## UC Introduces Online Test Prep for High School Pupils

PROGRAM OFFERED FOR FREE

### Planners Hope to Raise Scores On Standardized Exams

UC officials launched a Web site last week aimed at providing high school students with free coaching for standardized tests.

The California Virtual High School Web site, sponsored by the UC's College Preparatory Initiative, will offer online preparatory courses to California students preparing for the SAT I and ACT as part of a high school outreach program.

"It's an exciting program, and hopefully students who would benefit from it will learn about it and be able to use the services," said UC spokesperson Lavonne Luquis.

The site's courses are intended to raise students' scores on standardized tests through practice and regular exposure.

Approximately 1.3 million high school students will enter college next year, many of whom will be required to take standardized tests, according to the College Board Web site.

Many high school students choose to pay for preparatory programs such as those run by The Princeton Review, which charges between \$99 and \$699 for online SAT I classes.

"When the service is offered free of charge, it makes it much easier for students who otherwise might not be able to afford this type of test preparation," she added.

The site will cover all sections of the examinations and include a timed sample test, vocabulary builders, sample problems and optional e-mail reminders.

It will also include a "word of the day" feature, tips on time management, suggested guessing strategies and explanations for correct and incorrect answers.

Students can also choose a parent or teacher to be their "coach," monitoring their progress throughout the courses.

Some questioned the usefulness of online educational tools because they may provide insufficient personal interaction.

Simply registering for a preparatory Web site is not enough to raise an SAT I or ACT score because many students do not fully utilize online resources, said Drew Deutsch, assistant vice president of The Princeton Review.

"Students have to be invested in taking test preparation seriously," he added. "But no matter what, exposure to the test can help the student."

The free portions of The Princeton Review's online college preparation Web site have had many users, but they

## Former Israeli Prime Minister Barak to Speak on Campus

Speech Will Address Prospects for Israeli-Palestinian Peace

Former Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak, a man heralded by many Israelis as a great peacemaker, will come to UC Berkeley this month at a time when relations between Israelis and Palestinians have drastically deteriorated.

Barak, Israel's most highly decorated soldier, will speak at UC Berkeley's Zellerbach Hall on Nov. 19.

At a campus that has become a hotbed for Middle Eastern political debate and protest, Barak's visit to UC Berkeley raises concerns about security.

Former Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu canceled his speaking engagement at the Berkeley Community Theater in November 2000 after protesters stormed the building.

The event's organizers and university officials said they are working with the police to ensure the safety and success of the event.

"We certainly are concerned about security," said UC Berkeley Assistant Chancellor John Cummins. "But we have had many controversial speakers at the university before. We will do everything we can to make it go successfully."

Berkeley Hillel Executive Director Adam Weisberg said he predicts Barak's moderate voice will draw less protest than Netanyahu.

Hoang Phan, a member of Students for Justice in Palestine, said the group has not made a decision regarding any official rallies yet.

But Phan said the group may find the upcoming speaker "an issue of concern" and may choose to respond in conjunction with other Bay Area

activist groups. Barak's speech will be entitled, "Peacemaking: Prospects for Israeli-Palestinian Peace," and will be sponsored by the Israel Action Committee.

Barak will give a firsthand account of his involvement in the Oslo Peace Process. He will also talk about the upswing in violence that followed the breakdown of peace talks, said David Singer, co-chair of the Israel Action Committee.

Barak was Israel's prime minister from 1999 to 2001 and represented the country in the failed Camp David Summit, peace talks brokered by former President Clinton in 2000.

Since the Summit, Israel, the West Bank and Gaza have been plagued by near-daily outbreaks of violence. "We think it is very important to educate the campus community about what is going on in the Middle East," Singer said. "It is important that a campus like Berkeley brings major figures like Barak to campus."

Funding for the upcoming event came from a number of sources, including university and ASUC funds, Singer said.

Chancellor Robert Berdahl allocated \$10,000 for the event, Cummins said. The money came from a \$100,000 fund for events promoting dialogue about the Middle East, he added.

