

Union Has Filed Complaints With Board

"We do not feel that bargaining has reached a stalemate," said Margy Wilkinson, chief negotiator for the union. "I think we'd be willing to compromise if we had assurance that the university was willing to deal with us fairly."

The union has filed a number of complaints with the board, alleging unfair labor practices on the part of the university.

The state board will decide on UC's request in about a month, said Kristin Rosi, regional attorney for the board.

A union rejection may prolong an answer, Rosi added.

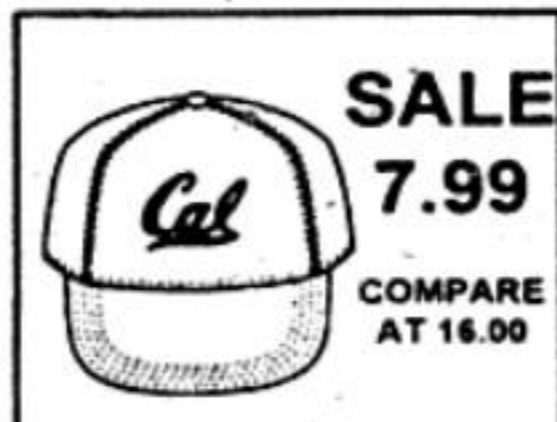

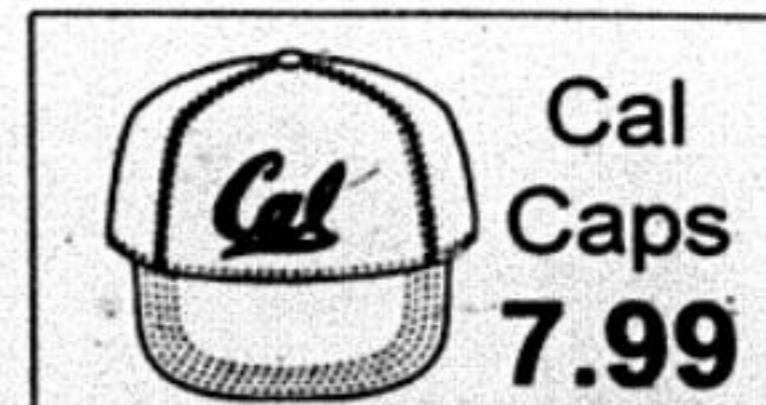

Sex on Tuesday

When Sex Turns Sour

Let's face it: We love it when things go wrong. That element of danger or just plain insanity can be pretty attractive—just look at the popularity of MTV's "Jackass" if you need more evidence. You may not, however, find the worst case scenarios of sex so appealing, but it's better to be aware of them than to get burned playing with fire later.

Maybe baby?

"Making Babies: A Natural Outcome"—the first chapter in "Sex for Dummies." My first impression, and probably yours too, was "well, duh," but it can really take on a new meaning when you're talking about unprotected sex, a broken condom or some missed birth control pills. The chance of an unplanned pregnancy can be a very serious and scary thing to go through, and I've heard plenty of "close call" stories from shaken-up couples. It's a pretty common story, even from sexually conscientious couples, so my suggestion is that you think through the possibilities ahead of time, or face the "maybe baby" jitters.

I forgot to take my birth control pills. What should I do?

If you forget to take one pill, take it as soon as you remember, and you can take your next pill on schedule. If you forget two pills in a row, take two pills the day you remember and two pills the next day. If you miss any more pills than that, I'd suggest investing in a watch with an alarm. You should also wait for your next period using backup birth control for the rest of that month, and then start a new pill pack, again using backup birth control for that month. Whether you need to worry about pregnancy in each of these cases depends on the kind of birth control pill you are on, so make sure you know the rules for what you're taking.

The condom broke: pregnancy perspective

If you find yourself in a sticky situation, know that you still have options. Emergency birth control, also called the "morning-after pill," reduces the risk of pregnancy up to 72 hours after vaginal intercourse, though the sooner you use them, the better. They usually consist of two pills taken orally 12 hours apart, usually cost somewhere around \$40 and can make you feel woozy and nauseous.

