers the following criticisms on the review yesterday:

"While the general appearance and drill of the corps are creditable there is a great deal of room for improvement. Many of the cadets did not take and assume the position of a soldier. There was too much talking and unsteadiness in the ranks—faults which indicate raw, undrilled and poorly controlled soldiers. The belts were generally too loose and hung too low on the waists and the coats were untidy, not being pulled

down snugly but having a rough and rumpled appearance. Several of the officers seemed unacquainted with the manual of the sword, some saluting non-commissioned officers and some not saluting at all.

"The marching was generally quite good the companies passing the reviewing stand with a very good line. The guides of the companies both in line and in column were not careful enough in estimating and taking the proper distances. The band has undergone marked improvement."

**A RECENT INVENTION.**

Prof. Christy Granted Patent for New Mining Process.

Professor S. B. Christy of the Mining Department of the University of California, has just been granted an American patent for a process for the recovery of gold and silver from cyanide solutions by electrolysis. The new process has all the advantages of the Siemens and Halske Process, so long in successful use in South Africa under Charles Butters, but avoids its chief difficulty, the necessity for cupelling an enormous weight of lead cathodes in order to recover the gold from them.

As a contribution to the mining industry, wherever this new process seems adapted to existing conditions, and provided only that he has some guarantee that it will be properly installed and operated, Professor Christy offers to grant a free license for its use anywhere in California to any citizen of the State.

Although the new process is very simple it requires good technical management for its success. Professor Christy does not recommend it for small plants, working irregularly; he considers the usual zinc process better adapted for these. He recommends it only for use in large establishments in continuous operation and under good technical management. For these it has the great advantage over all processes yet proposed for the recovery of gold and silver from cyanide solutions in that it returns the gold and silver free from admixture with base metals, and in a pure state ready for the mint, without any auxiliary fire process.

**CO-OPERATION OFFERED.**

**Commercial Museum Promised Aid From Philadelphia.**

A new offer of co-operation has been received by Professor C. C. Plehn, secretary of the promotion committee of the Pacific Commercial Museum, from E. W. S. Tingle, assistant to Dr. William P. Wilson, director of the Philadelphia Commercial Museum. Mr. Tingle's letter, under date of February 7th, is in part as follows:

"The value of active co-operation between the two institutions is certain," says Mr. Tingle, "concerning the fact that we have expended over a million dollars in reaching the point which we have attained, and viewing the further fact that by means of our correspondents, and through our own officials sent out to various parts of the world, we have built up a chain of communication whose links cover practically every country, the value to you of free access to this fount of information need not be dwelt upon.

"On the other hand, our experience teaches us that there is work enough to be done in the Orient alone to engage to its fullest the activities of any institution working along similar lines. Considering the geographical position of San Francisco, the comparative easy communication between it and the Orient, and the natural commercial affinities which could be expected to arise, if not already existing between the Pacific Coast and the Orient, it would seem that the establishment of a commercial museum in San Francisco, which should have for its sole task the development of our trade with the Orient, would be particularly fitting and valuable."

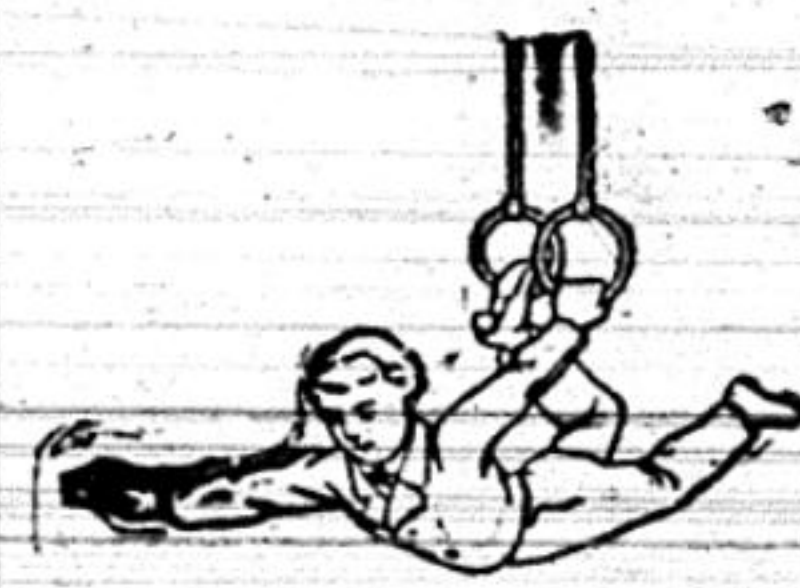
