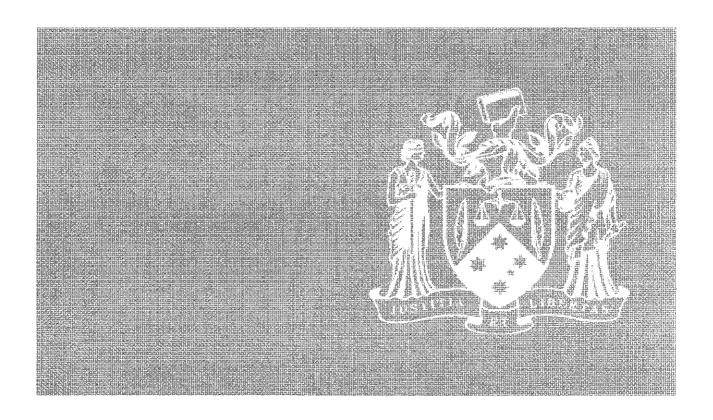

## Contract of Sale of Land

## IMPORTANT NOTICE TO PURCHASERS - COOLING-OFF

Cooling-off period (Section 31 of the Sale of Land Act 1962)

You may end this contract within 3 clear business days of the day that you sign the contract if none of the exceptions listed below applies to you.

You must either give the vendor or the vendor's agent written notice that you are ending the contract or leave the notice at the address of the vendor or the vendor's agent to end this contract within this time in accordance with this cooling-off provision.

You are entitled to a refund of all the money you paid EXCEPT for \$100 or 0.2% of the purchase price (whichever is more) if you end the contract in this way.

EXCEPTIONS: the 3-day cooling-off period does not apply if:

- you bought the property at a publicly advertised auction or on the day on which the auction was held; or
- you bought the land within 3 clear business days before a publicly advertised auction was to be held; or
- you bought the land within 3 clear business days after a publicly advertised auction was held; or
- the property is used primarily for industrial or commercial purposes; or
- the property is more than 20 hectares in size and is used

  or property for farming or
- primarily for farming; or
  you and the vendor previously signed a contract for the sale of the same land in substantially the same terms; or
- · you are an estate agent or a corporate body.

## NOTICE TO PURCHASERS OF PROPERTY OFF-THE-PLAN

Off-the-plan sales (Section 9AA(1A) of the Sale of Land Act 1962)

You may negotiate with the vendor about the amount of the deposit moneys payable under the contract of sale, up to 10 per cent of the purchase price.

A substantial period of time may elapse between the day on which you sign the contract of sale and the day on which you become the registered proprietor of the lot.

The value of the lot may change between the day on which you sign the contract of sale of that lot and the day on which you become the registered proprietor.

## **Special Conditions**

- 1. The Vendor sells the said property on the basis of the existing amenities pertaining to the land as set out in the Vendors Statement and improvements and to the services provided to the land and any improvements thereon and the Purchaser acknowledges that he has inspected the land and any improvements thereon and is aware of the services available provided by the relevant municipality and other statutory authorities and agrees to indemnify and keep harmless the Vendor and agrees to make no claim against the Vendor in relation to any alleged defect pertaining to the land and any improvements thereon and/or the services provided to the said property.
- 2. The Purchaser agrees that any failure of the buildings or improvements on the land to comply with any planning, health environmental building or other Legislation, regulations, by laws or any planning permit and any encroachment by or on the land does not constitute a defect in the Vendors title, and the Purchaser should not make any objection requisition, or claim any compensation from the Vendor on any such ground and the Purchaser accepts the land and any improvements on the land in their present condition, position and state of repair and subject to all faults and both latent or patent. The Vendor will not be required to procure any building permit, building approval, final inspection, Certificate of Occupancy or any other permits, approvals or inspections in relation to the land and any improvements and the Purchaser shall not make any requisition or claim any compensation from the Vendor on that ground.
- 3. Due Diligence Checklist and Acknowledgement
  The Sale of Land Act 1962 provides that the vendor or the vendor's Licensed Estate Agent must make a prescribed due diligence checklist available to purchasers before offering land for sale that is vacant residential land or land on which there is a residence and the Purchaser acknowledges that this is attached to the Vendors Statement.
- 4.. Schedule 1 (Openn Negotiation Terms and Conditions) forms part of this contract. The sale of the property shall be conducted pursuant to the terms of Schedule 1 and both the Vendor and the Purchaser shall be bound by those terms.

## ADDITIONAL TERMS ANNEXURE

## Company

If the Purchaser is a company not listed on the Australian Stock Exchange then the Purchaser agrees to procure the signature of each of its Directors to a Guarantee and Indemnity in the form of the Guarantee and Indemnity and deliver it to the Vendor's representative within 7 days of the day of sale. Should the Purchaser fail to do this in the time stipulated then such failure shall be deemed to be a breach of this Contract and shall entitle the Vendor to exercise all the remedies given to it under this Contract and /or at law.

## **Environmental Compliance**

- 1 The Purchaser accepts the condition of the Property, including the presence of any Contaminant in, or under, or emanating from the Property. Contaminant means a solid, liquid, gas, odour or substance or property of any substance, which make or may make the Property unsafe, unfit or harmful for habitation or occupation by any person or cause damage to the Property or is such that it does not satisfy the contamination criteria or standards published or adopted by the relevant environment authority. As at the Day of Sale, those criteria are contained in the National Environment Protection (Assessment of Site Contamination) Measure 1999 published by the National Environment Protection Council. The Purchaser acknowledges that the Vendor makes no representation or warranty on whether the Property complies with any Environmental Law. Environmental Law means a law regulating or otherwise relating to the environment current at the Day of Sale including, without limitation, any law relating to land use, planning, pollution of air or water, soil or ground water or contamination, chemicals, waste, use of dangerous goods or to any other aspect of protection of the environment or a person or property.
- 2 The Purchaser agrees not to make any requisition or objection, refuse or delay payment of the Price, take any action or make any claim for compensation, damages, costs or expenses against the Vendor in relation to the Condition of the Property and releases the Vendor from any such action or claim whether or not such action or claim is known or is foreseeable at the Day of Sale.
- 3 The Purchaser indemnifies the Vendor against any costs, loss, liability or damage arising after the settlement date suffered or incurred by the Vendor or person claiming under the Vendor arising out of or in connection with the Condition of the Property or the non compliance of the Property with any Environmental
- 4 The Purchaser releases and discharges the Vendor and its successors, assigns, employees and agent from and against all claims, suits, demands and actions of every description whatsoever and whenever occurring which the Purchaser has, may have, or which may accrue in the future or which, but for the execution of this Contract, the Purchaser would or might have had against the Vendor as a result of the presence of any Contaminant in, or under that Land and from and against all claims for costs and expenses in respect of such claims, suits, demands and actions.
- 5 This special condition will not merge on completion of this contract.

#### **Nomination**

Any nomination must be in writing and executed by the named Purchaser and the substitute or additional Purchaser and be accompanied by a copy of the Statutory Declaration made by the named Purchase for stamp duty purposes.