Should you take your chances, know that most over-the-counter pregnancy tests can't give you any answers until 10 to 14 days after you've had sex.

Once again, while your love may be everlasting, that condom, dental dam or lolleye probably isn't. First of all, it is important to let your partner know to protect the both of you.

The thought of getting a sexually transmitted disease can make you scared enough to wet your pants, which, as it turns out, may be for the best after all. For women, peeing after sex can help reduce the risk of getting a bladder infection called cystitis. An additional piece of feminine wisdom: Don't douche. Douching may force germs farther up inside your body, which probably isn't worth being "springtime fresh."

Home remedies like these aren't sure-fire cures for infection, however, and it's still a good idea to get tested. Bacterial infections like gonorrhea, syphilis and chlamydia can be treated with antibiotics. Other viral infections, like HIV, can take years to detect, so periodic testing is a good idea for you and your partner.

Now, I can remember being scared out of my wits after sex education in high school, and I have no wish to spread the experience. Sex is more than just bacteria and accidents. It should be enjoyed but with the knowledge that flirting with disaster is fun until it ends up in bed with you.

area, Berkeley's citizens are still at risk for terrorism, Zook added. A radioactive "dirty bomb" exploded in San Francisco would likely rain fallout on the city.

If the city decides to keep its own stores of smallpox antidote, it will have to do so under armed guard at a local hospital where it could be administered, Zook said.

"If people panicked, and let's say all the people find out where the (antidote) is stored, people could storm the hospital," Zook said.

Bates Must Keep Progressive Supermajority in Check

If the Berkeley City Council can learn anything from the Nov. 5 elections, it's that the city's residents are no longer complacent with the progressive-moderate sparring that has defined City Council meetings for the last six years.

Despite outgoing Mayor Shirley Dean's impressive eight-year record in revitalizing Downtown Berkeley and turning the city into a more business-friendly commercial environment, voters resoundingly rejected another four-year term for the mayor, giving the progressives at least a 6-3 majority on the City Council.

City Council meetings should run more smoothly under a progressive supermajority than they have been under the slim 5-4 progressive majority.

But we are concerned that the City Council will depart from the pragmatism brought by Dean once the new progressive supermajority council is sworn in Nov. 30.

While Dean has been busy backing such landmark projects as the Downtown Arts District and the Interstate-80 bicycle overpass, the progressives have worked to create an anti-business city, most noticeably by placing a moratorium on all office space development in West Berkeley.

Some of the environmental advocacy of the progressives has served the city well, but the new progressive City Council must not abandon the progress established by outgoing Mayor Dean.

Such a task will be left only to mayor-elect Tom Bates, to keep the progressive City Council focused on practical city needs and not allow it to be consumed by historically progressive dreams of an environmental utopia in Berkeley.

Even Bates said he wants to expand on the Berkeley's economic boom under Dean by bringing arts districts to neighborhoods beyond Downtown Berkeley.

In the past, progressives have presented such wild-eyed ideas as opening up miles of creeks through Berkeley's streets at the expense of

millions in taxpayers' money. Such plans must not replace the progress made by Dean as the City Council's priority.

Although Berkeley voters resoundingly voted in Bates to replace Dean, they rejected nearly

every city measure that would have raised taxes, including measures to retrofit Old City Hall and upgrade the city's pedestrian services.

It is the progressives who often present more tax raising projects that depart from the city's practical needs. Bates must keep his progressive City Council supermajority in check, having them focus on Berkeley's practical needs.

The past eight years under Dean have seen Berkeley revitalize itself by creating a commercial environment friendly to business development. There is no reason to stop this progress, and Bates must see to it that the new progressive City Council recognizes this.

Fee Increase Would Compromise UC Accessibility

As representative voices of our respective student bodies, we find your recent editorial in favor of student fee increases extremely short-sighted ("Students Should Accept Possible UC Fee Increase," Nov. 15). As the Nov. 18 UCLA Daily Bruin editorial states, students should not be responsible for funding UC.

