PRELIMINARIES AND GENERAL

THE PROJECT

The works are as described in this specification and as shown on the drawings.

SITE

The site of the works, the site address and the legal description are shown on the drawings. Confine access and work to the area of site indicated on the drawings.

BUILDING CONSENT COMPLIANCE

It is an offence under the Building Act 2004 to carry out any work not in accordance with the building consent. Refer the resolution of matters concerning compliance to the main contractor for direction. Where building consent approval is affected refer any change to the territorial authority.

STATUTORY OBLIGATIONS

Comply with all statutory obligations and regulations of regulatory bodies controlling the execution of the works.

BUILDING CONSENT

Obtain the original or copies of the building consent form and documents from the main contractor and keep on site. Liaise with the territorial authority for all notices to be given and all inspections required during construction to ensure compliance. Return the consent form and documents to the owner on completion.

PRODUCER STATEMENTS

When producer statements verifying construction are required, provide copies to both the territorial authority and the owner. Producer statements to be in the form required by the Territorial Authority to comply with the Building Act.

SET-OUT AND DATUM

Set out the works to conform with the drawings. Establish a permanent site datum to confirm the proposed building ground floor level and its relationship to all other existing and new building levels.

CONSTRUCTION SCHEDULE

SINGLE STOREY

These drawings to be read in conjunction with any supplementary engineer's documentation (i.e. Truss design, floor framing layout and foundation design).

All construction to comply with NZS 3604, NZBC & local council policy.

All timber treatment to comply with NZS 3602.

FOUNDATION:

Refer to Structural Engineer's documents for drawings and specification.

FRAMING

All Framing: (unless stated otherwise on the drawings) VSG8-MSG8 Douglas Fir

Exterior walls: H1.2, Bottom plate - 90x45 & Double top plate - 90x45 + 140x35 or 140x45 & top plate 140x45 **Interior walls:** Untreated with H1.2 bottom plate, Bottom plate & Top Plate - 90x45, refer to ceilings for double top plate requirements.

Bottom plate fixings: Lumberlok Bottom Plate Fixing Anchors as per manufacturer's specifications @ 900mm crs on all external walls and within 150mm of each end of the plate. 75mmx3.8mmØ shot fired fasteners @ 900mm crs and within 150mm of each end of the bottom plate to interior load bearing walls.

DPC between bottom plate & floor slab (Refer to MiTek specification attached for specific bottom plate fixing details required for bracing & lintels).

WALL FRAMING:

Exterior & Interior Loadbearing wall: 90x45mm or 140x45mm studs @ 600 crs, refer Architectural drawings for fire rated wall wall studs and spacings.

Dwangs Exterior: 90x45 or 140x45 @ 800crs **Non loadbearing:** 90x45mm studs @ 600mm crs **Dwangs Interior:** 90x45mm @ 800mm crs

Lintels: Lintels are shown on the Truss design. (All Lintels SG8 unless stated otherwise).

Building Wrap: 6mm Rab Board, 7mm Ecoply Barrier or Fastwrap building wrap with Aluband flexible flashing tape Building wrap to be strapped @ 300crs maximum between dwangs. Building wrap for fire rated wall to be fire retardant building paper.

INSULATION, ENERGY EFFICIENCY:

Exterior Walls: Pink Batts - Refer to H1 Schedule, Energy Efficiency Calculations **Ceilings:** Pink Batts - Refer to H1 Schedule, Energy Efficiency Calculations

Glazing: Double glazing with low emissivity clear to all windows, excluding garage

Air Seals: PEF Rod & Low expansion foam.

Lighting: All lighting recessed into ceilings to be closed and abutted type.

TRUSSED ROOF AREA: (A as-built truss design will be provided at time of manufacturing)

Corrugated profile/Longrun roof

Purlins: 70x45 SG6 @ 900crs, spacing for end purlins at max 2/3 of intermediate span

Purlin fixings: Fixing type T, 1 / 10g self-drilling screw, 80mm long (NZS3604:2011 Table 10.10)

Trusses: @ 900crs, refer to truss design (H1.2 unless otherwise stated on Timber Treatment Plan)

Fascia & Gutter system: Metalcraft Metalline fascia 185mm and Metalcraft gutter, refer to roof plan.

Down pipes: 75x55mm rectangular downpipe.

Soffits: 4.5mm Hardiflex to Ribbon boards, sprockets & packers ex50. Provide 6mm Hardiflex for fire wall.

CEILINGS

Interior Walls: Walls running parallel to battens to be double top plate - 90x45 + 140x35 or 140x45

Battens: 70x35 timber battens at 600 crs & 13mm Gib board to ceiling.

Flat Ceilings: 13mm Gib board throughout unless specified different on the plans & Level 4 finish to all rooms in flat ceiling areas.

FLOOR FINISHES

Note: Floor surfaces of any space containing "sanitary fixtures or sanitary appliances must be impervious and easily cleaned."

Carpet: Non-slip and have a slip (wet) coefficient value of 0.55-0.70 for tufted of loop pile. (NZBC D1/AS1 Table 2) Floors to be carpet unless stated otherwise on plan, not including the garage.

Floor Tiles: Non-slip and have a slip (wet) coefficient value of 0.35-0.65 for grit finished ceramic tiles. (NZB C D1/AS1 Table 2).

Entry through external doors to have a max step of 190mm (Riser height and tread depth for all steps in one flight, shall be uniform within the tolerance of \pm 5 mm measured at the centreline on straight flights and at the pitch line on curved and spiral flights.)

With outward opening doors, a landing shall be provide with a clear space of at least 400mm from the leading of the door and the full width of the landing.

Build up this area with AP40 and compact, to have a cross fall of no less than 1:100 and fall away from building. (By Others, Coefficient of friction, wet - 0.6 - 0.9)

WET AREAS

Lining: Aqualine Gib with Enamel paint finish, refer to details attached.

Floor: Flooring to all first floor wet areas and bath plinths to be sealed with:

'ARDEX' waterproofing system, BRANZ appraised

KITCHEN JOINERY

Bench top – Engineering Stone with impervious surface, **Cupboards** – Melteca/Melamine **Bathroom Joinery**

Top – Vitreous China, Cupboards – Polyurethane coated

SINKS

Minimum Requirements for sinks:

Kitchen Sink: 300mm dia min X 125mm min depth. (As per NZBC G3/AS1) Laundry tub: No less than 35 litres. (As per NZBC G2/AS1)

VENTILATION:

Mechanical ventilation to be discharged outside via the soffit to comply with NZBC G4/AS1. Mechanical ventilation to be discharged outside via the soffit to comply with NZBC G4/AS1. Recommended Manrose Pro Series fan system or similar with min 25 litres per second, provide Manrose Pro Series MIXFLO shower fan MFLP150S (150mm) to bathroom, toilet or laundary which is not located to external wall.

SMOKE ALARMS (Hush type) To comply with NZBC F7/AS1 and to be installed to AS1670.6. Smoke detectors to be fitted within 3.0m of sleeping areas and on Escape routes, as indicated on plan. (Additional information – smoke alarms shall comply one of the following standards, UL217, ULCS531, AS3786 and BS5446 pt1 - Proof of compliance will be required for final inspection and issue of Code Compliance Certificate).

WATER PIPES

Water pipe from hot water heater to be 15mmØ with no more than 2 litres total volume (as per NZBC G12/AS1 Table 4 and NZS 4305 cl. 3.2.1 and Table 5) and closed cell foam polymer insulation which is preformed to the shape of the pipe and not less than 13 mm thick, is acceptable material for preventing pipes less than or equal to 40 mm diameter from freezing (as per NZBC G12/AS1).

Acceptable pipe lengths as per NZS 4305 table 5 $10mm\emptyset = 78ml/m$ (25m max, total) $15mm\emptyset = 176ml/m$ (12m max, total)

20mm $\emptyset = 214$ ml/m (7m max, total)

NZBC 7.5 Watertightness

7.5.1 The water supply system shall be tested to ensure watertightness.

An acceptable testing method is to:

- a) Subject the hot and cold system to a pressure of 1500 kPa for a period of not less than 15 minutes, and
- b) Inspect the system to ensure that there are no leaks.

TIMBER FRAMING, FOR INTERIOR USE

Timber treatment as per "Framing" section from construction schedule, machine stress graded timber to AS/NZS 1748, with moisture content at supply of 16% or less.

TIMBER FRAMING, FOR EXTERIOR USE

Timber treatment as per "Framing" section from construction schedule, machine stress graded timber to NZS 3631 and to NZS 3602, table 1 with moisture content to NZS 3602 table 4.

CEILING BATTENS

GIB® Rondo™ galvanised steel ceiling battens or timber battens, refer to "Ceilings" section from construction schedule.

TIMBER TRUSSES

Moisture content at supply: 16%.

DAMPPROOF COURSE

2-ply/3-ply Kraft felt strip saturated and coated with bitumen.

NAILS

Steel, stainless steel and galvanised steel of pattern to suit the location.