## Berkeley Lab Supercomputer Will Undergo Extensive Upgrade

IBM to Install New System Hardware

The Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory announced drastic increases in the processing capabilities of one of its largest supercomputers yesterday, to be made in conjunction with IBM.

The U.S. Department of Energy's National Energy Research Scientific Computing Center (NERSC), located at Berkeley Lab, will upgrade its supercomputer to process information at a rate of 10 trillion calculations per second.

Berkeley lab spokesperson Jon Bashor said he predicted the lab may move up from its No. 5 position on the Top 500 Supercomputer Sites List.

The list, which is updated every six months, rates the most powerful computer systems worldwide based upon processing power.

"This could put us to No. 2, making us one of the most powerful systems in the country," Bashor added.

The top-ranked supercomputer, located in Japan, currently operates at 41 trillion calculations per second during peak performance. The second-ranked supercomputer, located at the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, operates at 12 trillion calculations per second.

Berkeley lab employees said the

upgrade will allow more difficult scientific problems to be tackled.

"We will be able to run our jobs faster, execute sooner and gain quicker turnaround," said Robert Ryne, a researcher at Berkeley lab and chair of the department's user group.

Scientists use the computer system to investigate problems by designing simulations in areas such as physics, chemistry and computational biology.

Signing a contract with IBM on Oct. 14, the center chose to increase the capability of the existing system rather than buy a new one.

"IBM is committed to developing the world's fastest supercomputer technology for institutions such as NERSC to explore the boundaries of science," said IBM spokesperson Willow Christie.

Bashor said IBM offered the "most cost-effective deal" for this year's computer upgrade, which the lab accepted three years ago.

The new system hardware, in addition to five years of IBM technical support, cost \$30 million. The funding was provided by the U.S. Department of Energy.

IBM is estimated to finish installing the system this December or January

## UC to Lead Class Action Lawsuit Against Texas-based Energy Supplier

Plaintiffs Seek to Recover Investment Losses

UC was elevated to the status of lead plaintiff in its class action lawsuit against Dynegy, Inc. last week.

The university has joined other companies and individuals in its attempt to recover lost investments, alleging that Dynegy misrepresented its financial health.

The plaintiffs have charged the Texas-based supplier of gas, coal and power with reporting loans as sources of revenue.

The plaintiffs also allege that Dynegy misrepresented its sales activity by repeatedly trading the same units of electricity, UC spokesperson Trey Davis said.

"We plan to defend ourselves," said Dynegy spokesperson David Byford, declining further comment on the case.

As lead plaintiff, UC will be responsible for gathering complaints from all the plaintiffs and presenting the court with a condensed version.

"Investors were deceived by public and official reports into investing in a company that wasn't as financially solid as it appeared to be," Davis said.

The lead plaintiff is typically the party who has suffered the largest financial loss. The loss incurred by UC was \$112.4 million, significantly greater than that of any other company, Davis added.

UC purchased 4.16 million shares of Dynegy stock between Nov. 1, 2000 and May 7, 2002.

The money lost by UC, though

substantial, will have little effect on the university's pension and endowment plans, said UC attorney Chris Patti.

"Obviously it's never good to suffer losses in the pension plan," Patti said. "(But) the pension plan is significantly overfunded."

The loss represented less than one-quarter of 1 percent of the university's portfolio, the collection of endowment and pension plans.

The university's portfolio is currently valued at \$51 billion.

Davis added that the financial losses had "no effect" on endowments that support academics and research.

The university was also named lead plaintiff earlier this year in its suit against Enron. Davis and Patti agreed the allegations in the Enron and Dynegy cases were similar in nature.

"Both companies borrowed money from banks but manipulated the transactions to make them look like commodity sales," Patti said.

Several other institutions applied to be lead plaintiff in the Dynegy suit, including the Banknorth Investment Management Group, RRZ Investments Management Inc., the New York Hotel Trades Council and Hotel Association of New York City.

Banknorth Investment Management Group and RRZ Investments Management Inc. lost a total of \$6.8 million in investment money.

