VARSAITY NINE

DEFEATED.

SCORE OF GAME, 9 TO 3.

California Men Do Poor Fielding and Base Running.

The second game of the series between the Fireman's Fund and California was played Saturday at Recreation Park and was won by Fireman's Fund by a score of 9 to 3. The Fireman's Fund played the same team as before, while on the Varsity Swan took Fuller's place at second and Carter played in right field instead of Mein. The only improvement over the first game was in the batting of the Varsity, nine hits being made off Krug and Moskiman, including a home run and three two baggers. Our fielding was poor and the base running still poorer. In the third inning, with two men on bases and none out, Braley bunted along the third base line and beat the ball to first. The next man up struck out, but stupid base running turned it to three outs and retired the side. The Fireman's Fund earned two of their nine runs, the others being the result of poor fielding and throwing, two men coming in on poor throws to bases. A pretty double play was made by Carter and Braley. Carter caught Follansbee's fly and threw Krug out on his attempted steal to third. Smith caught two high fouls and also got two hits.

The best playing on the part of California men was done by Smith, Swan, Hunter and Hamlin. The batting by Hunter was excellent. Braley also was good at batting but poor at fielding the ball. Errors were frequently made by the Varsity men, and some of these errors were very costly.

The attendance at the game was very small, and the California men did not receive the encouragement that should have been given to them.

PRE-IDENT WHEELER LECTURES.

His Subject, "The Attitude of the Greek Towards His Gods."

President Wheeler lectured on Friday at Richmond College, Richmond, Virginia, on "The Attitude of the Greek Toward His Gods." On Monday he will lecture at Richmond College on "Religion and Art," and on Tuesday on "Fashion and Etiquette Among the Ancient Greeks." He will spend Wednesday in Washington on University business, and on Thursday, February 22nd, will deliver the annual Washington's Birthday address at Johns Hopkins University.

The lectures which Dr. Wheeler has been delivering at Richmond College are in the endowed lectureship provided for by the late James Thomas, Jr. Mr. Thomas set aside an endowment the income of which was to provide each year for a series of lectures at Richmond College on some theme in literature, science or art. Among the lecturers who have appeared from year to year are; United States Commissioner William T. Harris, Dr. H. Furness, President G. Stanley Hall of Clark University, Professor Woodrow Wilson of Princeton, and President D. C. Gilman of Johns Hopkins.

DEBATING CONFERENCE HELD.

Preliminary Arrangements Made for Intercollegiate Contests.

A meeting of the intercollegiate debating committee of Stanford University and the University of California was held yesterday afternoon at the California Hotel in San Francisco. A. H. Suzzallo, L. B. Wickersham and Frank Adams represented Stanford, and J. T. O'Connor, Law College, F. W. Aitken '00 and Ralph T. Fisher '01 represented the University of California. The meeting was held to consider arrangements for the next intercollegiate debate and to draw up a new agreement to govern debating matters. Nothing definite was decided upon as to general arrangements, but on next Saturday the second conference will be held and matters put in final form for this and the next three years.

As the date for holding this year's contest is but nine weeks off it was found necessary to make a provisional agreement in the matter of choice of question and selection of sides. It was decided that the section of the old agreement providing for a toss as to who should have the option of choosing the question or selecting the side should hold for the present emergency. On a toss the Stanford committee won and chose to leave the selection of the question to the California committee. Our committee will make their selection within the next two and one-half weeks and communicate their decision to the Stanford men by 4 o'clock on the afternoon of March 5th. The Stanford committee will then have one week in which to make a choice of sides.

At the beginning of the meeting on motion of O'Connor, Suzzallo was elected chairman of the joint committee and Aitken secretary. A subcommittee on printing and building was appointed consisting of Wickersham and Aitken.

The library has received from Dr. Leyds, the European diplomatic representative of the Transvaal Republic, an autograph letter expressing his thanks for a copy of Joaquin Miller's pro-Boer poem composed at the commencement of the war. The letter is written on a government letter-head and bears the official seal of the South African Republic.

A Serious Accident.

Last Saturday while playing golf in Berkeley, Ralph Phelps '02 met with a serious accident. He was struck by a golf club in the eye and the injury he received was very severe.

SOME days ago we noted the introduction into Congress of a bill which has for its object the reservation of a large tract of land at Lake Tahoe as a part of the system of forest reserves and in particular as a forestry station to belong to the University. Success will be most heartily wished to the measure alike by those who are interested in the preservation of forests and by all who desire the University's expansion. In the German universities the study of forestry is made the chief department among the economic branches and is ranked with the profession of law and medicine. It attracts many students and of late years a number of Americans have availed themselves of the advantage there afforded. On their return they find excellent openings for the practice of this profession both in the employ of the government and in filling the growing demand for foresters among the large land-owners of the country. As yet the primeval forests of America have sufficed for the enormous demands upon them, but such havoc has been wrought that the time is not far distant when the supply of timber must be made the subject of trained care and foresight. The realization has been growing too of the necessity of preserving the growth upon important water beds. National prejudice against governmental managership of such affairs may lead to the entrusting of their supervision to the universities. No comment is necessary upon the importance of such a possibility if it should be realized. Looked at from another standpoint the forestry offers delightful avenues to those for whom an outdoor profession is strongly preferable or even a necessity. At present the outdoor professions are almost limited to the various branches of engineering and the natural sciences, none of which in general offer such uninterrupted outdoor work. The realization of the present project would give a great impetus to the forestry work of the Agricultural Department. We sincerely hope both that this will be realized and that additional facilities will be

secured which will warrant the establishment of a College of Forestry which shall rank with our College of Commerce

The CALIFORNIAN was enabled on Friday to taste the sweets of victory in an athletic argument with our revered contemporary. We desire to offer them our most sincere thanks for the opportunity. This is only because we are sure it will add gusto to the enjoyment of the victories which we are confident that the various Varsity representatives are destined to win from Stanford. It has been a clean sweep so far and we hope that the same record will be upheld to the end of the season.

College Settlement.

The College Settlement work in West Berkeley has recently received an impetus and improvement in general conditions through the influence of individual generosity in supplying funds long needed for the furthering of the plans of the enterprise. Saturday the Boys' and Girls' Clubs took possession of new quarters. The new home of the College Settlement has been furnished and fitted in efficient style for the purpose in hand, and the workers in the movement feel assured of good results which have heretofore been impossible to achieve on account of limited facilities and inadequate funds.
