CONFERENCE OF ALUMNI. WILL MEET ON CHARTER DAY.

To Plan for More Active Support of University.

A conference of the Alumni of the University of California will be held in Berkeley on the afternoon of Charter Day, March 23rd. Seventy-five or one hundred of the Alumni are expected to be present, including representatives from every county in the State. President Wheeler will place before the Conference a statement of the needs, prospects and ambitions of the University.

The purpose of the Conference is to more closely connect the Alumni with the undertakings of the University and interest them in its affairs. The delegates will be the most representative university men of the districts they are from, and will be taken from all professions.

In the evening of Charter Day a reception to President and Mrs. Wheeler will be held at the Mark Hopkins Institute of Art under the auspices of the Associated Alumni. The new addition to the Art Gallery will be opened to those present. Admission will be by ticket. Tickets will be issued to all the Alumni and to the invited guests, including the faculty and regents.

The committee arranging for the Conference is composed of Messrs. T. A. Perkins, L. de F. Bartlett, Gaston E. Bacon, Dr. J. D. Hodgen and Dr. d'Ancona. The committee for the reception consists of the President of the Council, Dr. L. Van Orden, Miss Emma Hefty, and Messrs. C. S. Green and C. C. Judson.

Geological Lecture.

The subject of the University Extension Lecture on some important events in the Geological History of the Pacific Coast, which was given last night by Dr. H. W. Fairbanks at the Y. M. C. A. building in San Francisco, was different from that announced.

Instead of speaking on "The Origin of the Sierra Mountains, the Cascades and the Great Basin Ranges" as was arranged, Dr. Fairbanks lectured on "The Earthquakes of California and their Effects Upon the Topography."

The lecture announced for last night will be delivered on next Thursday evening.

Wednesday afternoon Professor John Fryer addressed the ladies of the Century Club, San Francisco, on the subject of "The Language and Literature of China."

CLASS FIELD-DAY POSTPONED. Plans Concerning Nature of the Contest.

The continued bad weather has interfered, to a great degree, with track work during the past week and has left the field in such bad shape that the interclass field day must be postponed still another week. But as this date is that upon which the Affiliated Colleges was scheduled, the two events will come off together. Two methods for bringing off the field day are proposed. One is to have a triple meet wherein all three contesting teams will run independently of one another. The other proposition is to hold the field day with the two lower classes combined against the team from across the bay. The first, second and third places won by the Freshmen and Sophomores, regardless of the Affiliated Colleges, will count in the inter-class contest. The latter scheme will probably be carried out.

Executive Committee Meets.

The Executive Committee of the A. S. U. C. met yesterday at 10:20 a. m. Those present were President Dorety, Martin, Moran, Eshleman and Carter.

The report of the auditing committee upon C. E. Thomas' report of finances of the Thanksgiving Show and of President Wheeler's lecture was presented and accepted. The auditing of Manager Tully's report of the Musical Clubs' Northern trip was also accepted. Inasmuch as Manager Franklin's report was not accompanied with vouchers in due form, his report was not accepted.

The Astronomy of Precision.

Astronomer W. T. Hussey, of the Lick Astronomical Department, completed his course of lectures yesterday on "The Astronomy of Precision." He traced the growth of exact mathematical astronomy from the earliest times, and dwelt upon the practical benefit that this branch of the service has been to the world at large, especially in nautical observations.

The Chemistry Department of the University of California has just received an extensive collection of organic chemicals from Kahlbaum & Co. of Berlin. This makes the California collection one of the largest and best in America.

Intercollegiate Preliminaries.

The date of the first preliminaries for the Intercollegiate debate has been fixed for March 20th, the place as usual to be Stiles Hall. If there be any second preliminaries they will take place March 22nd. Entries and other details are somewhat uncertain as yet, but announcements may be looked for on the North Hall bulletin board.

Baseball Tomorrow.

If the weather clears in time to permit, it the Varsity will play the Santa Clara College nine tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The Santa Claras have been defeated twice this year, once by Stanford and again by California. In their last game with Stanford, however, the Cardinal was defeated by a close score.

University Association Meeting.

At the second annual meeting of the University Association of America, which was organized in Chicago two weeks ago by the leading universities of the country, the subjects to be discussed will be the migration of graduate students and the requirements for the granting of higher degrees.

President Wheeler says that the organization of this Association is one of the most important events in the history of education in America. No such co-operative movement has ever before been attempted. Only in France, where all the universities are under the direction of the Government, has anything of the kind ever been known.

Dr. George Holmes Howison, Mills Professor of Intellectual and Moral Philosophy and Civil Polity, who is spending a year at Oxford engaged in philosophical writing, has been elected an honorary member of the Common Room by the fellows of Balliol College, Oxford. The Commencement Period.
 Attention is called by the University authorities to the action taken last May by the Academic Council with reference to the Commencement period.

1. The Commencement period extends from the morning of Thursday preceding Commencement Day to the evening of that day, namely, Wednesday evening (this year May 16th).
2. The first four days of this period, namely, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, are reserved for undergraduate exercises, such as Class Day, exhibitions by students' clubs, the baccalaureate sermon or address, etc.
3. The last three days, namely, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, are reserved to the University authorities, to the alumni and to such societies connected with the University as represent the higher academic pursuits in some public way.
4. In particular, in 1900, Class Day falls on Thursday, May 10th, the baccalaureate sermon on Sunday, May 13th, and the Commencement exercises on Wednesday, May 16th, at 10:15 a. m.