In 1987, the state Legislature published The Master Plan Renewed, which reads, "An accessible and excellent education system is essential to the cultural, political, and economic health of a nation or state..." This statement is as true today as it was in 1987. It is critical to have an educated work force as our future researchers, artists, economists, legislators, lawyers, doctors and teachers that will strengthen California's economy and lead us back to prosperity over the next decade.

An excellent and accessible education system is critical for the future of California. This is why student leaders state-wide strongly oppose any increase in student fees.

Many people subscribe to the myth that UC is a bargain to attend compared to other institutions. UC has actually maintained a competitive fee

level overall. The problem is that this does not consider the actual total cost of attending the university. Student fees make up only a fraction of that total cost, as students know well. Most of us have had first-hand experience with housing searches only to find some of the highest rents in the nation.

The true cost of attending UC is significantly higher than that of its four comparable institutions. The UC Student Association report entitled "Dispelling the Myths: The True Cost of Attending the University of California" reports that "A first year student in Charlottesville, Va. pays over \$4,000 less than his or her counterpart in La Jolla." When the UC total cost is held up against the total cost at comparable institutions, the University of Michigan costs \$380 less, the University of Illinois costs \$2,212 less, the State University of New York at Buffalo is \$3,518 less, and the total cost to attend the University of Virginia is \$4,227 less than UC.

A vital question must be asked when discussing fee increases: Is UC really accessible to top-level students of all class backgrounds? The more fees are raised, the less accessible we become. A 1996 RAND study found that every 10 percent increase in price would lead to a 0.5 percent decrease in enrollment. Our current low fee level, in the face of such high cost of living expenses in California, helps to keep

UC competitive cost-wise.

The recent Daily Cal editorial supports fee hikes, asserting that "low income students will largely be unaffected" by the fee increase. Although we do have a strong financial aid model, the sticker shock already frightens away many potential applicants. Our legislators must realize that, put simply, California has a responsibility to uphold, to make the future of California a priority, because the future of this state is what is at stake.

We recognize that in these difficult times, tough choices have to be made. However, to raise fees and cut the UC budget is extremely myopic. For a better California tomorrow, we must invest in education today. To quote the 1972 Select Committee on The Master Plan for Higher Education, "California's goal in providing and maintaining public higher education is to encourage the development of well educated citizenry as the best guarantee for a free and healthy society."

For the future of California, we must fight to maintain the accessibility, affordability and quality of UC. Fee hikes, however "modest" they may seem, will only serve to make higher education a privilege instead of our right.