### CORRECTION

### Stolen Newspapers Found in Trash

Approximately 1,000 copies of Monday's Daily Californian were found discarded in several Sproul Plaza trash cans yesterday.

The newspapers were still stacked and unread, indicating that they were stolen and thrown away. Nearly 90 percent of the newspapers were recovered and placed back on the racks.

"We are deeply troubled by the theft and attempted disruption of The Daily Californian. Whenever people steal newspapers they are trampling on free speech," said Rong-Gong Lin, II, editor in chief of the Daily Cal.

The Daily Cal was alerted of the stolen newspapers about 11:30 a.m. Lin filed a police report with the UC Police Department.

Many times in recent years groups objecting to political advertisements or editorials have stolen large segments of the Daily Cal press run. The last such incident occurred in October 2001.

tend to devote inadequate time to improving test performance, Deutsch said.

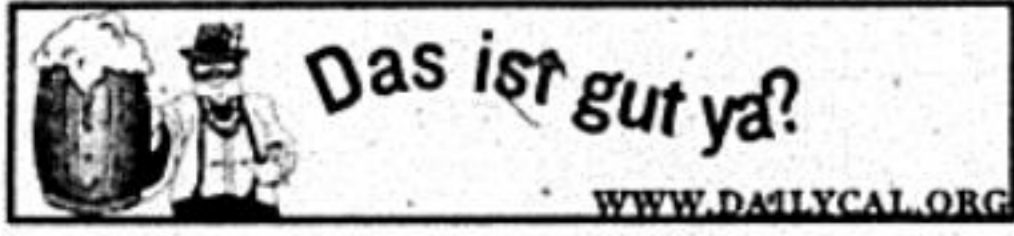
Some students welcomed efforts to alleviate the stress of standardized tests.

2003. The computer is scheduled to be up and running by March or April.

Lab employees said the system upgrade will allow more users to utilize the system's processors.

"The users are happy to be getting a bigger resource," Ryne said. "We're happy with the way the computer center runs and the stability."

Bashor said over 2,500 researchers from across the country use the center's facilities, with all researchers sharing the computer's resources.

"There are 2,000 users competing for several thousand processors to do a project," Ryne said.

Lab officials said the center usually receives more requests for time on the computer than the system can handle.

Doubling the size of the computer will increase the time and power available for researchers to use the system, officials added.

UC Berkeley physics professor Marvin Cohen said that he believes he will benefit from the system's enhanced power, with the increased computer usage time.

"(The new system) is very important to us, for it allows us to do science and calculations we wouldn't have before," he said.

Phan, along with other SJP members, said the chancellor's choices regarding speaker sponsorship fail to include prominent Palestinian officials.

"I think the only way to add to the dialogue is for the chancellor to fund a forum with both sides," he said.

Cummins said the university is balanced in presenting both sides of the

Middle Eastern debate. The university invited Palestinian Edward Said to speak on campus in February, he added.

"The more information we get on the Middle East and the more perspectives the better," said Laurence Michalak, vice chair of the Center for Middle Eastern Studies.

The Barak event will be free for all UC Berkeley students, faculty and staff, Singer said. Tickets for community members will begin at \$40.

Tickets will go on sale for the UC Berkeley community at 10 a.m. Wednesday and for the larger community at 10 a.m. Thursday at the Zellerbach ticket house.