## **Notices**

The purchaser shall comply at his expense with all notices served on the vendor or on the purchaser after the date hereof in connection with the property sold and shall assume all liabilities arising therefrom or in connection therewith and shall indemnify the vendor against all claims thereunder.

## **Notices**

If the Vendor or his Solicitor serves on or gives to the Purchaser a Notice consequent upon a default in any payment hereunder or the observance or performance by the Purchaser of any term condition or other stipulation herein then the default shall not be deemed to be remedied until (in addition to the payment or the observance or performance required by virtue of the Notice being made or complied with by the Purchaser) the Purchaser has paid to the Vendor the proper legal costs and disbursements incurred by the Vendor in or about the serving or giving of the Notice.

## Restrictions

The Purchaser buys subject to any restrictions imposed by and to the provisions of the Planning Scheme and any other Town Planning Acts or Schemes.

## **Solar Panels**

The Vendor makes no representations or gives any warrantied whatsoever with respect to any solar panels installed in the property hereby sold in relation to their condition, state or repair, fitness for purpose, their in-put, fed in tariff or any benefits arising from the electricity generated by any solar panels, save that they are owned by the vendor and not encumbered in any way. The Purchaser acknowledges that any current arrangements with any energy supplier shall cease on the settlement.

#### Form of Guarantee for Directors

#### To: The Vendor

## 1. Guarantor's acknowledgement

The Guarantor acknowledges that:

- the Guarantor gives this Guarantee in consideration of the Vendor entering into the Contract with the Purchaser at the Guarantor's request;
- (b) if the Guarantor executes this Guarantee after the Vendor, the Guarantor gives this Guarantee for valuable consideration provided by the Vendor; and
- (c) before the Guarantor executed this Guarantee, the Guarantor read and understood the Contract and this Guarantee.

## 2. Meaning of the words

The meanings of the terms used in this document are set out below:

"Contract" means the attached contract of sale between the Vendor and the Purchaser, and any other agreement between the Vendor and the Purchaser concerning the property sold under the Contract;

"Guarantee" means this deed of guarantee and indemnity;

"Guaranteed Money" means the whole of the price, interest and other money payable under the Contract;

"Guarantor" means the Guarantor named in the Schedule;

"Guarantor's Obligations" means the obligations of the Guarantor under this Guarantee;

"Purchaser" means the person named as the purchaser in the Contract;

"Purchaser's Obligations" means the obligations of the Purchaser to:

- (a) pay the Guaranteed Money; and
- (b) comply with all the Purchaser's other obligations to the Vendor under the Contract;

"Vendor" means the person named as the vendor in the Contract.

## 3. Guarantee

- (a) The Guarantor guarantees to the Vendor:
  - (i) payment of the Guaranteed Money when it is due;
  - (ii) compliance with all the Purchaser's Obligations;
  - (iii) that the Guarantor will discharge any liability which the Purchaser has to the Vendor if the Vendor ends the Contract because of the Purchaser's default; and
  - (iv) if the Purchaser fails to pay any of the Guaranteed Money on time, the Guarantor will pay that money to the Vendor on demand.
- (b) If the Purchaser fails to comply with any of the Guaranteed Obligations, the Guarantor:
  - (i) indemnifies the Vendor against any loss, damage, costs or expenses the Vendor incurs as a result: and
  - (ii) will pay an amount equal to the loss, damage, costs or expenses to the Vendor on demand.

## 4. Indemnity

- (a) The Guarantor indemnifies the Vendor against any loss, damage, costs or expenses the Vendor incurs because:
  - the Purchaser's Obligations are wholly or partly unenforceable against the
     Purchaser for any reason including, but not limited to, the Purchaser lacking
     capacity or power to enter into the Contract, dying or becoming insolvent, or being
     affected by any other legal limitation, disability or incapacity;
  - (ii) the Purchaser claims a refund of any of the Guaranteed Money because of anything under clause 4(a)(i);
  - (iii) a payment to the Vendor under the Contract is held to be a preference, is set aside by a court, or is not effective because of the operation of a law;
  - (iv) the Purchaser's liability to pay any of the Guaranteed Money when due or to comply with any of the Purchaser's Obligations is released or deferred under a scheme of arrangement between the Purchaser and the Purchaser's creditors or in any other way; or
  - (v) anything else occurs that would prevent the Vendor from recovering the Guaranteed Money under the guarantee in clause 3.

- (b) The Guarantor will pay to the Vendor on demand an amount equal to any loss, damage, costs or expenses for which the Guarantor indemnifies the Vendor under this clause 4.
- (c) The Guarantor's Obligations under the indemnity in this clause 4 are separate and independent from the Guarantor's Obligations under the guarantee in clause 3.

## 5. Guarantee is continuing and irrevocable

This Guarantee is a continuing security and is irrevocable until discharged according to its terms.

## 6. Principal obligations

- (a) The Guarantor's Obligations are principal obligations.
- (b) The Vendor need not, before enforcing the Guarantor's Obligations:
  - (i) make a demand on the Purchaser;
  - (ii) exercise any rights the Vendor has against the Purchaser; or
  - (iii) enforce any security the Vendor holds for performance of the Purchaser's Obligations.

## 7. Guarantor's obligations are unconditional

The Guarantor's Obligations are unconditional and will not be prejudiced or affected in any way if:

- (a) the Vendor, whether with or without the Guarantor's consent or knowledge:
  - (i) gives the Purchaser extra time to pay any of the Guaranteed Money or to perform any of the Purchaser's Obligations;
  - (ii) grants the Purchaser any other indulgence;
  - (iii) makes a revision agreement, composition, compromise or arrangement with the Purchaser or any other person; or
  - (iv) waives an obligation of the Purchaser or another Guarantor;
- (b) the Purchaser or another Guarantor dies or becomes insolvent;
- (c) there is a variation of the Contract or any contract substituted for it;
- (d) the Purchaser nominates a substitute or additional purchaser under the Contract;
- (e) the Vendor receives a payment which the Vendor does not have a legal right to retain;
- (f) now or in the future the Vendor holds any negotiable or other security from any person for payment of the Guaranteed Money or performance of the Purchaser's Obligations; or
- (g) the Vendor releases, exchanges, renews, modifies, varies or deals in any other way with any judgment, negotiable or other specialty instrument, or any other security the Vendor recovers, holds or may enforce for payment of the Guaranteed Money or performance of the Purchaser's Obligations, or makes an agreement at any time concerning any of these matters.

## 8. Guarantor waives rights as surety

The Guarantor waives all rights the Guarantor may have under the law (including surety law) that may:

- (a) give the Guarantor the right to be fully or partly released or discharged from the Guarantor's Obligations; or
- (b) restrict or prevent the Vendor from enforcing the Vendor's rights under this Guarantee.

## 9. Vendor's rights against Purchaser are not affected

The Vendor's acceptance of this Guarantee does not prevent the Vendor from exercising the Vendor's rights in respect of any continuing, recurring or future default by the Purchaser.