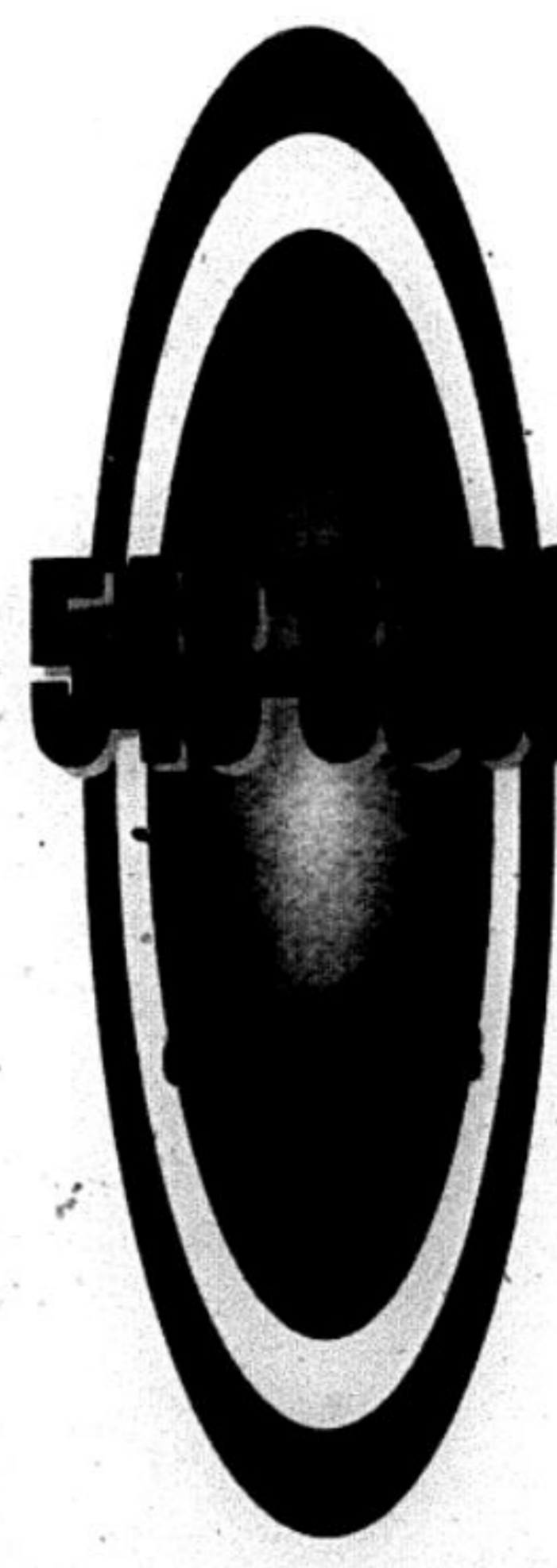

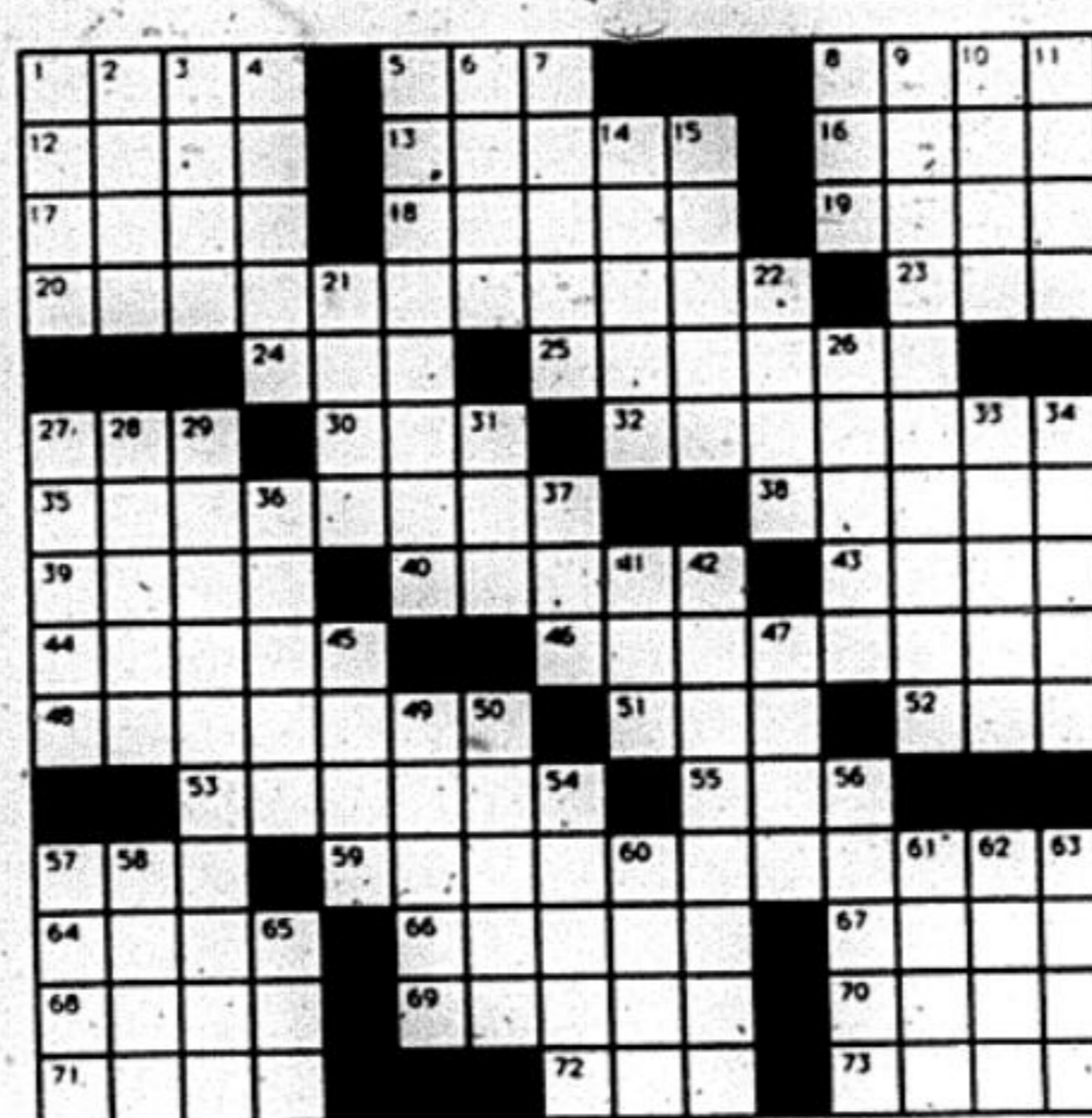

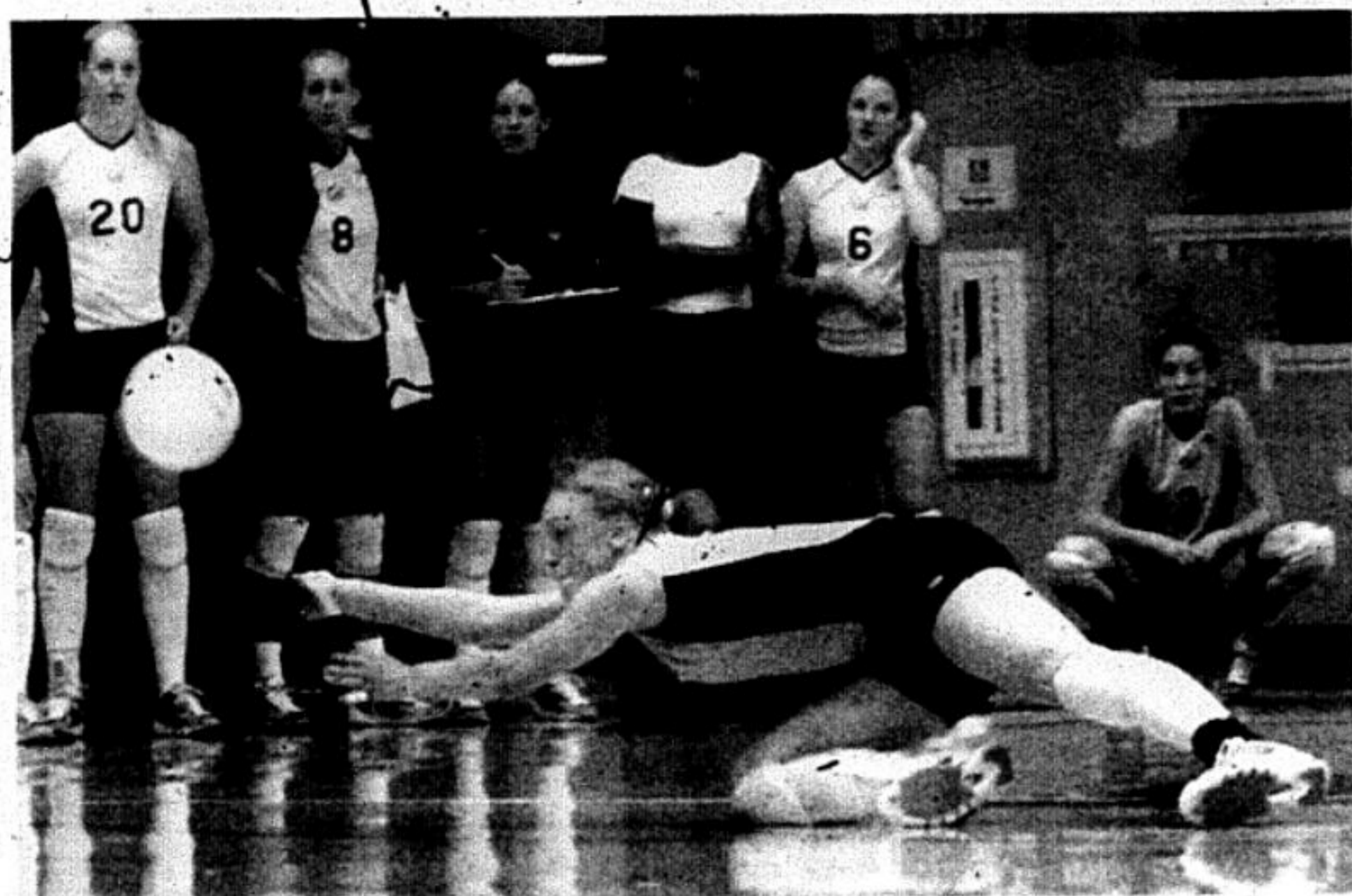

Cal Faces Its Toughest Test During Season's Final Week

Volleyball Visits Broncos, Hosts Card to Close Campaign

Contrary to what this publication printed in Monday's addition, the regular season is not over for the Cal volleyball team—not by a long shot.

The Bears (17-10, 7-10 in Pac-10), face arguably their toughest week of the year, as they take on two top-15 teams in a span of four days.

Cal starts down its final rocky road tonight at 7 p.m. against No. 11 Santa Clara, before Friday's meeting with No. 3 Stanford.

The Broncos (23-4, 11-2 in the West Coast Conference) are fresh off a 3-2 win over Loyola Marymount last weekend. That victory clinched at least a second-place finish in the WCC for Santa Clara, and an automatic bid into the NCAA tournament.

But despite the Broncos' recent accomplishments and gaudy record, the Bears go into Leavey Center tonight confident about their odds for victory.

"They are ranked highly, but we are very optimistic about our chances," sophomore Mia Jerkov said. "We definitely have the ability to play at their level."

