CLASS FIELD DAY POSTPONED. TO BE HELD MARCH TENTH.

Affiliated Colleges Will Meet Sophomores and Freshmen.

The two lower classes are making active preparations on the track and field for the annual Sophomore-Freshman interclass field day. The contest has been postponed to March 10th, one week later than the date already announced, in order to give the men a longer time in which to train. The soft condition of the new curves on the track has greatly hampered the sprinters and distance men in their training. The field day coming on March 10th will give the men one week longer to get into fairly good form for the running events.

The athletes of the Affiliated Colleges will combine forces on March 17th against the Freshmen and Sophomores. It would be impossible to foretell what the result of this contest will be as the men from across the bay are nearly all men of unknown ability. Of those known about Roy Woolsey and Ben Bakewell are the most prominent athletes. Walsh, a sprinter, Oscar Reeve, distance man, and Topham, broad jumper, will each give their opponents a hard contest in their several events.

The Class of 1903 does not seem to have brought much new track material to the university. Cadogan, however, who comes from the A. A. L. with the enviable records of 51 2-5 seconds in the 440, and 23 1-5 seconds in the 220, will materially strengthen the California team in Eastern as well as Western fields. Townsends, although a new man, is doing well in the sprints, and Moulder has a record of 28 2-5 seconds in the low hurdles. Beyond these three men the strength of the Freshman class is unknown.

The Sophomores, on the other hand, have been weakened by the loss of their star athlete, Ed. Hurssey, who has not returned to college this term. But the same trio will be at the weights as were last year—Plavo, Albertson and Smith. Service will do the broad jump, and with Scott will run the distances. Hamlin and Powell will do the hurdling and Bishop the sprints.

Professor Howison of the Philosophy Department read a paper at the meeting of the Oxford Philosophical Society on the life and work of F. A. Lange.

REPORT OF HEARST PLANS.

Professor Jones Edits Account of the Competition.

The trustees of the Phoebe A. Hearst Architectural Plan have recently published the report of the international competition which resulted in the selection of M. Benard's plans for the Greater University. The book is profusely illustrated with half-tones and cuts of the University grounds and of the different plans submitted. The frontispiece is a half-tone picture of Mrs. Phoebe A. Hearst.

The report contains an historical account of the international competition from the time of its inception to its completion. This historical account is given in four languages, English, French, Spanish and German. The report of the jury containing the reasons which guided them in their decision, is given in full.

The report was published with Professor Jones as editor and George O. Brehm '00 as manager. It is bound in paper and contains one hundred and fifty pages.

PROFESSOR RISING HONORED.

Appointed on Jury of Awards of Paris Exposition.

Professor W. B. Rising has received a communication from Ferdinand W. Peck, Commissioner General to the Paris Exposition, notifying him of his nomination as a member of the International Jury of Awards at the Exposition to be held in Paris next summer.

The appointments to the Jury of Awards will be made by the French Government, but the choice of the American Commissioner General will without doubt be confirmed.

Upon his arrival in France Professor Rising will receive his credentials and assume the duties of his office.

New Office for President.

During the absence of President Wheeler, a private office is being constructed adjoining his present office in South Hall. The present office of the President will be used by his Secretary and stenographers.

GAMES ARRANGED FOR EASTERN TRIP.

TRIPLE MEET IN NEW YORK.

Reinstatement in Intercollegiate Association Is Needed.

Track Manager Decoto yesterday received word from Harvard that it will be impossible to arrange a date for a dual meet with our track team. A telegram was received from Cornell, however, asking for a triple meet between California, Cornell and Columbia to be held in New York. Arrangements will be made looking to the holding of these games.

Another matter now in process of negotiation is our reinstatement in the American Intercollegiate Association. Evidently misunderstanding our situation and the great difficulty and expense attendant upon sending a track team East, they have dropped California from the Association. Without a membership in this Association it will be impossible for us to compete in the great Mott Haven games. Manager Decoto has written at length explaining that our non-participation is not from any lack of interest as was charged, but is owing only to the difficulties of our situation. It is anticipated that a reinstatement will be obtained without difficulty.

