ALUMNI BEATEN

BY VARSITY.

MEN SHOW IMPROVED FORM.

Games Tomorrow Both Here and at Palo Alto.

In a practice game on the campus yesterday afternoon, the Varsity defeated the Alumni for the second time this season. The game, unlike that played two weeks ago, was above the average, in the playing done by the Varsity. After the first inning, during which Carter and McKeown, by two errors, allowed two men to cross the plate, the Alumni were not allowed to score again. Nourse pitched the whole game in good form for California, striking eight men out, and allowing but three to take first on balls. Jansing, who comes from the Dental College, and King covered second base well.

For the Alumni, McLaren and McLaughlin played the best ball. The batting of the Varsity has improved as the fourteen hits and home runs in yesterday's game show. The game in detail was as follows:

He was then promoted to be a Brigadier-General and had command of the Department of Texas until the Spanish war broke out, when he was made a Major-General of volunteers with command of a corps, and after the war was retired.

General Graham is proceeding to Manila to join his son, Lieutenant Graham, and to escort his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Lieutenant Graham, nee Kent, of Oakland.

Senior Class Meeting.

President Martin of the Senior Class has called a meeting to be held today at 11:15 a. m., in Room 18, North Hall. Various preliminary matters call for attention in beginning the term's work, and in particular the first preparations for class day will be begun.

TRACK MEETS FOR CALIFORNIA.

Probable Contests With Yale and Pennsylvania.

On Wednesday Track Manager Decoto received a telegram from the Yale athletic management saying that a meet with the Pacific Coast athletes would be very acceptable to Yale in case the English team does not come to the United States this year. Yale had previously considered her athletic season too full with the regular dual meets, the Mott-Haven games and her contest with Cambridge College, Minn. But now that it is no longer likely that the Englishmen will visit the United States this year, a match will probably be arranged with California.

Another telegram was received from the University of Pennsylvania requesting that a match be made between that University and the University of California. The team from California which visited the East in '95 were tied by the Quaker State collegians, who were the only athletes with whom the Berkeley men were matched that did not suffer defeat in the contest.

1902 Debating Society.

Last Tuesday evening the Sophomore Debating Society met at Stiles Hall and discussed the question: "Resolved, That the members of the President's cabinet should have seats in the United States Senate."

The affirmative side was supported by Weed and Coghlan, while those representing the negative were Weight and Service. The decision was rendered in favor of the negative. In the business meeting which followed Messrs. Hyde and Schoenfeldt were elected to membership.

The next meeting of the Society will be held on Tuesday evening, March 6th. The debate at this meeting will be on the subject: "Resolved, That there should be an offensive and defensive alliance between the United States and Great Britain." The affirmative will be argued by W. D. Root and P. W. Owen, and the negative by F. F. Goodsell and L. P. Jones.

Visitor From Oberlin.

Professor George F. Wright of Oberlin College, one of the leading geologists of the country, will be in San Francisco on Monday next and is expected to visit the University. Professor Wright is on his way to Siberia whither he goes for the purpose of studying the geology of that country, and also of northern China.

PROF. CAMPBELL LECTURES.

Describes the Eclipse Expedition to India.

On Wednesday evening Professor W. Campbell of the Lick Observatory delivered a highly interesting lecture on "The Lick Observatory Eclipse Expedition to India." The lecture was delivered in the Students' Observatory, and was illustrated by excellent stereopticon views.

The funds for this expedition, organized for the purpose of observing the total eclipse of the sun on January 21, 1898, were furnished by Col. C. F. Crocker. The expedition was highly successful in every way. Professor Campbell described in detail the nature of the country and people, the setting up of the instruments, the viewing of the eclipse, and the photographs obtained. The photosphere was carefully observed and studied by the party, and also such peculiarities of the chromosphere as were shown to advantage by the eclipse. The lecture concluded with views of various beautiful buildings of India.

Last Tuesday at 11:15, Professor Campbell lectured before the class in Modern Astronomy on "Some Results Obtained from Measurements of Stellar Velocities in the Line of Sight." The accuracy reached at the Lick Observatory in this line of work surpasses everything of a like nature previously accomplished elsewhere. In this connection the discovery that Polaris, the North Star, represents a multiple system, is of special interest to the popular mind.

Tennis Affairs.

Manager Selby reports that up to this time about six hundred dollars has been collected on tennis court subscriptions, leaving an outstanding balance of two hundred dollars in unpaid subscriptions. Permission has been secured to build the courts on the ground just east of the baseball field; the manager has already called for bids for their construction, and work will be begun soon.

