Bears, Olympians Clash Tomorrow

Yearlings, Modesto J. C. Also In Bargain Double Bill; Rain Forecast; Hamilton Optimistic

California's entire track and field forces, both Varsity and freshmen, will be turned loose at 2 p.m. tomorrow in Edwards stadium in a bargain double meet.

Two contests, Varsity vs. Olympic Club and freshmen vs. Modesto Junior college, will be presented simultaneously and Varsity Coach Brutus Hamilton promises that "something will be doing all the time."

Although rain has been forecast for the meet, Hamilton is still optimistic as to tomorrow's weather. If the precipitation lets up by 10 a.m. tomorrow, Hamilton stated that the track will be ready by 2 p.m. If the contest is held there promises to be a sizeable crowd because the competing Stanford-Fresno meet has been postponed.

CLUB GIVEN EDGE

According to the pre-dope sheets, the visiting squad has the edge, roughly about 70-61. However, Coach Hamilton yesterday made two changes in the Bear roster which may swing the balance the other way.

Clarence Barnes will run the 220 as well as the 440 and Denzil Widell will compete exclusively in the quarter-mile.

The opening Varsity event of the day, the mile run, may be the turning point of the meet. The race appears to be a toss-up between Dick Peter for California and Olympic Club's Dick Preston and Cecil Cole. Cole, however, is a doubtful starter.

440 IS TOSS-UP

Equally important and equally doubtful as to outcome is the second event, the quarter-mile. Four of the entrants are just about even, namely, California's Widell, Barnes and John Reese and Clubman Elton Wieman.

The 880-yard event may prove outstanding to California rooters since there is an opportunity for a Bear clean-sweep. Warren and Wesley Craig and Shirley Summers are in a little better condition than Bill McCurdy, the leading Cub entry, and might garner nine points between them.

Students will be admitted free to the meet upon presentation of student body cards. General admission will be 50 cents and for high school students, 25 cents.

Rain Prevents Crew Meet With Jaysees

Fresh Contest Postponed Due to Near Flood On Sacramento River

It took near flood conditions to stop California's freshman crew, but the elements succeeded in their mission.

Scheduled to meet the Sacramento Junior college varsity and junior varsity on the Sacramento river today, Coach Russ Nagler received notice late yesterday that the meet would have to be postponed indefinitely.

The message said that due to the heavy rains of the past few days the river has risen ten feet in two days and impending flood conditions have forced the postponement of the race.

Although the capital city crew visits the Oakland estuary April 27, Nagler expressed the hope that a home-and-home race would still be possible this season.

Original plans of holding the meet next week faded when it was found that the Jaysee oarsmen travel south at that time to match strokes with the UCLA eight.

If the match is not re-scheduled within the next four weeks it will mean that the yearling crewmen will have to go against the University of Washington's frosh without any preliminary competition, when the two boats meet in April.

The freshmen will resume practice today on the estuary devoting the majority of the time to racing starts and sprints.

STUB'S ALTERATIONS After talking about the changes down at UCLA in football I guess we oughta take a look around our own backyard because there are plenty of switches coming out of the head of Stub Allison down at spring practice.

Among the more important changes is that of Jerry Lutes, two year veteran at right half, to the tailback post. Lutes held the position as a freshman. Joe Merlo who played last season as a quarter-back is now listed as a right tackle. Morley Mathewson has changed sides of the line, playing right end again.

Bill Hutters, who moved into the fullback breach when Ted Hubert was hurt last year, is back again at quarterback. Gene Witter and Walt Gordon Jr. are also back at the signal-calling post.

ELLIS AT GUARD Changes from last year's frosh now find Captain Jim Jurkovich at right half, plugging the spot vacated by Louie Smith. Cal Ellis, a tackle, is at right guard.

Some of last season's Ramblers have felt the Allison switch. Hank Zacharias, formerly a fullback, is a left half. Don Warhurst, who played end and center as a yearling in '38, is back again at end. Walt Yatchmenoff is now at right guard. He formerly played center.

In addition to these changes Martin Beck, who rated equal raves with Bob Reinhard as a tackle two years ago on the Cubs, is back in school again. Beck dropped out in the middle of the year as a freshman.

BEARS LOOK GOOD It looks like the Stubber has done a general overhauling. He's experimenting with his material like Pasteur did with his germs. Allison is getting a good look at everyone, not caring to chance changes in the middle of the season when injuries start depleting the ranks. This was a cause for the poor season suffered by the Bear Varsity last year.