Type to NZS 3604 section 4 Durability, and of the size and number for each particular types of joint as laid down in the nailing schedules of NZS 3604 sections, 6 Foundations, 7 Floors, 8 Walls, 9 Posts, 10 Roof framing and 15 1.5 kPa and 2 kPa snow loading. Except that when hand driving nails into Timber the nail lengths and diameters should be generally as for power driven nails.

BOLTS AND SCREWS

Steel, stainless steel and galvanised steel of pattern to suit the location.

NAIL PLATES

Stainless steel and/or galvanised steel toothed or nailed plates to the plate manufacturer's design for the particular locations as shown on the drawings.

CONNECTORS

Galvanised steel connectors and structural brackets to the connector manufacturer's design for particular locations shown on drawings.

MOISTURE CONTENT

Maximum allowable equilibrium moisture content (EMC) for framing supporting interior linings 16%.

FRAMING WALLS

Frame to required loading and bracing complete with lintels, sills and nogs, all fabricated and fastened to NZS 3604 sections 8 & 15.

FRAMING ROOFS

Frame to required loading and bracing complete with valley boards, ridge boards and purlins/battens. Design and fit roof trusses complete with anchorage. All fabricated and fastened to NZS 3604 sections, 9 Posts, 10 Roof framing and 15 1.5 kPa and 2 kPa snow loading.

1.5 PERFORMANCE

Accept responsibility for the weather-tight performance of the completed cladding system, including all penetrations. To NZBC B2/AS1 Durability and NZBC E2/AS1 External moisture.

2 PRODUCTS

2.1 TIMBER SPECIES

Western Red Cedar:

Herman Pacific Canadian Western Red Cedar (Thuja plicata) harvested from the sustainable managed forests of British Columbia, Canada. Herman Pacific Western Red Cedar is supplied from forest sources, certified legal and sustainable under one or more independent third party verified certification systems (PEFC, CSA, SFI or FSC).

Refer to website for Herman Pacific's policy on sustainability and for links to suppliers websites and forest management goals and policies.

Yellow Cedar:

Herman Pacific Canadian Yellow Cedar (Chamaecyparis nootkatensis) harvested from the sustainable managed forests of British Columbia, Canada. Herman Pacific Yellow Cedar is supplied from forest sources, certified legal and sustainable under one or more independent third party verified certification systems (PEFC, CSA, SFI or FSC).

2.2 WEATHERBOARDS

Western Red Cedar & Yellow Cedar weatherboards to **Herman Pacific** (Hermpac) profiles, Lap and Rebate details to BRANZ BU 411 and general design to NZS 3617, species and grading to NZS 3602, table 2, reference 2A.1, Requirements for woodbased building components to achieve a 15-year durability performance. Weatherboards in lengths relevant to profile selection and application, with all unsound and open split knots excluded by cross cut removal prior to fixing into position.

Acceptable Solution is limited to the following types of weatherboards and their derivatives:

- Horizontal Rusticated and Hermpac Custom Profiles
- Horizontal Splaycut and Hermpac Custom Profiles

A selection of the above profiles are also available in Western Red Cedar Finger-Joint (CEDARONE & CEDARLINE) Pre-Primed and Undercoated, Sanded and/or de -nibbed between coats.

2.3 COVER BOARDS, MOULDINGS AND SCRIBERS

To **Herman Pacific** (Hermpac) profiles as detailed, with species and grading to <u>NZS 3602</u>, but with all unsound and open split knots excluded by cross cut removal prior to fixing into position. To <u>NZS 3602</u>, table 2, reference 2A.3, Requirements for wood-based building components to achieve a 15-year durability performance.

2.4 WALLUNDERLAYS

For flexible wall underlays, rigid wall underlays and rigid air barriers, refer to the appropriate separate section(s).

2.5 EXTERIOR CAVITY WALL BATTENS

Non-Structural Fixing Options:

Radiata pine H3.1 or H3.2 battens, minimum 20mm thickness. Temporary fix battens before being fixed into the framing with the cladding fixings. Cavibat, Non-Structural 40mm x 18mm fluted Polypropylene Cavity Batten System. Temporary fix battens before being fixed into the framing with the cladding fixings. Refer to BRANZ Appraisal 524.

Vertibat Radiata Pine H3.1 or H3.2 castellated and bevelled battens, minimum 20mm thickness. Temporary fix battens before being fixed into the framing with the cladding fixings.

Structural Fixing Options:

Radiata pine H3.1 or H3.2 battens, minimum 20mm thickness. Structurally fix Radiata Pine cavity battens as per BRANZ BU 582, part 4.2. Vertibat Radiata Pine H3.1 or H3.2 castellated beveled battens, minimum 20mm thickness.

NOTE: Vertibat and Radiata Pine Batten - Treatment to NZBC B2/AS1 and NZS 3602, table 1, reference 1D.10, Requirements for wood-based building components to achieve a 50-year durability performance.

2.6 EXTERIOR CAVITY CLOSER/VERMIN-PROOFING

Aluminium with upstands. Upstand one side 10mm and the other 75mm. Length and width to suit cavity. To NZBC E2/AS1: clause 9.1.8.3 and figure 66.

2.7 NAILS, SILICON BRONZE

Hermpac Crown, Rose or Flat Head, Annular Grooved Shank Silicon bronze fixings to <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1 Table 24. Refer to **Herman Pacific** construction details for fixing details and to SELECTIONS clause for fixing sizes.

2.8 NAILS, STAINLESS STEEL

Hermpac Crown, Rose, Flat or Jolt Head, Annular Grooved Shank Grade 316 Stainless steel fixings to NZBC E2/AS1 Table 24. Refer to Herman Pacific construction details for fixing details and to SELECTIONS clause for fixing sizes.

2.9 CLINCH NAILS, STAINLESS STEEL

Hermpac Proprietary 40 x 2.0mm and 50 x 2.0mm Clinch Nail, Annular Grooved Shank Grade 316 Stainless steel.

2.10 FLASHINGS

To <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1, 4.0 **Flashings**. Material, grade and colour as detailed and scheduled and to <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1; Table 21: **Compatibility of materials in contact**

and Table 22: **Compatibility of materials subject to run-off**. Ensure that materials used for flashings are compatible with the window frame materials and fixings and cladding materials and fixings.

2.11 SOAKERS, STAINLESS STEEL / COLORSTEEL ZINCALUME / ALUMINIUM

To <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1, 4.0 **Flashings**. Machine folded stainless steel/zinc coated steel sheet to profile of weatherboard and mitred corner joints. To <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1; Table 21: **Compatibility of materials in contact** and Table 22: **Compatibility of materials subject to run-off**. Ensure that materials used for soakers are compatible with adjacent materials and fixings, cladding materials and fixings.

2.12 SOAKERS, COPPER

To <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1, 4.0 **Flashings**. Machine folded half-hard copper sheet to profile of weatherboard and mitred corner joints. To <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1; Table 21: **Compatibility of materials in contact** and table 22: **Compatibility of materials subject to run-off**. Ensure that materials used for Soakers are compatible with adjacent materials and fixings and cladding materials and fixings.

2.13 FACTORY PRE-FINISHING - MACHINECOAT (NZ) - FLOOD COAT INUNDATION

Flood Coat Inundation: Factory application of selected oil based stain finishes by flood inundation and enhanced penetration of timber surface by roller pressure and fibre saturation.

Refer to: Machinecoat (NZ) - Flood Coat Inundation versus Spray Application,

and Maintenance Of Selected Oil Stain Finishes.

Resene: Machinecoat (NZ) Waterborne Woodsman oil stain - exclusive

pigment and fungicide enriched factory formulation.

Wood-X: Penetrating wood oil - exclusive Machinecoat (NZ) factory

formulation, standard and custom colour range.

Site applications to coating manufacturer's specifications. All Hermpac Weatherboards and Mouldings must be coated all 6 sides prior to installation. All cut ends require double coating.

2.14 FACTORY PRE-FINISHING - MACHINECOAT (NZ) - SURFACE SPRAY APPLICATION

Premium Acrylic Primer, Premium Alkyd Undercoat, Premium Acrylic base Top coat (Air Dried Timber):

Factory spray application of selected solvent based oil primer and undercoat starter coats and / or acrylic base finish coat on to timber surface.

Refer to: Hermpac Coating instructions

Primer Colour: Hermpac Off White or as specified by special contract.

Undercoat Colour: Hermpac Off White or as specified by special contract.

Factory applied Starter coats: Primary coat - Primer.

Secondary coat - Undercoat.

Factory applied Finish coats: Refer to SELECTIONS.

Site applications to coating manufacturer's specifications. All Hermpac Weatherboards and Mouldings must be coated all 6 sides prior to installation. All cut ends require double coating.

Premium Alkyd Primer and Undercoat, Premium Acrylic base Top coat (Kiln Dried Timber):

Factory spray application of selected solvent based oil primer and undercoat starter coats and / or acrylic base finish coat on to timber surface.

Refer to: Hermpac Coating instructions

Primer Colour: Hermpac Off White or as specified by special contract.

Undercoat Colour: Hermpac Off White or as specified by special contract.

