**Local Residents Boycott Jobs in Support of March**

While black Americans filled the Mall in Washington D.C. yesterday for the Million Man March, some Berkeley residents who could not attend the event boycotted work to show their support.

Organizers of the march urged blacks to stay away from their jobs and not spend money yesterday to demonstrate the community's importance to the American economy.

A number of workers stayed away from their jobs yesterday, both on the UC Berkeley campus and in the surrounding area. Workers at the UC Berkeley Office of African American Student Development left for the day, posting a sign on the door explaining their absence.

The march would allow black men to "recommit themselves to each other, their family and the uplifting of the whole race," according to the sign attached to the door.

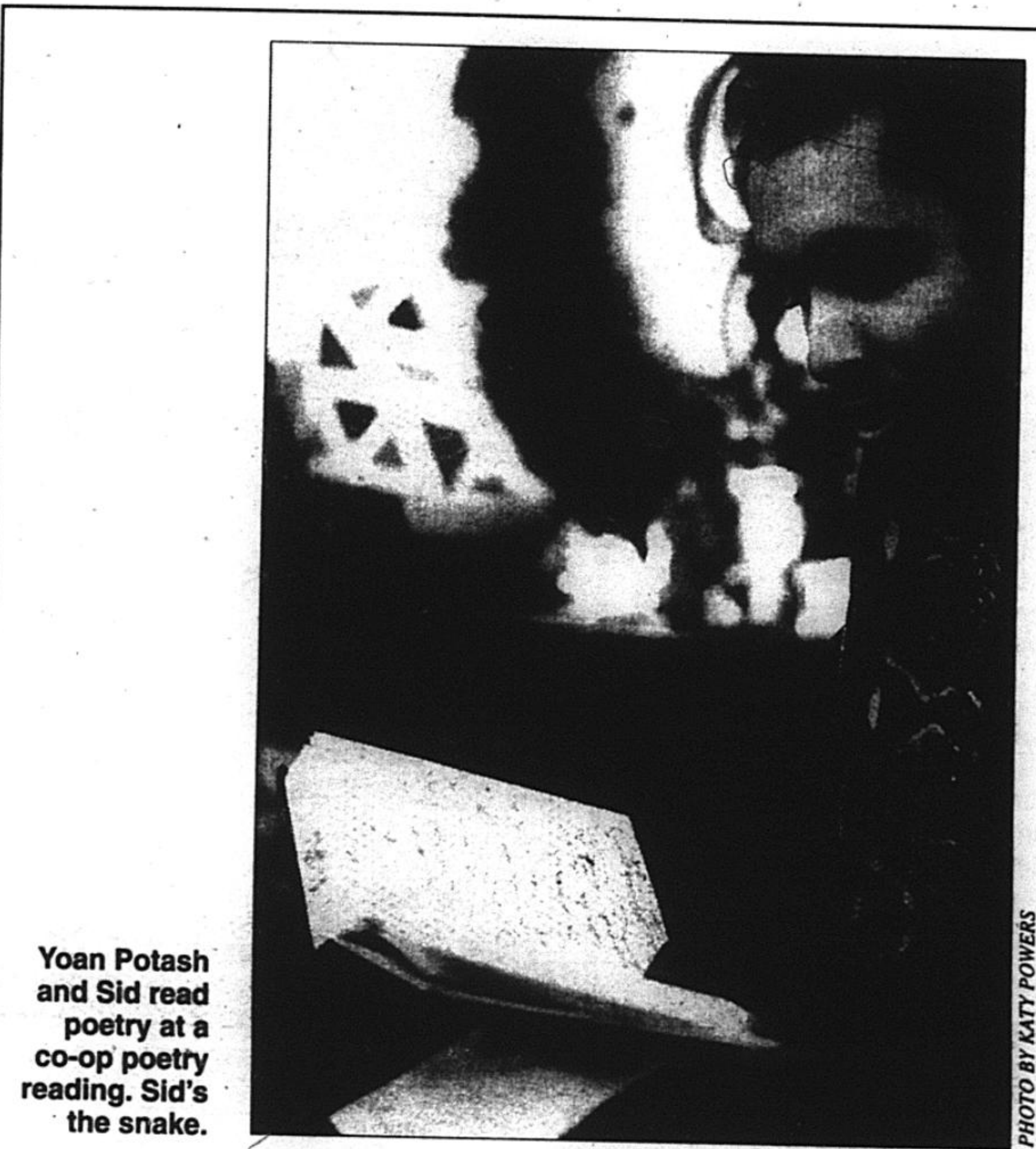
Though some school districts across the country, particularly the Washington D.C. district, shut classroom doors for the march and boycott, Berkeley school officials did not take similar action. Other city and university officials also did not sanction a day of boycotting.

The Black Muslim Bakery, Inc., located on San Pablo Avenue in Oakland, closed its doors yesterday, along with all other Black Muslim Bakeries in the country, to show solidarity for the march. Nation of Islam leader Louis Farrakhan delivered the keynote address and co-organized the event along with the Rev. Benjamin Chavis, former head of the NAACP.

dents, who are ready to snuggle up with pillows scattered about the den. The room is so unexpectedly cozy that even the floor offers a comfortable seat.

While cooperative parties often receive the most publicity, a wide range of lesser-known activities, from poetry readings to

**Revisionist Historian To Speak**

Irving disputes the scope of Holocaust

Controversial British historian David Irving will speak today in downtown Berkeley, one year after violence erupted at the local YWCA when he spoke about his revisionist views on the Holocaust.

Irving has published more than 20 books on World War II history and is known for his view that fewer people died in the Holocaust than mainstream historians claim.

His supporters call him a prolific British historian and say that he has been a victim of defamation and physical brutality for expressing what they call his expert opinion on the history of the Holocaust.

Irving attempted to speak in Berkeley last October at the YWCA on Bancroft Way, but more than 200 protesters interrupted the event. Violence erupted when demonstrators entered the facility, threw chairs and tables and assaulted several audience members, including Irving.

A few months later, a small group called the Berkeley Free Speech Coalition formed to organize another Irving speech on the UC Berkeley campus, but the event never took place.

**Cities Criticize Fire Response Cuts**

Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory officials yesterday criticized a public letter several city officials wrote last week about cutbacks in the lab's fire department, calling their concerns exaggerated and misleading.

On Oct. 6, city officials representing Berkeley, Oakland and Orinda sent the letter, asking lab Director Charles Shank to reconsider the cancellation of a fire response pact among the cities and the reduction of the lab's firefighting staffs.

According to the pact, known as the automatic aid agreement, Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory (LBNL) would send one of its six fire, rescue or hazardous materials units into the city of Berkeley or to the UC Berkeley campus to assist with fire protection when necessary.

The agreement's cancellation went into effect Oct. 1. Under a new mutual aid agreement, the lab's fire department will only respond to emergencies when requested to do so.

The letter stated that because of the lab's location, LBNL firefighters were often the first to arrive at fires in the hills.

"All of us believe that the history of wildland fires from 1923 to 1991 bears out our contention that the lab's firefighter cuts not only affect our surrounding communities, they seriously impact the lab itself," wrote the city officials. "Even when budgets are tight, public safety services must be maintained."

However, lab spokesperson Ron Kolb disagreed yesterday with the letter's contention that cuts mean increased danger to the community.

"In fact, the letter contains many misstatements and factual errors," Kolb said. "It greatly misrepresents the capabilities of the fire department to respond to emergencies."

Kolb said the lab "would not and could not" reconsider the cuts.

"This letter implies that we have endangered employees and members of the community," Kolb said. "That is a false statement."

The Berkeley mayor's office said yesterday that the cuts would have a serious impact on the community.

Mayoral Chief of Staff Amy Resner stated that the decision to end the automatic aid agreement would make firefighting harder. "You need a lot of manpower

to fight large fires," she said.