CONCERTS PLANNED.

College Musical Clubs to Exchange Entertainments.

At a conference held in San Francisco between Manager Tully of the California Musical Clubs and Mr. O. C. Leiter, treasurer of the Stanford Student Body, it was decided that the musical organizations of the two universities should exchange concerts some time during the month of April. The performers of specialties will accompany the Clubs and do their customary acts in the entertainments. Mr. Riley of Stanford will give a monologue at the concert given in Berkeley.

The proceeds of the two concerts will be divided evenly between the musical organizations of the two universities.

"Immortality of the Animal."

Dr. W. P. Montague will deliver a lecture before the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals at the parlors of the Occidental Hotel in San Francisco, Thursday evening, March 1st. The subject of his lecture will be "Immortality of the Animal."

HENRI DE REGNIER. Sketch of Life and Achievements of the Lecturer.

The recent arrival of Monsieur Henri de Regnier in San Francisco and the announcement of the lectures which he will deliver at this University call forth some sketch of his life and achievement.

Monsieur de Regnier was chosen as the third annual lecturer of the "Cercle Francais de l'Universite Harvard" to speak before Harvard University in 1900. He will deliver eight lectures on "French Modern Poetry," beginning on March 1st.

Among the places he will visit besides Harvard are the Adelphi College of Brooklyn, Alliance Francaise, New York; Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences, Brown University, Bryn Mawr College, Cercle Francais de l'Alliance, Boston; University of California, University of Chicago, Columbia, Cornell, Mount Holyoke, Packer Institute of Brooklyn, University of Pennsylvania, Princeton, Vassar, Wellesley, Wells, Williams and Yale University.

Henri de Regnier was born at Honfleur, near Havre, France, in 1864. His first verses were published in November, 1885, under the title of "Les Lendemain." This was followed, the year after, by another work, "Apaisement." This debut was not unnoticed, but it was only in 1887, with the publication of a collection of sonnets, entitled "Sites," that he attracted the attention of the literary world. M. de Regnier belonged to the group of young poets that received the name of "Decadents" or "Symbolists," this last name being permanently attached to those who recognized Paul Veraine and Stephane Mallarme as leaders.

From 1887 M. de Regnier's works appear in quick succession. The titles of these various poems are as follows: "Episodes," 1888; "Poemes Anciens et Romanesques," 1890; "Tel qu'en Songe," 1892; "Arethuse," 1895. All these works, which were published in small editions, were reprinted by the Societe du Mercure de France, in three volumes, "Premiers Poemes," "Les Jeux Rustiques et Divins," which contain besides "Arethuse" a number of new poems which are considered among the best written by M. de Regnier.

In addition to his poems, he published, in 1895, a series of stories, "Le Canne de Jaspe," and another one in 1899 "Le Trefle Blanc." The French Academy awarded him last year the Prix Vitet for his works. He was made a chevalier of the Legion of Honor in 1897. He married the second daughter of Jose-Maria de Heredia, of the French Academy, the renowned author of "Les Trophées," and is therefore the brother-in-law of M. Pierre Louys, the author of "Aphrodite" and "Chansons de Bilitis."

DEBATING it would seem has been added to the questions upon which we have differences with Stanford. In this instance Stanford comes forward with proposals, not to return to the established order of things, but to introduce innovations. Her representatives desire chiefly the holding of the intercollegiate debate at Palo Alto, in the belief that the Field Day will be held there, and an increase in the number of judges.

Provided that the Field Day were to be held at Stanford there would be some points in favor of taking the debate there also. There would be objections as well, for the holding of the Carnot alternately at the two universities leaves only the intercollegiate debate accessible to large numbers of the interested public in the large cities around the bay. As a focussing point for educated interest in the two universities, the debate should be held in the largest available auditorium in San Francisco.

On the question of judges Stanford has traditionally taken a somewhat illogical position. No one could question the decision of the honorable and eminent gentlemen who have on all occasions acted as judges. Yet our friends have both maintained the superiority in various particulars of their representatives and have decried the lack of interest in debating at Palo Alto. We fail to discern either how an increase in the number of judges would increase the interest in debating at Stanford or how it would ever in the past have altered any of the decisions.