Factory applied Starter coats: Primary coat - Primer.

Secondary coat - Undercoat.

Factory applied Finish coats: Refer to SELECTIONS.

Site applications to coating manufacturer's specifications. All Hermpac Weatherboards and Mouldings must be coated all 6 sides prior to installation. All cut ends require double coating.

3 EXECUTION

3.1 **GENERALLY**

Execution to NZBC E2/AS1: 3.0 Weather tightness risk factors, and 9.0 Wall claddings, 9.1.8 Drained cavities and 9.4 Timber weatherboards.

3.2 STORAGE

Take delivery of **Herman Pacific** timber products, dry, unmarked and undamaged from freight and handling (Grade characteristics excluded). Store on site, under cover, laid flat and true, clear of the ground by a minimum of 150mm and supported on dry and clean timber bearers at maximum 900mm centres.

3.3 **SUBSTRATE**

Before starting fixing ensure that the substrate conforms with <u>NZS 3604</u>, section 2, table 2.1, **Timber framing tolerances** and the requirements of <u>NZS 3604</u>, section 6, **Foundation and subfloor framing** and <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1, governing support for timber board cladding.

3.4 VERTIBAT DRAINED CAVITY / NON STRUCTURAL

Install 20mm minimum thickness drained cavity to <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1: 9.0 **Wall claddings**, where required. The Vertibat battens are temporarily fixed using galvanized nails and then fixed by the cladding fixings which will penetrate the wall framing studs over the wall underlay.

Seal the top of the cavity and install cavity closer/vermin-proofing at base of walls, open horizontal (or raking) junctions, over openings (windows, meters etc.). Do

not use horizontal cavity battens. Use cavity spacers where fixing is required between cavity battens.

3.5 CAVIBAT DRAINED CAVITY / NON STRUCTURAL

Install Cavibat 18mm drained cavity. Wall framing studs lined with Cavibat, Non-Structural 18mm x 40mm fluted Polypropylene Cavity Batten System. Refer to BRANZ Appraisal 524. The CAVIBAT battens are temporarily fixed—using galvanized nails and then fixed by the cladding fixings which will penetrate the wall framing studs over the wall—underlay.

Seal the top of the cavity and install cavity closer/vermin proofing at base of walls, open horizontal (or raking) junctions,—over openings (windows, meters etc.). Do not use horizontal cavity battens. Use cavity spacers where fixing is required between cavity battens.

3.6 BATTENS DRAINED CAVITY / NON STRUCTURAL

Install 20mm minimum thickness battens drained cavity to <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1: 9.0 **Wall claddings**, where required. The battens are temporarily fixed using galvanized nails and then fixed by the cladding fixings which will penetrate the wall framing studs over the wall underlay.

Seal the top of the cavity and install cavity closer/vermin-proofing at base of walls, open horizontal (or raking) junctions, over openings (windows, meters etc.). Do not use horizontal cavity battens. Use cavity spacers where fixing is required between cavity battens.

3.7 VERTIBAT DRAINED CAVITY / STRUCTURAL

Install 20mm minimum thickness Vertibat drained cavity to NZBC E2/AS1: 9.0 Wall claddings, where required. Permanently fix battens onto the framing, over underlay, using Grade 304 Hermpac Stainless Steel Hex Head Screws ensuring minimum 25mm penetration into framing. (Refer Hermpac construction drawings and installation guide for detailed structural fixing)

Seal the top of the cavity and install cavity closer/vermin-proofing at base of walls, open horizontal (or raking) junctions, over openings (windows, meters etc.). Do not use horizontal cavity battens. Use cavity spacers where fixing is required between cavity battens.

3.8 BATTENS DRAINED CAVITY / STRUCTURAL

Install 20mm minimum thickness battens drained cavity to NZBC E2/AS1: 9.0 **Wall claddings**, where required. Permanently fix battens onto the framing, over underlay, using Grade 304 Hermpac Stainless Steel Hex Head Screws ensuring minimum 25mm penetration into framing. (Refer Hermpac construction drawings and installation guide for detailed structural fixing)

Seal the top of the cavity and install cavity closer/vermin-proofing at base of walls, open horizontal (or raking) junctions, over openings (windows, meters etc.). Do not use horizontal cavity battens. Use cavity spacers where fixing is required between cavity battens.

3.9 PENETRATIONS

Confirm that exterior wall openings have been prepared ready for the installation of all window and door frames and other penetrations through the cladding.

Required preparatory work includes the following:

- wall underlay to openings finished and dressed off ready for the installation of window and door frames and other penetrations
- claddings neatly finished off to all sides of openings
- installation of flashings (those required to be installed prior to installation of penetrating elements).

3.10 SET-OUT

Using laser or mechanical devices set-out the overlap boards to ensure dimension to exposed face in line of weather is constant and that boards remain horizontal/vertical. Use a string line to set out all nailing that will be visible in the finished work. Align all nailing accurately in straight lines. Use the appropriate **Herman Pacific** proprietary weatherboard set-out tools to establish correct angle of nail and consistent, accurate placement relative to visible edge of board.

3.11 FIXING - PAINT FINISH

Install level, true to line and face, to <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1: 9.4 **Timber weatherboards**. Prime all cut ends before fixing.

Pilot drill all fixings slightly smaller than gauge of fixing to ensure a snug fit and to minimise risk of moisture entry. Punch all fixings and prime all raw, exposed timber surfaces. Using an appropriate filler, fill all nail holes flush with board surface.

3.12 FIXING - OIL STAIN FINISH

Install level, true to line and face, to <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1: 9.4 **Timber weatherboards**. Double coat all cut ends before fixing. Pilot drill all fixings slightly smaller than gauge of fixing to ensure a snug fit and to minimise risk of moisture entry. Finish the heads of Herman Pacific Crown, Rose and Flat head nails flush onto and not into the board surface. Do not 'over drive' the nail head and crush the timber surface beneath and surrounding the nail.

3.13 FIXING RUSTICATED / SPLAYCUT WEATHERBOARDS

Install level, true to line and face, to <u>NZBC E2</u>/AS1: 9.4 **Timber weatherboards**. Single nail weatherboards to every fixing point, just clear of the lapped board below. Pilot drill all fixing holes on an upward slope slightly smaller than the gauge of fixing to ensure a snug fit and to minimise risk of moisture entry. Refer to **Herman Pacific** website for accurate weatherboard fixing information

Using a **Herman Pacific** 40 x 2.0mm specialty clinch nail, restrain the upper, hidden lap tongue by driving the clinch nail, positioned hard up against but not into the top edge of the board at every fixing point, into the frame and so that the clinch head settles flush into the timber surface, prior to the next row of boards being fixed above. The clinch nail head must not sit proud of the timber surface nor prevent the correct separation of each adjacent row of boards.

3.14 INSTALLFLASHINGS

Install flashings, covers and soakers as detailed on the drawings and to NZBC E2/AS1.

3.15 COMPLETE

Ensure the work is complete with all flashings, finishings and trim properly installed so the cladding system is completely weather tight.

3.16 REPLACE

Replace all damaged or marked elements.

3.17 LEAVE

Leave work to the standard required for following procedures.

3.18 REMOVE

Remove all debris, unused materials and elements from the site.

1.0 General Information

1.1 Introduction

The Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System is a cavity-based external wall cladding system for residential and light commercial type buildings where domestic construction techniques are used.

The cladding system consists of horizontally fixed Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut cedar weatherboards installed over cavity battens, flashings and accessories and is finished with a premium penetrating oil stain or paint finish to Herman Pacific Limited specifications.

The system incorporates a primary and secondary means of weather resistance (first and second line of defence) against water penetration by separating the cladding from the external wall frame with an 18-20 mm drained cavity.

1.2 BRANZ Appraisal

The Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System has been appraised by BRANZ. Refer to Appraisal No. 658 (2014).

The Hermpac CedarOne Bevelback and Rusticated Weatherboard Cavity System has been appraised by BRANZ. Refer to Appraisal No. 766 (2015).

1.3 Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboards

Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut weatherboards are manufactured from Canadian Coastal Western Red Cedar (*Thuja plicata*) and Canadian Coastal Yellow Cedar (*Chamaecyparis nootkatensis*).

The weatherboard lap and rebate profiles are in accordance with NZS 3617 and BRANZ Bulletin 411. The weatherboards are minimum 18.5 mm thick and are available in a range of widths and face profiles, supplied as a random length supply. Selected lengths are outside the general specification and are available by special contract.

1.4 Cavity Battens

The Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System uses either treated timber cavity battens or Cavibat polypropylene cavity battens to separate the weatherboards from the wall frame and form the cavity. Cavibat cavity battens can be installed vertically over the wall framing to provide support for the weatherboards at fixing points, e.g. at window openings. Refer to www.cavibat.co.nz and BRANZ Appraisal No. 524 (2012) for full specifications.

