## RALLY AT HEARST HALL.

### EASTERN TRIP ASSURED. Enthusiastic Students Cheer For the Team.

In spite of the bad weather a good crowd attended the rally at Hearst Hall last night and encouraged the track team by yells and songs. Birnie Miller '97 presided, and after stating the object of the meeting introduced E. J. Brown '98 as the first speaker, who gave a history of the trip east in '95 and showed how difficulties were overcome at that time similar to the ones confronting the management now. He gave great praise to the '95 team for the grit they displayed, and said such grit would overcome all difficulties.

The chairman next introduced Col. Edwards as a consistent friend of athletics. Col. Edwards said that inasmuch as the Track Team is one of the most important parts of the University in that it is uniformly successful it deserves the hearty support of all. He also compared the team with that of '95, and said that we have a much better team now than we had at the same time in '95. He gave it as his opinion that the former trip east did more to interest the people of the State in the University than anything that had occurred for many years.

C. E. Miller '00 next told of the bad impression we had made throughout the east by our lack of good faith in keeping our dates for meets. Every year since '95 intercollegiate meets have been arranged with eastern universities none of which have been kept. He pointed out the necessity of our eradicating this bad impression. Mr. Miller added that the Athletic Committee had carefully considered the records of the Eastern men and in face of this were unanimous in recommending the trip.

"Billy" Drum was called for, and in response stated that it had always been his ambition to become the Captain of the University of California Track Team and he now considered he was Captain of the finest team California ever produced. After this he went over the team in detail, telling just what might be expected from each man. He maintained that we are sure of at least two first places in the Mott-Haven games—Hoffman in the pole vault and Plaw in the hammer-throw. Besides, each of the men are able to compete in two events.

Manager Decoto followed with a rousing speech telling how the University was reinstated in the National League and gave the schedule of meets already arranged: Leaving here April 29th we will meet Yale May 5th, Princeton May 12th, Cornell May 16th, and contest in the Intercollegiate meet on the last Saturday in May and in the Western Intercollegiate meet on the first Saturday in June. Dates will be arranged with Wisconsin and Michigan.

President Wheeler told how he is always interested in seeing the West teach the East. He gave a graphic

## GRADUATE CLUB PLANS.

### Lecture Course With Social Features Announced.

A meeting of the Graduate Club was called to order by President Root last Friday evening in the ladies' room of East Hall. About forty persons were present. At the opening of the meeting Mrs. Winter rendered two solos and the company joined in singing college songs.

The executive committee made a report, proposing the following plans for future meetings of the Club:

First—A lecture course with social feature.

1. Monthly meetings at which a lecture or paper shall be given by some member of the faculty of the University of California or other invited guest on facilities for graduate work in some leading American or European university.

2. At some time during the college year to have a "round table" on the facilities for graduate study in the University of California through reports of committees or students representing the various departments of the University.

The social side of life is not to be neglected in these monthly gatherings. With her usual generosity Mrs. Hearst has offered the Graduate Club the privilege of holding its monthly meetings in Hearst Hall.

Second—A plan to aid in increasing the efficiency of the University Library.

1. Find out the special needs of the Library through graduate students appointed in the various departments who are to co-operate with the heads of their respective departments and with the Librarian.

2. Attempt to supply these needs:

- By personal contributions to the Library, or to the loan Library.
- By club contributions to the Library, or to the loan Library.
- By arousing the interest of others:

- The undergraduates.
- The friends of the University in the various parts of this State or other States, e. g. individuals who take pride in their State institutions, and the numerous California University clubs.

At the conclusion of the reading of the report discussion concerning it was engaged in. Librarian Rowell and others spoke favorably to it, and upon vote it was unanimously adopted by the Club members.

After the business meeting the company adjourned to the refreshment hall where speeches were made, partaking of the character of a General Symposium of College Life. Graduates from different universities spoke of their Alma Maters as follows: Mr. James of the Berkeley High School, Johns Hopkins; Miss Brooks, Boston University; Mr. Noon, Yale; Miss Everett, Mt. Holyoke; Professor Bailey, South Carolina; Mrs. Kneiss, Michigan University.

Professor Le Conte gave a short talk on reminiscences of college life in the University of California.

## CLASSICAL

### STUDENTS MEET.

#### DISCUSS SCHOOL AT ATHENS. Plans Formulated for Raising an Endowment Fund.

The students of the College of Letters met yesterday at 11:15, to decide whether they would take up the work of raising the University of California's contribution for the American School at Athens. The University has been contributing two hundred and fifty dollars a year for the maintenance of the school, but it is desired to raise such a sum that the interest on it will make our yearly contribution.