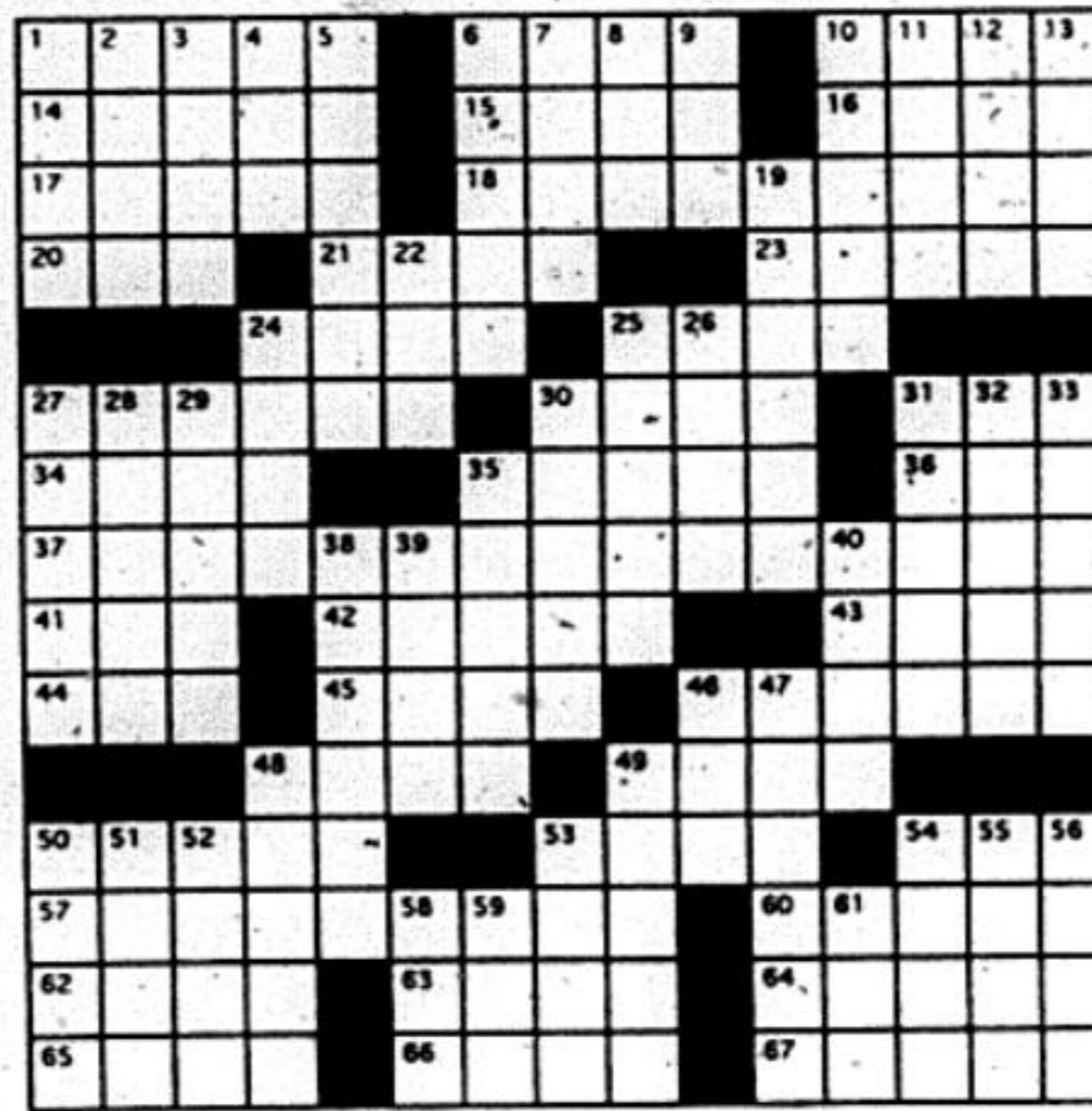

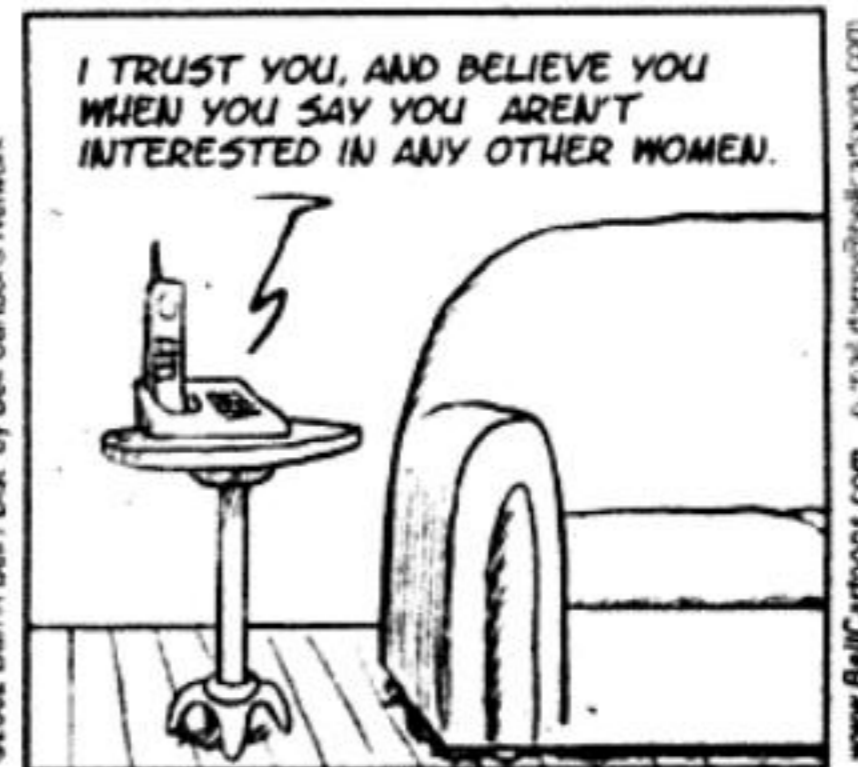

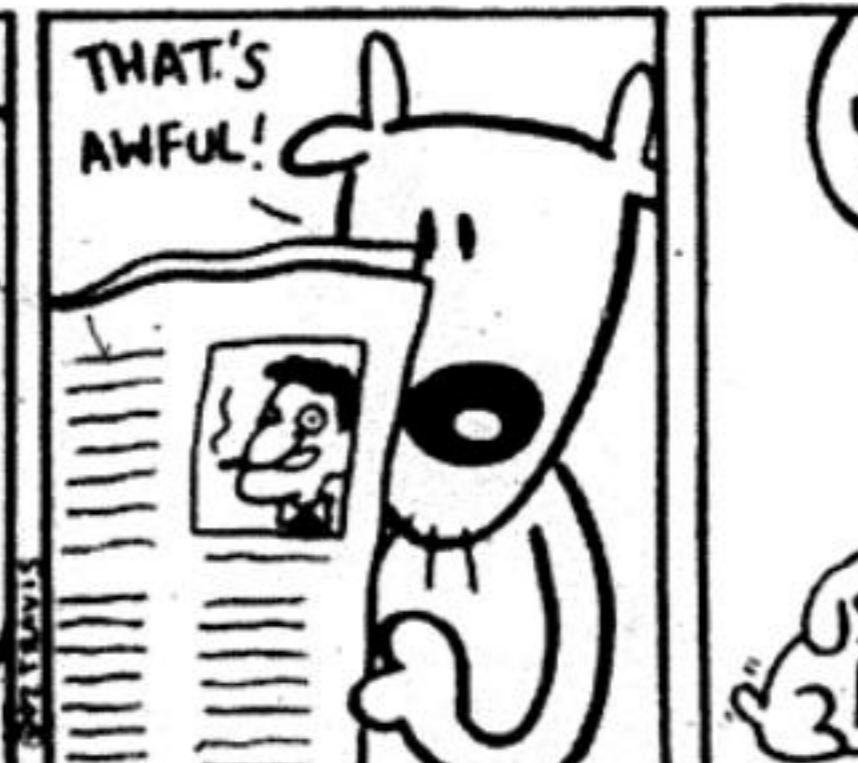

## Despite Infighting, Cougars Rout Sun Devils

Apparently, the only thing Washington State's defense needed to slow down Arizona State's dynamic offense was a hard slap in the face.

Just don't tell Cougar linebacker Ira Davis.

Despite a mid-week locker room skirmish which led to the loss of two defensive starters, the No. 5 Cougars upended No. 25 ASU 44-22 Saturday to become the Pac-10's only unbeaten team.

Davis and cornerback Jason David got into a fight last Tuesday in which the linebacker broke the cornerback's right cheek.

Davis is expected to miss up to eight weeks. Davis was suspended indefinitely after the incident.

