CALIFORNIA WINS, STANFORD LOSES. GOOD BASEBALL SATURDAY.

Berkeley Players Show Marked Improvement.

Hard, consecutive batting, sharp, clean fielding, and the excellent pitching of Kaarsberg enabled the Varsity to win a well-earned game from the Santa Clara College nine on the Stanford campus last Saturday afternoon. The work of all the players was of a high order and showed considerable improvement over that of previous games. Kaarsberg was in his best form, striking out ten men. Toward the end of the game he was hit somewhat freely, but he was very steady when men were on the bases, and the hits netted only four runs while the California men made seven.

The best batting was done by Smith, Fuller and Braley, while the fielding of Smith, Hunter and Wolf was especially worthy of note. Hamlin played his usual steady game on first, and Mein did well the little he had to do. A fine double play was made by Wolf and Smith, the former catching a long fly to left and by a splendid throw putting a man out at the plate when he attempted to score on the hit. Bride played a fairly good game, his error being made on a hard chance.

For Santa Clara, Leake, Graham and Connor played the best game. Kelly was batted out of the box, but Keefe, who replaced him, did well, not a single hit being made off of him. A detailed score follows:

FIELD DAY TO BE AT PALO ALTO.

TRACK MANAGERS AGREE.

California Yields Rather Than Break Off Relations.

The intercollegiate disagreement concerning the place of holding the field day this year, has finally been settled, and it is California that has given in. California has all along been willing to arbitrate, but Stanford declared that the field day would be held at Palo Alto or not at all. The objection to this plan is one of finances. It is claimed by the Californian management, that few people will be willing to pay \$1.25 for the privilege of seeing a field day, as would be necessary if the contest came off at Stanford. The Cardinal, on the other hand, affirms that the field day was held at Berkeley last year upon the condition that the track team reciprocate by going down to Palo Alto this year.

It seems that in declaring their ultimatum Stanford would have been just as well pleased if the field day, for this year at any rate, be declared off; and it is for this reason that the management telegraphed last Friday the reply that California agreed to the holding of the field day at Stanford this year.

As it is certain that the event will be a financial loss, strict economy will be practiced during the whole season. The receipts from the interclass, affiliated and championship field day will have to pay the expenses of the season.

It is now planned, instead of having a dual meet between the winners of the interclass field day and the affiliated colleges, to hold a triple meet between the Freshmen, Sophomore and Affiliated College teams.

This contest will take place on Saturday, March 17th. The A. A. L. will hold its semi-annual field day on the cinder track the following week, March 24th.

Prof. LeConte's Birthday.

DEBATING CONFERENCE.

Intercollegiate Committees Hold a Second Meeting.

A second meeting of the Stanford and California intercollegiate debating committee was held Saturday afternoon at the California Hotel. F. W. Aitken, J. T. O'Connor and R. T. Fisher represented Berkeley, and A. H. Suzzallo, L. B. Wickersham and Frank Adams appeared for Stanford. The meeting was for the purpose of drafting a new debating agreement for the two universities. Several changes in the old agreement were proposed, but were left over to a third meeting to be held next Saturday. The matter of the selection of the judges was discussed, and it was agreed that the Berkeley committee should submit the first list of possible names, and that this list be in the hands of the Stanford committee by March 5th. The Stanford committee is to return a counter list one week from that date.

Review on Wednesday.

The dress parade and review of the University cadets in honor of General Graham will take place on Wednesday, instead of Monday as announced. The faculty, students and friends are invited to be present. The recent nomination of two of our heads of departments to positions of national and international importance is an extremely gratifying manifestation. From a national point of view, the whole intelligent population of the country must rejoice at the growing tendency towards the appointment to such positions as these of men who have gained their eminence in our Universities. Probably in no other activity of life are the standards of distinction so high or is the mental schooling so stringent. Certainly nowhere else is the finished man better fitted to make himself of service to the nation. The men who direct our national affairs are showing a wisdom universally commended in their selection for posts requiring special preparation and powers, of these men who have devoted their lives to the development of the required capabilities. University professors are public men to those who know them in a less than personal way—a circle measured by the degree of distinction they have attained in their particular branch. Men who have gained note in this capacity have an unequalled hold upon public confidence, and we are happy to see them accorded a well-earned public recognition, in the assurance that they will prove themselves fully deserving of confidence.

