THE PROPOSED

EASTERN TRIP.

ATHLETIC COMMITTEE ACTS.

A Rally Next Wednesday to Arouse Enthusiasm.

Last evening the Athletic Committee considered the advisability of sending a track team East this year. B. P. Miller '98 addressed the committee in favor of the proposed trip. A resolution was adopted authorizing Track Manager Decoto to make all arrangements for the trip provided the necessary sum be raised to cover the expenses. A meeting and rally of the student body will be held next Wednesday evening in Hearst Hall to ratify this resolution and arouse enthusiasm among the students themselves.

All those who know anything at all about past college history cannot forget the brilliant record made by our track team which was sent East in 1895. The impulse of the trip was so strong that most of the team outdid themselves and established records that completely surpassed all their previous efforts in California. Princeton was defeated and Pennsylvania tied in dual meets. The team brought home the Western intercollegiate championship. The only defeat in a dual meet was received at the hands of the Chicago Athletic Association.

California had a strong team in 1895 but we have prospects of a far stronger team this year. Conservative enthusiasts consider that our team's average ability is equal if not better than that of any college in America with the exception of Pennsylvania. The team would probably consist of ten men. Among these would be Drum for the sprints, Hoffman for the pole vault, Ben Bakewell for the hurdles, Broughton for the broad jump, Plaw for the hammer-throw, Woolsey for the shot-put, Squires for the distances, and Cadogan for the quarter-mile. All of these are capable of competing in other events beside their specialties. California knows what these athletes have done in the past and can be sanguine that their best is yet to be shown. With college support and enthusiasm behind them and success and glory before them our team ought to make a record that has never been surpassed by any individual athletic team in America. The College itself would be immensely advanced in the estimation of all American universities. Pacific Coast tennis men have dem-

STUDENTS' CONGRESS MEETS.

Debate on Hay-Pauncefote Treaty Last Evening.

Last night the Students' Congress held its regular meeting at Stiles Hall. The session was well attended.

Before the regular debate the business matters were attended to. Messrs. Herbert Rothchild and Jesse Steinhart were elected to membership. It was then decided that all members who had been absent from the Congress for three consecutive meetings, unless they should give acceptable excuses to the Speaker within two weeks, should be dropped from the roll. The Clerk was instructed to post these names on the bulletin board in North Hall.

The regular debate was then held. Prime Minister Kidd announced the following question for discussion: "Resolved, That the Hay-Pauncefote treaty should be ratified." The ministry was upheld by Messrs. Flaa, Koford and Brand; the opposition by Messrs. Allen, Colton and Skafie. The question was fully discussed by the regular speakers as well as from the members from the floor.

After the conclusion of the debate a vote was taken on the merits of the opposing arguments. The ministry was upheld by a vote of 12 to 10.

ATHLETIC COMMITTEE.

Routine Business Transacted Last Evening.

A meeting of the Athletic Committee of the Associated Students was held last night in Stiles Hall. The minutes of the previous meeting were not read. Baseball Manager Belcher made a report which was accepted. Thirty-four dollars and eighty-five cents expense was incurred at the Varsity-Santa Clara and Stanford-Fireman's Fund games. Forty dollars was voted for baseball expenses during the coming week. Tennis Manager Selby reported that the new tennis courts would cost about \$1,400. The cost of grading will amount to \$200 more than had been estimated. The football manager was allowed to incur \$15 for cleaning football suits. Treasurer Kaarsberg reported a cash balance of \$658 in the Commercial Bank. The expenses of the baseball games last week were \$48.25, and the receipts \$87. Bills to the amount of \$211.08 were paid. After considering the advisability of sending a track team East, the committee adjourned.

Astronomy Lecture.

Astronomer R. H. Tucker of the Lick Observatory lectured on "The Meridian Circle" in the Students' Observatory yesterday. The lecture dealt with the technical sources of error that affected the instrument and the methods of correction. To show the liability of the Meridian Circle to errors, the lecturer explained how an earthquake felt in Mexico, January 21, 1900, affected the readings so that observations had to be discontinued for about an hour.

This evening at eight o'clock Dr. Montague will lecture in the rooms of the Occidental Hotel in San Francisco upon the subject of "The Immortality of the Animal." The lecture will be delivered before the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and the public is invited.