## 10. If Purchaser enters a composition or arrangement

- (a) The Guarantor must not prove in competition with the Vendor for any money the Purchaser owes the Guarantor if:
  - (i) the Purchaser enters into a composition or arrangement with the Purchaser's creditors:
  - (ii) the Purchaser is an individual and is bankrupt; or
  - (iii) the Purchaser is a body corporate and an order is made or resolution passed for its winding up, an administrator is appointed to it under the *Corporations Act 2001*, or it is placed under any form of external management under that Act.

- (b) The Guarantor authorises the Vendor to:
  - (i) prove for all money the Purchaser owes the Guarantor; and
  - (ii) retain and carry to a suspense account and, at the Vendor's discretion, to appropriate, amounts received in this way until the Vendor has received 100 cents in the dollar for the money the Purchaser owes the Vendor.

## 11. Guarantor to pay Vendor's costs and stamp duty

The Guarantor will pay on demand:

- the Vendor's costs (including legal costs on a solicitor and own client basis) of and incidental to preparing, executing, stamping and enforcing this Guarantee; and
- (b) any stamp duty payable on this Guarantee.

## 12. Notices

A notice or demand by the Vendor under this Guarantee may be given or made in the same way as a notice or demand under the Contract.

## 13. Persons who sign this Guarantee are bound

Each person who signs this Guarantee as Guarantor is bound by it, even if another person named as a Guarantor:

- (a) does not sign it;
- (b) is not or ceases to be bound by it; or
- (c) has no power to sign it.

#### 14. Assignment

- (a) The Vendor may assign all or some of the Vendor's rights under the Contract or this Guarantee, or both, without the Guarantor's consent.
- (b) If the Vendor assigns any of its rights, the Guarantor will execute any document which, in the Vendor's opinion (reasonably held) is necessary to complete the assignment.

## 15. Interpreting this Guarantee

In this Guarantee:

- (a) unless the context requires a different interpretation:
  - (i) the singular includes the plural and the plural includes the singular;
  - (ii) a promise or agreement by two or more persons binds each of them individually and all of them together;
  - (iii) reference to a person includes a body corporate;
  - (iv) reference to a party to this Guarantee or the Contract includes that party's executors, administrators, successors and permitted assigns; and
- (b) headings are only for convenience and do not affect interpretation.

## **General Conditions**

## **Contract Signing**

#### 1. ELECTRONIC SIGNATURE

- 1.1 In this general condition "electronic signature "means a digital signature or a visual representation of a person's handwritten signature or mark which is placed on a physical or electronic copy of this contract by electronic or mechanical means, and "electronically signed" has a corresponding meaning.
- 1.2 The parties consent to this contract being signed by or on behalf of a party by an electronic signature.
- 1.3 Where this contract is electronically signed by or on behalf of a party, the party warrants and agrees that the electronic signature has been used to identify the person signing and to indicate that the party intends to be bound by the electronic signature.
- 1.4 This contract may be electronically signed in any number of counterparts which together will constitute the one document.
- 1.5 Each party consents to the exchange of counterparts of this contract by delivery by email or such other electronic means as may be agreed in writing.
- 1.6 Each party must upon request promptly deliver a physical counterpart of this contract with the handwritten signature or signatures of the party and all written evidence of the authority of a person signing on their behalf, but a failure to comply with the request does not affect the validity of this contract.

#### 2 LIABILITY OF SIGNATORY

#### 4 NOMINEE

The purchaser may no later than 14 days before the due date for settlement nominate a substitute or additional person to take a transfer of the land, but the named purchaser remains personally liable for the due performance of all the purchaser's obligations under this contract.

## Title

#### 5 ENCUMBRANCES

- 5.1 The purchaser buys the property subject to:
  - (a) any encumbrance shown in the section 32 statement other than mortgages or caveats; and
  - (b) any reservations, exceptions and conditions in the crown grant; and
  - any lease or tenancy referred to in the particulars of sale.
- 5.2 The purchaser indemnifies the vendor against all obligations under any lease or tenancy that are to be performed by the landlord after settlement.

#### 6 VENDOR WARRANTIES

- 6.1 The vendor warrants that these general conditions 1 to 35 are identical to the general conditions 1 to 35 in the form of contract of sale of land published by the Law Institute of Victoria Limited and the Real Estate Institute of Victoria Ltd in the month and year set out the header of this page.
- 6.2 The warranties in general conditions 6.3 and 6.4 replace the purchaser's right to make requisitions and inquiries.
- 6.3 The vendor warrants that the vendor:
  - (a) has, or by the due date for settlement will have, the right to sell the land; and
  - (b) is under no legal disability; and
  - (c) is in possession of the land, either personally or through a tenant; and
  - (d) has not previously sold or granted any option to purchase, agreed to a lease or granted a pre-emptive right which is current over the land and which gives another party rights which have priority over the interest of the purchaser; and
  - (e) will at settlement be the holder of an unencumbered estate in fee simple in the land; and
  - (f) will at settlement be the unencumbered owner of any improvements, fixtures, fittings and goods sold with the land.
- 6.4 The vendor further warrants that the vendor has no knowledge of any of the following:
  - (a) public rights of way over the land;
  - (b) easements over the land;
  - (c) lease or other possessory agreement affecting the land;
  - (d) notice or order directly and currently affecting the land which will not be dealt with at settlement, other than the
    usual rate notices and any land tax notices;
  - (e) legal proceedings which would render the sale of the land void or voidable or capable of being set aside.
- 6.5 The warranties in general conditions 6.3 and 6.4 are subject to any contrary provisions in this contract and disclosures in the section 32 statement.
- 6.6 If sections 137B and 137C of the Building Act 1993 apply to this contract, the vendor warrants that:
  - (a) all domestic building work carried out in relation to the construction by or on behalf of the vendor of the home was carried out in a proper and workmanlike manner; and

- (b) all materials used in that domestic building work were good and suitable for the purpose for which they were used and that, unless otherwise stated in the contract, those materials were new; and
- (c) domestic building work was carried out in accordance with all laws and legal requirements, including, without limiting the generality of this warranty, the Building Act 1993 and regulations made under the Building Act 1993.
- 6.7 Words and phrases used in general condition 6.6 which are defined in the *Building Act 1993* have the same meaning in general condition 6.6.

#### 7 IDENTITY OF THE LAND

- 7.1 An omission or mistake in the description of the property or any deficiency in the area, description or measurements of the land does not invalidate the sale.
- 7.2 The purchaser may not:
  - make any objection or claim for compensation for any alleged misdescription of the property or any deficiency in its area or measurements; or
  - (b) require the vendor to amend title or pay any cost of amending title.

#### 8 SERVICES

- 8.1 The vendor does not represent that the services are adequate for the purchaser's proposed use of the property and the vendor advises the purchaser to make appropriate inquiries. The condition of the services may change between the day of sale and settlement and the vendor does not promise that the services will be in the same condition at settlement as they were on the day of sale.
- 8.2 The purchaser is responsible for the connection of all services to the property after settlement and the payment of any associated cost.

#### 9 CONSENTS

The vendor must obtain any necessary consent or licence required for the vendor to sell the property. The contract will be at an end and all money paid must be refunded if any necessary consent or licence is not obtained by settlement.