Lab fire Chief Wayne Nordby, who has opposed the cuts, said he appreciated the concern from the city authorities.

"I was very happy to see that kind of support from the political base and the professional fire community out there. They understand the cuts aren't conducive to the safety of the community," Nordby said yesterday.

"We will do what we have to do with the resources we are given, but there's a proper way to do things, and I don't think that it's in the best interest of good safe firefighting (to make the cuts)," he added.

**Faculty May Ask For Delay in Ending Affirmative Action**

Campus faculty may vote today to ask the UC Board of Regents for a one-year delay in eliminating race-based affirmative action policies in admissions and hiring.

Three motions concerning the university's diversity policies are on the agenda for a 3 p.m. Academic Senate meeting in the Bechtel Engineering Center's Sibley Auditorium today.

The Academic Senate meets twice a year and includes all UC Berkeley faculty members.

The first motion would voice approval for the regents' decision to grant special recognition to prospective students who have "suffered disadvantage economically or in terms of their social environment."

The other two motions challenge the regents' decision. The second motion asks to delay eliminating affirmative action for at least one year and to study the issue further so that "the admissions policy can be

# NEWS IN BRIEF

## Robberies May Be Linked

Police are investigating connections between a bank robbery that occurred Friday evening and other robberies that took place last month. The Bank of America branch located at 1536 Shattuck Ave. was robbed Friday evening, said Berkeley police Inspector Dan Wolke.

Police are investigating a connection between that robbery and two others that took place last month, including a robbery which occurred on Sept. 23 at the Wells Fargo Bank located at 2144 Shattuck. The thief in that case was described as a male in his early twenties, 5-foot-7, weighing approximately 180 pounds.

The Bank of America robber was described as a male in his late 20s to early 30s with jet black hair, last seen wearing a red and white shirt, Wolke said.

Another robbery which occurred in September at the Great Western Bank at 1801 Solano Ave. also may be connected, Wolke said. So far no arrests have been made in any of these robberies, Wolke said.

Also, a suspect was arrested Thursday evening in connection with another robbery at the Wells Fargo Bank at 1800 Solano Ave. earlier that day.

According to Wolke, Willie Sykes entered the bank and handed a demand note to the teller. After the teller gave Sykes an undisclosed amount of money, the suspect left the bank and went to a friend's house, where police later found him.

Police arrested Sykes after a short foot chase near the corner of Camelia Street and San Pablo Avenue, Wolke said.

## City May Trim More Trees

The city council will consider adopting a policy tonight to improve the maintenance of city-owned trees in Berkeley's hill area to guard against future fires.

Frederick Leif, chairperson of the fire assessment commission which was created after the devastating 1991 East Bay hills fire, said the city's trees are not maintained to the standards required of residents.

"When we plant a tree it's not a one time event," he said. "It's an ongoing obligation. Trees that are poorly maintained in the hill areas are a real liability."

Unless properly trimmed, the trees could act as a fuel ladder allowing ground fires to spread across tree tops, Lief said.

According to the fire assessment commission, residents in the hills spend at least \$4 million annually to comply with city fire inspectors requiring vegetation removal.

The city manager is recommending that the council delay any action until a report can be submitted in December. The cost of improving maintenance of the city's trees has not been determined.

Since the 1991 fire, local cities have made mutual aid pacts to improve the coordination of fire fighting. Berkeley has also conducted programs to remove hazardous underbrush in the hills to prevent future fires.

Berkeley fire Chief Gary Cates said the city has removed nearly 1,000 tons of vegetation in the past several years.

The Free Speech Coalition will also sponsor today's speech. Organizer Aftab Malik said yesterday that his group brought Irving to Berkeley in order to assert the historian's First Amendment right to free speech. The Coalition, which Malik said includes approximately 15 core members, hopes to eventually bring Irving to the UC Berkeley campus.

"Irving is being illegally denied campus facilities in violation of the Constitution, in violation of the First Amendment," Malik said.

Malik said his organization would not release the location of the speech, but said it would give that information to UC Berkeley students who contact the group in advance for tickets. Interested students had to call to guarantee their admittance to the event, and the Coalition promised to mail or hand-deliver the tickets.

At least two groups — the Bay Area Coalition Opposing Fascism and a group of Jewish UC Berkeley students — plan to organize events protesting Irving's appearance today.

The Coalition Opposing Fascism intends to rally at Berkeley BART at

2:30 p.m. today. If the group learns the site of Irving's speech, it will march there and demonstrate.

"We consider it a victory that he (Irving) can't publicize the location of his meeting and has to resort to surreptitious means. It shows that the amount of public opposition to his lies and revision of history is strong," said Luma Nichol, a member of the Coalition Opposing Fascism.

Also, a group of approximately 20 UC Berkeley Jewish students will hold a memorial service at noon today in front of Sather Gate dedicated to "the martyrs of hate."

"We are a component of the Jewish community at Cal that's coming together to form an opposition to David Irving and to educate the public about the real facts about the Holocaust. We feel that it's our duty as Jews and as ancestors of the people that died to remember," said Laliv Dramen, one of the organizers of the event.

Malik said his group encourages peaceful protest. "That of course is their right, and they should protest if that's what they believe. The only thing that we're concerned about is the kinds of violence and terrorism that occurred last year," he said.

with opportunities to meet people in other houses and to build a community.

"People that don't know a lot about co-ops associate us with the Cloyne problems and think of us as a bunch of weirdos," said junior Roberto Lewis, a Castro co-op resident, referring to last fall when 62 students moved out of Cloyne, citing dirty conditions and drug use among tenants.

Dan Einstein, a Lothlorian House resident, offered some examples of activities that occur in his house, including full-moon walks and massage workshops, as well as "sitting around fires and eating wine and cheese."

"Community varies a lot from co-op to co-op," Einstein said. "There is always the question of how to get more people together."

"Co-op people are just regular people, like anywhere else," he added.

On a larger scale, the University Student Cooperative Association (USCA) organizes events to acquaint residents of different houses with one another. USCA oversees 15 houses and three apartment complexes, housing nearly 1,200 people.

"Such activities are absolutely essential; they're the most important thing," said junior Rajasvini Bhansali, social manager of Ridge House. "These activities are one key way to let people know that co-ops are good."

Sophomore Michael Casella, a Kingman Hall resident and USCA member resources assistant supervisor, suggests the houses have "the feeling of a big family, not necessarily due to living together, but if you're from a co-op, you feel at one with the co-ops."

There is a variety of themes among the houses, such as two all-women co-ops and a vegetarian house.

The all-women co-ops, lacking the distraction of men, offer a quieter and cleaner atmosphere in which students can find peace, said senior Heather Belt, a resident of Sherman Hall.

"I like Sherman because it is clean and quiet, and as a student that's important to me," Belt said. "The differences are the differences you'd expect — like there's more food here."

Although the women at Sherman do not find themselves rallying around sisterhood, they said that without men, there are no sexual mysteries.

"Without guys there aren't any sexual dynamics, who's seeing who. We don't have that because we're all girls," said sophomore Allison Gurley, a Sherman resident.

Belt added, "There are no tensions like 'where did you sleep last night?'" However, men are not completely absent from the lives of Sherman women.

"We have a guest room that you can sign up for if your boyfriend is visiting," Belt said. "We don't have any rules about boys. You can basically do whatever you want."

Gurley said she found outsiders' views of all-women co-ops inaccurate.

"People think we're like a sorority or a bunch of lesbians, but it's just a nice atmosphere pretty much," she said.

The activities of all-women co-ops do not differ much from those of their co-educational counterparts, said a number of Sherman Hall residents. Sherman women host game nights, talent nights, movie nights and formal dinners.

"You can always count on food, cleanliness and quietness; you can feel secure here," Belt said.

A unique community exists in the vegetarian co-op, Lothlorian House. By choosing a vegetarian diet, Lothlorian residents choose a vegetarian lifestyle.