M. L. McCollough '00 was elected chairman of the meeting. Professor Clapp was the first speaker. He laid before the students the plan that has been thought of for raising the necessary amount. It is proposed that the students of the College of Letters make a systematic canvass of the cities around the bay in selling tickets for a course of six lectures to be given during March and April. The lectures will be as follows: Professor Bacon will lecture on "The Boer Question;" Professor Gayley on "Life at Oxford;" Rev. C. R. Brown on "Constantinople and the Turks;" Dr. Voorsanger on "The Literary History of the Old Testament;" Dr. MacDonald of St. Charles' Catholic Church, on "Joan of Arc."

The sixth lecture will be given either by Dr. Alfred Emerson or President Wheeler. The tickets will be \$2.50 for the entire course. The lectures are to be given in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, San Francisco, the first one being March 22nd and one each succeeding Thursday for six weeks. The lecturers have offered their services free.

Professor Clapp said that all the large Eastern universities are contributing to the support of the American School, and that the University of California, in order not to be behind them, must take up this work and carry it through. Of the \$4,500 which must be raised, there is now on hand about \$300. Mrs. Hearst has promised to give the last \$1,000 and Mayor Phelan has promised \$250 so that now about \$3,000 remains to be raised.

President Wheeler spoke of the American School at Athens. He said that it was a very powerful American and Americanizing institution. It is more important than the ministry or the four consuls

## INTER-CLASS FIELD DAY.

### Discussion of Relative Merits of the Contestants.

If the weather permits the Freshman-Sophomore Field Day will be held next Saturday, March 10th. The records of many of the Freshmen entered are not known and this fact makes any forecast, as to the probable winners, difficult.

The 100-yard dash should be a good race with little to choose between Townsends '03 and Bishop '02. Cadogan will have but little trouble in winning both the 220 and 440. Service and Scott should run second and third in 440. The new men in the distances make these events uncertain; but, based upon their work this year, Scott should win the 880 with Service a close second. If Powell approaches his form of the Reno field day he will win the mile. Although Hamlin has had no track training this term, he may be counted on to win both hurdles. Powell should get second in the high hurdles, and Moulder second in the low hurdles. The mile walk lies between Carter '02 and Elder '03.

Turning to the field events, the Sophomores will win all three places in the hammer-throw with Plaw, Smith and Albertson. The shot-put lies between Clay and Plaw with little choice for first place. In the jumps Powell should win the high with Service and Nourse second and third, and in the broad jump Cadogan should be given first, Service, second. The pole vault lies between Duden, Hamlin, Zederman and Brune.

### 1902 Debating Society.

The 1902 Debating Society held its regular meeting on Tuesday evening. The debate was on the question: "Resolved, That the United States should make an offensive and defensive alliance with Great Britain." The speakers on the affirmative were D. Root and L. E. Martin; on the negative F. F. Goodsell and L. B. Jones. The decision was given in favor of the affirmative.

Messrs. Roberts and Vanderbilt were elected members. J. B. Sawyer read a paper on the Nicaraguan canal.

The question for the next meeting will be: "Resolved, That the United States should construct and control exclusively the Nicaraguan canal." The speakers on the affirmative will be: Messrs. Eshleman and Weed; on the negative, Messrs. Kelley and Bidwell. J. Coghlan will read a paper on the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

In addition they have another stimulus which should call up their keenest energies—the familiar charge that both their pursuits and their dispositions are unpractical. Here they are face to face with an eminently practical undertaking. They are placed on their metal to grapple with it and to prove themselves equal to it.

which are in Athens. It is a center for doing good. France spends \$5,000 a year on her school, and Germany and England each have good schools. Each university that contributes \$250 a year, has the privilege of sending its graduates to the school without tuition. This amounts to founding a free scholarship for the graduates of an institution. Membership in the school is equivalent to two graduate scholarships. No money expended for American education goes farther than money for the American School at Athens.

Martin '00, Fisher '01, Eshleman '02 and Moriarty '03 addressed the meeting and all were very much in favor of taking up the work. A motion was then made that the chairman, N. H. Garrison and Professor Clapp be empowered to choose a committee of ten to arrange for the canvass. This motion was carried and on the committee the following were appointed: Mr. Parsons, chairman; Messrs. Skaffe, Abraham Garrison, Fisher, Eshleman and Moriarty; Misses Macaulay, Rose Taylor and V. B. Bryan; and Professor Clapp as honorary member. Before the meeting adjourned, all present who were willing to assist in making the undertaking a success handed in their names. About one hundred and fifty students thus expressed their desire to do what was possible to further the project.
