TRACK TEAM MEETS ARRANGED.

TWO MORE DATES SET.

Field Days to Be Held With Wisconsin and Michigan.

Arrangements are being rapidly completed by Manager Decoto for the Eastern trip of the Track Team. The schedule of field days with Eastern colleges was practically closed when on March 12th the manager received telegrams from the Universities of Wisconsin and Michigan announcing their willingness to meet California. According to the arrangements the team will meet the University of Michigan on June 9th. On the 13th of June at the same place, California will contest with Wisconsin.

Yesterday a letter was received by Manager Decoto from Yale, stating that that college was very glad she would have an opportunity to meet California on May 5th in a field contest; that the date, though inconvenient for Yale, it being but two days before her meet with Harvard, would not interfere with the previous arrangements. There were two conditions, however, that Yale insisted on in her letter. The first one was that the meet should be carried on under the rules of the American Amateur Athletic Association; and the second, that each contestant should file an affidavit, attested by the Dean of the College from which he came, that he is a bona fide member of the University of California.

The College has already begun to direct its efforts towards making the trip a financial success. Work along this line will be taken up in a systematic manner, each class appointing committees to discuss ways and means, as well as to collect contributions. Many of the alumni have also promised to aid financially. These efforts, together with the returns that the Week of Entertainments are expected to give, will place the proposed trip on a firm financial footing.

President Martin of the Senior Class has appointed the following committee to meet Manager Decoto at 11:15 on Wednesday, in Room 16, North Hall: Messrs. Dorey, Miller, Roland, Oliver, Hoffman, McCullough, Skaffe, Peck; Misses Jewett, Nathan, Linscott and Bortomes. This committee will meet to discuss ways and means for aiding the financial success of the proposed Eastern trip.

GYMNASIUM WORK IN THE EAST.

Professor Magee on Athletic Work in Other Colleges.

During the two months journey in the East, from which Director Walter E. Magee of the University of California gymnasium, and Mrs. Magee, woman assistant in physical culture, have just returned, nearly every university of importance in the country was visited, and at each a careful study made of the gymnasium equipment, the methods employed, the administration of athletics and the facilities for athletic sports.

"There is a most striking difference," said Professor Magee yesterday, "between the appearance of the students at those universities where gymnasium work is compulsory, and those where it is merely optional. Especially in the colleges where military instruction is combined with compulsory gymnasium exercise is the carriage, bearing and physical condition of the young men noticeable and worthy of admiration. An interesting contrast is offered at the University of Nebraska, where gymnasium work is prescribed for all women for the first two years, but is merely optional with the men. The general appearance of the women was noticeably better than that of the male students.

"It is a noticeable fact that the gymnasium work for women at many American colleges exceeds in effectiveness the gymnasium work for men. This has come about, I believe, because of the great agitation there has been in favor of physical training for women, and because of the realization that the college girl is particularly in need of systematic physical exercise.

"An interesting feature of college life for women is the growth of interest in outdoor sports. At Vassar there are excellent opportunities for rowing and sailing in summer, and skating and ice boating in winter, on the Hudson. Basketball is very popular, golf too, and there is a track on which the college girls practice for the high jump and sprints, and other sports.

"A popular feature of the gymnasium, at a great many of the universities which I visited, is the swimming tank. Columbia has the finest natatorium in the country. The white marble pool, of apsidal shape is 150 by 50 feet on its axis and contains 200,000 gallons of water. It is warmed in winter. The depth varies from four to ten feet.

PROFESSOR PLEHN'S LECTURE.

The Industrial Revolution in China His Subject.

Last evening at the Mark Hopkins Art Institute Professor Plehn delivered the first address of the series on the Commerce of the Pacific. His topic was the "Industrial Revolution in China." He drew an analogy between the industrial revolutions that have taken place in England and Europe in the past and the one that is now taking place in China. The effect of the introduction of machinery into China today is analogous, he showed, with the changes induced by mechanical innovations of England and Europe during the period of their industrial awakening. The results of the changes are productive of both good and evil. The revolution in China, now that it has begun, he said, is advancing with rapid strides; development is progressing on a large scale to suit the needs of a large population.

The industrial development of China since 1896 was then considered. Special reference was made to the opening up of the rivers and the rapid extension of the railway system of the country, as well as to the growth of the Treaty ports. The leasing of Chinese land to foreign individuals and corporations was another topic of discussion.

The theme of Professor Plehn's discussion is of vital interest, especially at the present time.

University Visitors.

On last Monday at the drill hour Mrs. Phoebe Hearst with Mme. Berrada, Mme. Ahumada, wife of the Governor of Chihuahua, Mexico, and Miss Annie Wheeler, daughter of General Joe Wheeler, visited the drill of the battalions and afterwards made a tour of inspection around the college grounds. The women's rooms at South Hall, recently fitted up for the accommodation of the women students of the University by Mrs. Hearst, were also visited.