"Some people are vegetarians for political reasons, so they are socially concerned and interested in certain issues," said graduate student Karen Edwards, a resident at Lothlorian. "We're not just about vegetarianism, but we have ideals for a way of living in common."

Lothlorian residents are not all strict vegetarians, but the no-meat rules are rigorous.

"We don't let any animal meat in any of the common areas, and we don't use our utensils to prepare meat," said Lothlorian resident Mark Strehlow. "If you bring meat home to eat you have to eat it in your room."

Lothlorian residents organize three traditional house activities every semester: a special lunch, dinner and a food orgy. During the food orgy, residents must feed each other without utensils.

"The most famous activity is the food orgy. It is basically a dance in which you feed other people," said senior Joe Knowles. "It can be erotic."

"We basically feed each other in a celebratory way," said Strehlow. "It's like a rock concert setting with a lot of sweating and a lot of food. We let energy out and just go with it."

This house also organizes events such as cookouts, picnics and theme nights.

"Lothlorian has a warm spirit to it in reputation," said Knowles. "It is a very tight co-op with a very strong cooperative spirit. Everyone has an active stake in house issues."

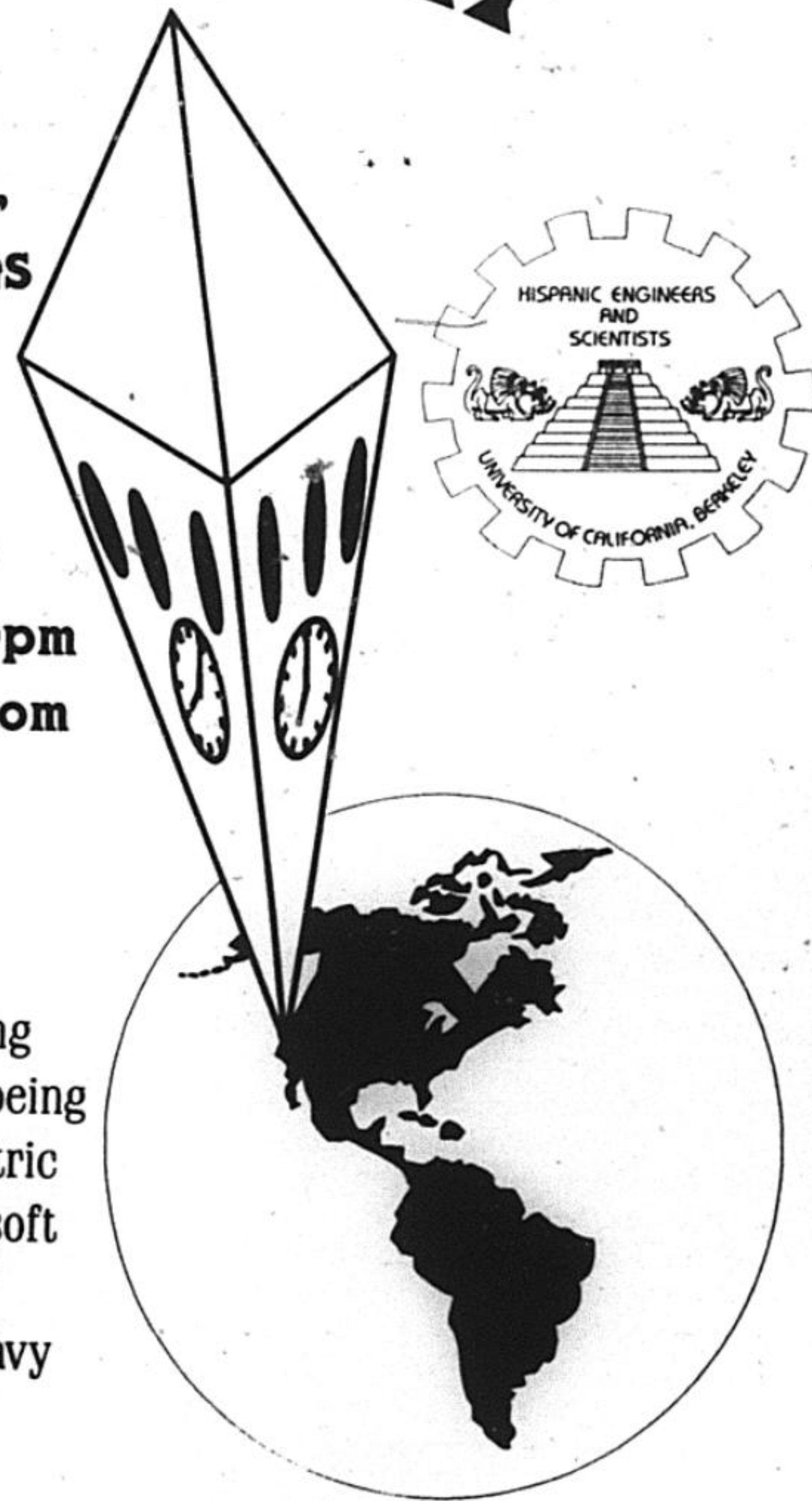

## Up In Smoke

If Berkeley politics were sex, we'd all be smoking cigarettes right now. Of course, this assumes that you're satisfied with all that has transpired over the past two weeks. After the O.J. verdict and the brilliance of Jesse Jackson on the steps of Sproul, everything seems rather blasé. For a columnist, this is the worst of all possible worlds. We are forced to turn inwards, to write about our own lives, to compose "confessional" pieces. But I've already learned that publication of one's intimate details in a college daily is awkward. Take it from me, if you place the word "masturbation" anywhere within the confines of your column, it will end up in big, bold letters directly under your photo. I will not have that — at least not again.

So after swearing off O.J., affirmative action, and the ASUC as possible topics, I was dumbfounded. To be effectively confessional, you have to do something deviant. Because I'd like to keep my personal perversions to myself, I thought I was done for. That is, until a girl flicked her smoke into my backpack on the way to work. There was my topic. I could simply bitch about smokers for 15 inches, except, I smoke.

Although I invariably try to distance my parents from my social arena, I was unable to keep my nasty habit a secret for very long. The smell of smoke lingering on clothes, body and breath is usually a common problem, but this indicator can always be passed on to another. "I know Mom, we were at this coffee shop, and everyone was smoking. It was disgusting!" During high school, my parents probably just assumed I either hung out at the seediest joints in L.A. or took frequent tours of the Philip Morris plant. In either case, it was not odor that gave me away. Explanation was a little more cumbersome when my parents actually found cigarettes in my glove compartment.

Actually, I was driving my uncle's car at the time. Naturally, I passed the guilt onto my uncle, telling my father that the pack of unfiltered smokes must belong to the 65-year-old. The fact that my uncle had never smoked, compiled with the fact that he was still in the hospital for cardiac arrest, might have aroused my parents' suspicions. Still, I was in the clear. My lie only burned up, in the most non-metaphorical sense, when I lit my sister's car on fire after flinging my cigarette out the window, missing the entire known world, but somehow hitting her back seat. I now make a conscious effort to fling harder. Just ask the motorcycle cop I hit this summer. "Nice catch!" He wasn't amused.

The smoker is a strange animal — a bundle of contraries. We hate smoking, we love smoking. We hate non-smokers, well, we pretty much just hate non-smokers. But there is a reason for this. Its genealogy is quite similar to the way Nietzsche applies resentment to morality. Way back when, before the days of ultra-lights, the smokers comprised a weak tribe of insecure social outcasts. One day, a short, frumpy chain smoker made a grand declaration. "Smoking is cool!" He explained to all of his comrades that the nonsmokers might be able to climb stairs without taking rest stops, but they were dorks. The stigma has remained to the modern day, and smokers still feel they are just plain cool.