1.5 Accessories

Accessories supplied by Herman Pacific Limited for use with the Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Cavity System include:

- Hermpac external corner mouldings HP40 (40 x 40 mm) and HP42 (42 x 42 mm) and the Hermpac 'Smart Corner' series, profiled external corner moulds.
- Hermpac internal corner moulds HP41 (18.5 x 18.5 mm) and the Hermpac 'Smart Corner' series.
- Hermpac cover battens 18 mm thick boards in widths of 69 mm (HP201) and 90 mm (HP202). Hermpac eaves moulding HP32 (40 x 27 mm), HP33 (26 x 15 mm) and HP 7 (30 x 18 mm) bevelled profile.
- Hermpac Rustic plugs HP44 (40 x 9.25 mm) and HP43 (25 x 9.25 mm) profiled to suit the weatherboard profile. The plugs are supplied in 10 m bundles.
- Hermpac scribers HP11 HP18, with bevelled or radiused edges (cut to suit as required).
 Hermpac weatherboard fixings (oil stain finish) silicon bronze, Grade 316 stainless steel annular grooved Hermpac Crown Head, Rose Head or Flat Head nails. The nail shank must be minimum 3.25 mm diameter and the length must allow minimum 30 mm penetration of the wall frame.
- Hermpac weatherboard fixings (paint finish) silicon bronze, Grade 316 stainless steel annular grooved Hermpac Jolt Head nails. The nail shank must be minimum 3.25 mm diameter and the length must allow minimum 35 mm penetration of the wall frame.
- Hermpac clinch nails 40 x 2.0 mm or 50 x 2.0 mm Grade 316 stainless steel annular grooved nails with an off-set flat head.
- Hermpac cover batten fixings 50 x 2.8 mm silicon bronze, Grade 316 stainless steel annular grooved Hermpac Crown Head, Rose Head or Flat Head nails for stain finish or Grade 316 stainless steel annular grooved Jolt Head nails for paint finish.
- Hermpac scriber fixings length to suit scriber size (minimum 50 x 2.8 mm) stainless steel
 annular grooved Hermpac Crown Head, Rose Head or Flat Head nails for stain finish or
 Jolt Head nails for paint finish.
- Hermpac flat and corner soakers 90° soakers available in copper, stainless steel, powder coated Zincalume or etch primed aluminium.
- Hermpac soaker fixings 19 x 1.6 mm silicon bronze or stainless steel Rose Head or Flat Head nails.
- Hermpac aluminium flashings widths to suit specified corners.

1.6 Handling and Storage

Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut weatherboards must be stacked flat and true, clear of the ground by a minimum of 150 mm and supported on dry and clean timber bearers at maximum 900 mm centres.

The weatherboards must be kept dry at all times either by storing within an enclosed building or when stored externally an additional secondary cover to the plastic wrapping is required. Care must be taken to avoid damage to edges, ends and the weatherboard surfaces.

2.0 Design Information

2.1 Design Responsibility

The Specifier for the project must ensure that the details in this literature are suitable for the intended application and that additional detailing is provided for specific design or any areas that fall outside the scope and specifications of this literature.

2.2 Scope

This specification covers the use of the Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System as an external horizontally fixed wall cladding system for buildings within the following scope:

- the scope limitations of NZBC Acceptable System E2/AS1, Paragraph 1.1; and,
- · constructed with timber framing complying with the NZBC; and,
- with a risk score of 0-20, calculated in accordance with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Table 2; and,
- situated in NZS 3604 Wind Zones up to, and including Extra High.

CedarOne, CedarLine or painted weatherboards fixed with annular grooved Grade 316 stainless steel Jolt Head nails are limited to use in NZ 3604 Wind Zones up to, and including Medium where studs are at 600 mm centres maximum, and NZS 3604 Wind Zones High and Very High where studs are at 400 mm centres maximum.

This specification also covers the use of the Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System (stain finish only) as an external horizontally fixed wall cladding system for weathertightness and structural wind loading for buildings within the following scope:

- the scope limitations of NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 1.1 with regards to building height and floor plan area; and,
- · constructed with timber framing subject to specific engineering design; and,
- situated in specific design wind pressures up to a maximum design differential ultimate limit state (ULS) of 2.5 kPa.

For applications which are outside the scope of this literature and details which are not in this literature the specifier must ensure that the design meets the relevant performance requirements of the NZBC.

Herman Pacific Limited recommends that professional design advice is sought in these circumstances.

2.3 Building Regulations

The Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System if designed, used and installed in accordance with the statements and conditions of this literature and the supporting BRANZ Appraisal, will meet the following provisions of the New Zealand Building Code:

- · Clause B1 Structure
- · Clause B2 Durability
- · Clause E2 External Moisture
- · Clause F2 Hazardous Building Materials

2.4 Ground Clearances

The finished floor level must have a minimum clearance to paved or unprotected ground as required by NZS 3604:2011.

Hermpac weatherboards must overhang the bottom plate on a concrete slab by a minimum of 50 mm as required by NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Table 18.

The bottom edge of the Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System must finish a minimum of 100 mm above paved surfaces or 175 mm above unprotected ground.

At deck or low pitch roof/wall junctions, the bottom edge of the Hermpac weatherboards must be kept clear of any adjacent surface, or above the top surface of any adjacent roof flashing by a minimum of 35 mm.

2.5 Structure & Framing

Timber wall framing behind the Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System must be treated as required by NZBC Acceptable Solution B2/AS1.

Timber framing must comply with NZS 3604 for buildings or parts of buildings within the scope limitations of NZS 3604. Buildings or parts of buildings outside the scope of NZS 3604 must be to a specific design in accordance with NZS 3603 and AS/NZS 1170. Where specific design is required, the framing must be of at least equivalent stiffness to the framing provisions of NZS 3604. Use of timber framing must be in accordance with framing manufacturer's specifications.

In all cases studs must be at maximum 600 mm centres, with dwangs fitted flush between the studs at maximum 800 mm centres. Note: For CedarOne, CedarLine or painted weatherboards fixed with annular grooved Grade 316 stainless steel Jolt Head nails, studs must be at a maximum 600 mm centres for NZS 3604 Wind Zones up to, and including Medium, and 400 mm centres maximum for NZS 3604 Wind Zones High and Very High.

2.6 Framing Tolerances

In order to achieve an acceptable wall finish, it is imperative that framing is straight and true. Framing tolerances must comply with the requirements of NZS 3604:2011.

2.7 Cavity Closure Strip

The Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System must incorporate a cavity closure strip to close off the bottom of the cavity and provide resistance against the penetration of vermin. The cavity closure strip must be in accordance with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 9.1.8.3.

The cavity closure strip must be manufactured from PVC, aluminium or stainless steel, and be punched with 3 - 5 mm holes or slots which provide a minimum ventilation opening area of 1000 mm² per lineal metre of wall.

2.8 Wall Underlay

The Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System must be installed over wall underlay complying with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Table 23, or wall underlays covered by a valid BRANZ Appraisal.

All external walls of buildings must have barriers to airflow in the form of interior linings with all joints stopped for wind zones up to and including Very High, and rigid underlays for buildings in the Extra High wind zone and specifically designed buildings up to 2.5 kPa design differential ULS wind pressure. Unlined gables and walls must incorporate a rigid sheathing or an air barrier which meets the requirements of NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Table 23. For attached garages, wall underlays must be selected in accordance with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 9.1.3.4. Where rigid underlays are used, the weatherboard fixing lengths must be increased by a minimum of the thickness of the underlay.

2.9 Inter-storey Junctions

Inter-storey drained joints must be constructed in accordance with the Technical Literature. Inter-storey drained joints must be provided to limit continuous cavities to the lesser of 2-storeys or 7 metres in height, in accordance with the requirements of NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 9.1.9.4(b).

2.10 Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboards

Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut weatherboards shall be fixed with an approximate 2mm vertical expansion gap at the overlap between boards. Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut profiles are all manufactured in accordance with BRANZ Bulletin 411 (Refer to E2/AS1 page 121, paragraph 9.4.1.1) and have a 27mm rebate for a 25mm lap.

The weatherboards shall be pre-coated with the selected coating (prior to site delivery and installation) by Herman Pacific Limited associate Machinecoat (NZ) Ltd, by the flood coat inundation method or in-line spray coat system (subject to coating type selected).

Pre-finished Rusticated and Splaycut weatherboards shall be over-coated and maintained in accordance with the coating manufacturer's specification. All cut ends and/or uncoated surfaces shall be double coated during installation to protect against the penetration of moisture, post installation.

The weatherboards shall be fixed through the cavity battens to the studs at maximum 600mm centres using Hermpac weatherboard fixings (refer to Section 1.5 of this specification).

External corners shall be weatherproofed by the use of corrosion resistant corner flashings and corner facings, e.g. Herman Pacific Limited proprietary profiles HP 40, HP 42, the Herman Pacific 'Smart Corner' series, or cover battens HP 201 and HP 202 with Herman rustic plugs or scribers.

Internal corners shall be weatherproofed by the use of corrosion resistant internal corner flashings along with internal mouldings, e.g. Herman Pacific Limited profile HP 41 or the Herman Pacific 'Smart Corner' series.

3.0 Installation Information

3.1 System Installation

This section of the literature should be read in conjunction with the installation details.