#### 10 TRANSFER & DUTY

- 10.1 The purchaser must prepare and deliver to the vendor at least 7 days before the due date for settlement any paper transfer of land document which is necessary for this transaction. The delivery of the transfer of land document is not acceptance of title.
- 10.2 The vendor must promptly initiate the Duties on Line or other form required by the State Revenue Office in respect of this transaction, and both parties must co-operate to complete it as soon as practicable.

#### 11 RELEASE OF SECURITY INTEREST

- 11.1 This general condition applies if any part of the property is subject to a security interest to which the *Personal Property Securities Act 2009 (Cth)* applies.
- 11.2 For the purposes of enabling the purchaser to search the Personal Property Securities Register for any security interests affecting any personal property for which the purchaser may be entitled to a release, statement, approval or correction in accordance with general condition 11.4, the purchaser may request the vendor to provide the vendor's date of birth to the purchaser. The vendor must comply with a request made by the purchaser under this condition if the purchaser makes the request at least 21 days before the due date for settlement.
- 11.3 If the purchaser is given the details of the vendor's date of birth under general condition 11.2, the purchaser must
  - (a) only use the vendor's date of birth for the purposes specified in general condition 11.2; and
  - (b) keep the date of birth of the vendor secure and confidential.
- 11.4 The vendor must ensure that at or before settlement, the purchaser receives—
  - (a) a release from the secured party releasing the property from the security interest; or
  - (b) a statement in writing in accordance with section 275(1)(b) of the Personal Property Securities Act 2009 (Cth) setting out that the amount or obligation that is secured is nil at settlement; or
  - (c) a written approval or correction in accordance with section 275(1)(c) of the Personal Property Securities Act 2009 (Cth) indicating that, on settlement, the personal property included in the contract is not or will not be property in which the security interest is granted.
- 11.5 Subject to general condition 11.6, the vendor is not obliged to ensure that the purchaser receives a release, statement, approval or correction in respect of personal property—
  - (a) that-
    - (i) the purchaser intends to use predominantly for personal, domestic or household purposes; and
    - (ii) has a market value of not more than \$5000 or, if a greater amount has been prescribed for the purposes of section 47(1) of the Personal Property Securities Act 2009 (Cth), not more than that prescribed amount; or
  - (b) that is sold in the ordinary course of the vendor's business of selling personal property of that kind.
- 11.6 The vendor is obliged to ensure that the purchaser receives a release, statement, approval or correction in respect of personal property described in general condition 11.5 if—
  - (a) the personal property is of a kind that may or must be described by serial number in the Personal Property Securities Register; or
  - (b) the purchaser has actual or constructive knowledge that the sale constitutes a breach of the security agreement that provides for the security interest.
- 11.7 A release for the purposes of general condition 11.4(a) must be in writing.

- 11.8 A release for the purposes of general condition 11.4(a) must be effective in releasing the goods from the security interest and be in a form which allows the purchaser to take title to the goods free of that security interest.
- 11.9 If the purchaser receives a release under general condition 11.4(a) the purchaser must provide the vendor with a copy of the release at or as soon as practicable after settlement.
- 11.10 In addition to ensuring that a release is received under general condition 11.4(a), the vendor must ensure that at or before settlement the purchaser receives a written undertaking from a secured party to register a financing change statement to reflect that release if the property being released includes goods of a kind that are described by serial number in the Personal Property Securities Register.
- 11.11 The purchaser must advise the vendor of any security interest that is registered on or before the day of sale on the Personal Property Securities Register, which the purchaser reasonably requires to be released, at least 21 days before the due date for settlement.
- 11.12 The vendor may delay settlement until 21 days after the purchaser advises the vendor of the security interests that the purchaser reasonably requires to be released if the purchaser does not provide an advice under general condition 11.11.
- 11.13 If settlement is delayed under general condition 11.12 the purchaser must pay the vendor-
  - interest from the due date for settlement until the date on which settlement occurs or 21 days after the vendor receives the advice, whichever is the earlier; and
  - (b) any reasonable costs incurred by the vendor as a result of the delay—as though the purchaser was in default.
- 11.14 The vendor is not required to ensure that the purchaser receives a release in respect of the land. This general condition 11.14 applies despite general conditio
- 11.14 applies despite general condition 11.15
  Words and phrases which are defined in the Personal Property Securities Act 2009 (Cth) Have the same meaning in general condition 11 unless the context requires otherwise.

## 12 BUILDER WARRANTY INSURANCE

The vendor warrants that the vendor will provide at settlement details of any current builder warranty insurance in the vendor's possession relating to the property if requested in writing to do so at least 21 days before settlement.

#### 13 GENERAL LAW LAND

- 13.1 The vendor must complete a conversion of title in accordance with section 14 of the *Transfer of Land Act 1958* before settlement if the land is the subject of a provisional folio under section 23 of that Act.
- 13.2 The remaining provisions of this general condition 13 only apply if any part of the land is not under the operation of the Transfer of Land Act 1958.
- 13.3 The vendor is taken to the holder of an unencumbered estate in free simple in the land if there is an unbroken chain of title starting at least 30 years before the day of sale proving on the face of the documents the ownership of the entire legal and equitable estate without the aid of other evidence.
- 13.4 The purchaser is entitled to inspect the vendor's chain of title on request at such place in Victoria as the vendor nominates.
- 13.5 The purchaser is taken to have accepted the vendor's title if:
  - (a) 21 days have elapsed since the day of sale; and
  - (b) the purchaser has not reasonably objected to the title or reasonably required the vendor to remedy a defect in the
- 13.6 The contract will be at an end if:
  - (a) the vendor gives the purchaser a notice that the vendor is unable or unwilling to satisfy the purchaser's objection or requirement and that the contract will end if the objection or requirement is not withdrawn within 14 days of the giving of the notice; and
  - (b) the objection or requirement is not withdrawn in that time.
- 13.7 If the contract ends in accordance with general condition 13.6, the deposit must be returned to the purchaser and neither party has a claim against the other in damages.
- 13.8 General condition 17.1 [settlement] should be read as if the reference to 'registered proprietor' is a reference to 'owner' in respect of that part of the land which is not under the operation of the *Transfer of Land Act 1958*.

## Money

## 14 DEPOSIT

- 14.1 The purchaser must pay the deposit:
  - (a) to the vendor's licensed estate agent; or
  - (b) if there is no estate agent, to the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer; or
  - (c) if the vendor directs, into a special purpose account in an authorised deposit-taking institution in Victoria specified by the vendor in the joint names of the purchaser and the vendor.
- 14.2 If the land sold is a lot on an unregistered plan of subdivision, the deposit:
  - (a) must not exceed 10% of the price; and
  - (b) must be paid to the vendor's estate agent, legal practitioner or conveyancer and held by the estate agent, legal practitioner or conveyancer on trust for the purchaser until the registration of the plan of subdivision.

