PRESIDENT

WHEELER BACK

AFTER A BUSY EASTERN TRIP.

Enthusiastic Crowd of Students Met Him at the Station.

President Wheeler arrived yesterday on the 5:20 local and was greeted by an enthusiastic crowd of students. When he appeared he was cheered and yells were indulged in.

The President stopped at Denver, Richmond, Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York and Chicago. While at Washington the President had several important conferences with President McKinley, Secretary Hay and other prominent administration officers. He visited the leading Universities, and also was present at the conference of principal colleges held at Chicago. DEBATING QUESTION SELECTED.

The Preliminaries Will Be Held In About Ten Days.

The committee on the intercollegiate debate has chosen the following question: "Resolved, That the 'army canteen' should be abolished." This question has already been sent to Stanford and an answer is expected in about a week. The preliminaries will be held in about ten days.

The word canteen, used for brevity, to be construed in the restricted sense which it has acquired in popular discussion in this country as referring to that feature of the institution which pertains to the sale, under control of the United States military authorities, of intoxicating liquors to soldiers. This is the detailed interpretation sent of the technical term "canteen" and is to be printed on the program as showing the intent of the question for the purposes of the discussion.

JOHNS HOPKINS ADDRESS.

President Wheeler's Talk on the Duty of the University

The Baltimore Morning Herald of February 23rd, contains an extended account of President Wheeler's participation in the 24th Commemoration Exercises of the Johns Hopkins University. President Wheeler's address was on "The Duties of the University Toward the Commonwealth." It was, in part, as follows:

"We cannot face the lessons which this day of its own right brings to us without being reminded that we live in times of change and overturning. We are arriving at the end of a century which has developed inter-communication by the railway, the steamer, the telegraph and the telephone, and the tremendous significance of it all for the life of man has suddenly burst upon our sleepy eyes, as the seed the century has been sewing hurries to the ripening of its fruits in all the fields at once.

"The sharp strong trend of the times has brought upon our political institutions, conceived under entirely different conditions, the twisting, testing and danger that inheres in the rising power of corporate wealth, the dominance of party machines, the extension of natural sovereignty.

"The shadow will not retreat from the dial of history. Lovers of the morning may deplore the gathering blaze of the mid-day, but the morning is gone, and it behooves us to use the strength of the day according to its opportunity.

"These are days when out of its dangers and its hopes, the State calls with a voice that only dull ears can fail to heed, claiming the service of the noblest and best. No college walls are dense enough to-day to turn back the call which comes for non-trained men who have learned the lessons of the centuries. The college, whatever its form and name, is a public institution, created first and foremost to serve the largest purposes of human society. No form of human institution has proved itself in the product of its men and their deeds, so eminently and purely a public institution. In increasing measure this is true of the college of to-day, both in the output it yields and in the confidence reposed by the public in its disinterestedness, its patriotism and its wisdom.

"The one thing that brings permanent satisfaction to life is service. We are not our own; we have been

Speeches Will Be Made by Faculty and Alumni.

bought with a price. The summons which to-day rings throughout the land and echoes in these academic halls is a summons to public service of the public state, of a state which is frankly a public possession administered for the public good under public law. To some it will be a call to political service; to all it is a summons to renew the faith of the nations founders, to be revived in temper and mind according to the high religion of public spirit.

President Gilman, in seeking a present with which to honor President Wheeler, selected a very appropriate one—a book containing a number of letters and portraits of Bishop Berkeley, in whose honor the sight of the University of California was named, and the author of the historic verses beginning, "Westward the course of empire takes its way." In accepting the volume from Dr Gilman, who was formerly President of the University of California, President Wheeler said, "the academic consciousness of California is the creation of the President of the Johns Hopkins University."

At the annual banquet of the alumni of the Johns Hopkins University, President Wheeler paid a graceful tribute to President Gilman, saying that he was known almost as well on the Pacific Coast as in Baltimore, and that he was revered all over the country as a great educator.