The selected wall underlay and flexible sill and jamb tape system must be installed by the building contractor in accordance with the underlay and tape manufacturer's instructions prior to the installation of the cavity battens and the rest of the Hermpac Rusticated an Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System. Flexible building underlay must be installed horizontally and be continuous around corners. Underlay must be lapped 75mm minimum at horizontal joints and 150mm minimum over studs at vertical joints.

Generic rigid sheathing materials must be installed in accordance with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1 and be overlaid with a flexible wall underlay. Proprietary systems shall be installed in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions. Particular attention must be paid to the installation of the building underlay and sill and jamb tapes around window and door openings to ensure a continuous seal is achieved and all exposed wall framing in the opening is protected. All penetrations through the wall underlay must be sealed and joints sealed or lapped 150 mm.

The selected cavity closure strip must be installed so a minimum 15 mm drip edge to the bottom of the weatherboards is maintained at all times.

Cavity battens must be installed over the wall underlay to the wall framing at a maximum of 600 mm centres where the studs are at 600 mm centres, or at 400 mm centres when studs are at 400 mm centres. Cavibat cavity battens must be fixed in place with 40 x 2.8 mm hot-dip galvanised flat head nails or galvanised or stainless steel finishing brads at 400 mm centres. Refer to www.cavibat.co.nz and BRANZ Appraisal Number 524 (2012) for further information. Timber cavity battens must be fixed in place with 40 x 2.8 mm hot-dip galvanised flat-head nails at maximum 800 mm centres.

Where the studs are at greater than 450 mm centres, a wall underlay support, e.g. polypropylene strap, 75 mm galvanised mesh, galvanised wire, or additional vertical battens must be installed over the wall underlay between the cavity battens at maximum 300 mm centres to prevent the wall underlay from bulging into the drainage cavity.

3.1.1 Aluminium Joinery Installation

Aluminium joinery and associated head flashings must be installed in accordance with the window manufacturer's instructions. A 7.5 - 10 mm nominal gap must be left between the joinery reveal and the wall framing so a PEF rod and air seal can be installed in accordance with NZBC Acceptable Solution E2/AS1, Paragraph 9.1.6 after the joinery has been secured in place.

3.1.2 Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Cedar Weatherboard Installation

Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut weatherboards must not be wet prior to installation. Prior to installation, the back, face and edges of the Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut weatherboards must be sealed with an exterior grade oil-based penetrating oil stain or paint. During installation, cut ends and edges and all fresh cuts or exposed timber must be double sealed with an exterior grade oil-based penetrating oil stain or paint.

Before the weatherboards are installed, the corner detail must be prepared to suit the selected option, e.g. external box corner/corner moulding etc. The necessary flashings must be installed before commencing weatherboard fixing and the cavity closure must be installed continuously around the bottom of the cavity.

Immediately prior to installing the weatherboards over the internal and external corner flashings, a continuous bead of sealant must be applied to the face of the flashing along the fixing line.

The first course of weatherboards must be full length, and commence from an external corner. The first weatherboard must be installed level to assist with the installation of subsequent weatherboards. The weatherboards must overhang the bottom plate by a minimum of 50 mm.

Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut weatherboards must be overlapped a minimum of 25 mm with an expansion gap of 2 mm at the overlap. The top of the weatherboard lap must be restrained using the Hermpac clinch nail at every cavity batten.

Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut weatherboards must be pre-drilled on a slight up-slope, with a hole slightly smaller than that of the nail, to reduce the risk of moisture entry. Fix each weatherboard with one nail per board at every cavity batten. Fixing must be carried out using silicon bronze or Grade 316 stainless annular grooved Hermpac Crown Head, Rose Head or Flat Head nails. The nail shank must be minimum 3.25 mm diameter and the length must allow minimum 30 mm penetration of the wall frame.

Note: For CedarOne, CedarLine or painted weatherboards, use Grade 316 Stainless Steel annular grooved Jolt Head nails and allow minimum 35mm penetration of the wall frame. Punch nails 2mm below the weatherboard surface, prime nail holes and fill prior to sanding and finishing.

The fixing must be located 30-35 mm above the bottom of the weatherboard, be located no closer than 32 mm from the end of the board, and must finish flush onto the surface of the weatherboard, not into or below the surface.

Fix weatherboards in full lengths where possible. Where joints are unavoidable, scarf the weatherboard at 30° over a cavity batten and fix as per drawn detail 'HC-RUST-413'.

3.1.3 Boxed Corners, Cover Battens and Mouldings

External and internal corners must be finished in accordance with the installation detailing.

3.1.4 Finishing

At least two coats of an exterior grade quality oil-based penetrating stain must be used over the front face of the Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut weatherboards to protect the weatherboards and give the desired finish colour to the exterior walls. The stain must be

recommended for use as a wall cladding stain by the manufacturer and must be brush or Machinecoat NZ Ltd applied. Herman Pacific Limited recommends the use of oil based stains manufactured by Wood-X and Resene.

Follow the stain manufacturer's instructions at all times for application of the stain finish.

For paint finish the paint must be recommended for use as a wall cladding paint by the manufacturer and must be brush or Machinecoat NZ Ltd applied.

To ensure a top quality paint finish:

- Envelope prime all cut ends and bare timber surfaces twice with a premium oil based primer.
- 2. Punch nail holes and prime promptly after punching with a premium oil based primer.
- 3. Fill holes with a suitable filler, allow to dry and sand area smooth.
- 4. Apply one coat of a premium oil based primer to sanded area and allow to dry before sanding lightly.
- 5. Ensure surface is free from dirt prior to painting top coats. Wash or lightly sand areas where dirt/film build up has occurred.
- 6. Apply two coats of premium high quality 100% acrylic to surface allowing adequate time for drying between coats.

Follow the paint manufacturer's instructions at all times for application of the paint finish.

Refer to Section 4.0 for maintenance requirements.

4.0 Maintenance

Building owners are responsible for the maintenance of the Hermpac Rusticated and Splaycut Weatherboard Cavity System. Annual inspections must be made to ensure that all aspects of the cladding system, including flashings remain in a weatherproof condition. Any damaged areas or areas showing signs of deterioration which would allow water ingress, must be repaired immediately. Sealant, coatings, flashings or the weatherboards must be repaired in accordance with the relevant manufacturer's instructions.

Regular cleaning (at least annually) of the surface finish with water and a mild detergent is recommended to remove grime, dirt and organic growth, to maximise the life and appearance of the cladding.

3. EXECUTION

Conditions

3.1 INSPECTION

Inspect the roof framing and supporting structure to ensure that it is complete and fully braced ready for roofing and free from any misalignments or protrusions that could damage the roofing.

3.2 FRAMING TIMBER MOISTURE

When continuous metal cladding etc. Runs along a long continuous timber member and is directly fixed to it, the timbers equilibrium moisture content (EMC) to be 18% or less. For flashings in this situation (sometimes called transverse flashings) the framing EMC to be maximum 16%, and preferably as low as 12%. Transverse flashings can be temporarily tacked in place and final fixing done when moisture content is acceptable.

3.3 STORAGE

Upon delivery visually inspect sheets for damage and accept packs of undamaged roofing. Reject all damaged material. Store on a level firm base clear of the ground, with packs well ventilated and completely protected from weather and damage. Do not allow moisture to build up between sheets. If sheet packs become wet, fillet or cross stack to allow air circulation and drying between sheets.

3.4 HANDLING

Do not drag sheets across each other or other materials. Avoid distortion and contact with damaging substances, including cement. Long lengths of roofing should be lifted onto the roof using an approved load spreading beam. Protect edges and surface finishes from damage, keep under cover and remove as the product is being installed. Use soft, flat sole shoes when fixing and for all other work on the roof. Walk along the purlin line whenever possible.

3.5 SEPARATION

Isolate dissimilar materials (metals and non-metals) in close proximity as necessary by painting the surfaces or fitting separator strips of compatible materials. Place isolators between metals and treated timber and cement based materials. Do not use lead sheet or copper in contact with or allow water run-off onto galvanized or aluminium/zinc coated steel.

3.6 FIX INSULATION

Refer to thermal insulation sections.

3.7 SET-OUT

Carefully set out with consideration of the position of side laps to take account of the prevailing wind and line of sight. Ensure all sheets are square and oversailing the gutter true to line. Check during fixing to eliminate creep or spread and string lines along purlin centres to keep fastenings in line.

3.8 END LAPS

End laps are not recommended, except where specifically detailed.

3.9 THERMAL MOVEMENT

Fix for Thermal Movement to Metalcraft requirements for thermal movement.

3.10 FIXING GENERALLY

Install and fix in accordance with the <u>NZMRM CoP</u> recommendations, and to Metalcraft required fixing patterns and details for each area of the building roofing. Use only screws as required by Metalcraft. Paint colour matched fixings and accessories before installation.

3.11 MARKING AND CUTTING

Use ink pen, chalk line or coloured pencil for marking roof sheets prior to cutting. Do not use lead pencil for marking Zincalume[®] and Colorsteel[®]. Cut by shear only, using nibblers or hand snips. Remove all cutting and drilling debris from the roof.

