CONFERENCE HELD LAST SATURDAY. DEBATING AGREEMENT REACHED.

Stanford Rejects Question Submitted by California.

The Intercollegiate Debating Committee met last Saturday afternoon in San Francisco. The representatives of Stanford contended that the question submitted by California was not of sufficient importance for an intercollegiate debate, and proposed that the place of holding the debate should be settled by arbitration, the debaters to appear before the Board of Arbitrators and discuss the advisability of any change. California objected to the idea of holding two intercollegiate debates, and maintained that the only practical way of settling the question was in the way indicated in the question.

The representatives of Stanford, however, remarked that the attitude of Stanford in regard to the question, would be changed if the question was submitted regularly on Monday, without any limiting clauses. The justice of California's contention, that the debate should be held in San Francisco, is thus conceded by Stanford.

California's representatives objected to the proposition made by Stanford that the judges should vote without consultation. This proposal was made with the view of obviating any possibility of one judge dominating over the other two. California objected that not only would such a method be discourteous, but that better decisions would result from the judges conferring together. Finally the committee adopted the following rule: "Without any discussion in the debate as presented by the speeches, the judges shall, at the conclusion of the debate, proceed to ballot for the winning team. A majority of the ballots shall be necessary for a decision."

During the debate the judges are to be seated in different parts of the building. Stanford withdrew from the position which she has heretofore held, that the number of the judges should be increased to five.

In regard to the instructions to the judges, it was decided that the decision should be rendered "on the merits of the debate," the merits of the question not being considered "save as they are presented in the debate." This proposition has been contended for by California for some time, but was presented this year by Stanford.

BOURDON CEREMONY.

Committee on Arrangements Has Been Appointed.

At a meeting of the Freshman Class held last Friday a committee of arrangements for the annual Bourdon ceremony was appointed. This committee is composed of Mr. J. A. Moriarity, chairman; Messrs. G. C. Brown, James Conannon, A. J. Woolsey, B. L. York, C. G. Bailey and T. R. Hanna; Misses Mary Putnam and Z. B. Taskins.

It is the intention of the class this year to retain the essential features of the old Bourdon, and at the same time so change it that it will be suited to new conditions. The general plan which the committee has now in mind is that the ceremony shall be held in the amphitheatre, and shall be of the nature of a play laid in the lower regions. Various members of the Faculty will be brought before the court and sentenced to incur different penalties.

With this plan in mind a competition similar to that of the Junior farce will probably be inaugurated. A prize will be offered, and all plays submitted will become the property of the class. By interweaving, if necessary several plays, the committee hopes to be able to obtain one worthy of the occasion.

PRESIDENT WHEELER RETURNS.

Students Will Welcome Him at the Station.

President Wheeler is expected to arrive in Berkeley from his Eastern trip today at six o'clock. The schedule which he has followed so far would show that after finishing with the conference at Chicago he would leave there Saturday night and arrive in Oakland at about five o'clock today. This, then, would bring him to Berkeley on the six o'clock train.

If there is no hitch in the program it is the intention of the students of the University to go to the train and welcome the President back to Berkeley, and to the University. They will escort him from the station to his home and try to show him some degree of the appreciation which is felt for the services which he has rendered the University.

A notice will be posted today when more definite news as to his arrival is received. It is urged that as many of the students as possible turn out to welcome President Wheeler home.

UNLESS the unforeseen happens we shall have President Wheeler back with us this afternoon. His trip, judging from the press dispatches, must have been a well-nigh continuous ovation. In addition to previously concluded engagements to speak at various centers of learning, he has been the leader of a movement calling into consultation the representatives and presidents of the country's Universities—a move for taking the initiative in which they have expressed their thanks to California. He has, moreover, been called into council by the heads of the national government. As the president of the State's University every citizen of California must have felt an interest and a pride in this splendid recognition—every student and alumnus of the University a pride and a personal gratification.

The outside press has made some very pertinent comments apropos of the President's trip. They have drawn attention to the difference between the University president of today and the one of a generation gone. The latter was generally more or less of a recluse given up to the study and teaching of theology or ethics or some kindred subject and whose almost only active pursuit was the repression of unruly students. The highest type of University president of today may be desired at the White House, as was President Wheeler, to advise concerning national interests—irrigation and forestry and the fitness of men for national appointments. We take a just pride in having at our head a man who is eminently fitted to play a part in the active affairs of the nation and whose abilities are a matter of national recognition.

His departure a few weeks ago was taken at such a time and with such quietness that we had no opportunity even to bid him an affectionate *auf Wiedersehen* or to offer a respectful request that he make the trip not one too taxing on himself. His absence and return being a realization of all the respect, the admiration and the affection we have in

this short season grown to feel for him. It needs but a signal for this to express itself, and if we can all meet him this afternoon on his arrival the opportunity will be most favorable. The student officers will, we are sure, meet a universally felt desire if they will arrange for a fitting demonstration of the feeling to which we wish to give expression.

Most of his schooling was received in Europe, and he lived in Athens where his ability to speak Greek fluently was of great help to him. He superintended the collections of specimens for the museum of archaeology at Cornell, and his services will therefore be especially valuable in selecting the collection for the University of California.

Seed Distribution.

The seed and plant distribution work of the Agricultural Department which has been in progress since December, is practically closed for this year. Nearly a thousand persons have been reached by the distribution, and material has been sent to about fifty counties, thus widely covering the State. During the distribution about 3500 plants, 700 cuttings and 10,000 ounces of seed have been handled.

Very keen interest has been shown in this work of plant introduction and distribution. The participants freely report the results of their trials, which aid materially in the definition of the adaptabilities of new plants undertaken in the reports of the agricultural department.

Grammar Grade Certificates.

The change in regard to the requirement of Pedagogy for High School teacher's certificates have been issued to all graduates of the University no matter if any Pedagogy had been taken or not. After the close of the Academic year 1900-1901, Pedagogy will be necessary for securing such a certificate. The amount of work necessary is the same as is now required for recommendations for the High School certificate.
