UNIVERSITY CREW IN TRAINING.

BOATING INTEREST INCREASES

Arrangements Made for Race With Columbia Club.

Captain Frank V. Kington of the University Rowing Association's four-oared crew, concluded negotiations with the Columbia Rowing Club Tuesday for a race to be rowed on either March 31st or April 7th. About two weeks ago the Columbias intimated that they would like a race, and Tuesday's agreement resulted.

The University Association, stirred by President Wheeler's determined effort to revive rowing in the California University, decided some time ago to put out a crew this year if possible, and the men have been training for some time under the coaching of S. T. Pembroke an enthusiastic and experienced oarsman. The crew consists of Frank V. Kington '03, captain and stroke; John W. Barnes '00, afterwaist; David Goodale '00, number two; Minot E. Scott '02, bow.

The race with the Columbia Club crew will be in the junior barge class over a mile course. There will probably be singles as well, though no arrangements have as yet been made for the latter event.

The University Rowing Association has begun a complete renovation of the boat-house and is overhauling its boats and adding dressing-rooms and lockers for the large number of new members recently added to its rolls.

A standing challenge has been issued to Stanford and upon its acceptance, boating will be instituted as a regular intercollegiate sport.

REGENTS TRANSACT BUSINESS.

Mrs. Hearst Provides for Archaeological Research.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Board of Regents was held Tuesday afternoon in Mark Hopkins Institute of Art in San Francisco. The Regents present at the meeting were Judge Wallace (chairman), Miller, Denicke, Budd, Houghton, Slack, Rowell, Dr. Pardee, Foote, Neff, Anderson, Waymire and Mrs. Hearst. President Wheeler announced that experts of acknowledged repute had been engaged to make excavations and explorations in those parts of the world rich with relics of ancient learning. The entire expense of work will be borne by Mrs. Hearst. On motion of President Wheeler a vote of appreciation and thanks was tendered to Mrs. Hearst.

In Egypt, probably the richest country in archaeological specimens, Dr. George A. Reisner will have charge of the explorations. Dr. Reisner was formerly of the Berlin Museum and of the Cairo Museum. He has been engaged for five years. Dr. Uhle, another noted archaeologist, will pursue investigations in South America and Yucatan. California, New Mexico and Mexico will be searched for specimens by Dr. Philip Mills Jones. A start has already been made in this State in the Tulare region, where several mounds have been explored. Dr. Alfred Emerson, recently professor in the Athens School of Archaeology, is now on his way to this State to confer with Mrs. Hearst in regard to the work in Greece and Etruria. The materials collected by the scientists will be placed in the archaeological museum to be established at Berkeley.

Several professors of the University were granted leaves of absence in order that they may attend scientific congresses which are to be held during the Paris Exposition. Professor Rising was voted a leave of absence until October. Professor Rising is to act as a juror at the exposition, and is also a delegate to the fourth international convention of applied chemists. Professor Irving Stringham will attend the international congress of mathematicians at Paris, and will not return to Berkeley until Sept. 1st. Professors Rising and Stringham and Professor Le Conte, who was granted a leave of absence at the special meeting of the Board on February 1st, were accredited as representatives of the University. PROF. LEUSCHNER RETURNS.

Standing of the Astronomy Department in the East.

Professor Leuschner returned from his Eastern trip Tuesday evening on the Overland Limited. He reports a pleasant and enjoyable trip. Professor Leuschner was one of the two delegates sent from the University of California to the meeting of the Association of American universities which was recently held in Chicago.

At the first meeting of the Association, Professor Leuschner was made temporary secretary. He has now in his possession all the minutes, resolutions and other documents of the Association, which he will arrange and forward to the permanent secretary of the Association, President W. R. Harper of the University of Chicago.