- 14.3 The deposit must be released to the vendor if:
  - (a) the vendor provides particulars, to the satisfaction of the purchaser, that either-
    - (i) there are no debts secured against the property; or
    - (ii) if there are any debts, the total amount of those debts together with any amounts to be withheld in accordance with general conditions 24 and 25 does not exceed 80% of the sale price; and
  - (b) at least 28 days have elapsed since the particulars were given to the purchaser under paragraph (a); and
  - (c) all conditions of section 27 of the Sale of Land Act 1962 have been satisfied.
- 14.4 The stakeholder must pay the deposit and any interest to the party entitled when the deposit is released, the contract is settled, or the contract is ended.
- 14.5 The stakeholder may pay the deposit and any interest into court if it is reasonable to do so.
- 14.6 Where the purchaser is deemed by section 27(7) of the Sale of Land Act 1962 to have given the deposit release authorisation referred to in section 27(1), the purchaser is also deemed to have accepted title in the absence of any prior express objection to title.
- 14.7 Payment of the deposit may be made or tendered:
  - (a) in cash up to \$1,000 or 0.2% of the price, whichever is greater; or
  - (b) by cheque drawn on an authorised deposit-taking institution; or
  - (c) by electronic funds transfer to a recipient having the appropriate facilities for receipt.

However, unless otherwise agreed:

- (d) payment may not be made by credit card, debit card or any other financial transfer system that allows for any chargeback or funds reversal other than for fraud or mistaken payment, and
- (e) any financial transfer or similar fees or deductions from the funds transferred, other than any fees charged by the
- 14.8 Payment by electronic funds transfer is made when cleared funds are received in the recipient's bank account.
- 14.9 Before the funds are electronically transferred the intended recipient must be notified in writing and given sufficient particulars to readily identify the elevant transaction.
- 14.10 As soon as the funds have been electronically transferred the intended recipient must be provided with the relevant transaction number or reference details.
- 14.11 For the purpose of this general condition 'authorised deposit-taking institution' means a body corporate for which an authority under section 9(3) of the *Banking Act 1959 (Cth)* is in force.

#### 15 DEPOSIT BOND

- 15.1 This general condition only applies if the applicable box in the particulars of sale is checked.
- 15.2 In this general condition "deposit bond" means an irrevocable undertaking to pay on demand an amount equal to the deposit or any unpaid part of the deposit. The issuer and the form of the deposit bond must be satisfactory to the vendor. The deposit bond must have an expiry date at least 45 days after the due date for settlement.
- 15.3 The purchaser may deliver a deposit bond to the vendor's estate agent, legal practitioner or conveyancer within 7 days after the day of sale.
- 15.4 The purchaser may at least 45 days before a current deposit bond expires deliver a replacement deposit bond on the same terms and conditions.
- 15.5 Where a deposit bond is delivered, the purchaser must pay the deposit to the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer on the first to occur of:
  - (a) settlement
  - (b) the date that is 45 days before the deposit bond or any replacement deposit bond expires;
  - (c) the date on which this contract ends in accordance with general condition 35.2 [default not remedied] following breach by the purchaser; and
  - (d) the date on which the vendor ends this contract by accepting repudiation of it by the purchaser.
- 15.6 The vendor may claim on the deposit bond without prior notice if the purchaser defaults under this contract or repudiates this contract and the contract is ended. The amount paid by the issuer satisfies the obligations of the purchaser under general condition 15.5 to the extent of the payment.
- 15.7 Nothing in this general condition limits the rights of the vendor if the purchaser defaults under this contract or repudiates this contract, except as provided in general condition 15.6.
- 15.8 This general condition is subject to general condition 14.2 [deposit].

## 16 BANK GUARANTEE

- 16.1 This general condition only applies if the applicable box in the particulars of sale is checked.
- 16.2 In this general condition:
  - (a) "bank guarantee" means an unconditional and irrevocable guarantee or undertaking by a bank in a form satisfactory to the vendor to pay on demand any amount under this contract agreed in writing, and
  - (b) "bank" means an authorised deposit-taking institution under the Banking Act 1959 (Cth).
- 16.3 The purchaser may deliver a bank guarantee to the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer.
- 16.4 The purchaser must pay the amount secured by the bank guarantee to the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer on the first to occur of:
  - (a) settlement;
  - (b) the date that is 45 days before the bank guarantee expires;

- (c) the date on which this contract ends in accordance with general condition 35.2 [default not remedied] following breach by the purchaser; and
- the date on which the vendor ends this contract by accepting repudiation of it by the purchaser. (d)
- The vendor must return the bank guarantee document to the purchaser when the purchaser pays the amount secured 16.5 by the bank quarantee in accordance with general condition 16.4.
- 16.6 The vendor may claim on the bank guarantee without prior notice if the purchaser defaults under this contract or repudiates this contract and the contract is ended. The amount paid by the bank satisfies the obligations of the purchaser under general condition 16.4 to the extent of the payment.
- Nothing in this general condition limits the rights of the vendor if the purchaser defaults under this contract or repudiates 16.7 this contract except as provided in general condition 16.6.
- This general condition is subject to general condition 14.2 [deposit]. 16.8

#### 17 SETTLEMENT

- 17.1 At settlement:
  - the purchaser must pay the balance; and (a)
  - (b) the vendor must:
    - do all things necessary to enable the purchaser to become the registered proprietor of the land; and (i)
    - give either vacant possession or receipt of rents and profits in accordance with the particulars of sale.
- 172 Settlement must be conducted between the hours of 10.00 am and 4.00 pm unless the parties agree otherwise.
- 17.3 The purchaser must pay all money other than the deposit in accordance with a written direction of the vendor or the vendor's legal practitioner or conveyancer.

#### ELECTRONIC SETTLEMENT 18

- ovne Settlement and lodgement of the instruments necessary to record the purchaser as registered propuletor of the land will be conducted electronically in accordance with the Electronic Conveyancing National Law. This general condition 18 has priority over any other provision of this contract to the extent of any inconsistency.
- A party must immediately give written notice it that party reasonably believes that settlement and lodg ement can no longer be conducted electronically. General condition 18 ceases to apply from when such a notice is given.
- 18.3 Each party must:
  - be, or engage a representative who is, a subscriber for the purposes of the Electronic Conveyancing National (a)
  - ensure that all other persons for whom that party is responsible and who are associated with this transaction (b) are, or engage, a subscriber for the purposes of the Electronic Conveyancing National Law, and
  - conduct the transaction in accordance with the Electronic Conveyancing National Law. (c)
- The vendor must open the electronic workspace ("workspace") as soon as reasonably practicable and nominate a date 18.4 and time for settlement. The inclusion of a specific date and time for settlement in a workspace is not of itself a promise to settle on that date or at that time. The workspace is an electronic address for the service of notices and for written communications for the purposes of any electronic transactions legislation.
- This general condition 18.5 applies if there is more than one electronic lodgement network operator in respect of the transaction. In this general condition 18.5 "the transaction" means this sale and purchase and any associated transaction involving any of the same subscribers.
  - To the extent that any interoperability rules governing the relationship between electronic lodgement network operators
  - the electronic lodgement network operator to conduct all the financial and lodgement aspects of the transaction (a) after the workspace locks must be one which is willing and able to conduct such aspects of the transaction in accordance with the instructions of all the subscribers in the workspaces of all the electronic lodgement network operators after the workspace locks;