THE editor of next year's Blue and Gold denies the statement that he intends to abolish entirely the humorous element from his volume. This announcement will be received with general approbation. Some individuals care only for the humorous side of the book and await its appearance as they would that of a comic weekly. Such an interest in it is not worth catering to, but the book has a more substantial mission than this and the humorous element has a place in it. As an annual student chronicle of the University's history, the Blue and Gold not only would be of very small interest if it consisted merely of catalogues and statistics, but also without the humorous element it would fall short of its mission by failing to record in this way the student life and happenings. This province of course has been and easily may be extended to an objectionable degree. But primarily there is a large field both of people and affairs which may be best recorded in this light, and which may moreover be so recorded that the subject will gain as much enjoyment from it as the spectators. For malice and personal injury there is no place. The Blue and Gold may be depended upon in another direction, to express with considerable accuracy public opinion. That it expresses this in personalities is because in the limited and peculiar province of a College community, public opinion is held largely in terms of personalities. Here it serves as a warning to those who run counter to the general sentiment and so benefits both the community and the transgressor. For such reasons, and not as a traditional right from which as much as possible is to be gotten, should

this feature of the College annual be perpetuated.

THE production in San Francisco of the Junior Farce with all the original cast means no small effort for all those concerned. It furnishes many instances on the part of the participators of personal effort and sacrifice "for the sake of California" which may well serve as an example to others. In addition to profiting by the example, it remains for others to give as much support and to make the effort as easy and as agreeable as possible for those who are to participate.

Question for Debate.

The committee appointed for the consideration of a question for debate between California and Stanford has decided that it will not be advisable to debate the "Cauteen" question. On or before Thursday of this week another question will be submitted to Stanford. The preliminaries will be announced later.

GYMNASIUM WORK IN THE EAST.

The pool is illuminated by electric lights placed around the sides and beneath the surface of the water.

"At Cornell, gymnasium work is obligatory for two years, and special attention is given to those who need individual attention. This year there are sixty-six candidates for the college crew, with Mr. Courtney as coach. The method of training consists of ten minutes work on the rowing machine, beginning with thirty strokes to the minute and gradually working up to forty and finishing with a spurt. Then the men go to the gymnasium to take special exercise. The work ends with a mile run in slow time. Cornell, like Wisconsin, has advantages possessed by few colleges in the facilities for aquatic sports offered by its proximity to the lakes. In winter ice-boating, skating, hockey and similar sports are popular.

"The magnificent Yale gymnasium was built for the university by the alumni at a cost of \$250,000. The Vanderbilts gave \$20,000 for the entrance and staircase. The shower baths, the Turkish baths, the swimming tank and the two rowing tanks are fitted up in the most elaborate fashion. Besides the gymnasium proper there are departments for swimming, boxing, wrestling, fencing, broad-sword, single stick and bowling alleys. More attention is paid to individual work at Yale than at any other university in the East, except perhaps at Harvard. Regular classes are formed perhaps twice a week, but the work is not compulsory. Each student is charged five dollars a year for gymnasium privileges whether he uses the gymnasium or not. The Yale field, situated about a mile from the University, is one of the finest athletic grounds in the country.

"The Hemenway gymnasium, erected by Augustus Hemenway of Boston, at an original cost of \$110,000 was when built, the best probably in the world, and is still a magnificent affair though it suffers by comparison with the modern palaces devoted to gymnasium work, such as those of Columbia and Yale. The Harvard gymnasium is well equipped with modern apparatus. It is due to Dr. Sargent, more than to any

man in the country, that we have the developing appliances which can today be prescribed for individual work. Harvard's 'Soldiers' Field' already has every facility for outdoor work, including space for football, the quarter-mile running track with 220 straightway; a diamond adjacent to the football grounds; bleachers surrounding the football field with a capacity of 12,000; a baseball cage, and training quarters close at hand; and a boathouse on the Charles River. When the present plans are carried out Harvard's athletic field will be the finest in the United States.

"At Vassar, Bryn Mawr, Smith and Wellesley, the gymnasium work is prescribed for a portion of the course. At Wellesley where there are splendid facilities for boating, much attention is given to the training of the college crew, and the girls also run the hare and hounds, play basket ball, tennis and lacrosse, and engage in skating and other winter sports. The Smith gymnasium was built by a friend at a cost of \$35,000. I have never seen in any woman's college gymnasium work superior to that done at Smith.

"Adjoining Johns Hopkins gymnasium is a covered court 65x140 feet in size and forty feet high. It has also a cinder track of sixteen laps to the mile. This court is undoubtedly the finest of its kind in existence. It affords ample space for the practice of all outdoor sports, including lacrosse, in which Johns Hopkins excels.

"The West Point gymnasium is similar in its equipment to that of the University of California, with the exception that it has a large swimming tank, a feature of which California is in great need. The work at West Point is by far the best that I have seen anywhere.

Only Columbia, Wisconsin and Minnesota exceed us in this respect. The enlarged gymnasium will accommodate a class of 300 at one time."
