PROFESSOR MOSES APPOINTED. MADE PHILIPPINE COMMISSIONER

Form of Government for the Islands to Be Drafted.

Professor Bernard Moses called on President McKinley yesterday morning and was tendered a place on the Philippines Commission, which position he accepted. The commission is now complete, comprising the following: W. H. Taft of Cincinnati, Professor Dean C. Worcester of Michigan, Luke Wright of Tennessee, Henry Ide of Vermont and Professor Moses.

Professor Moses, who is so well known to the students of the University of California, is fifty-four years of age, having been born in Burlington, Conn., August 27, 1846. He has held his position in the University of California as professor of history and political economy since 1876. He was educated in the University of Michigan and the University of Heidelberg. For a short time before coming to Berkeley he held the position of professor of history in Albon College. Among the books he has published are: "Politics," "Federal Government in Switzerland," "Democracy and Social Growth in America" and "Establishment of Spanish Rule in America." Professor Moses was married in 1880 to Miss Mary E. Briggs.

President Wheeler, since his return from the East, has stated the circumstances of Professor Moses' appointment as follows: "President McKinley said to me: 'I want a Pacific Coast man for the place and I want the best man on the Coast. I mean the man of highest fitness, capabilities and attainments. The best appointment in that sense is also the best appointment in a political sense.' I at once named Professor Moses. His mastery of matters of public polity and his special equipment in Spanish-American history and institutions render him eminently qualified to fulfill the duties of the position.

"While President McKinley has made no promises of the time when the commissioners will be relieved from duty, I anticipate that Professor Moses may return to his post in the University in eight or ten months. The scope of the commission includes simply the analysis of the conditions obtaining in the island and the drafting of a form of government adapted to meet them. I regard the disposition shown by the Administration to consult with and employ the services of great experts like Professor Moses as one of the most significant governmental developments of our time."

ATHLETIC RALLY TONIGHT.

Gathering at Hearst Hall to Arouse Enthusiasm.

The rally to be held this evening at Hearst Hall for the purpose of arousing enthusiasm in the project to send the track team east, will be the first distinctively athletic rally since the one held just before Thanksgiving. It is desired that all students should attend as the scheme for the Eastern trip will amount to nothing unless it receives the support of the student body. An opportunity will be afforded to Californians tonight to show their interest in the undertaking, and the tenor of the meeting will go far toward indicating the final decision that will be made. Besides the student and alumni speakers announced in yesterday's Californian, President Wheeler will be present and address the students relative to the proposed trip.

Manager Decoto received yesterday a telegram from Yale stating that that university would be willing to meet California on May 5th according to the conditions previously arranged in the correspondence between the two universities.

The University of Wisconsin is desirous of meeting this University in a dual track meet, to be held immediately after the Western inter-collegiate meet.

Students of Letters to Meet.

As announced in yesterday's Californian there will be a meeting of all the students in the College of Letters today at 11:15, in Room 18, North Hall. It is desired that every student in that college should be present as important matters are to be discussed. President Wheeler and Wilsie Martin '00 will address the meeting. Cadets desiring to attend will be excused from drill by Commandant Soule.

President Wheeler to Speak.

Next Saturday President Wheeler will address the Montecello Club of San Francisco. At 8 o'clock on Thursday evening, March 15th, he will speak before the Art Association of the University of California at Hearst Hall.

The Carnot medal for 1900 will be on exhibition for the next week in the trophy case at the Library so that those who have never seen one of these medals will have the opportunity.

WEEK OF BENEFIT ENTERTAINMENTS.

PLANS FOR CANCELING DEBT.

Farce and Minstrels to Be Presented by Students.

Elaborate preparations are in progress for the "University Week" entertainment to be given in San Francisco on a scale which has before never been attempted by any organization of the University. The purpose of the entertainment is twofold. At present the Associated Students is burdened with a debt that seriously cripples the activities of the college in athletics as well as in other lines. The prospect of sending a team east to compete with the great universities is in itself but a prospect unless some measures are taken to reduce this debt that has grown steadily during the last three years. The plan that is now being furthered is to put the University student body on a firmer financial basis and at the same time to enable California to be represented in an Eastern meet. The successful accomplishment of this undertaking is, however, as much incumbent on the students of the University as upon those who will participate in the performances.

Morosco's Grand Opera House has been secured for eight successive performances, the series to be known as the "University Week." R. W. Tully's successful farce, "James Wobberts I s. s., Boston," will be presented Saturday evening, April 7th, and also Monday, Tuesday and Saturday matinee of the following week. The Farce will be slightly remodeled to suit the change of audience, but in the main it will not be radically altered. The cast will include the same company who presented the farce on last Junior day. The play itself, judging from the success it enjoyed at its initial performance, can hardly fail to meet the approval of the public.

On Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings of the same week there will be given three minstrel performances. These will partake of the nature of the "old college minstrels," and will draw their talent not only from the active members of the University but also from the graduates who have shown special ability in this line. The University Glee, Banjo and Mandolin Clubs will take part in these entertainments. The Schwartz-Tully combination and Elmer Harris will also assist with specialties. Out of

ASSOCIATION OF UNIVERSITIES.

Plans Already Laid for Second Annual Meeting.

Plans have already been laid for the second annual meeting of the Association of American Universities, which was organized in Chicago two weeks ago by the leading Universities of the country.

At a meeting of the executive committee, of which President Charles W. Eliot of Harvard University is president, President Wheeler, vice-president, President William R. Harper of the University of Chicago, secretary, and President D. C. Gilman of Johns Hopkins University and President Seth Low of Columbia University, members. It was decided to hold a second meeting of the Association in Chicago in March, 1901. The subjects to be discussed at that time are the migration of graduate students, and the requirements for the granting of higher degrees.

President Wheeler says that the organization of this Association of American Universities is one of the most important events in the history of education in America. No such co-operative movement has ever before been attempted. Only in France, where all universities are under the direction of the government, has anything of the kind ever been known.

Bourdon Plans.

The Bourdon Committee of the Freshman Class have offered \$15 as a cash prize for the best scheme for the Bourdon exercises. Of what the celebration shall consist of will be left open for competition, but feasibility and striking characteristics will count much in the award. Great latitude is left to the competitors in every direction, so the finished scheme should be quite complete when handed in. All manuscript presented shall become the property of the committee.

The competition will close March 19th. Those desiring further details should see some member of the committee immediately.

It is a truism of history that contemporary chroniclers have great difficulty in seeing and recording events in their broad meaning and their true significance. Yet it seems safe to assert without fear of future criticism that the current college year is destined to go down as an *annus mirabilis* in the history of the University. Almost simultaneously at the year's beginning we had the jury's decision in the Hearst Architectural Competition and the arrival of President Wheeler—as to both which events we own that our perspective is yet too short to venture an opinion on to their ultimate significance. Next—not to classify important happenings—came the Thanksgiving victory which the memory will surely not soon be effaced nor overshadowed. Following close upon this was Mrs. Hearst's arrival in Berkeley to stay the college year out with us, to be a royal hostess and a cordial friend to every one of us, and to place the social life of the University on a new basis.

A fourth of this year remains and it offers to the student body an opportunity to achieve something monumental, something so far as we

are capable worthy to stand with what has preceded. It is to send our Track Team east and to send it in the proper spirit. As on the Thanksgiving field a dozen men, more or less, will be in the public eye, as many more by several times will have given their unheralded efforts to raise these to their proud eminence, and the great majority will have given little that is substantial, and much inspiration and enthusiasm. This effort will require more in the substantial way, but if the proper spirit be aroused and each does his share the effort will be small for the individual. Let us then begin with tonight's rally to give our enthusiasm full play, and to remember that we shall have in this the support of many comrades. Then we can be assured that we will furnish both the contributions and the inspiration that is required. We may hope, moreover, to create a fund of enthusiasm which will carry success into every undertaking, which will perpetuate itself, give to all our affairs a hearty support and a sound basis, and finally react to its own advantage, for in success is unity.

It is expected of every student of Letters that he be present at the meeting of his College today at the drill hour. Classical students are generally considered to have more *esprit de corps*, more particularism, than students pursuing any other literary course. Today they will have an opportunity of showing whether or not they deserve this reputation. The call for such a meeting as this of a whole group of students is made but seldom, and they may all be assured that it would not be made except on grounds of great interest and importance to their department of the University.

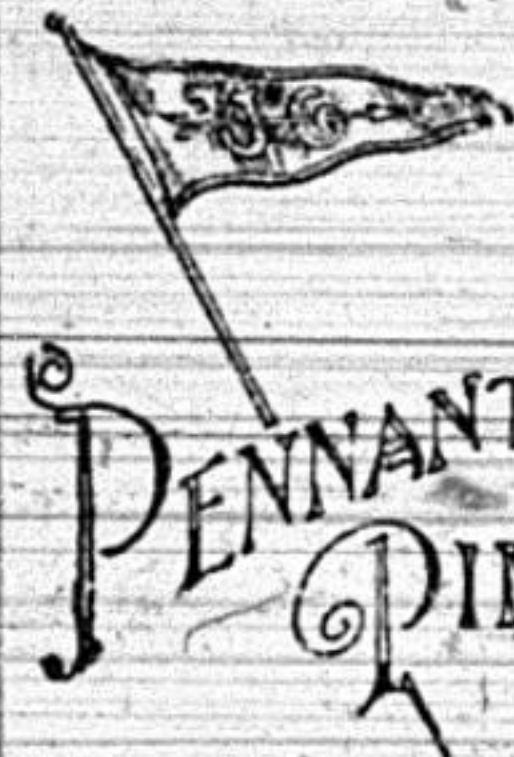
