SECOND GAME WITH FIREMAN'S FUND TOMORROW IN SAN FRANCISCO.

Krug and Moskiman Will Pitch for Insurance Men.

The Varsity will cross bats for the second time with the Fireman's Fund team tomorrow afternoon at the Eighth and Harrison street grounds. The insurance men, so far, have twice defeated Stanford, once by the score of 8 to 6, and again by the score of 8 to 2. Two weeks ago they also defeated our Varsity team, the resulting score being 7 to 4. This game should, therefore, show just how much California has improved during the last two weeks. The out-field will be strengthened by Swan in center field, otherwise the make up of the team will be the same as usual. The weakest point of the Varsity nine still continues to be their batting, but even this has been improved under the coaching of Van Haltren.

Committee in Charge Makes Preliminary Arrangements.

The committee appointed by President Eshleman of the Sophomore class, to arrange for a minstrel show has met and set to work to make the entertainment an assured thing.

Tuesday evening, April 3rd, has been set as the date upon which the show will be given, and, if the gymnasium is completed by that time, effort will be made to secure it for the entertainment.

The plan is to have a regular minstrel performance, the first half of which will be given to the usual minstrel jokes and songs and the second half to specialties.

There will be a chorus of thirty voices which are to be put under the charge of a director and trained for the occasion. The orchestra has been put under the charge of LeRoy Smith.

Kinetic Theory Discussed.

A meeting of the Mathematics, Physics and Astronomy Section of the Science Association, was held on Wednesday at 3:45 p. m. in Room 6, North Hall. Dr. Boynton read a very interesting paper on the kinetic theory of gases and liquids. He discussed critically the fundamental principles of the theory, and both the old and recent literature of the subject. It seems particularly important to emphasize the relations between the kinetic theory of gases, and the more recent kinetic of liquids, on the one hand and the theory of solutions, osmotic pressure, etc., on the other. Dr. Boynton intends to embody his views in a treatise, to be published by MacMillan's.

On Wednesday Monsieur Henri de Regnier, the French poet and critic of the Symbolist school, arrived in San Francisco.

Through the generosity of Prince Poniatowski, Monsieur de Regnier has been engaged to deliver a series of lectures before the students of this University. These talks will be in French, and their aim is the stimulation of the study of modern French literature in the University. Mrs. Hearst has kindly offered the use of Hearst Hall for the series. There are to be five lectures, the dates of which are as follows. The hour in each case is 3:00 p. m. There is no admission charge.

Tuesday, April 17th—Parnassians and Symbolists. Origins of Contemporary Poetry.

Thursday, April 19th—The New Poetry School.

Saturday, April 23rd—Alfred de Vigny. A Precursor.

Wednesday, April 25th—Jose-Maria de Heredia.

College Exhibits at Paris.

The exhibits which the more important American universities are planning to make at Paris in 1900 will be of a nature somewhat different from that at the World's Fair in 1893. Each university, instead of having a complete exhibit representative of all the work done in that entire institution as was the case at Chicago, will devote itself to an exhibit of some special department of its activity.

Harvard will exhibit its astronomical work, Columbia its pedagogy, the University of Chicago its collection of crystallizable minerals, Yale its geological specimens, Princeton its university publications and charts illustrating the history of the organizations of the university, and the University of Pennsylvania will exhibit among other things, its archaeological collections.

It is the endeavor of the Californian to publish regularly the proceedings of the standing committees of the Associated Students. When a week passes without a report from one of them it may be inferred that for some reason the committee has failed to meet. This has been occurring more and more frequently

of late owing to the lack of a quorum, a state of affairs for which there is no excuse on so small a committee. A year ago the affairs of the Association were brought to a standstill because repeated calls failed to secure a quorum of the student body. Such manifestations were a large part of the immediate cause of the movement which resulted in the adoption of the present constitution. In this features were introduced which the framers hoped would obviate any delay or inattention in the transaction of business—small committees with weekly meetings, and only half yearly meetings of the Association. The acceptance by the members of these committees of the whole responsibility for the Association's business imposes upon them the responsibility of making this business a paramount consideration. The successful working of the constitution and what is more the successful conduct of the Association's business depends upon their conscientious performance of their duties. The plea of a busy season of the year and personal duties elsewhere is no excuse, and it is to be hoped will not again be the cause, for any neglect of Associated Student affairs.

It is proposed to establish a school of forestry at Yale to be conducted on a different plan from others in the country. It will be chiefly an out-of-door school, and after a course in the rudiments and the economics of the science, the students will be given practical instruction in the care of forests.

The big international meet between Yale-Harvard and Oxford-Cambridge track teams may not materialize. A serious difficulty has arisen in the effect the continued Boer war is having upon English athletics. A number of the best English athletes have already gone to the front.

A rough estimate of the number of books in the libraries of the principal American colleges shows that Harvard leads with 550,000 volumes; Chicago is next with 300,000; Columbia follows with 275,000, and the Cornell library contains 225,000.

Ex-President Cleveland is to be a lecturer at Princeton this year. He has agreed, it seems, to deliver lectures called for by the Stafford Little fund of \$10,000, which establishes a lectureship on themes connected with public life.

Harvard and Yale hope the time is at hand when only graduates and under-graduates of these universities will be admitted to the annual football game. They desire by this change to arouse a greater university spirit.

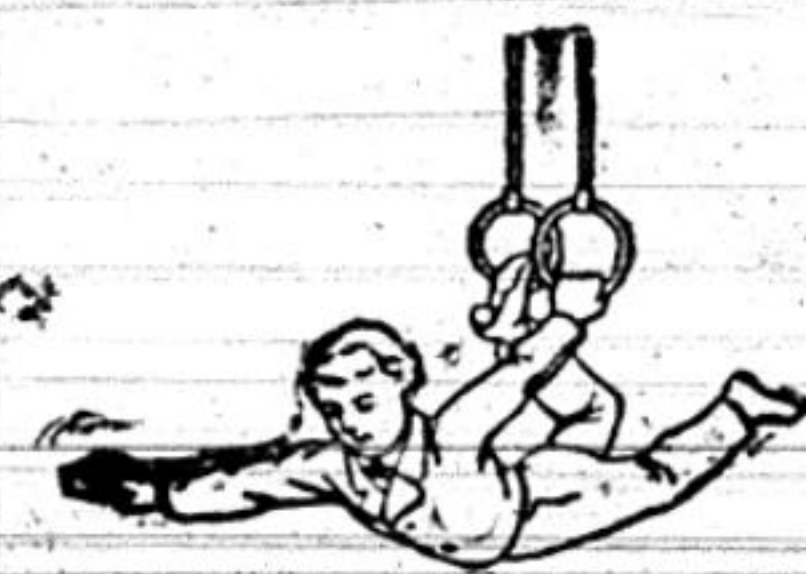