Athletic Committee.

A meeting of the athletic committee was called for last evening, but as no quorum of the committee members was present it was not possible to transact any business.

THE status of the negotiations upon the Intercollegiate Field Day is one greatly to be regretted. The account of it given on Wednesday ascribes however some undeserved blame to the Stanford track manager. As is the case with us his actions must be submitted to an athletic committee for sanction. Knowing the sentiment of this committee and not as we understand it from any wish of his own he says that arbitration will not be accepted. We have offered to submit the question to a representative committee of arbitration, to one or more neutral parties, and finally to the Stanford faculty athletic committee. If there is an athletic committee in existence which will decline all these it is likely that we will make our negotiations with them anything but protracted.

A careful investigation of last season's athletic transactions fails to reveal any grounds for this intolerant attitude. The reason that the last Field Day was held on our oval

was that the Olympic—the only neutral track—had had built within it a high board bicycle track which shut off the spectators' view of the cinder path. It is quite inexplicable how Stanford's athletic management could have gained such a deep-rooted idea that there was any agreement to hold field days alternately on the respective campuses. The only possibility is that they have reasoned themselves into this belief. If it was in any way inferred from the negotiations of last year's manager, Stanford's manager must have known that such an agreement binding on future representatives could not be made without the sanction of the governing athletic committee. Our athletic committee was never asked to give its consent to such an agreement.

As an act of courtesy we would be glad to hold this year's track meet at Palo Alto, but practical considerations have been already stated which form an insurmountable objection. What advantage Stanford would gain in the matter that her representatives should so insist upon it, we cannot see. As unsuccessful competitors in track athletics, by offering an alternative of impossible demands or no field day, they place themselves in a most unenviable position.

On Monday Professor L. J. Richardson will leave for a month's visitation of schools throughout the State. During the week Professors Merrill and Price will also leave for the same purpose.

Hanford Wants More Institutes.

Hanford has petitioned the Board of Regents of the University of California to hold at least two farmers' institutes there each year, one in the spring, and one in the fall. At the farmers' institute held in Hanford last Friday and Saturday, resolutions were adopted thanking Director D. T. Fowler and Professor A. P. Hayne "for their practical and scholarly lectures, and for the very able suggestions and advice given for the solution of many problems affecting the agriculturalists and horticulturalists in this county." A copy of these resolutions has been received at President Wheeler's office.

Changes at Yale.

Yale has decided to establish a "University Council" to assist President Hadley in the administration of the university. The council will consist of fifteen members. The general faculty meetings will be discontinued and in their place the separate faculties of the different departments will meet regularly with their deans as presiding officers.

The Pomona Experiment Station has recently been conducting a series of experiments with a view to saving water by means of more economical methods in irrigation.

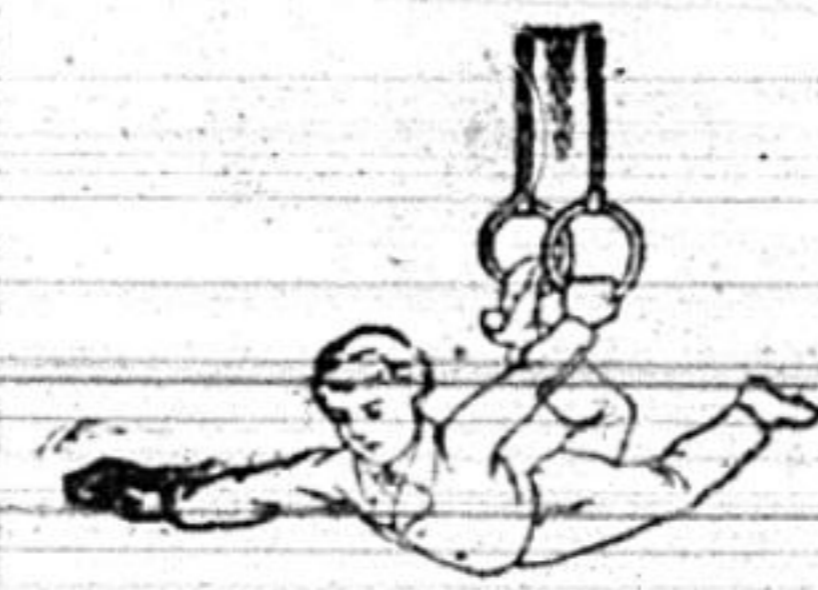