WSU (8-1, 5-0 in the Pac-10) put the distraction aside and played one of its most complete games of the year. Quarterback Jason Gesser threw for 250 yards and three touchdowns, breaking the all-time school records for both categories in the process.

"I think it is just a credit to the maturity of our team," Cougar coach Mike Price said.

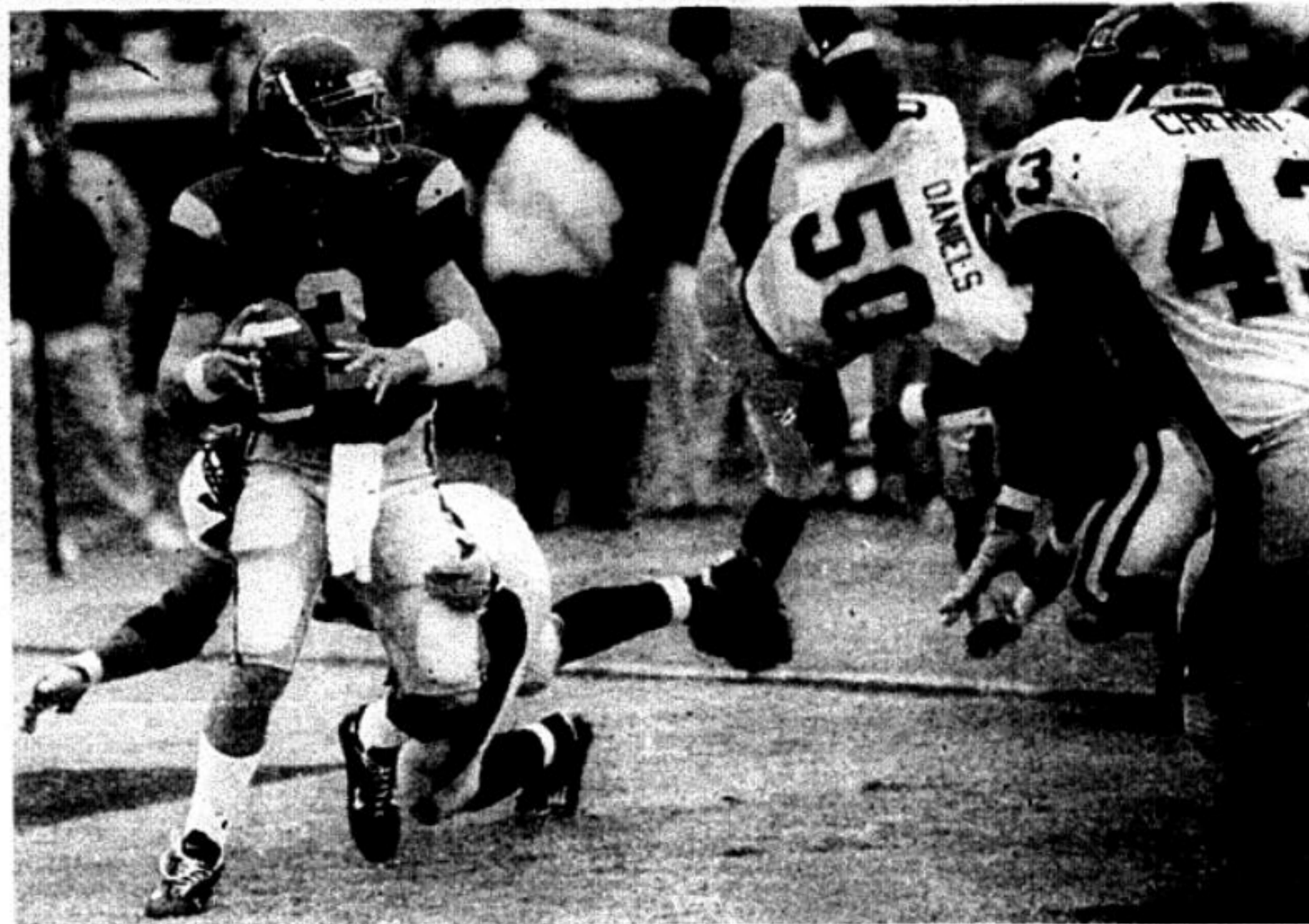
Though the Cougars scored 44 points, the defense created most of the offense's opportunities, forcing four turnovers and compiling eight sacks.