The most obvious teaching of the recent controversy with Stanford is the necessity for some permanent and definite means of arbitration in the case of such differences. American collegians appear to share the national weakness for constitutions and for exactly indited agreements under which to conduct their transactions. When none such exist a distinct advantage lies with the misguided or the unscrupulous party.

In the incident just closed there were several circumstances which emphasized particularly this need. After an agreement to arbitrate had been with some difficulty obtained, it was found that the gentlemen designated as arbitrators felt unable to serve owing to various embarrassing circumstances attending the unexpected call upon them. If a board of arbitration or some method of securing one, had been previously and permanently agreed upon, no such objections could have arisen. In the second place Stanford finally declined arbitration altogether. Under a permanent agreement the shamelessness of such an attitude

would without doubt have prevented its being taken. Our yielding to the demands made was purely for reasons of our own and had no relation to the merits of the controversy. It is useless to cause any bitterness by rehearsing these or by calling up the charges and counter-charges of a closed incident. However, we feel confident of completing Stanford's chagrin when the Field Day comes off.

The suggestion for this permanent agreement upon some method of arbitration has been made before. We second the motion.

onstrated that they are not far behind the East. Our football team has earned the right to be classed among the nation's best. The track team is now ready to show America that they are fit to be ranked among the champions.

Manager Decoto has energetically set to work and arranged such preliminaries as are necessary to make the trip feasible. The prospects are to meet Yale, Princeton, Pennsylvania, University of Wisconsin and University of Michigan in dual meets; Cornell and Columbia in a triple meet; to take part in the great intercollegiate games at Mott-Haven, Conn; and to take part in the Western intercollegiate games at Chicago. The University of California has been reinstated in the Intercollegiate Athletic Association and is eligible to compete at Mott-Haven.

The team should win every dual meet except that with Pennsylvania and bring back with them the Western intercollegiate championship cup. Princeton has very kindly offered the use of their track for training purposes. The plan is to leave Berkeley the latter part of April and make headquarters at Princeton while in the East.

A very liberal estimate of the cost of such a trip would be \$4500. The plan is to raise \$1500 from the alumni and \$1500 from the students; \$1500 is to be expected on guarantees from the Eastern meets. The whole matter now rests in the hands of the students for a final decision.

Target practice for the cadets of the Junior Class will begin on Saturday, March 3rd. All cadet members of that class will report at Shell Mound Park, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 3 p. m., and will fire twenty-five rounds of cartridges.

The ammunition will be supplied by the armorer at that time and place.

Each cadet must appear and shoot as above described to fill out his military record for the year.

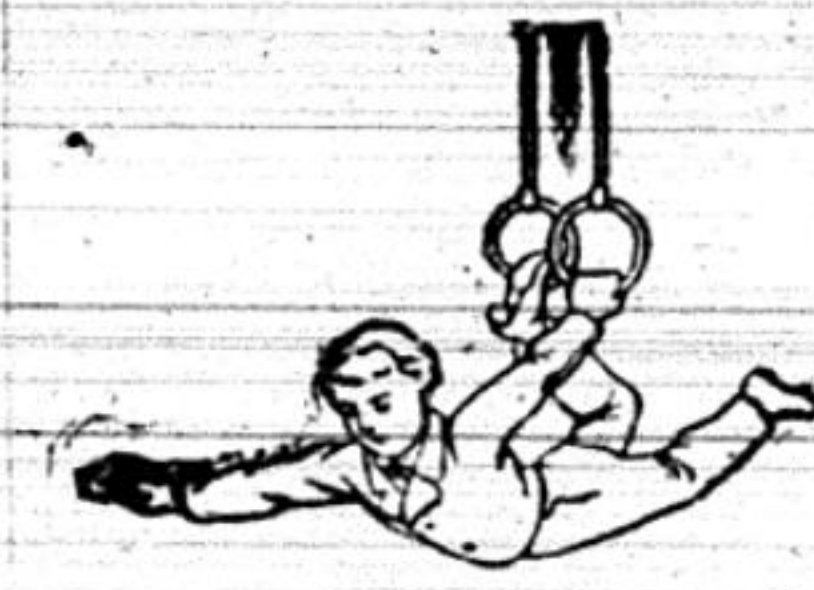
