## QUESTION FOR DEBATE IN DOUBT.

### STANFORD WILL NOT CHOOSE.

#### University Presidents Object to Subject Proposed.

The Debating Committee of Stanford University telegraphed yesterday evening that owing to the action of the Presidents of the two Universities they would not at present select their side upon the question submitted by California. Presidents Jordan and Wheeler in discussing the question, "Resolved, That the Army canteen should be abolished," considered that it would be injudicious to debate the subject, and hence the action which Stanford has taken.

The position which Stanford has assumed will probably interfere with the preliminaries. As previously arranged these were to take place on March 20th and 22nd and the finals on the 26th. It is probable that these debates will be postponed.

In regard to the matter of arbitrating the question as to where the intercollegiate debate shall be held, the committee of the University of California has informed the Stanford committee that after canvassing the opinion of the student body it would be impossible for California to concede anything further and, hence, the question of arbitration must of necessity be dropped.

#### Sophomore Committee.

The Students' Congress will meet tonight in Stiles Hall. There is to be an election of officers for the ensuing term. The debate will be on the question "Resolved, That the Army canteen should be continued." Kennedy '00, Dickson '01 and Talbot '00 will support the ministry, while Downer '01, Weiler '03 and Edwards '01 will argue for the opposition.

## FIELD DAY NEXT SATURDAY.

## SECOND CONCERT

### AT HEARST HALL.

#### LARGE AUDIENCE PRESENT.

#### Entertainment at Macdonough Theater on March 17th.

The second concert of the Musical Clubs was held yesterday afternoon in Hearst Hall. The hall proved incapable of holding all those who desired to attend and as a consequence many were compelled to stand. Financially the concert was a grand success, and it is estimated that the three concerts will net the Musical Clubs at least three hundred dollars.

The Clubs were assisted by Frederick S. Knight, tenor, Charles E. Parcels '95, violinist, E. G. Kuster '00, cellist, H. G. Poheim '00, violinist and F. G. Goodenow '01, pianist.

An "Interrupted Serenade," sung by Du Ray Smith '02, was especially well received. The concert was on the whole very creditable. It showed evidence of hard and careful practice but lacked the free and easy and confident execution, which amateurs find it difficult to attain. Tully gave some entertaining reminiscences of the Northern trip, but his Dutch dialect, which is eminently suited for rapid dialogue, is not so well adapted for monologue. Mr. Charles E. Parcels '95 rendered an admirable violin solo entitled "Les Adieu."

Next Saturday night, March 17th, the Musical Clubs will give a concert in the Macdonough Theater, Oakland. The program will consist of a violin solo by Poheim '00, Schwartz '01 and Tully '01 will appear in their new "double-decked Dutch" specialty and George T. Gray of the Affiliated Colleges will give a Chinese impersonation. A monologue will be given by Harris '01 and the "Rough House" Sextet will also appear on the program.

The concert will be essentially the same as was given throughout the State upon the recent trips of the Clubs. It is expected that the Oakland students will assure the Musical Clubs a good house.

The Botanical garden has received a valuable donation from D. F. Franceschi of Santa Barbara, consisting of seeds and well-rooted plants of the following rare species: Acacia Cavenia, the "Cavan" or "Espino" of Chile, an ornamental hedge plant exceedingly useful on account of the strong opines with which it is freely provided. The pods contain about 32 per cent of a tannin particularly valuable as a dye-material. Salpiglossa rhomboidea a small South American shrub, producing edible berries of vinous taste. Indigopera Avil, one of the shrubs yielding commercial indigo, and a native of the West Indies, South America and Fiji Islands.

**The Caspian Oil Fields.**

Dr. Andrew L. Lawson, Professor of Geology and Mineralogy, lectured at the California Academy of Sciences Monday evening on "The Mineral Wealth of Russia with Particular Reference to the Caspian Oil Fields." The lecture was illustrated with lantern slides. Professor Lawson's address embodied the results of personal investigation, as he has himself traveled through Russia and studied its geology.