WSU now controls its own fate in its quest for the Rose Bowl, though they will face a tough roadblock Saturday when No. 15 Oregon visits Pullman.

A win over the Ducks (7-2, 3-2) would make a great goodbye present for Gesser. WSU has not beaten Oregon in the senior QB's three previous seasons. The last two contests have been decided by a total of 10 points.

Oregon snapped a two-game home losing streak last week by pummeling Stanford 41-14.

The Ducks also exacted a measure of revenge against the Card (2-6, 1-4).

A 49-42 loss to Stanford was the only blemish on the Ducks' record last year.

With running back Onterio Smith sidelined because of a knee injury, Oregon relied on Jason Fife's four touchdowns (three passing, one running) to subdue the Cardinal.

"They are a good football team and we knew they could make the plays," Stanford coach Buddy Teevens said.

The Cardinal gets No. 10 USC, who would be undefeated in the Pac-10 if not for a missed extra point last month against the Cougars.

Senior QB Carson Palmer has keyed the recent offensive success for the Trojans (6-2, 4-1), passing for 796 yards and nine touchdowns in his last two games. USC has scored over 40 points in each game, both victories.

UCLA faces Arizona Saturday in a game which means more to the Bruins than meets the eye. At 3-2 in the Pac-10 (6-3 overall), UCLA still has an outside chance of winning the conference,

although its other remaining games are against USC and WSU.

The Wildcats (3-6, 0-5) boast the conference's most prolific receiver in Bobby Wade, but have been anemic in the ground game, averaging 50.8 rushing yards per game this season.

The Bruins are coming off a 34-24 road victory over free-falling Washington. The Huskies (4-5, 1-4) have lost three of four games after winning three of their first four.

"We're stuck in a position where we realize it's not going to be a banner year for the University of Washington," coach Rick Neuheisel said.

Oregon State will try to sink the Huskies' spirits even lower this weekend. The Beavers (6-3, 2-3) ran all over Arizona Saturday, amassing 194 yards on the ground en route to a 38-3 win.

Running back Steven Jackson didn't match the 239-yard, three-touchdown performance he achieved against Cal, but still managed 134 yards and two scores against the Wildcats.

## Cal Takes Top Honors at Taekwondo Championships

### Bears Beat Out Field Despite Small Contingency

The Cal taekwondo team won its fourth consecutive national title last weekend, placing first at the 27th National Collegiate Taekwondo Association Championships in Agua Dia, Puerto Rico.