A debate is something upon

which a decision could not be left safely to large numbers of judges. There are too many considerations below the surface and too many fine points of insight and discrimination to trust to other than trained minds. Reliance upon numbers would dictate the leaving of the decision to a popular vote of the audience. And even a jury requires expert instructions from a judge. For past intercollegiate debates it has been difficult to secure even three judges possessed of the proper qualifications. So on every side an increase in their number finds nothing in its favor and many objections.

Students' Congress.

The next meeting of the Students' Congress is to be held in Stiles Hall on Tuesday, February 27th. The following measure will be presented by the Government for adoption: "Resolved, That the Senate should ratify the Hay-Pauncefote treaty." Flaa '01, Brand '01 and Koford '03 will uphold the Ministry, while Pierce '01, Deutch '02 and Andrews '02 will speak upon the opposition.

UNIVERSITY SUMMER SCHOOL.
Will Be in Session From June 25th to August 3rd.

The summer session of the University of California will last from Monday, June 25th, to Friday, August 3rd. Special emphasis will be placed upon the instruction in history and political science. Professor Bernard Moses, Professor Thomas R. Bacon and Dr. K. C. Babcock all being members of the summer school faculty. Courses will be offered in Pedagogy, Latin, English, Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Botany. Several lecturers from outside the University will aid in the work.

The work in physics, chemistry and botany will consist of practical laboratory courses supplemented by lectures on the principles involved. In physics and chemistry provision will be made for students and applicants who wish to do experimental work in preparation for University matriculation.

Throughout the summer session the University library will be open every day, except Saturday and Sunday, from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., to any who will make the deposit of \$5, which is required of all summer school students who wish the privilege of home use of library books. The deposit will be returned, less any unpaid charges.

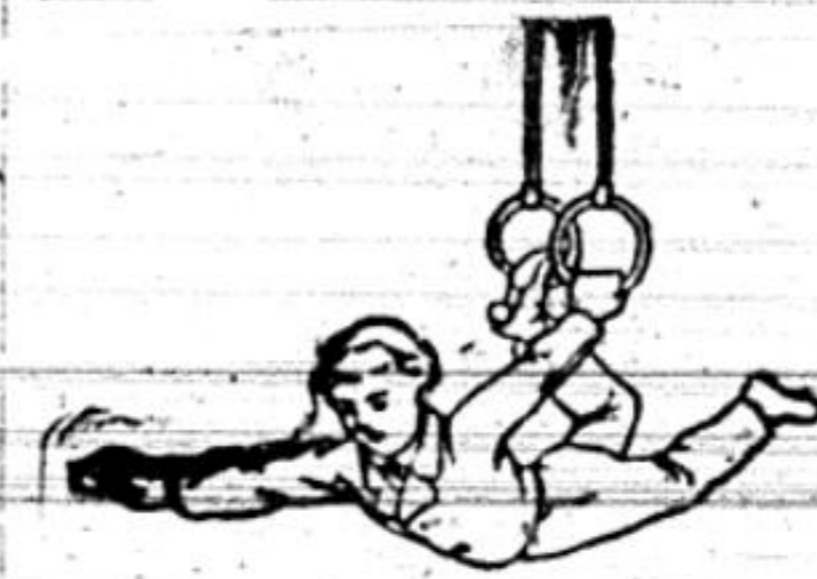
To insure adequate arrangements in due season, and to facilitate prompt communication with prospective students in case of changes in present plans, Recorder James Sutton requests that all persons who propose to attend any of the courses should, on or before June 18th, fill out the blank form of application furnished by the University. The fees are to be paid in advance to the Secretary of the Board of Regents at his office in South Hall. The tuition fee will be \$10, regardless of the number of courses taken. The laboratory fee in physics and botany will be \$5, and in chemistry there will be required a deposit of \$10, to cover breakage and materials used, the balance unused to be returned to the student at the end of the term