- 18.6 Settlement occurs when the workspace records that:

  - if there is no exchange of funds or value, the documents necessary to enable the purchaser to become (b) registered proprietor of the land have been accepted for electronic lodgement.
- The parties must do everything reasonably necessary to effect settlement: 18.7
  - electronically on the next business day, or (a)
  - at the option of either party, otherwise than electronically as soon as possible -
  - if, after the locking of the workspace at the nominated settlement time, settlement in accordance with general condition 18.6 has not occurred by 4.00 pm, or 6.00 pm if the nominated time for settlement is after 4.00 pm.
- Each party must do everything reasonably necessary to assist the other party to trace and identify the recipient of any missing or mistaken payment and to recover the missing or mistaken payment.
- 18.9 The vendor must before settlement:
  - deliver any keys, security devices and codes ("keys") to the estate agent named in the contract, (a)
  - direct the estate agent to give the keys to the purchaser or the purchaser's nominee on notification of settlement (b) by the vendor, the vendor's subscriber or the electronic lodgement network operator;

(c) deliver all other physical documents and items (other than the goods sold by the contract) to which the purchaser is entitled at settlement, and any keys if not delivered to the estate agent, to the vendor's subscriber or, if there is no vendor's subscriber, confirm in writing to the purchaser that the vendor holds those documents, items and keys at the vendor's address set out in the contract, and

give, or direct its subscriber to give, all those documents and items and any such keys to the purchaser or the purchaser's nominee on notification by the electronic lodgement network operator of settlement.

#### 19 GST

- 19.1 The purchaser does not have to pay the vendor any amount in respect of GST in addition to the price if the particulars of sale specify that the price includes GST (if any).
- 19.2 The purchaser must pay to the vendor any GST payable by the vendor in respect of a taxable supply made under this contract in addition to the price if:
  - (a) the particulars of sale specify that GST (if any) must be paid in addition to the price; or
  - (b) GST is payable solely as a result of any action taken or intended to be taken by the purchaser after the day of sale, including a change of use; or
  - (c) the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract is of land on which a 'farming business' is carried on and the supply (or part of it) does not satisfy the requirements of section 38-480 of the GST Act; or
  - (d) the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract is of a going concern and the supply (or a part of it) does not satisfy the requirements of section 38-325 of the GST Act.
- 19.3 The purchaser is not obliged to pay any GST under this contract until a tax invoice has been given to the purchaser.
- 19.4 If the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract is of land on which a 'farming business' is carried on:
  - (a) the verigor warrante that the property is land on which a farming business has been carried on for the period of 5 years preceding the date of supply; and
  - (b) the purchaser warrants that the purchaser intends that a farming business will be carried on after settlement on the property.
- 19.5 If the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract/is a going concern:
  - (a) the parties agree that this contract is for the supply of a going concern; and
  - (b) the purchaser warrants that the purchaser is, or prior to settlement will be, registered for GST; and
  - (c) the vendor warrants that the vendor will carry on the going concern until the date of supply.
- 19.6 If the particulars of sale specify that the supply made under this contract is a 'margin scheme' supply, the parties agree that the margin scheme applies to this contract.
- 19.7 In this general condition:
  - (a) 'GST Act' means A New Tax System (Goods and Services Tax) Act 1999 (Cth); and
  - (b) 'GST' includes penalties and interest.

## 20 LOAN

- 20.1 If the particulars of sale specify that this contract is subject to a loan being approved, this contract is subject to the lender approving the loan on the security of the property by the approval date or any later date allowed by the vendor.
- 20.2 The purchaser may end the contract if the loan is not approved by the approval date, but only if the purchaser:
  - (a) immediately applied for the loan; and
  - (b) did everything reasonably required to obtain approval of the loan; and
  - (c) serves written notice ending the contract, together with written evidence of rejection or non-approval of the loan, on the vendor within 2 clear business days after the approval date or any later date allowed by the vendor; and
  - (d) is not in default under any other condition of this contract when the notice is given.
- 20.3 All money must be immediately refunded to the purchaser if the contract is ended.

## 21 BUILDING REPORT

- 21.1 This general condition only applies if the applicable box in the particulars of sale is checked.
- 21.2 The purchaser may end this contract within 14 days from the day of sale if the purchaser:
  - (a) obtains a written report from a registered building practitioner or architect which discloses a current defect in a structure on the land and designates it as a major building defect;
  - (b) gives the vendor a copy of the report and a written notice ending this contract; and
  - (c) is not then in default.
- 21.3 All money paid must be immediately refunded to the purchaser if the contract ends in accordance with this general condition.
- 21.4 A notice under this general condition may be served on the vendor's legal practitioner, conveyancer or estate agent even if the estate agent's authority has formally expired at the time of service.
- 21.5 The registered building practitioner may inspect the property at any reasonable time for the purpose of preparing the report.

#### 22 PEST REPORT

- 22.1 This general condition only applies if the applicable box in the particulars of sale is checked.
- 22.2 The purchaser may end this contract within 14 days from the day of sale if the purchaser:

- (c) is not then in default.

- 25.2 The purchaser must notify the vendor in writing of the name of the recipient of the \*supply for the purposes of section 14-255 of Schedule 1 to the *Taxation Administration Act 1953 (Cth)* at least 21 days before the due date for settlement unless the recipient is the purchaser named in the contract.

## Planning controls

## Can you change how the property is used, or the buildings on it?

All land is subject to a planning scheme, run by the local council. How the property is zoned and any overlays that may apply, will determine how the land can be used. This may restrict such things as whether you can build on vacant land or how you can alter or develop the land and its buildings over time

The local council can give you advice about the planning scheme, as well as details of any other restrictions that may apply, such as design guidelines or bushfire safety design. There may also be restrictions – known as encumbrances – on the property's title, which prevent you from developing the property. You can find out about encumbrances by looking at the section 32 statement.

## Are there any proposed or granted planning permits?

The local council can advise you if there are any proposed or issued planning permits for any properties close by. Significant developments in your area may change the local 'character' (predominant style of the area) and may increase noise or traffic near the property.

## Safety

## Is the building safe to live in?

Building laws are in place to ensure building safety. Professional building inspections can help you assess the property for electrical safety, possible illegal building work, adequate pool or spa fencing and the presence of asbestos, termites, or other potential hazards.

## **Building permits**

# Have any buildings or retaining walls on the property been altered, or do you plan to alter them?

There are laws and regulations about how buildings and retaining walls are constructed, which you may wish to investigate to ensure any completed or proposed building work is approved. The local council may be able to give you information about any building permits issued for recent building works done to the property, and what you must do to plan new work. You can also commission a private building surveyor's assessment.

## Are any recent building or renovation works covered by insurance?

Ask the vendor if there is any owner-builder insurance or builder's warranty to cover defects in the work done to the property.

# Utilities and essential services Does the property have working connections for water, sewerage, electricity, gas, telephone and internet?

Unconnected services may not be available, or may incur a fee to connect. You may also need to choose from a range of suppliers for these services. This may be particularly important in rural areas where some services are not available.