3.12 STOP ENDS AND DOWNTURNS

Form stop-ends at the upper end of sheets. Form downturns at the gutter line where the roof pitch is less than 8 degrees. Form using the required tools.

3.13 INSTALL FLASHINGS

Flash roof to parapets, walls and penetrations to detail. Flashings to be installed on timber framing with moisture content of less than 20%. Where no detail is provided flash to NZMRM COP NZ metal roof and wall cladding Code of Practice recommendations and Metalcraft and NZBC E2/AS1 requirements. Cut accurately and fix using sealant and rivets to detail and to Metalcraft requirements to form a weatherproof cover. For visible flashings, plan joints/junction to take account of the aesthetic requirements.

3.14 USE OF SEALANTS

Select and use sealants only as recommended by Metalcraft. Apply sealant in two narrow beads transversely across flashing intersections, close to the two edges. Avoid exposing sealant on outside surfaces.

3.15 FLASHING PENETRATIONS

Flash all penetrations through the roof. Fit pipe flashings with a proprietary collar flashing, with other penetrations flashed as detailed and to provide a weathertight installation. Ensure that flashings are set to avoid any ponding of water.

TEMPERATURE

Do not carry out tiling where the ambient temperature is below 5°C, or onto a substrate with a temperature higher than 40°C.

SUBSTRATE

Ensure that all services and accessories are in place and located to suit the tile layout, with the substrate required for tiling work. Commencement of the work means the substrate and environment are accepted by the tile layer as satisfactory.

CONCRETE FLOORS PREPARATION

Remove from the surfaces all contaminants such as paints, oils, release and curing compounds. Remove all projections, unevenness and loose material to leave a clean, dust and dirt-free surface. Remove all existing finishes down to the concrete & prepare surfaces and carry out the tiling work in accordance with AS 3958.1, as modified by BRANZ Good practice guide: Tiling.

LIQUID WATERPROOFING MEMBRANE – ARDEX waterproofing system To AS 3740.

Install waterproofing membrane between the tile adhesive and the substrate. Reinforce all junctions of the waterproofing membrane as per the manufacturer's recommendations. Install waterproof membranes as follows: -

To walls behind bath - Two tiles high

Clean thoroughly and prepare as for tiling. Remove any paint overspray and plaster spills. Ensure that waterproofing has been completed. Install electric undertile heating system to manufacturers requirements with the element connected to a continuity tester during installation. Leave ready for tiling and connection to the electrical system.

CEMENT BASED SCREED

Mix of 3:1 Portland cement, wash-mix sand, gauged with liquid polymer additive to the tile manufacturer's requirements.

Apply a proprietary cement slurry bond coat over the whole of the floor to the tile manufacturer's requirements. Mix and place a 40 mm thick mortar bed over the bond coat and firmly tamp, screed and compact to the required level. Form screeds with a deviation from plane of not more than 5 mm over 3 metres.

In waterproofed areas where the cement screed has been laid over the waterproofing membrane, prepare the screed surface by applying a further waterproof coating before laying tiles.

Form screeds in areas where water is used in significant amounts with a deviation from plane of not more than 5 mm over 3 metres. Unless otherwise specified form screeds at 1: 40 minimum.

TILE ADHESIVE

To BS 6431, parts 1 to 23 inclusive & AS 2358.

Adhesives selected for use on proprietary substrates or waterproof membranes to have documented compatibility approval from the respective manufacturers.

Apply and float thick bed cement-based adhesive to a maximum 6 mm bed thickness to the tile manufacturer's requirements. Rib surface with a notched trowel, press tiles and beat it into place with 3 mm joints, and to obtain required coverage of adhesive on the back of each tile.

GROUT

Cement based, compressible and to suit the particular location and use.

EDGE GRIPPER, TAPES, FIXING BARS

BINDER BARS

Anodised aluminium section with a fluted face.

SUBSTRATE

Before starting work inspect the substrate to ensure it will allow work of the required standard and that all fittings and fixtures around which the carpet is to be scribed, are in place.

PROTECTION

Protect adjoining work surfaces and finishes during installation and make good any damage to same.

TAPE

Tape for binding and seaming to be the type and width required by AS/NZS 2455 to suit the specified carpet and the standard of performance required.

LAYOUT

Plan the carpet layout so that seams run lengthways, traffic runs along the seam, light from windows is not across the seam and pile faces away from the main natural light source.

TEMPERATURE

Acclimatise carpet to a room temperature above 15°C through the whole of the installation.

PREPARE FLOOR SURFACE

Prepare floors for laying to AS/NZS 2455 requirements.

INSTALLATION, UNDERLAY

QUALIFICATIONS

Plumbers to be experienced competent craftsman plumbers, or registered plumbers working under the direction of a craftsman plumber, familiar with the materials and techniques specified.

WATER MAIN POLYETHYLENE

High density polyethylene 32 mm OD (minimum 25 mm internal diameter) pipe complete with rubber ring compression type fittings.

POLYBUTYLENE WATER PIPE

Polybutylene tubing to AS/NZS 2642.2 and AS/NZS 2642.3 complete with fittings and accessories brand-matched.

POLYETHYLENE WATER PIPE

Proprietary high-density cross-linked polyethylene composite pipe and fittings to BS 7291.3.

POLYBUTYLENE/POLYETHYLENE WATER SUPPLY

Size the piping layout to eliminate loss of pressure at any point by simultaneous draw-off. Run pipes complete with all fittings, support and fixing, and jointed to the pipe manufacturer's specifications, all to NZBC G12/AS1. Conceal pipework and pressure test before the wall linings are fixed.

INSTALLING HOT WATER PIPE INSULATION

Insulate all hot water pipes in accordance with the insulation manufacturer's instructions. Cut insulation sections tight between timber framing and tight between the webs of studs.

Where hair felt is used, wrap around pipes in two layers in opposite directions and secure with galvanised steel wire ties.

INSTALL TAPS AND FAUCETS

Install taps and faucets in accordance with the tap manufacturer's requirements. Flush out on completion. Check that washers or ceramic discs are operating correctly.

- b) Comply with Paragraph 6.7.5 when freezing of the drain is likely.

Comment:

This paragraph applies to water heaters that are installed outside the building's thermal envelope in cold climates.

6.7.5 Relief drains located where freezing is likely

Additional requirements for relief drains located where freezing is likely (see Figure 12) are that:

a) Relief valve drain pipes shall discharge over a tundish with a 25 mm air break before the drain pipe enters a zone where freezing is likely, and

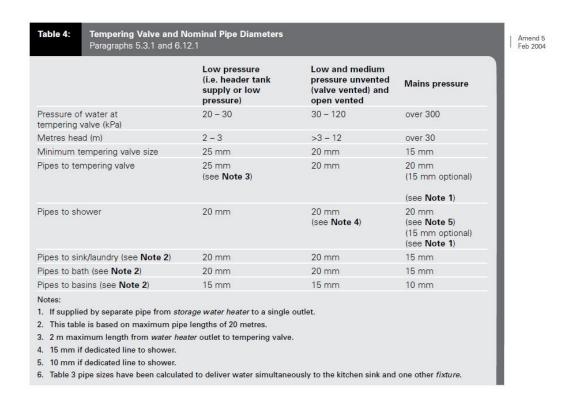
b) Relief valve drains from a tundish shall be one size larger than the outlet diameter of the relief valve.

7.2 Protection from freezing

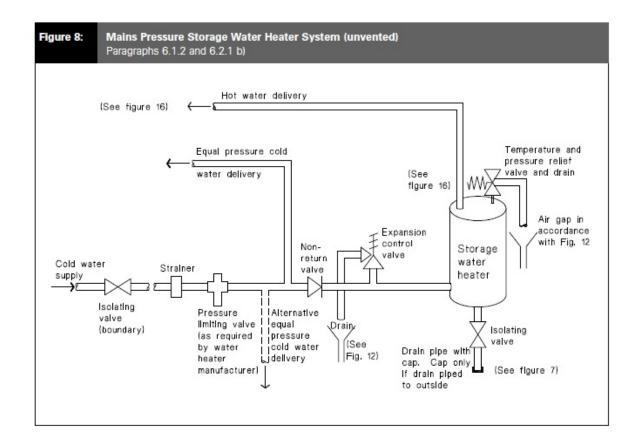
- **7.2.1** Where there is the likelihood of freezing, hot and cold water supply systems shall be protected in the following manner:
- a) Piping outside of the building thermal envelope shall be insulated.
- b) Piping buried in the ground shall be insulated or installed below a level affected by freezing.