These nominations are also particularly gratifying as national recognitions of California through her ministers of state as it were. Here, even as in student athletics, the man most honors California who most honors himself. Personally all Californians give their heartiest endorsement and desire the nominations to receive the speedy confirmation they deserve.

The publication in two morning papers of a matter purely concerning the life of the University, the exclusion of which from the press had been especially requested, deserves all the caustic criticism it is receiving. The root of the whole evil is in the state of the American press, certain features of which are

among the most discouraging indications of the state of our national life. They scatter to the four winds matters of purely private concern, to gratify a morbid public curiosity for the creation of which they are largely responsible. They are prone, moreover, to exaggerate and to distort facts to this same end. We have no desire in this instance to make a mountain out of a mole hill, and we deery it more as an indication than as an injury. This was merely a matter which it could do no outsider any good to know, which the public could only misunderstand and further distort, and which might in some degree injure the good name of the student body—reasons enough for keeping it to ourselves. The press has in the main been an excellent friend to the University. It has rendered to ours as to many another good cause, yeoman service. But in this instance as in many another, through the selfish action of some individual and the dereliction in duty of those who supervise, it has far over-reached the "mission of the press" to which it so often appeals.

The daily papers have certain accredited representatives who are likewise connected with the University. These, in this case, disclaim responsibility for the action in question. We remind them that they owe to the University the best of their efforts, subordinate though they be, to exclude from publication such matters as ought to be excluded, and that an active and not a passive attitude is required of them in this regard. They are warned that there is a sorry time in store for any correspondent who shows indications that he does not love his University more than he loves himself and the journal he serves.

This is in accordance with a law passed by the legislature, and approved by Governor Gage March 20, 1899, fixing eight hours as the length of day for workmen on public contracts, or in public institutions. 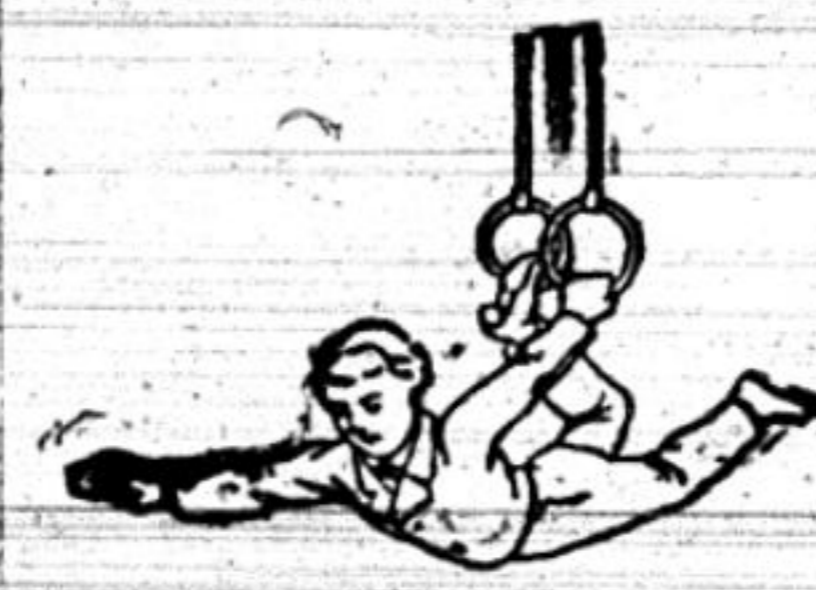