Of course, if we could quit, we wouldn't be so quick to judge. It also doesn't help that nonsmokers are always more than willing to offer insightful stopping techniques: "Just, like, quit." Obviously, this doesn't help. I have tried everything to bring my habit to a grinding halt, a smooth stop and even a slow roll.

One of the most common techniques is limiting one's smoking to only certain times. For example, only smoking after a meal. This never works. The smoker will draw on all sorts of unusual semantics simply to be permitted a drag. After about two days of this type of cutting back, one can justify two smokes to top off a big meal of water from a drinking fountain. I cannot even begin to count the times I have asserted that I will smoke but refrain from buying packs. This is a good way to make friends fast. There is no one people adore more than the smoker who bums a pack a day.

I disagree with the use of The Daily Californian as a forum for the editors to air their opinions when the central purpose of a campus's newspaper is to report the news relevant to the campus and to serve as a forum for the airing of a variety of views from all segments of the campus populace.

### The Real Racism

#### Editor:

Wednesday night I put a sign in my window proclaiming my belief that "Reverse Discrimination had to Go." According to Jeffrey Chan ("Walk Out," Oct. 12), this means I dismiss people of color as "unsuccessful...lazy, unmotivated and dumb." That "they are too spineless and meek to succeed."

Sorry Jeff, but it seems that you are the one who doubts the mental quality of people of color. I say that race should not be an issue in admitting students to any university, but you say that a person of color who went to the same high-school as me, had the same opportunities as me, and had the same qualifications as

me should have a better chance of getting into the college of his choice?

What could be more racist than bringing up our youths explicitly telling them that their race will determine their opportunities, telling minority children that they do not have to achieve at the same level as their white counterparts to succeed? How can you tell a white child that he had to do better than his black friend to get into the same college, just because they are of a different race. And how can you tell that black child that he need not aim as high as his white friend to get into the same school?

These are the consequences of race-based affirmative action, yet you said "affirmative action is a program designed to ensure that equally qualified people are not dismissed because of the color of their skin." Yet race-based affirmative action means white people with identical qualifications as people of color have a lesser chance of getting in.

You argue that "the barrio youth with a 3.9 GPA who hopes to teach in her own inner-city school is a more valuable student to our university than the prep-school grad with a 4.0 who aspires to the stock exchange." However, here you do not mention race. What if the "prep-school grad" is black and the "barrio youth" is white?

This is where it becomes obvious that race-based affirmative action had to go. I attended a high school that offered every possible honors and AP course. How is it fair that a minority student at my school who didn't need to work should have more opportunities than a poor white kid at another school who had to work 20 hours a week and was not offered the honors and AP courses that would boost his UC GPA?

Obviously, what we need is admissions based not on race, but on what you achieved given the opportunities presented to you.

Finally, it is important to realize that removing race from the admissions process will not affect the ethnic make-up of the UC system as a whole. The minimum requirements are still in place and everyone who meets these will have a spot based on their ability to achieve. You say Jeff, "we all deserve access to education," and this is exactly what dismantling race-based admissions and taking economic condition into consideration would do.

### Protest Irving Peacefully

A revisionist who claims that the atrocities of the Holocaust were grossly exaggerated, David Irving has drawn criticism America from anyone who has every read anything about World War II death camps.

Last year, Irving was invited to give two speeches in Berkeley — one at the university YWCA ended in a book-burning and a riot, the other was halted by protesters before he even said a word.

Today at 4 p.m. Irving returns with a lecture sponsored by the Berkeley Free Speech Coalition. Seats are available only to UC Berkeley students.

We completely disagree with Irving's anti-semitic rhetoric, as most educated people do. But while Irving's views may be deplorable, those who forced the cancellation of last semester's speech denied him his First Amendment right to say what he believes.

In response to last year's protests, the location of the event is being withheld from all but those with tickets.

Once the location is known, everyone who disagrees with Irving should make their voices heard. Protests must continue wherever Irving speaks publicly, but they should be peaceful and non-confrontational. Violence accomplishes nothing, except giving publicity to Irving and his brand of inflammatory speech.

This semester we hope Irving will be allowed to give his lecture to whomever would possibly pay the \$3 charged to see him. We also hope there is a large crowd peacefully demonstrating outside the lecture hall this afternoon, showing him that racism is not acceptable in academia.

David Irving's speech may be offensive and just plain incorrect, but it's his right to deliver it to open ears.

And it's our right to say that he's wrong.

Although the bakery was closed for business, workers came by the store to watch footage of the march on television. John Ayres, who works at the bakery, watched Farrakhan's speech, which began at 1 p.m.

"I think he hit everything right on the mark as he usually does," Ayres said. "The reason for calling the whole march was to go back into the community. The only one to change the community is us."

Mustafa Bey, who also refrained

from his work at the bakery, explained that the organizers of the march declared yesterday a holy day for blacks in America.

"This was a great and fantastic thing to take place. There has never been anything like this to take place in the country," Bey said.

"Subsequent to this day there will be a change in the black community," he added. "When the black men go back to their respective communities, they will take responsibility."

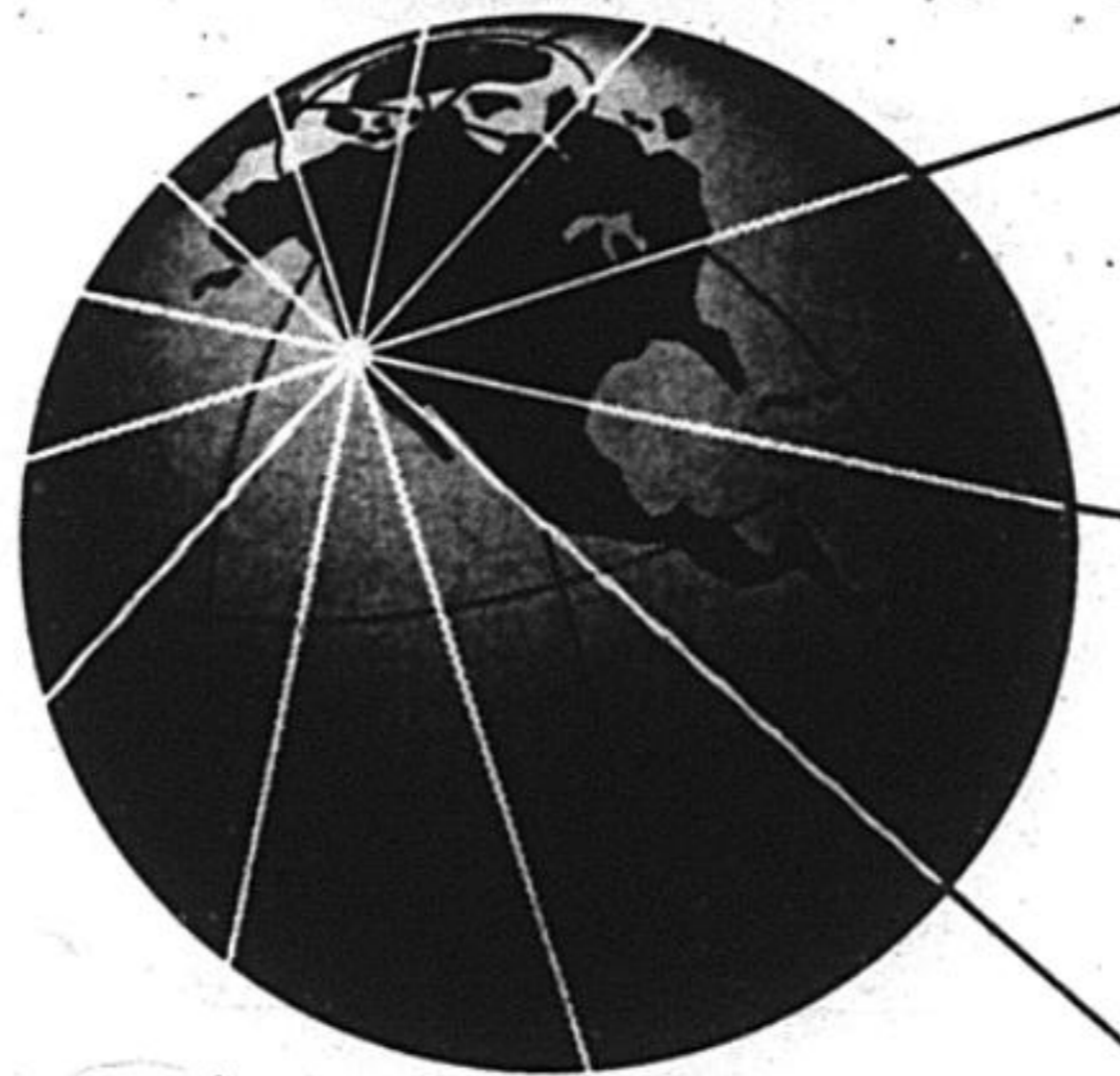
Yesterday's march marked the largest gathering of black men in U.S. history and was one of the largest gatherings since the civil rights movement.