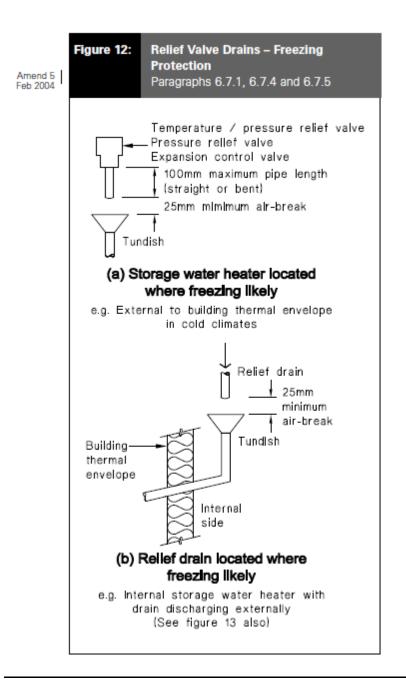
Water Supply Pipework Support Spacing (NZBC G12/AS1)



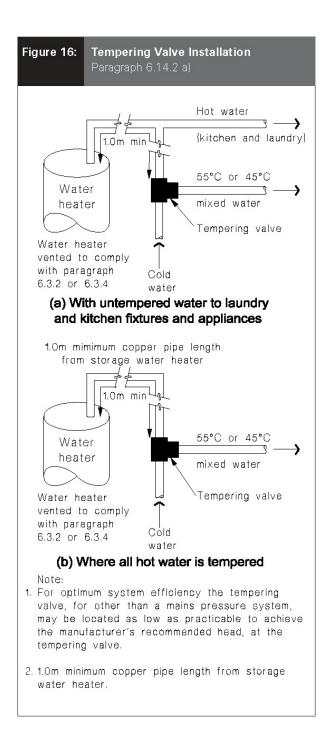
Hot and Cold Water Service Pipe Size (NZBC G12/AS1)



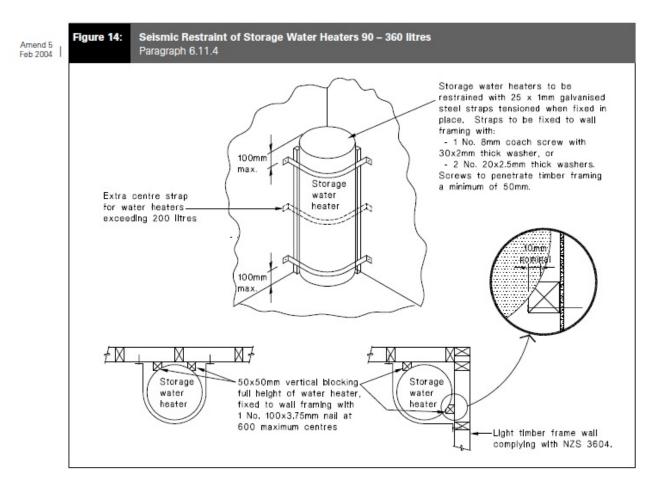
Mains Pressure Storage Water Heater System - Unvented (NZBC G12/AS1 Fig 8)



Relief Valve Drains – Freezing Protection (NZBC G12/AS1 Fig 12)

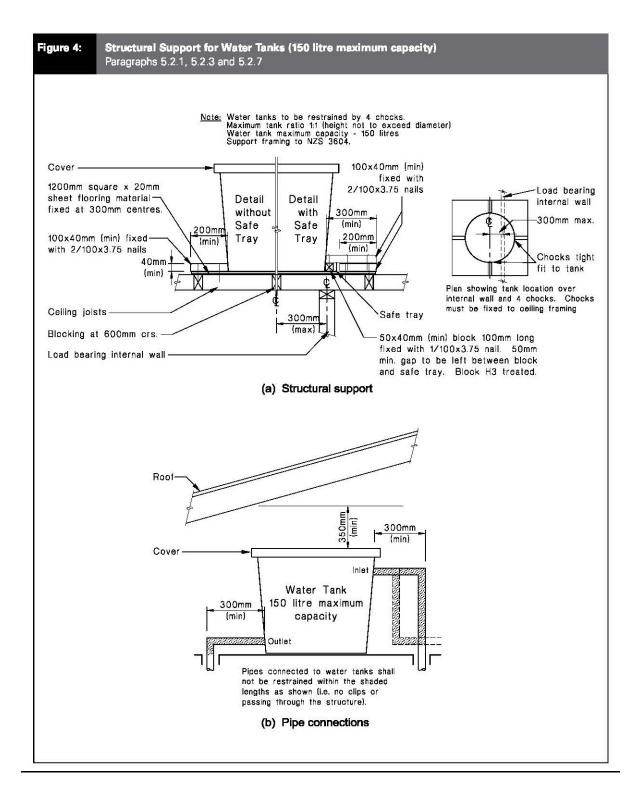


Tempering Valve Installation (NZBC G12/AS1 Fig 16)

PLUMBING / HARDWARE

• Hot water cylinder to be A-grade 250 Lt Mains Pressure complete with tempering valve. Note: Mains pressure cylinders incorporate a pressure relief pipe which protrudes from foundation, location to be determined by plumber.

PRELIMINARY AND GENERAL

As specified on the plans the plumbing will comply with G13/AS1 – Sanitary Plumbing, G13/AS2 Drainage or alternatively AS/NZS 3500 Plumbing and Drainage

All plumbing work to comply with the requirements of the NZBC, refer to sections E3, G10-G15.

AS/NZS1260 - PVC pipes and fittings for drain, waste and vent applications

NZS7641-Unplasticised PVC waste and ventilating pipes, fittings and accessories 32-50mm

AS/NZ4858 - Wet Area Membranes

E3/AS1- Internal Moisture

Plumbers, Gasfitters and Drainlayers Act 2006

EXTENT OF WORK -

Provide for all materials and execution of all works necessary for the proper completion of the plumbing work. All work is to be carried out by tradesmen registered as required by the plumbing and drainage regulations and relevant standard and in accordance with the NZBC and Territorial Authority requirements. All pipe work is to be concealed where possible within wall spaces, or as indicated on the drawings. The carpenter is responsible for provision of all framing, blocking etc for the support of fittings. Co-operate with all other trades for the provision of ducts, trenches, cut-outs in foundation and slab and the laying of pipe work. Holes for pipes through framing members shall be of minimum size and shall be positioned to ensure structural integrity of framing members are not compromised.

Note requirements for any penetrations in wall framing from NZS3604 sections 8.5.1.6 & 8.7.5.

PERMIT, FEES -

Give all notices, and arrange for the inspection of the work and materials.

MATERIALS -

Provide all the materials, labour and plant necessary to complete work in accordance with the drawings and provide specifications, NZBC approved documents as specified in B1/1, E1, G1, G2, G13/1 & G13/2.

All internal pipes shall be polybutylene to DIN8077 and DIN8078 complete with fittings and accessories brand matched. Pressure test all fittings and pipe work and ensure there are no leaks and all fittings are in good working order.

FLASHINGS -

Generally provide all flashings required by all other trades to make the building weather tight. Flash and counter flash all pipes, vents and exhausts with 1.0mm min Butynol or EPDM (or 0.7mm aluminium / 0.55mm BMT galvanised or Aluminium zinc coated flashings or 1.0mm min Butynol for zincalume roofing) neatly capped to roofing or flash with approved paint-on membrane system and paint to match roofing colour.

WATER SUPPLY -

Water is from a municipal supply.

- a) Cold water can be obtained from the existing site connection via a mains pressure system providing adequate water pressure and volume; so avoiding the need for a cold water supply tank in or on the roof. Provide a high pressure mains system.
- b) Water heating is to be by means of a high pressure system; with cold water feed through a pressure reducing valve and separate non-return valve and complete with tempering valve set to maximum delivery temperature of 55° C.

The installation will comply with:

NZBC G12/AS1 Water Supplies
AS2642 Polybutylene pipe fittings
Plumbers, Gasfitters and Drainlayers Act 2006

COLD WATER SUPPLY -

Tap off from mains service lateral with 25mm ID polybutylene pipe and rubber ring compression fittings unless otherwise specified. Excavate trench, lay pipe and back fill to appropriate NZBC and NZS standards. Connect to building reticulation system. Provide a gate valve at the building.

Pipe laid in a trench a minimum of 500mm below finished ground level marker tape laid above backfill. Provide pipe to two hose taps, in positions at front and rear of building and to all fittings including hot water cylinder and washing machine. All branches to be short, straight and at as even gradient as possible with easybends used throughout. Use only approved connections throughout. All pipes are to be adequately supported, well secured and where possible concealed. Plumber to discuss with electrician and provide means of electrical earthing, when using any form of metal piping.

HOT WATER SUPPLY -

Provide polypropylene fusion welded joint system hot water supply pipes and branches to all fittings. Drain from HWC to be copper to drain to the outside of the building above ground over gardens or a gully trap. Installation shall be complete with seismic restraints and anti-scald device as per NZBC G12/AS1.

All hot water pipes to be insulated along with their length with 22mm wall thickness *Insultube* in roof space. The hot water pipe to the kitchen sink shall be insulated from the hot water heater to the sink (NZS4607:1989 601.2 & NZS4305:1996 3.7.2).

Maximum pipe length and nominal pipe size is

PIPE SUPPORTS -

Pipe and their supports shall be electrochemically compatible.

Except where anchor points are necessary, the pipes shall be supported in a way that permits free movement of the pipe along its length. Acceptable methods include lagging the pipe at the support with *Insultube*.