Professor Leuschner was very agreeably surprised to learn that Eastern astronomers regarded the work of the Astronomical Department of the University of California with a high degree of favor. Professor Simon Newcomb of Washington, Director Hale of the Yerke's Observatory, Professor Brown, Director of the United States Naval Observatory, Professor Pritchett, and others spoke of the excellent work done at the Students' Observatory at this University, and of the remarkable success achieved by student experimenters here. Professor Hale, of the Yerke's Observatory, intends to introduce into the University of Chicago the same method of instruction as that in use in the Astronomical Department of the University of California.

Professor Leuschner, while in Washington, was a guest of Professor Pritchett at the Cosmos Club, the leading scientific club of that city. He visited several scientific bureaus and saw a great deal of Professor Moses who was also stopping at the Cosmos Club.

Student Canvassers.

Yesterday afternoon those students who volunteered to canvass for the sale of tickets for the Student's Course of lectures were assigned their respective territories and given tickets. About one hundred persons applied for these tickets. Professor Clapp announces that those wishing to report upon the success of their work may do so on Friday, in Room 8, North Hall. Those, however, who are not in a position to report will be given ample time.

THE BOURDON CEREMONY.

May Be Abolished and Donation Made to Eastern Trip.

The Bourdon Committee of the Freshman Class met yesterday afternoon to discuss the advisability of holding the customary Bourdon ceremonies this year. There seems to be a strong feeling in the class in favor of giving the Track Team the amount which the Bourdon would cost and doing away entirely with the celebration. Next Friday at the Student's Hour a class meeting will be held and the Bourdon committee will then ask for an appropriation of \$200 to defray the expenses of the Bourdon ceremonies. In this way it is hoped to obtain an opinion of the class as to whether it would be best to dispense with the Bourdon entirely and give the funds to the Track Team, or to make no contributions as a class to the team, or to have a modified Bourdon and as a class give a certain amount to defray the expenses of the Eastern trip.

CONFERENCE OF ALUMNI.

Needs and Prospects of the University to Be Discussed.

The arrangements for the Charter Day exercise have not yet reached a very definite stage. Neither the nature of the morning exercises nor the speakers have as yet been decided upon.

In the afternoon the alumni conference composed of graduates from every part of the state will meet to discuss the needs and prospects of the University. The meeting will be thoroughly representative of the various colleges of the University of California, both professional and academic and of the various parts of the State. A special effort is being made to draw graduates to the conference from distant places. Great interest is being shown in the conference by alumni throughout the whole of California. Special rates have been made by the railroads and preparations are being made for the entertainment of the visitors during their stay in Berkeley.

In the evening a reception to President and Mrs. Wheeler will be held at the Mark Hopkins Institute of Art. There will be music and some speaking, the greater part of the evening, however, being given to the reception proper.

About two hundred new volumes, scientific and miscellaneous, have been received at the Library.

REGENTS TRANSACT BUSINESS.

Bailey, who will sever his connection with the institution at the end of the present academic year, was granted a leave of absence from April 1st to the end of the term. C. L. Cory, associate professor of electrical engineering, will engage in private business during the coming year, but will retain his title without salary.

Upon the recommendation of President Wheeler the following appointments were made in the post-graduate medical school: Dr. T. B. Leland and Dr. Wilson Shields, internal medicine; Dr. James M. Black and Dr. Conrad Well, surgery, and Dr. S. M. Mouser, bacteriology. The resignation of Dr. W. E. Hopkins as professor of ophthalmology was accepted.

The Academic Council, in a communication to the Board, recommended that part of the income from the medal fund be devoted to defraying the expenses of the medalist in post-graduate work, but the Regents decided that such use of the money was impossible on account of the terms imposed by the donors when the gift was made. The entire income was then ordered to be used in purchasing a medal for the most distinguished student of the graduating class. President Wheeler announces that on February 22nd, at the commemoration exercises of the Johns Hopkins University, President Gilman had presented him, as the representative of the University, with a rare volume about Berkeley in the early days. Two communications from Marsden Manson in regard to a new State Constitution and the conservation of the waste waters of the State, were referred to a committee composed of Judge Wallace, Foote and Reinsteip.

President Wheeler announced at the close of the meeting that at the next session of the Board he would recommend a number of changes in the faculty of the University.