## \$200,000 PRIZE

For years, I have been saying that the U.S. Budget cannot be balanced over an extended period of time in the absence of a trade surplus. Now I am making the following challenge to all economists and proponents of a balanced budget: **\$200,000** to the first person who explains why the article "Analyzing the Economy with Poker" is incorrect in a broad sense. This article, which is available without charge by calling 800-666-3903 or writing to Box 7634, Beverly Hills, CA 90212, explains that a) there are essentially three types of wealth: real assets, stocks, and net non-stock financial assets. Focusing on net non-stock financial assets, b) above-average income Americans must increase net non-stock financial assets each year in order to have a substantial incentive to produce and innovate, c) this "win" must come at the expense of either the U.S. Government, the below-average income class, or foreigners, d) since we are running a current account deficit (losing to foreigners) the only entity that can "keep losing" to fund the gains of the above-average income class is the Government. In other words, balance the budget for a prolonged period in the absence of a current account surplus and Americans will not increase net non-stock financial assets after taxes and will have little incentive to produce and innovate. With little incentive to produce and innovate, production of real assets would also decline, as would in all probability, stock prices. So the best way to attack budget deficit growth is to try to improve the trade deficit. It is no accident that most world governments have been running deficits for many years. If world governments as a group ran a balanced budget, the world-private sector could not increase net-non-stock financial assets and would have much less incentive to produce and innovate.

revisited and formulated in a more fully informed way."

The third motion asks for a similar delay in cutting affirmative action in hiring.

In the written motions, the Academic Senate stressed the importance of its participation in admissions and hiring policies.

In a press conference last week, political science Professor David Leonard expressed dismay with the regents' lack of consideration for faculty.

"The lack of confidence the regents have in our commitment (to academic excellence) is astounding," Leonard said.

If turn-out for the senate meeting is typical, less than 5 percent of faculty will vote on the motions. About

50 to 100 faculty members usually attend the meetings, said Senate Administrator Maria Bertero-Barcelo.

The motions to be voted on were already approved by the Division Council, a core group of Academic Senate leaders.

More than 450 UC Berkeley faculty have signed a petition demanding that the regents rescind their affirmative action decision, said Chicano studies Professor Carlos Munoz last week.

Although the motions appear to show that many senate members hope the regents will reconsider their ruling, members of the Academic Senate's admissions and enrollment committee are beginning to revise admissions criteria to comply with the decision.

"Admissions and enrollment has to figure out what to present in terms of criteria to be used by readers (of

applications)," committee member and molecular and cell biology Professor Richard Calendar said yesterday.

"The way that admissions has worked here is that 55 percent is let in on grades and SATs," Calendar said. "The other 45 percent are admitted only after a reading of the application. They have to be evaluated on some criteria."

Calendar added that committee members plan to meet monthly to develop the new criteria.

some easy scoring opportunities, as the Wildcats jumped to a 5-2 lead after the first period.

"They have a really speedy team and some of our defensemen were getting caught flat-footed in the neutral zone," Cal coach Shaun Clouston said.

The Wildcats struck quickly as A.J. Kapinos scored in the first minute of play, and Ryan Prevedel made it 2-0 when he got out on a breakaway and effortlessly put it past Cal goalie Peter Werner. Weber State added three more scores in the period, including one of two short-handed goals it recorded on the night.

When the Wildcats tallied four unanswered goals in the second period to open up a 9-2 lead, the only suspense left was the goal-scoring contest for fans, held during the second intermission.

What Cal needed was a few more Greg Penneys out on the ice. Penney, who started at left wing instead of his normal defense position, netted four goals for the Bears, emerging as the lone bright spot for the team.

The Cal co-captain scored twice in the first period, recorded the hat trick two minutes into the third and added one goal for good measure with 31 seconds remaining. Pechar also added a goal in the third, as the Bears actually outscored Weber State, 3-2, in the last period.

"We played a good third period, but for the most part, it was a lackluster effort," Clouston said. "We just didn't have enough guys stepping up."

In Friday night's 6-1 loss to Utah State, the Bears were outshot, 42-26, for the game. The Aggies scored twice in a one-minute span in the opening stages of the first period as Cal fell behind in a game for the first time this season.

Mark Jamieson cut the deficit to 2-1 heading into the first intermission, but the visitors outscored Cal, 4-0, in the second to coast to the victory.

The Bears' poor offensive showing in the first game could partly be explained by the absence of winger Rob Banglmaier, who will miss eight weeks while he serves an internship at an optometry school in Denver.

Banglmaier, a graduate student who is in his third year with the team, was off to a fast start in the young season, tallying five goals in the first two games. His absence disrupts the chemistry between a first line that included center Andy Denson flanked by wingers Banglmaier and Pechar.

"While we were playing together, it was clicking," Pechar said. "(Banglmaier's absence) takes away a dimension. It makes the team all-around weaker."

Mike Kim just returned from an internship of his own and will help fill the gap left by Banglmaier.

Cal concludes a season-opening, six-game homestand on Saturday against Northern Arizona.