Support spacing

Above ground water supply shall be securely supported at centres of no greater than those in Table 7 of NZBC G12/AS1 7.0.

Movement in concrete or masonry

Pipes penetrating or installed in concrete or masonry wall or floors shall pass through a sleeve, to permit free movement for expansion and contraction.

Anchor points

Anchor points shall be provided where:

- a) Seal ring joints are used and
- b) The joint is not able to resist the thrust imposed by water pressure.

Protection from frosts

Water supply pipework shall be insulated where water is likely to become frozen, to appropriate levels for this frost prone area.

Comment

Locations where the water supply pipe work is likely to become frozen includes pipes concealed in exterior walls, ceiling spaces above ceiling insulation, or basements fixed to the outside of buildings.

SANITARY FITTINGS -

Allow to fix fittings as indicated on the plans for the following. Builder via the plumber to provide fittings. Carefully note dimensions and install where shown.

TAPS, FAUCETS AND VALVES -

Fix all taps, faucets and mixing valves, as supplied by the Builder via the plumber. Fix all other water supply fittings as necessary.

VENTS, SOIL STACKS -

To comply with NZBC G13/AS1 and G13/AS2

The above shall be PVC extended up through the roof and flashed with approved flashing material. Terminal vent is to be of an approved size to pass up exterior wall, through eave if required and through roof.

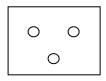

COMPLY

Comply with the referenced Electricity Regulations, Standards and the New Zealand electrical codes of practice for listed and prescribed work and with the utility network operator's requirements. Apply for the service connection.

QUALIFICATIONS

Carry out work by or under the direct supervision of a holder of a practising certificate under the Electricity Regulations.

CERTIFICATE OF COMPLIANCE

Supply a certificate of compliance to the owner, as required by the Electricity Regulations, and in particular, clauses 16, 34 and 35. Allow the network utility operator to test before the meter installation, listed work in spection, polarity check and livening of supply.

MAINS SUPPLY, SINGLE PHASE

Tough plastic sheathed neutral screened cable to AS/NZS 5000.2 and AS/NZS 3008.1.2, with a minimum rating of 60 amps per phase. Include pilot cable where required by network utility company.

MAIN EARTH - Provide a plastic toby box or UPVC tube to contain and protect the earth pin. Fix the connecting earth wiring closely and securely against wall surfaces.

Bond together and to earth all plumbing fittings not adequately isolated, to the Electricity Regulations and to the fitting manufacturer's requirements.

CABLES

Heat resistant cable for final connections to all heated appliances, and high temperature cable in ambient conditions may be above 35°C.

Proprietary manufactured, zinc plated powder coated metal case, weatherproof if mounted outdoors, and complete with meter mounting, main switch and fuse.

DISTRIBUTION BOARD

Proprietary manufactured heavy duty plastic fire resistant enclosed construction, complete with neutral and earth busbars, MCBs, 30 mA RCDs and 60 amp main switch, complete with 20% spare capacity to AS/NZS 3000. All protective devices: 6kA MCBs of the appropriate rating.

MINIATURE CIRCUIT BREAKERS

Miniature moulded case circuit breakers

WALL BOXES

Standard size in plastic, with 2 or more gang size, all screw fixed.

SWITCH UNITS

Sixteen amp minimum rated, 230 volt polycarbonate flush plate units.

Mount switches vertically and socket units horizontally. Label all switch units that control electrical equipment by colour filled engraving on the switch plate.

HOT WATER SYSTEM SWITCH

One way 20 amp switch complete with cable clamp for flexible PVC conduit to element enclosure.

SWITCHED SOCKET UNITS

Ten amp, 230 volt polycarbonate flush plate 3 pin flat NZS combination switch units, single or multi gang.

SMOKE ALARMS

To AS 1670 & Smoke alarms shall be installed on or near the ceiling in accordance with AS 1670.6 and the manufacturer's instructions.

GARAGE DOOR CONTROLLERS

Provide single switched socket outlet for the door controller to plug into.

LIGHT FITTINGS

All fittings complete with lamps, install light fittings in locations as directed by the owner, and in accordance with the fitting manufacturer's requirements and no less than the lighting schedule.

All downlights to be closed and abutted, downlights to have factory heat shields.

All downlight to be ICF-F rated LED. Luminaire can be abutted with insulation and some (IC) may be covered, providing the insulation is also suitable for such use to comply with C/AS1 7.4 (December 2013)

CIRCUIT PROTECTION

Install MCBs to protect each final sub circuit sized for circuit maximum loading.

Domestic

Install RCD protection at the switchboard of final sub circuits controlling socket outlets and lighting except for:

- Fixed cooking equipment, heating, HWC and A/C units

SET-OUT

Unless specifically detailed, confirm on site the exact location, disposition and mounting heights of all outlets, fittings, equipment, penetrations, and use of exposed wiring with the owner. Fix outlet items level, plumb and in line.

CABLING

Install with a maximum of 17 light outlet units or 6 double or single switched socket units on any circuit. Minimum 2 lighting circuits per installation. Separate circuits for all electric heating appliances. All cabling run concealed. No TPS cable laid directly in concrete. Locate holes in timber framing for the passage of cables at the centre line of the timber member. Install cable in conduits where required to pass through concrete or underground.

Complete all labelling in clear machine printed permanent manner. Include label under each controller, switch and circuit breaker on distribution boards. Include a warning notice if light dimmers are used in the installation. List the rating of each circuit.

WALL BOXES

Flush mounted in cavity construction.

EXTRA LOW VOLTAGE LIGHTING

Where remote transformers are used for ELV lamps, connect from transformer to lamp with minimum 2.5 mm2 conductor, to ensure voltage drop in transformer and conductor does not exceed 0.8 volts. Connect lamps 50 watt or greater matched to no more than one per transformer, located as close as practicable to the lamp. Ensure transformers and rear of light fittings are adequately ventilated and clear of any thermal insulation.

COMPLETION

Leave work operating correctly, with equipment clean and all lamps operational.

MANAGEMENT OF SITE SAFETY

The main contractor to undertake best practice systems to manage health and site safety. Building supervisors are all site safe qualified. The contractors are inducted on our Health and Safety policy and also provide the main contractor with documentation on their Health and Safety Management systems and also fill out a health and safety questionnaire.

The main contractor (Noted on specifications cover sheet) undertakes to manage hazards by elimination, isolation or minimisation in that order.

There is a Hazard Register posted on site at all times and all sub trades and suppliers required to record any potential hazards introduced onto site.

Earthworks and trenching will generally be back filled on same day but if this is not possible, barriers will be erected to minimise hazard.

To ensure site is clear, work areas are to be kept clean and tidy with receptacles provided and areas allocated areas for waste and refuse.

Chemicals and paints will be stored in original containers in a secure and well ventilated place appropriate to the product.

Building materials stored on site will be stacked so they cannot fall or protrude dangerously.

Public visiting site are instructed to report to site foreman who will ensure public are provided with a high visibility vest which must be worn on site at all times. Site foreman to ensure public are detoured from hazardous areas.

Fencing to keep out unauthorised personel. Under NZBC F5 – Construction and Demolition Hazards Clause 1.1.1, a 2.0 metre fence is required for protection of public.

Non-work Periods

The main contractor and sub contractors have responsibility to ensure public is not endangered in any way and site is safe during non-work periods

All sites have sign posted at entry stating 'Authorised personnel access only and please report to site fore man.

Tools locked away at end of day.

EROSION AND SEDIMENT CONTROL PLAN

The main contractor will use the relevant erosion and sediment control measures to meet the requirements for this site.

Provide protection for neighbouring sites from rubbish or sediment contamination.

EROSION CONTROL

- Minimum existing vegetation and soil will be removed from the site.
- Sediment Control measures will be in place before earthworks begin.
- Earthworks will keep to a minimum.
- Stockpiles will be delivered as late as possible, located within the sediment control zone, and protected from runoff and covered where necessary.
- Trenching will where possible be done at one time for all services. Contractors will be requested to set out, dig, and backfill trenches in a such as way as to minimise erosion and runoff.
- Hard wastes will be placed in the bins provided by the Company.
- Clients will be encouraged to landscape and cover exposed soil on their site as soon as possible.

SEDIMENT AND RUN-OFF CONTROL

- Upslope water will be diverted from the site where possible.
- Sediment controls will be placed at the bottom of the site to minimise runoff leaving the site. These may involve sediment fencing, supplemented with straw bales on steep areas.
- Existing vegetation will be used where possible to minimise runoff.
- Sump inlets will be protected from sediment runoff.
- Storm water down pipes will be connected as soon as practicable to the permanent Storm water system once the roof is laid.
- Contractors will be required to comply with these control measures.
- Wash down and wet trade runoff will be trapped and controlled on site
- Sediment control measures will be regularly inspected and maintained.

SITE ACCESS

- Stabilised access from the road to the platform will be provided.
- A runoff diversion bund will be included in the site access way if required.
- Sediment on footpaths and roads will be removed as soon as practicable.