Santa Clara has not had to endure a severe Pac-10 schedule against the toughest conference in the country.

"They haven't played any Pac-10 schools yet this year," middle blocker Heather Diers said. "I don't think they know how good Pac-10 teams are."

The top seven teams in the Pac-10 have all been in the top 25 at one point this season. Cal currently sits eighth in the conference, as one of the bubble teams that are awaiting a nod from the NCAA selection committee for entrance into the tournament.

A victory against a top-15 team like Santa Clara would give the Bears their fifth victory over a ranked opponent this season, and would bode well with the committee.

"I think a win against Santa Clara may give us the national recognition that we need to get into the tournament," Jerkov said.

A victory against the Broncos will not come easy for the Bears, however. Santa Clara boasts a solid defensive scheme, as well as one of the top players in the WCC.

"We play them once every year," Diers said. "What I know about them is that they are always strong down the middle. Their middle blockers are good and they run a lot of their sets through them." Running sets in the middle of the

floor has opened things up for middle blocker Betty Potter, who leads the WCC at 6.11 points per game and 5.33 kills per game. Potter is on pace to record 562 kills which would be a school record.

Potter is not alone. Her teammate, setter Kelli Sousa, is leading the country in assists per game at 14.52.

Cal's middle blockers, Camille Leffall, Heather Diers and Alicia Powers, will have their work cut out for them.

"It will be a challenge for us, but I feel we are up for it," Diers said.

NCAA UPHOLDS BEARS' BOWL BAN

Saturday's Big Game Gains Added Importance to Graduating Seniors

The Big Game just got that much bigger.

Cal's appeal of its bowl ban was denied by the NCAA yesterday, meaning the Bears (6-5, 3-4 in the Pac-10) will now head into the 105th Big Game, against Stanford Saturday at Memorial Stadium knowing it will be the end of their season.

It will also mark the final collegiate game for the team's 25 seniors, including quarterback Kyle Boller.