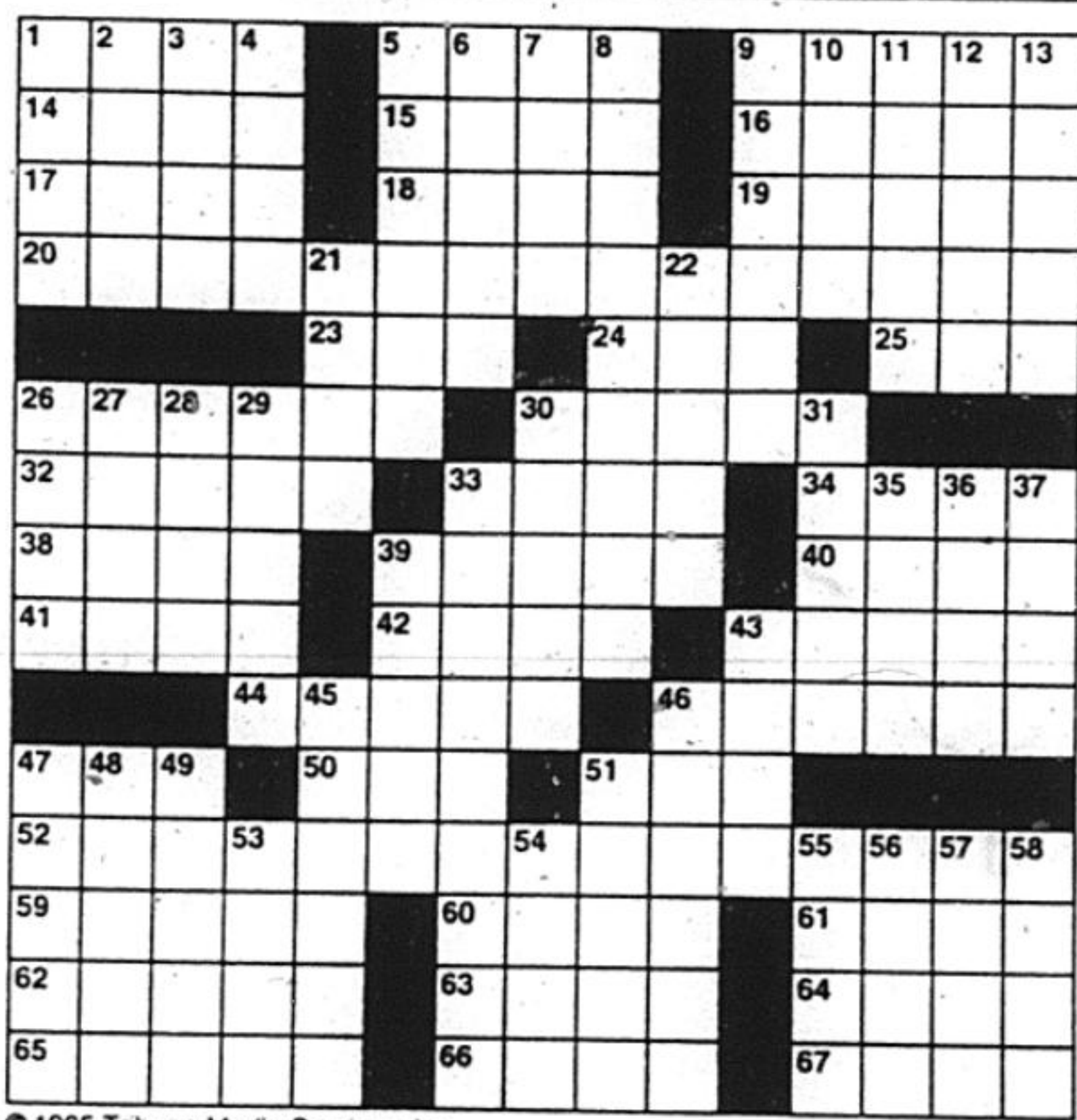

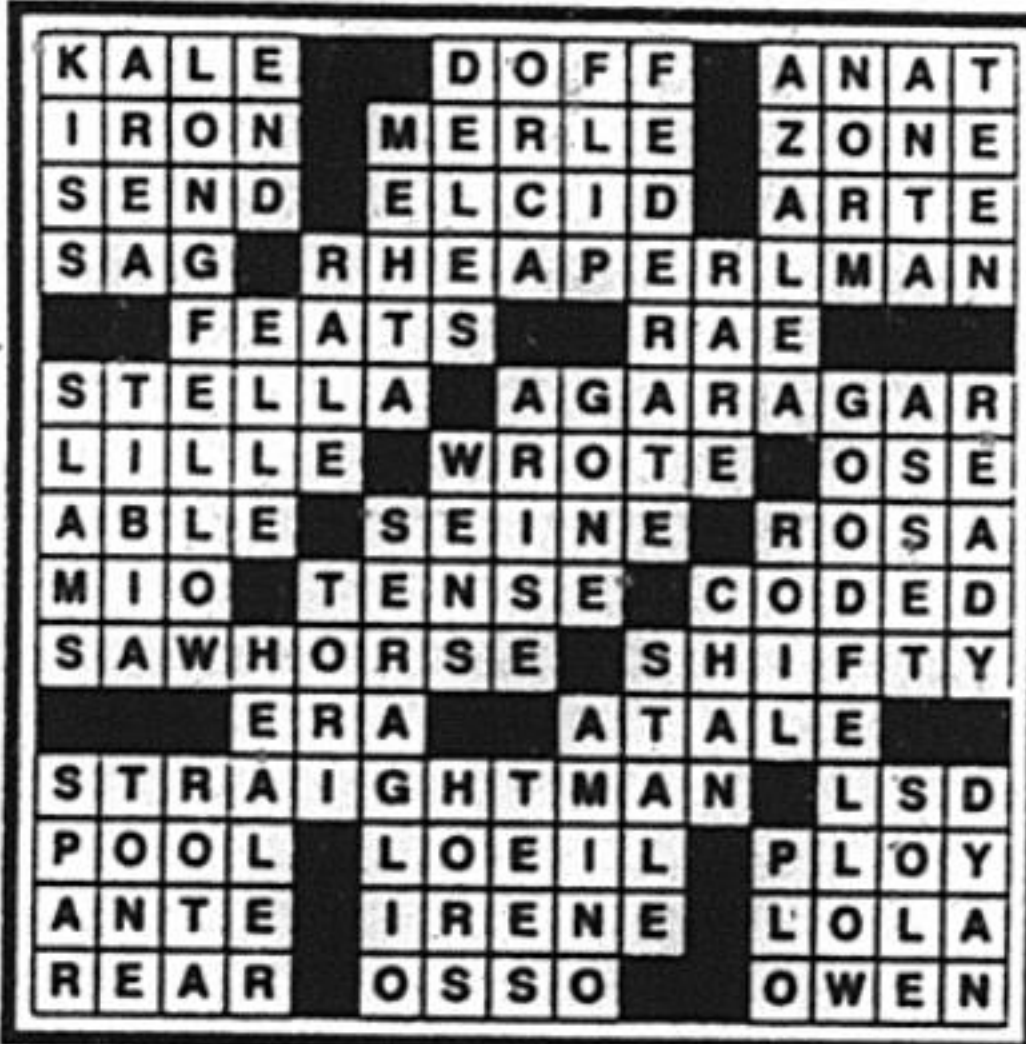

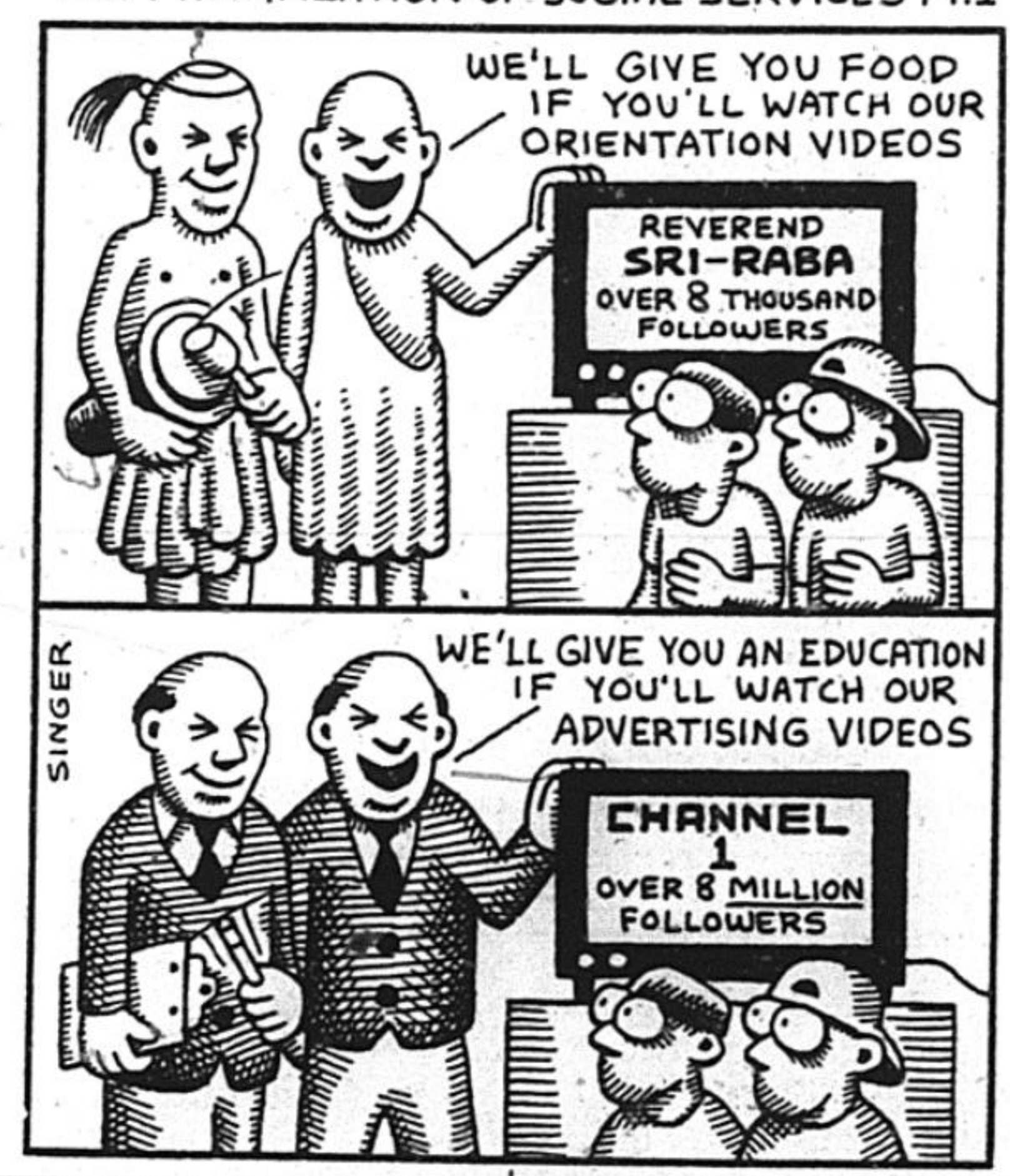

Any signs of over-confidence that may have lingered among members of the Cal ice hockey team surely evaporated after a pair of blowout losses over the weekend.

The Bears dropped a 6-1 defeat to Utah State on Friday night and fol-

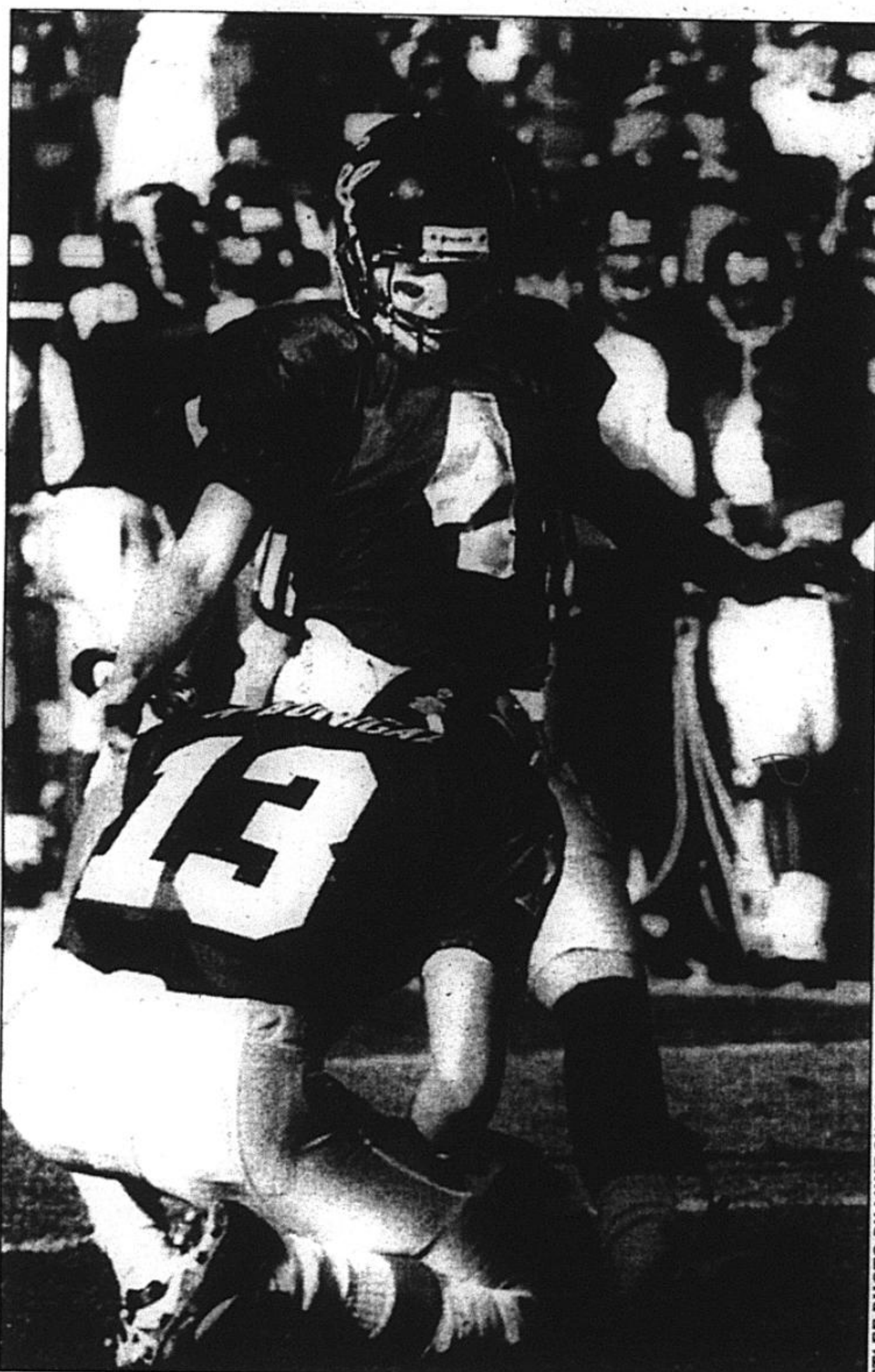
lowed that with an even more humbling, 11-5 loss to Weber State 24 hours later.

Cal (3-2, 2-0 in Pac-8) entered the weekend having hardly been challenged in its opening three contests against Nevada, USC and UCLA. Then the Aggies and Wildcats rolled into town, boasting squads that were faster and more physical than any Cal had seen so far this season.

"We pretty much knew nothing about these teams," Cal right wing Dave Pechar said. "I don't think we were expecting much. I just don't think we were up for (the games)."

## Longwell Ridding '94 Kicking Woes

His efforts were worth three points at best and did almost nothing to offset the havoc Oregon wreaked on the Bears, but Cal kicker/punter Ryan Longwell had the outing of his career Saturday.

Longwell, who made good on just 8-of-22 field goal attempts last season and bore his fair share of blame for a disappointing 4-7 campaign, broke his self-imposed media boycott Saturday after making a few positive contributions to a positively losing effort.

The junior kicked a career best 49-yard field goal in the first quarter, opening the day's scoring, and proceeded to boot three-pointers of 27 and 46 yards in the second stanza. Longwell is now 8-of-11 on the season for field goals, and his 49-yarder was Cal's longest since current — and faltering — 49er Doug Brien chimed in for 52 yards vs. Washington in 1993.

"That first one going through was big," said Longwell, whose previous best was a 44-yarder he hit in his first varsity start at Bend High School in Oregon. "I had this cloud hanging over my head that my longest kick was in my sophomore year of high school."

But that cloud was nothing compared to what hung over Longwell

after a dismal 1994 campaign. Cal's kicking game was a relative disaster; kicks blocked, kicks missed — name something bad having to do with a foot and a ball and it probably happened to the Bears.

Longwell quickly became a fixture at the receiving end of a lot of finger pointing. Skeptics of his talent began pinning all their hopes onto a freshman recruit — Ignacio Brache — who had made a handful of long balls. *Anything* would be better than what Longwell provided last season, the common thinking went.

