### EDITOR CHOSEN.

#### EARLE THE ONLY NOMINEE.

#### Dixley and Karmel Named as Candidates for Manager.

The meeting of the Sophomore Class was called Friday with President Eshleman presiding. The minutes of previous meeting were read and approved. The president announced the appointment of Miss Lydia L. Dozier and Miss Florence Kimball on the executive committee, and declared R. R. Service chairman of the committee. The other candidates having withdrawn, W. A. Powell was declared elected track captain of the Sophomore Class. The committee of arrangements of the minstrel show reported that as the date set for the show was too close to the time set for the University entertainments, a financial success could not be assured. Further, the talent desired for the minstrel show would be engaged with the University performances. For these reasons the committee suggested that the plan of having a class minstrel show be abandoned. The report of the committee was accepted. Moved, seconded and carried that a twenty-five cent assessment be levied to raise the existing debt of the class.

President Eshleman appointed the following committee to collect this assessment: Chairman, Miss Mabel Jarvig, Miss Lydia L. Dozier, Miss Mary Jewett, Du Ray Smith, Wm. Ross, Calvin O. Esterley.

The nominations for editor and business manager of the 1902 Blue and Gold were then in order. J. J. Earle was nominated for editor and Henry Pixley and Isaac Karmel were nominated for business manager. A committee of five, composed of William Robbins, Weed, Monroe E. Deutsch, Challon R. Parker and Shirley Walker, was elected to take charge of the election to be held Tuesday, March 13th. The meeting then adjourned.

#### De Regnier at Harvard.

Henri de Regnier, the celebrated French poet who is to deliver a course of five lectures at this University on modern French poetry, from April 17th to 25th, is now at Harvard University, where he is delivering a course of seven lectures before the Cercle Francais.

### VICTORIOUS.

#### FIREMAN'S FUND DEFEATED.

#### Stanford Wins in One of the Poorest Games of the Season.

The Varsity was defeated in its second game with Santa Clara last Saturday afternoon at Santa Clara. The game was the closest and most exciting of any played this season, the final score being 5 to 6. In the first inning California scored two runs while but one man could cross the plate for Santa Clara. In the third and fourth innings California allowed three of their opponents to score. In the eighth inning the Varsity brought two men in making the score 5 to 4 in their favor. Santa Clara managed to score two in the last inning which won for them the game.

Hunter played the star game of the day. Kaarsberg did good work but did not equal the record he made in the last match with Santa Clara in which he struck out ten men. King and Kaarsberg led in batting with two hits apiece credited to them. A single error was counted against each team. Santa Clara has now won a game and lost one from each of the college teams.

The events of the current year in the University's history recall to the mind the Renaissance period. Its great events are known throughout the land and indeed in other lands. Another of its features concerns almost exclusively us of the University community, something of which we alone and not the outside public have a true conception—Mrs. Hearst's hospitalities to all the University. No one, when her plans were announced, had any idea of the bounty and the scope with which they were to be carried on. But each week brings around added hospitalities, entertainments to the whole College the like of which neither this nor any other University ever knew. In our wonder it is personally and individually difficult even to define our grateful feelings much less to express them adequately.

From the community standpoint the personal associations which Mrs. Hearst is instrumental in bringing about are the complement of those great events which in the public eye constitute our renaissance. In Hearst Hall more than anywhere else goes on that life of internal intercourse of the University community which propagates the spirit of ascendant California. This intercourse of itself should be enough to do great things for our fellow feeling with one another and for our loyalty to the University. As not alone a contemporary but as also part of those other great events, it ought to do wonders for the foundation of student community of interest and for added devotion to California. If we are enjoying a true renaissance as we fondly hope, it should accomplish these benefits both to each individual and to community interests. And these it can accomplish if we seek from it and through it to gain them both.

**Special Freshman Meeting.**

A special meeting of the Class of 1903 was called to order last Friday afternoon at 3:45 p. m. The cause for the calling of the special meeting was the sudden death Friday

morning of Charles C. Carter, a member of the class and its first president. Upon motion a committee of three, consisting of Messrs. F. T. Berry, C. F. Stern and C. G. Bailey, was appointed by President Sibley to draw up, and send, resolutions of condolence to the parents of the deceased. Another committee was appointed to arrange for floral pieces, upon which committee were Misses McCleave and Baldrige; Messrs. Jackson, Maddux, Jones and Moriarty.

Out of respect to the memory of Mr. Carter and because of the gloom which his death has spread over the whole class, Mrs. Hearst did not receive the members of the Class of 1903 at Hearst Hall Saturday.

**University Degrees.**

It is probable that the total number of degrees to be conferred in the colleges at Berkeley during 1899-1900 will reach 247, as against 226 last year and 233 in the year before. This proportion has been maintained for several years, the men gaining in the Engineering Colleges and the women in the Colleges of Letters and Sciences. There is a marked rise in the number to take the Bachelor's Degree—from 203 to 232. There will be little increase, if any, in the number to gain advanced degrees. In spite of the increasing list of students in the Graduate Department, the number who have been able to qualify for advanced degrees under the high standards set by the Graduate Council has not been great.

Just 152 of the 332 candidates for the bachelor's degree entered the University as regular students and candidates for degrees four years ago. Of the regular Freshman entering at that time, only these 152, or 46.5 per cent. of those who entered, are still with the class. This is about the usual proportion, or a little less. It is noticeable that a larger percentage of the women than of the men (59.4 per cent. as against 39.6 per cent.) who began regular courses four years ago have carried these courses nearly to completion.