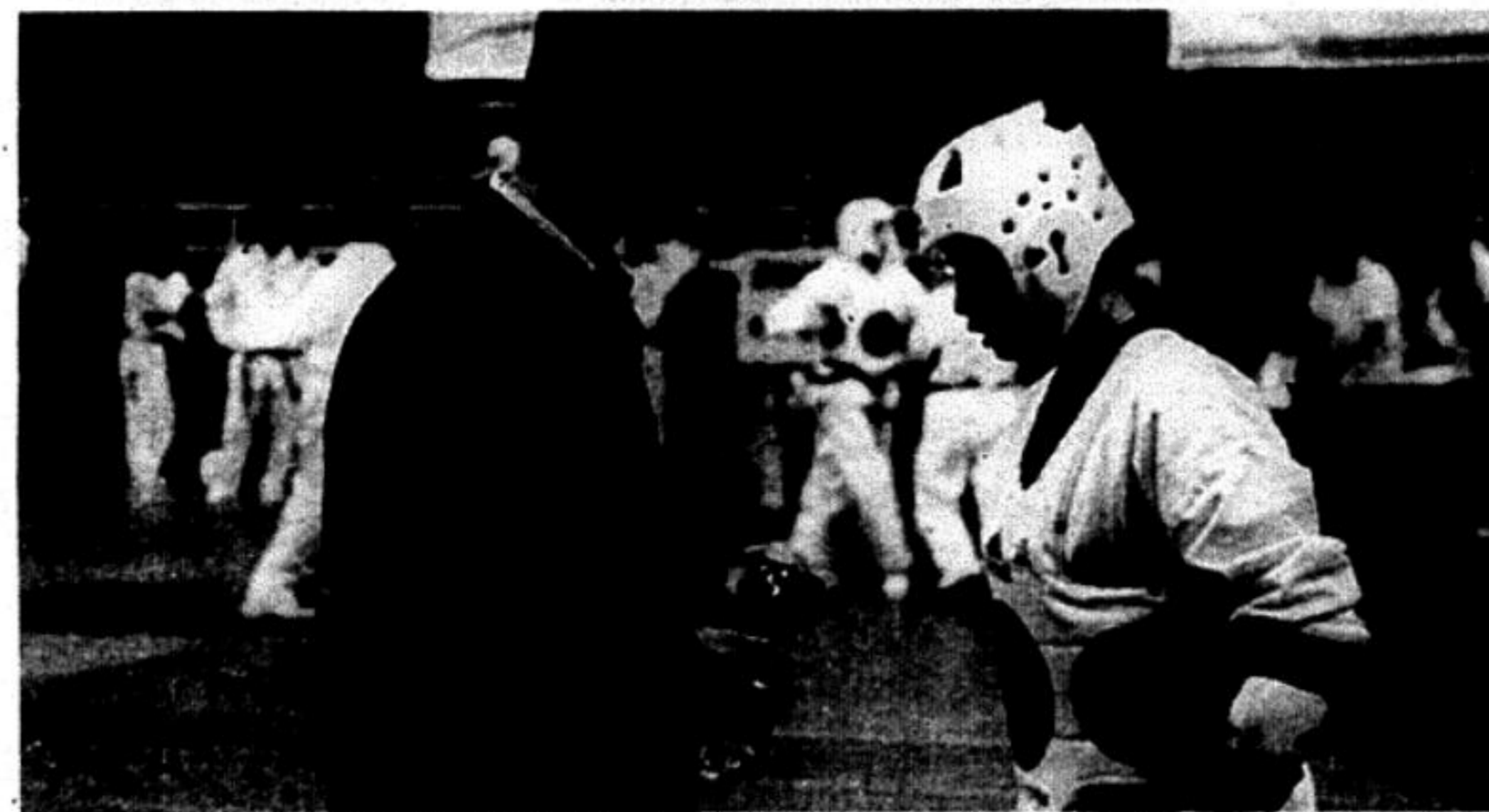
The Bears won the gold in eight of 16 events, and collected 17 medals total, to edge a field of more than 30 schools in the competition.

"We did better than we expected," Cal co-captain Efren Carrillo said. "We sent such a small team, but everyone performed well."

The championship consists of single-elimination sparring matches and a forms competition testing technical proficiency, with four weight classes each for men and women.

Cal entered 14 competitors in the tournament, compared to 34 for second-place Iowa State.

Carrillo, who won both the sparring and forms competitions in the light-weight division, credited captain and coach Jason Han for both his individual and team success.

"He's really the backbone of the team," Carrillo said. "The last four years, he's organized, competed, and coached us."

Han, a member of the U.S. National Team, did not defend his title in sparring, but took gold in forms for his division.

"I've been training with Jason and emulating everything he does," Carrillo said. "We did a lot of video work to prepare, and it really paid off. It's really rewarding to get this in my last year."

Although the Bears took 11 of their 17 medals in forms, their traditional strength, they credited a stronger than

usual showing in sparring for the victory.

"Cal usually gets its points from forms. When I came here, I wanted to change that, to have people look at us as fighters," Han said. "Now everyone can look at us as a powerhouse in both."

Eleven of the Bears' 14 competitors medaled in the competition, and five finished in the top three in both competitions.

Individual medalists are eligible for team trials for the U.S. Collegiate Team, which will represent the U.S. at the World University Games in Korea next summer.