# Buyers' rights Do you know your rights when buying a property?

The contract of sale and section 32 statement contain important information about the property, so you should request to see these and read them thoroughly. Many people engage a lawyer or conveyancer to help them understand the contracts and ensure the sale goes through correctly. If you intend to hire a professional, you should consider speaking to them before you commit to the sale. There are also important rules about the way private sales and auctions are conducted. These may include a cooling-off period and specific rights associated with 'off the plan' sales. The important thing to remember is that, as the buyer, you have rights

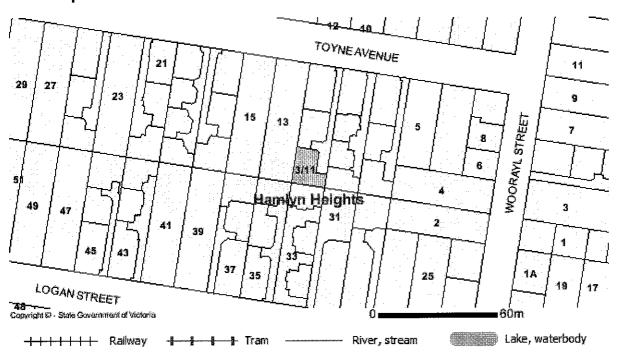

# Model rules for an owners corporation

# 1. Health, safety and security

# 1.1 Health, safety and security of lot owners, occupiers of lots and others

A lot owner or occupier must not use the lot, or permit it to be used, so as to cause a hazard to the health, safety and security of an owner, occupier, or user of another lot.

# 1.2 Storage of flammable liquids and other dangerous substances and materials

- (1) Except with the approval in writing of the owners corporation, an owner or occupier of a lot must not use or store on the lot or on the common property any flammable chemical, liquid or gas or other flammable material.
- (2) This rule does not apply to—
- (a) chemicals, liquids, gases or other material used or intended to be used for domestic purposes; or
- (b) any chemical, liquid, gas or other material in a fuel tank of a motor vehicle or internal combustion engine.

## 1.3 Waste disposal

An owner or occupier must ensure that the disposal of garbage or waste does not adversely affect the health, hygiene or comfort of the occupiers or users of other lots.

## 2. Committees and sub-committees

# 2.1 Functions, powers and reporting of committees and subcommittees

A committee may appoint members to a sub committee without reference to the owners corporation.

# 3. Management and administration

# 3.1 Metering of services and apportionment of costs of services

- (1) The owners corporation must not seek payment or reimbursement for a cost or charge from a lot owner or occupier that is more than the amount that the supplier would have charged the lot owner or occupier for the same goods or services.
- (2) If a supplier has issued an account to the owners corporation, the owners corporation cannot recover from the lot owner or occupier an amount which includes any amount that is able to be claimed as a concession or rebate by or on behalf of the lot owner or occupier from the relevant supplier.
- (3) Subrule (2) does not apply if the concession or rebate—

- (a) must be claimed by the lot owner or occupier and the owners corporation has given the lot owner or occupier an opportunity to claim it and the lot owner or occupier has not done so by the payment date set by the relevant supplier; or
  - (b) is paid directly to the lot owner or occupier as a refund.

# 4. Use of common property

## 4.1 Use of common property

- (1) An owner or occupier of a lot must not obstruct the lawful use and enjoyment of the common property by any other person entitled to use the common property.
- (2) An owner or occupier of a lot must not, without the written approval of the owners corporation, use for the owner or occupier's own purposes as a garden any portion of the common property.
- (3) An approval under subrule (2) may state a period for which the approval is granted.
- (4) If the owners corporation has resolved that an animal is a danger or is causing a nuisance to the common property, it must give reasonable notice of this resolution to the owner or occupier who is keeping the animal.
- (5) An owner or occupier of a lot who is keeping an animal that is the subject of a notice under subrule (4) must remove that animal.
- (6) Subrules (4) and (5) do not apply to an animal that assists a person with an impairment or disability.

## 4.2 Vehicles and parking on common property

An owner or occupier of a lot must not, unless in the case of an emergency, park or leave a motor vehicle or other vehicle or permit a motor vehicle or other vehicle—

- (a) to be parked or left in parking spaces situated on common property and allocated for other lots; or
  - (b) on the common property so as to obstruct a driveway, pathway, entrance or exit to a lot; or
- (c) in any place other than a parking area situated on common property specified for that purpose by the owners corporation.

# 4.3 Damage to common property

- (1) An owner or occupier of a lot must not damage or alter the common property without the written approval of the owners corporation.
- (2) An owner or occupier of a lot must not damage or alter a structure that forms part of the common property without the written approval of the owners corporation.
- (3) An approval under subrule (1) or (2) may state a period for which the approval is granted, and may specify the works and conditions to which the approval is subject.
- (4) An owner or person authorised by an owner may install a locking or safety device to protect the lot against intruders, or a screen or barrier to prevent entry of animals or insects, if the device, screen or barrier is soundly built and is consistent with the colour, style and materials of the building.
- (5) The owner or person referred to in subrule (4) must keep any device, screen or barrier installed in good order and repair.

## 5. Lots

## 5.1 Change of use of lots

An owner or occupier of a lot must give written notification to the owners corporation if the owner or occupier changes the existing use of the lot in a way that will affect the insurance premiums for the owners corporation.

## **Example**

If the change of use results in a hazardous activity being carried out on the lot, or results in the lot being used for commercial or industrial purposes rather than residential purposes.

## 5.2 External appearance of lots

- (1) An owner or occupier of a lot must obtain the written approval of the owners corporation before making any changes to the external appearance of their lot.
- (2) An owners corporation cannot unreasonably withhold approval, but may give approval subject to reasonable conditions to protect quiet enjoyment of other lot owners, structural integrity or the value of other lots and/or common property.

# 5.3 Requiring notice to the owners corporation of renovations to lots

An owner or occupier of a lot must notify the owners corporation when undertaking any renovations or other works that may affect the common property and/or other lot owners' or occupiers' enjoyment of the common property.

# 6. Behaviour of persons

# 6.1 Behaviour of owners, occupiers and invitees on common property

An owner or occupier of a lot must take all reasonable steps to ensure that guests of the owner or occupier do not behave in a manner likely to unreasonably interfere with the peaceful enjoyment of any other person entitled to use the common property.

#### 6.2 Noise and other nuisance control

- (1) An owner or occupier of a lot, or a guest of an owner or occupier, must not unreasonably create any noise likely to interfere with the peaceful enjoyment of any other person entitled to use the common property.
- (2) Subrule (1) does not apply to the making of a noise if the owners corporation has given written permission for the noise to be made.

# 7. Dispute resolution

- (1) The grievance procedure set out in this rule applies to disputes involving a lot owner, manager, or an occupier or the owners corporation.
- (2) The party making the complaint must prepare a written statement in the approved form.
- (3) If there is a grievance committee of the owners corporation, it must be notified of the dispute by the complainant.
- (4) If there is no grievance committee, the owners corporation must be notified of any dispute by the complainant, regardless of whether the owners corporation is an immediate party to the dispute.