Longwell's answer at the start of '95: let the media say what it will, just don't expect a lot of cooperation.

"I just felt like I talked a good game last year but didn't deliver on my promises," Longwell said. "It wasn't anything personal against you guys (the media). I felt like I needed to concentrate on my kicking game and not worry about defending myself."

During the offseason, Longwell worked on getting timing down with holder and No. 2 quarterback Kerry McGonigal, and making his entire motion more "mechanical," according to Cal special teams coach Scott Auker. He's taken a little power out

## Resurgent Cal Awaits Seconds

Nine down. Nine to go. The Cal women's volleyball team has now met every Pac-10 opponent, and with nine games in the can, the Bears are at the median of their conference schedule.

Following tonight's match at Santa Clara (6-14), a school Cal leads all-time, 21-4, the Bears (8-8, 3-6 in the Pac-10) will start in on the back nine of their Pac-10 docket with matches Friday and Saturday against formidable USC and UCLA.

Since most of the teams in the Pac-10 can be described as formidable, Cal head coach Sue Woodstra feels that her team's most important goal is to concentrate on every match.

"Focus and intensity are the most important things," said Woodstra. "We can beat any team if we go out and play hard. There's no 'W' or 'L' after any team's name until after we play them."

With this focus and intensity, the

Bears have managed to receive a top-25 vote for the first time in ages, while amassing eight wins on the season. Cal has knocked off three Pac-10 teams this season, including then-No. 18 Washington.

"That Washington match was our first win over a ranked opponent in several years. It was a mental hurdle to get over, and it shows a hint of what this team can do," said Woodstra. "It also shows that height isn't everything. Sometimes in the front row we were facing 6-foot-2, 6-2, 6-3, but we were relentless. We put a lot of pressure on them by competing so hard."

Though the casual onlooker may be sidetracked by Cal's 3-6 conference record, Woodstra feels that the team has made excellent progress to this point in the year. The Bears started off the 1994 season 0-6, and

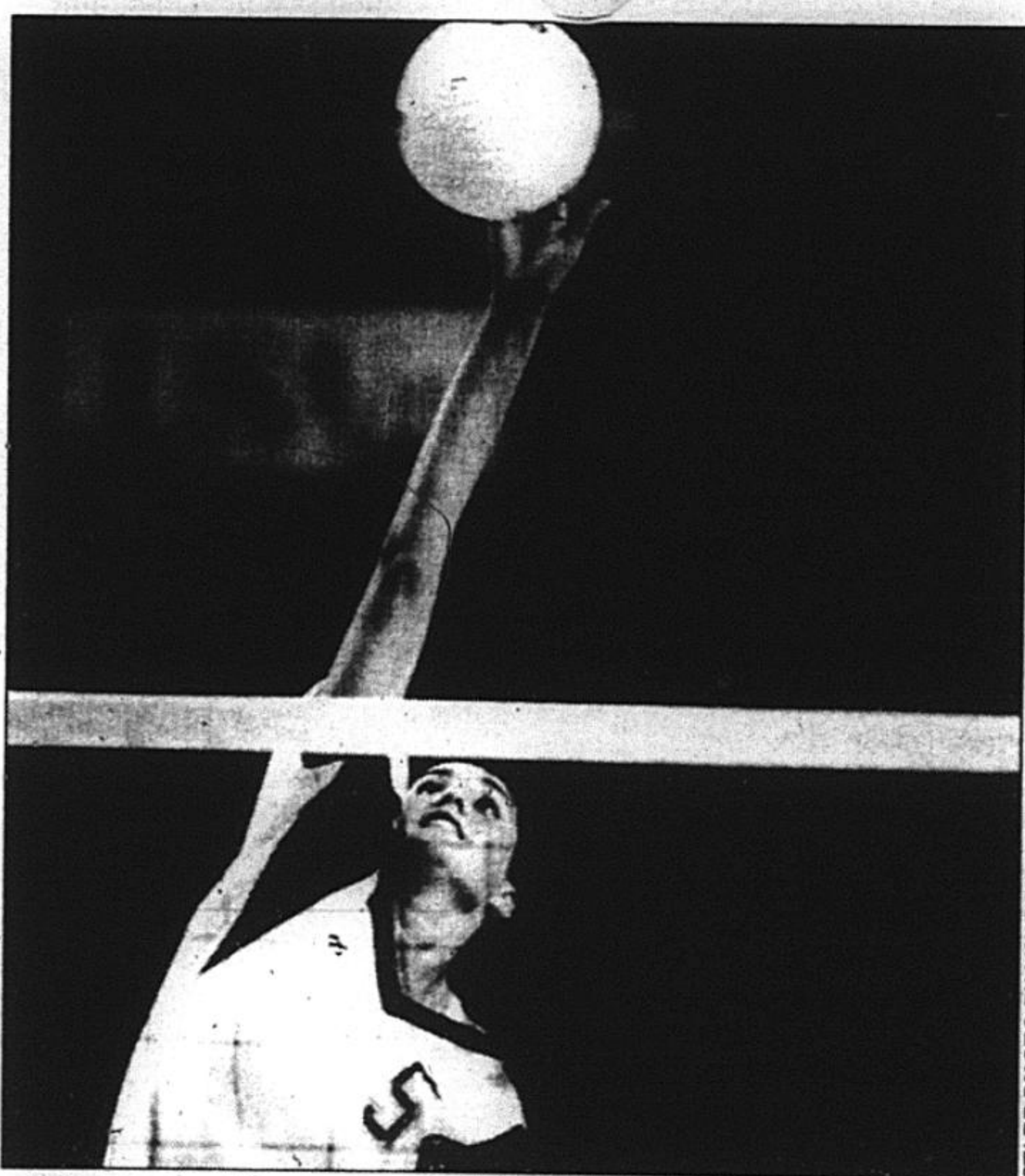
were 3-13 at this point last year.

"We're halfway through the season, and we have eight wins," said the coach. "We haven't lost to a team that wasn't ranked in the top 20, and we've beaten the No. 18 team. That's pretty good."

"The Pac-10 is so hard, you get beat up on all the time," continued Woodstra. "We may have an 8-8 and 3-6 record, and in a division like the Big East, that would be horrible. But in the Pac-10, we're losing to some very good schools. Seven of our last nine matches have come against ranked opponents."

At 8-8, Cal needs to win six of its final 12 matches in order to finish up with the .500 record necessary for an invitation to the NIVCs or the more prestigious NCAAs. The Bears are confident that due to their difficult schedule, a .500 overall record will virtually guarantee an invitation to one of the two tourneys.

Cal helped its postseason cause with Saturday's four-game win over Houston, but Woodstra felt it was a bit too early to be looking towards the playoffs.

## A Stanford Loss an Upset? This Year, at Least

At the start of the season, a Stanford loss to the Washington Huskies would probably not have been described as a frustrating upset.

But after the Huskies (4-2, 3-0 in the Pac-10) marched into Palo Alto and handed surprising Stanford (4-1-1, 2-1) its first defeat of the season Saturday, the Cardinal players could

speak of nothing but disappointment and missed opportunities.

"This is probably the most disappointing day in my brief career as head coach at Stanford," said head coach Tyrone Willingham. "We didn't get the big or little things done."

Contributing to Stanford's fall from the ranks of the Division I undefeated were the stellar performances of Husky quarterback Damon Huard, who threw for a career-high 295 yards, and sophomore tailback Rashaan Shehee, who ran for 196 yards and three touch-

Angeles to maintain their half-game lead in the Pac-10 race.

Keyshawn Johnson was held without a touchdown for the second consecutive week and Trojan rushers gained only 96 yards on the afternoon, but USC held together with defensive dominance to shut out WSU until midway through the third quarter. By that time, the Trojans (6-0, 4-0) had already built up an insurmountable 26 point lead, and the Cougars (3-3, 2-1) were never really a factor in the game.