"(The appeal denial) is disappointing, but it's so out of our control we can't do anything about it," Boller said. "We've been playing for a lot more than a bowl game—pride, respect. This is the last time I'll be playing with my buddies."

Had the appeal been granted, Cal likely would have qualified for a bowl.

The Bears have already won six games this season—the most since 1996, when Cal last played in a bowl game, a 42-38 loss to Navy in the Aloha Bowl.

"I am disappointed for our seniors," Cal coach Jeff Tedford said. "But I also know they'll treat this (Big Game) as a bowl game."

Tedford said the regained scholarships will allow him to reward walk-on players, though their loss would not have affected new recruits.

The appeal was heard before the committee Nov. 8 in Chicago. Cal athletic director Steve Gladstone said he learned the result last week.

"We made the request to the NCAA not to release the results publicly until Monday," Gladstone said. "We and Jeff (Tedford) did not want it to

come out the day before a game." Whatever uproar the administration sought to minimize did not come from the players.

"I'm a little disappointed about it, but I never had my hopes up too high anyway," Banta-Cain said.

The sanctions, announced by the NCAA Committee on Infractions in June, addressed a number of improprieties—the most serious of which involved two players, Mike Ainsworth and Ronnie Davenport, who played for the program in the fall of 1999 while academically ineligible.

Also exposed in the summer's NCAA ruling were 38 Cal football players and three recruits that made unauthorized hotel charges between 1997 and 2001.

The initial failure to acknowledge these violations during the university's internal investigation, and Cal's status as a repeat offender because of major infractions involving the men's basketball program under head coach Todd Bozeman in the mid-1990s, weakened the school's case.

One of Cal's arguments in appealing the ban was that it affects a head

coach, athletic director and a majority of players who were not even at Cal when the infractions occurred.

Former coach Tom Holmoe and athletic director John Kasser both left, while Davenport and Ainsworth failed out of school following the 1999 season.

However, the Appeals Committee acknowledged that in most cases postseason bans affect those who were not involved in the violations.

In addition, the combined violations indicated a "lack of institutional control," according to the original report this summer.

Executive associate A.D. Dan Coonan said the athletic department has made changes to improve oversight, including his own hiring to oversee revenue sports, and the addition of an associate A.D. for compliance and a director of football operations.

According to Gladstone, a new complaint structure within the athletic department and stricter rules for adding and dropping classes are designed to prevent academic fraud.

SPORTS IN BRIEF

Men's Hoops Routs EA Sports at Haas

The Cal men's basketball team used 15 players—everyone in uniform—in last night's 100-68 exhibition win over EA Sports.

The Bears' freshmen got their first taste of Haas Pavilion, as coach Ben Braun fielded an all-frosh lineup at several points in the game.

Joe Shipp starred for the Bears with 24 points and five rebounds even though he played just 25 minutes, while Brian Wethers bounced back from tendinitis in his knee for 16 points.

"It's good to get Brian back," Cal coach Ben Braun said. "He brings a lot of energy."

Unlike Friday's 90-86 overtime win over the California All-Stars, another team sponsored by EA Sports, this game was never close.

Gabe Hughes was 3-for-3 from the floor and provided a strong presence inside for Cal, which is collectively shorter and lighter in the post than in previous years. Amit Tamir was able to push around defenders for 12 points and three rebounds.

EA Sports couldn't find the basket, shooting 37.9 percent overall and a paltry 24 percent from three-point range.

Former Bear Thomas Kilgore led EA Sports with 15 points and seven rebounds.

As a last-minute substitution, Cal student Ryan Thomas Yokogawa suited

The goal breaks the mark set by Joy Fawcett during her three-year tenure at Cal (1986-1989).

The two-time All-American, who scored a combined 38 goals in the last two years, entered the season just six behind Fawcett.

Schott, who sat out a third of the season with a sprained knee ligament, finished the season second on the team with seven goals and tied for first with 18 points.

Schott's comeback was highlighted by her Nov. 8 hat trick against Arizona, which tied her the record.