- (5) The parties to the dispute must meet and discuss the matter in dispute, along with either the grievance committee or the owners corporation, within 14 working days after the dispute comes to the attention of all the parties.
- (6) A party to the dispute may appoint a person to act or appear on the party's behalf at the meeting.
- (7) If the dispute is not resolved, the grievance committee or owners corporation must notify each party of the party's right to take further action under Part 10 of the *Owners Corporations Act 2006*.
- (8) This process is separate from and does not limit any further action under Part 10 of the *Owners Corporations Act 2006*.

# Owners Corporation Statement of Advice and Information for Prospective Purchasers and Lot Owners

Schedule 3, Regulation 12, Owners Corporations Regulations 2007

OC 10 (12/07)

#### What is an Owners Corporation?

The lot you are considering buying is part of an Owners Corporation. Whenever a plan of subdivision creates common property, an Owners Corporation is responsible for managing the common property. A purchaser of a lot that is part of an Owners Corporation automatically becomes a member of the Owners Corporation when the transfer of that lot to the purchaser has been registered with Land Victoria.

If you buy into an Owners Corporation, you will be purchasing not only the individual property, but also ownership of, and the right to use, the common property as set out in the plan of subdivision. This common property may include driveways, stairs, paths, passages, lifts, lobbies, common garden areas and other facilities set up for use by owners and Occupiers. In order to identify the boundary between the individual lot you are purchasing (for which the owner is solely responsible) and the common property (for which all members of the Owners Corporation are responsible), you should closely inspect the plan of subdivision.

## How are decisions made by an Owners Corporation?

As an owner, you will be required to make financial contributions to the Owners Corporation, in particular for the repair, maintenance and management of the common property. Decisions as to the management of this common property will be the subject of collective decision making. Decisions as to these financial contributions, which may involve significant expenditure, will be decided by a vote.

#### **Owners Corporation rules**

The Owners Corporation rules may deal with matters such as car parking, noise, pets, the appearance or use of lots, behaviour of owners, Occupiers or guests and grievance procedures.

You should look at the Owners Corporation rules to consider any restrictions imposed by the rules.

#### Lot entitlement and lot liability

The plan of subdivision will also show your lot entitlement and lot liability. Lot liability represents the share of Owners Corporation expenses that each Lot Owner is required to pay.

Lot entitlement is an owner's share of ownership of the common property, which determines voting rights. You should make sure that the allocation of lot liability and entitlement for the lot you are considering buying seems fair and reasonable.

#### Further information

If you are interested in finding out more about living in an Owners Corporation, you can contact Consumer Affairs Victoria. If you require further information about the particular Owners Corporation you are buying into you can inspect that Owners Corporation's information register.

#### Management of an Owners Corporation

An Owners Corporation may be self-managed by the Lot Owners or professionally managed by an Owners Corporation Manager. If an Owners Corporation chooses to appoint a professional manger, it must be a Manager registered with the Business Licensing Authority (BLA).

#### c) Quorum & entitlement to vote

#### 7. Insurance

## 7.1. Current cover

The current insurance details were included in the Manager's Report, which was distributed with the notice of meeting. The Manager tabled a copy of the Product Disclosure Statement (PDS) and Financial Services Guide

Printed: 29 October 2019

(FSG) and advised the meeting that she is an Authorised Representative of CHU Underwriting Agencies, Body Corporate Brokers and Whitbread Insurance Brokers. The manager advised that Ace Body Corporate Management (Geelong) are unit holders in Resolute Property Protect (Resolute) whereby the manager is an authorised representative of Resolute and can provide general and factual advice to lot owners and committees regarding strata insurance. Note: Ace Managers will be receiving a distribution of dividends and commissions in accordance with the revenue they generate for acting as a unit holder and as an authorised representative of Resolute.

**General Advice Warning** – The Manager advised the meeting that any recommendation(s) made is general advice only and owners and/or their representatives should read the PDS before they make a decision.

Commission Disclosure — The Manager advised that as per clause 1.3 of the Contract of Appointment and in line with the Strata Community Association (SCA) guidelines, the Manager receives insurance commission on insurance premiums paid on behalf of the Owners Corporation from those organisations that the Manager is authorised to deal with. Commission does not exceed 20% of the base premium amount. This commission does not usually affect the insurance premium. The manager will also received dividends for being a unit holder in Resolute.

**Duty of Disclosure** – The law requires Owners Corporations (or designated officers) to tell the Insurers everything that they know (or could reasonably be expected to know in the circumstances) which is relevant to the Insurers decision to insure the Owners Corporation and the terms on which the Insurer offers to the Owners Corporation.

The duty applies before the Owners Corporation enters into a contract with the Insurer, that is, before the Insurer accepts the Owners Corporation's application and before an alteration or renewal of the Owners Corporation's policy.

If the Owners Corporation does not tell an Insurer everything that is relevant, they may;

- · Reduce or refuse to pay a claim;
- Cancel the policy; or
- If the Owners Corporation acts dishonestly, invalidate the policy from its beginning and not be bound by it.

The Manager advised the meeting that all owners and/or their representatives need to ensure information (as required above) is disclosed as soon as possible and prior to a policy being taken out, renewed or changed. If you are not sure whether something is relevant, it is best to disclose it anyway. Disclosures must be in writing addressed to the Manager.

Details of cover – The meeting discussed and noted the insurance details.

The Manager stated it is important to note that whilst the Owners Corporation has insurance on the buildings/roads and services and for public liability over the common areas, this insurance **does not extend** to owners and occupants contents or public liability inside a member's lot. It is, therefore, important that members organise their own insurance.

#### 7.2. Renewal of insurance

The Manager explained the importance of continuity of cover to comply with the Owners Corporation's legal responsibilities and explained that he is required to obtain clear instructions for the renewal of the insurance. The Manager advised that the Owners Corporation could;

- i. Renew at the same level of cover currently in place; or
- ii. Renew at the suggested level of cover from the Insurer; or
- iii. Renew at a set percentage increase; or
- iv. Obtain an insurance valuation and renew at the value suggested in the valuation report.

The meeting made the following resolution:

It was **RESOLVED** that the Manager source quotes for the insurance at the current level of cover and send to the chairperson for decision and renew at her discretion.

If there is an <u>after-hours</u> emergency concerning <u>Common Property only</u>, contact the Property Maintenance Department by calling the office number on 5221 3685 and selecting <u>Option 1</u>.

**Contractors** – The Owners Corporation has a *duty of care* and is required to provide a safe work site for all contractors. All contractors should be adequately insured and licensed for the work that they are carrying out. Owners should only be paid for work done if they covered by appropriate insurance, and where necessary, licensed.

#### 8.3. Essential safety measures

There are currently no essential safety measures being monitored.

#### **General Reminders**:

- Owners Corporation Rules Owners are reminded that the rules of the Owners Corporation must be adhered too. Owners should ensure their tenants are aware of the rules and ensure that they adhere to them.
- Parking on Common Property Parking on common property is in breach of the rules of the Owners Corporation and all owners are asked to ensure that they, their tenants and visitors are aware of this.
- Exterior of Buildings Approval should be sought from the Owners Corporation before commencing any
